First Baptist Revival Begins April 1

Spring revival services will begin Sunday and continue through Sunday, April 1 for the Burkburnett First Baptist Church.

The revival, with "Use Your Head and Your Heart" as the theme, will be conducted by Rev. Robert Norsworthy as evangelist and Steve Taylor as music director.

Morning services will be held Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 9:30 a.m. Noon services will be held Tuesday and Thursday (only) with lunch beginning those services at 12:30 noon. Evening services will be held Monday through Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

A special emphasis will be given to area youth as a "Youth Explosion" will be held in Burk Royal Park Saturday, March 31, at noon with lunch served. That night will be designated as Youth Night in the church with a special youth musical

group, READY, coming to perform.

Rev. Norsworthy, a 1949 graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University and a 1953 graduate of Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Ft. Worth, has been pastor of the Lamar Baptist Church in Wichita Falls since Jan. 1966.

He was ordained to the ministry by the First Baptist Church of Edmond, Okla. in 1948. Pastoring only churches in Oklahoma before coming to Wichita Falls in 1966 he pastored West Lawn in Oklahoma, City, Trinity in Pauls Valley, Oak Avenue in Ada and the First Baptist Church in Cushing.

Rev. Norsworthy and his wife Naomi, have one daughter, Margaret Anne, 13 years of age. Talent and experience, Steve Taylor, who is conducting the revival's music services is a full-time music evangelist. He has had twenty-five years ex-

perience in music-evangelism and participated in over eight hundred revival crusades, four hundred and fifty Sacred Concerts, one hundred and thirty-four Evangelism and Bible Conferences, Mission endeavors and other varied religious programs. Though a native of California, he makes his home and headquarters in Greenville, South Carolina.

The varied sizes and cultures of churches he has encountered has given him a keen insight and understanding in dealing with situations in each given church and locality. Taylor is considered as one of the finest of choir and choral directors in the field today.

For the past five years he has been Chairman of Music for the Conference of Southern Baptist Evangelists. His ministry has associated him with many of the leading contemporary evangelists.

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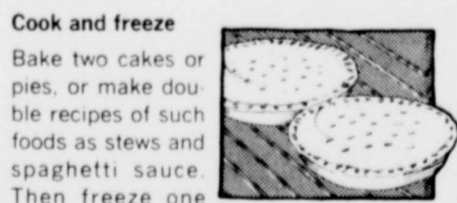
Tips to help you use electricity more efficiently for cooking.

You can get the most value from your electric range by following these tips.

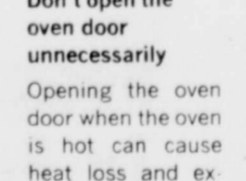


Use flat-bottomed pans
The flatter the pan the better the contact with the electric unit. Also, be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. And match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

can be cooked with little or no water. Once water starts to boil, use the lowest heat setting that will keep it boiling.



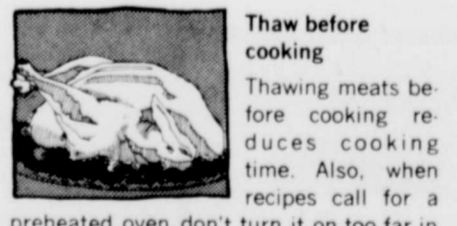
Cook and freeze
Bake two cakes or pies, or make double recipes of such foods as stews and spaghetti sauce. Then freeze one for future use. Also, when you're baking, prepare an oven meal at the same time so no surface cooking is necessary—simply choose foods that will cook at the same temperature.



Don't open the oven door unnecessarily
Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time. It also can result in undercooking.



Use minimum amount of water
The more water you use, the longer it takes to get it hot. Many foods



Thaw before cooking
Thawing meats before cooking reduces cooking time. Also, when recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance—usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

Bill Hobby, lieutenant governor of Texas, spoke at the recent Interscholastic League Press Conference in Austin about two vital pieces of legislation now before the Texas Congress concerning journalism. As guest speaker for the banquet which concluded the two-day gathering of high school journalists from around the state, Hobby provided the background and consequences of the Open Meetings Law and the controversial Newsman Shield Law.

Both proposed bills will not only affect this state's journalists, but will influence the outcome of similar bills now under consideration by state legislators around the country. The Open Meetings Law deals with an obstacle which has spun journalists for decades. It consists of all the closed sessions of legislators, the closed school board meetings, and other off-limit meetings from which the press has been excluded, Hobby said.

The proposed bill would make such meetings criminal offenses, in which any person participating would be liable reporter, but the refusal of appeal made it look as though the Courts favored dismissing confidential shield.

This is why the current news shield is necessary for Texas, because it is vital that the press be able to obtain information which can be kept confidential.

When it is possible for freedom of the press to be limited and controlled, then no freedom is safe. The press has always served in America as a means of exposing corruption in government which is necessary for the American people to know.

Hobby concluded by saying that the phrase "Freedom of Press" better illustrates what is at stake with these bills when reworded as "the right of the people to find out."

for a jail sentence, Hobby said. The Lieutenant Governor told the school journalists that he felt this was a just law which has been needed for a long time and one which only carries through the purpose of early Americans when they put the first amendment into law.

The second place of legislation which the Texas Democrat reviewed has been dubbed the Newsman's Shield Law.

Hobby stated that he felt one case has unfairly represented all news reporters and their attempt to keep confidential information. A reporter was recently arrested for observing the manufacture of an illegal drug which he did not report. The reporter would not reveal the names of the manufacturers and as a result was arrested. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court on the basis that newsmen have an immunity to withhold confidential information. The Supreme Court ruled that this is not so.

Hobby stated that he felt judgment had been passed not on the extremes of this particular

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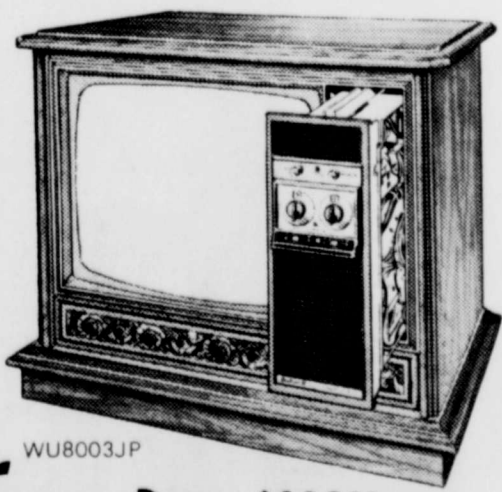

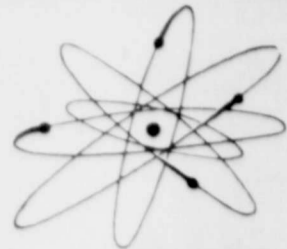

Two United At SAFB After Thirty - One Year Elapse

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--Despite a statistically minute chance, two men from two different countries who served together in the Pacific in the early days of World War II have met again at Sheppard, overcoming the rigors of prison camps and the likely possibility that their professions would take them far apart.

Java in early 1942 was a collection of Dutch, American, British, and Australian soldiers trying to slow the steamroller Japanese invasion across the Pacific.

Pearl Harbor was bombed, the Philippines barely clung on, and Singapore ready to fall, but the men on Java hoped to be more than merely the next in a string of Japanese conquests.

On this island was a young private in the Dutch Army and a Staff Sergeant in the second Battalion, 131st Field Artillery of the Texas National Guard, federalized in 1940. For Jules Mollinger, born in the Dutch East Indies to a warrant officer in the Dutch Army, waiting at Malang, northern Java, was a time to meet men in other units. For Leonard Campbell of Jacksboro, Texas, Malang was the destination when it became obvious the unit could not proceed to the Philippines.

The Japanese, unaware of the true strength of the island's defenses and uncomfortable with a seemingly large force on their right flank, turned and attacked. On March 1, the Japanese launched their first assault. On March 8, the allies of Java found how weak they were. The island surrendered, a guerrilla warfare was forbidden by the allied commanders, and all men were taken prisoner, including Private Mollinger and Sergeant Campbell.

Thirty-one years later, Mollinger and Campbell have met again, this time in the Transportation Officers course of the Department of Transportation Training, School of Applied Aerospace Sciences, at Sheppard. Mollinger is an employee of the U.S. Air Force in Rotterdam and Campbell is a transportation officer at Ellington AFB near Houston.

Besides Campbell, Mollinger has met Walt Collins, a good friend also from the Lost Battalion who now lives in Dallas. "Walt has not changed at all. Even after 30 years and all that has passed since then, he still looks the same," says Mollinger.

What did pass for the men was more than three years of brutal slavery. Mollinger, after capture, was sent to Changi Prison, Singapore, and then by oxcar to Burma. He spent the war with an itinerant labor crew that built airfields and

bridges for the Japanese. One of his creations was Udorn, now used by the U.S. Air Force.

Campbell was sent, with other Americans, to Hokkaido, northernmost island of the Japanese archipelago. There he spent the war working in steel mills and coal mines.

Liberation for both men came in 1945. Mollinger was rescued by British paratroopers from Assam, India. In Campbell's case, the guards simply disappeared one night, leaving the prisoners to their own resources.

Campbell joined the Air Force after the war and returned to Japan in 1946 to help with the war crimes trials. He retired from the Air Force in 1961 and has been at Ellington since then.

For Private Mollinger, the end of one war meant the beginning of another as Indonesia struggled for independence. In 1949, he left the army and went to the Netherlands, working first with a trading company, then with the Dutch Ministry of Defense, and now with the U.S. Air Force.

But their memories of imprisonment are still strong. Like all prisoners who make it, their survival hinged on tenacity, resistance, and sheer will to live. Never did either one doubt they would survive.

"They gave us too much food to die from and not enough to live on," said Mollinger. "But because I was raised near the jungle, I knew what plants would

Capt. Richardson Named As ATC Nurse of the Year

RANDOLPH AFB, TEXAS--(ATCPS)--Captain Daphne A. Richardson of Sheppard Air Force Base has been named Air Training Command's "Nurse of the Year," the first time that ATC has bestowed the honor.

In addition to serving as clinical nursing coordinator, pediatric service, USAF Regional Hospital, Sheppard AFB, she is nursing director of the Pediatric Nurse Associate Training Program at ATC.

Captain Richardson was chosen in competition with more than a dozen nominees, all assigned to hospitals on ATC bases. The final decision was made by a board convened at ATC headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas, by the ATC Surgeon.

The board also selected a second-place winner, Captain Kathryn A. Rogenes, medical-surgical practitioner at the USAF Regional Hospital at Chanute AFB, Ill.

Both nurses engaged in many corollary activities, in addition to carrying full patient loads. For example, Captain Richardson arranged for publication of pediatric health care information through a special weekly column in the base newspaper and actively participated in professional and health organization work in neighboring civilian communities.

Captain Rogenes took over the Nursing Clinic at the Chanute Hospital in 1971, then created the Medical-Surgical Practitioner role early last year.

She also served as a coordinator between the other nursing staff in the clinic and the Department of Nursing.

The winners will be honored in the near future at a formal dinner and award ceremony at Sheppard AFB, attended by high-ranking ATC medical and command officers.

Captain Richardson's name will be engraved on a 10-year plaque which will hang in the School of Health Care Sciences at Sheppard.
