Elections for the purpose of filling two places on the Burk Burnett Independent School District Board of Trustees will be held this Saturday, April 7 at the Burk Burnett Junior High School building. Places six and seven on the board will be sought by five candidates including 2 women and 3 men.

Thurman B. Allison, whose current place 6 term expires Saturday, will be seeking reelection to that place. Allison is opposed by Elizabeth Johnson. Three names will be seen on the ballot for place 7 of the board. They are Frank Morton, Major Taylor H. Greene, and Mrs. Odell Karstetter.

Burk To Host UIL Spring Meet

For the first time in Burk Burnett High School history since entering 3-A competition, the University Interscholastic League District Spring Meet will be hosted here beginning Friday, April 6 and will finish Saturday, the 7th. The director general for this year's competition is R.E. Warren, the Brownwood principal.

UIL is the official state coordinated competition held on the district level once a year in order to determine winners in academic events and spring sports. The winners of this district competition will advance to regional competition and those winners will be vying for state honors.

The Meet will feature competition for district crown in such sport areas as Track and Field, Tennis, Golf, and Volleyball. The academic events cover such areas as speech, literary events, secretarial skills, and science. The speech category of UIL events is divided into such areas as debate, poetry, prose readings, and persuasive and informative speaking. The literary category includes journalism, ready writing, and spelling, while the secretarial skills are typing and shorthand. Science competition includes science, slide rule, and number sense.

Burk Burnett's debate team entering the UIL Spring Meet is Dwight Caldwell and Mark Bailey. The national debate question they will debate for this year is "Resolved that the federal government should EXCLUSIVELY finance public education."

Entering Informative Speaking will be Ken Schroeder for the Boy's division and Debbie Spanable for the Girls; Ken Willingham is the alternate for the Boy's Division. Robbie Pemberton and Vickie Sickman will represent Burk Burnett in Persuasive Speaking and Ken Willingham is the alternate for this event.

Robin Walton and Diana Osborne will compete in Poetry Interpretation with alternates Dennis Barnes and Kathy Fidalio filling in for these contestants if they cannot attend. Steve Ranson and Teri Garland are the Burk entries for Prose Reading while Alan Mahaffey and Kathy Fidalio serve as alternates.

The Journalism event which will be directed by a Burk Burnett teacher, Mrs. Annie Gil-

lespie, will be attended by Sedelta Verble in Feature and Headline Writing, Janet Nelson in Editorial Writing, and Mel and Epps in Newswriting. Jacqueline Harris and Gayla Williams will be alternates in this category.

Mrs. Dorothy Page will direct the Ready Writing Event with Burk Burnett contestants Cindy Long and Teri Garland. Spelling and Plain Writing competition will include Paul Deutsch, Mike Lang and Marsha Milam from Burk Burnett with Marcie Long as the alternate.

Ranette Hudson and Rosalie Bills are the contestants for the Shorthand events and Karen Clarkston is the alternate. Mrs. Jane McCoy, a Burk Burnett teacher, will direct the event. Gail Cullison, Lynn Leonard, Dianna Barrett, Gayla Wheeler, Kim Aaron make up the Typewriting Team while Cheryl Gullory will be alternate. Mrs. Zell Schmidt is the director from Burk Burnett who will coordinate these events.

Barry Steele's Burk Burnett's hopeful in Science competition and Morgan Moore, Mark Rogers, and Joyce Morgan compose the Number Sense Team.

The One-Act Play competition will include the four winners of zone contests. Zones are divided into North and South, and the two winners of each zone advance to district. The zone contest in One-Act were held last Thursday at Vernon and from our North zone Hirschi and Vernon advanced to district. The district play-off will be at Hirschi High School April 6.

Tennis competition for district will be the 6th-7th with Coach Susan Hardeeman as director for this contention. Bill Froman will direct the track and field events and Bob Carpenter will direct the golf competition. The golf team will be competing in the third leg of district contention and this will decide regional contestants. As Burk Burnett doesn't have a volleyball team the competition will be held at Weatherford.

All area schools in district 3-A will be competing in these events utilizing Burk Burnett High School as host for these categories. Area residents are invited to come to the Burk Burnett High School to view the track and field events and the tennis matches. The golf tournament will be held at Sheppard Air Force Base Golf Course.

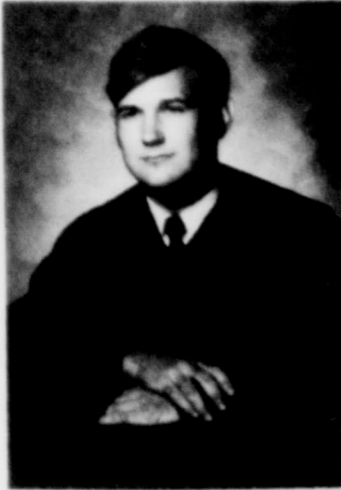

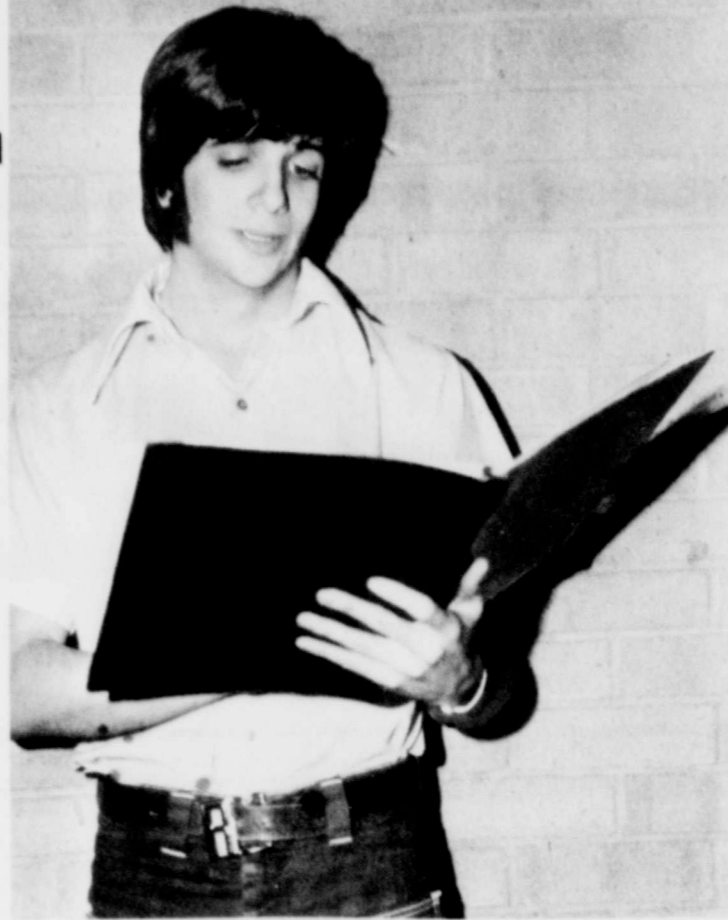

LETTERS to the EDITOR

Dear Sir:

Recently your paper printed a letter from a resident of Burk asking why the City ordinances concerning dogs were not properly enforced. The following week a rebuttal by the city manager was printed stating that all was being done, etc., etc.

Your paper is doing a public service by printing these complaints, but I would like to see this issue pursued further. Possibly printing the ordinances would help enlighten the public as to requirements for keeping dogs within the city limits.

It is impossible for me to set a trash basket on my patio while housecleaning, garbage cans are overturned and scattered, my children are growled and barked at while playing in our own yard, it is a daily job to repair my shrubs and flowers which are dug up, and the odor and mess left by neighbor's dogs is most annoying during hot weather. This morning the cover for our riding lawn mower was torn up by dogs. These are only a few of the reasons I would like to see a daily patrol for picking up animals running loose. I think this is the only way the situation will be remedied. But I certainly get the idea that the city's sympathies lie with the offenders. And the offenders must feel that the laws were made for someone other than themselves.

Last summer I personally called the police six times complaining about dogs that run loose, some without tags. Each

time I gave my name and address. I also gave the names and addresses of the people who made no attempt to enclose or restrain their animals. After the 6th call, the offending people must have been contacted as their friendly attitude abruptly changed. Only one of the dogs was thereafter restrained, and none were impounded. The situation is as bad, or worse than ever.

I have 2 dogs myself, so I am not a dog-hater. I am neither a crackpot or trouble maker but after a while it is hard to remain casual.

I enjoy my animals but as a matter of common decency I don't expect others to feel as I do about them. It is my place to see that they don't bother others, rather than putting people in the position of straining relations by requesting me to do as I am already required by law to do. But laws without enforcement are useless.

Mr. Bobby G. Littlejohn, president, Mr. Thurman B. Allison, Jr., Mr. Gene Bankhead, Mr. John B. Gill, Mr. Ira W. Schroeder, Mr. Ted B. Harris, Mr. Norman Roberts and the following absent: none; constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Mr. Thurman B. Allison, Jr., Place 6 and Mr. Bobby G. Littlejohn, Place 7, members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1973, said first Saturday being April 7, 1973, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District. WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BURKBURNETT INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 7, 1973, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District Members to fill Place 6 and Place 7.
2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall

be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election. All candidates shall file said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered 27, 28 and 29 at Junior High School Building, in Burk Burnett, Texas, in said School District, with Mr. Francis T. Felty, as Presiding Judge and Mrs. C.M. Archer, Mrs. James Roderick, Mrs. A. H. Lohofener, and Mrs. Francis Felty Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

4. Mr. Raymond Smart is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mrs. Betty Loveless is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Burk Burnett School Tax Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain within the boundaries of the

above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

7. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to be posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to

be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

8. It is further found and determined that in accordance with the order of the Board of Trustees the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board, located in the administrative office, a place convenient to the public, and said notice having been so posted and remained posted continuously for at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that this district is located in Wichita and Clay counties and that written notice of the date, place and subject matter of this meeting was furnished to the County Clerk of each county in which this district is located and that said notices were posted by the County Clerk of each of said counties on the bulletin board at the door of the county court-house for said county, a place convenient to the public, at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting. The returns of said posting shall be attached to the minutes of this meeting and shall be a part thereof for all intents and purposes.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Mr. Bobby G. Thomas studies the game and follows professional tactics. "Anyone can become a real good tennis player if they practice with determination," he concluded. Thomas practices at least three hours per day. This in itself explains Thomas's continued success -- Practice and determination.



Thomas plans to become a professional tennis player and tennis teacher. He stated that it would take him five years to shape-up for stiff professional competition and 10 years to actually become a pro.

"I like tennis because it doesn't really matter how large you are. Most people think that it is an easy game, but it is really physically demanding," he commented. He said that the game demanded the player to run all the time and that it is a game of alertness. He prefers to take the offensive position at the net and this illuminates the attitude he takes toward the game.

DALLAS--Plans to construct and operate a new pipeline in Southeastern Oklahoma and an 850-horsepower compressor station will be installed near Durant.

King also noted that 36 miles of interstate lines between Texas and Oklahoma will be abandoned, and 382 miles of pipeline in Northeast Texas will be transferred to intrastate operations.

Estimated cost of all construction and realignment of facilities is \$2.5 million, with all work to be completed by December, 1973.

S. Harry King, Vice President of Lone Star's Transmission Division revealed that a new 8-inch pipeline will be built from the company's present facilities near Durant, Oklahoma along a 79 mile route parallel to the Texas-Oklahoma border to Idabel in McCurtain County, Oklahoma. Two other short sections of 8-inch pipeline

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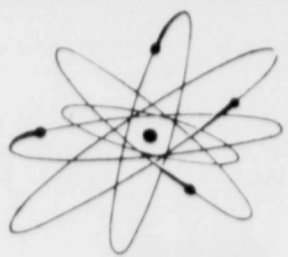
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Madden Given Commendation

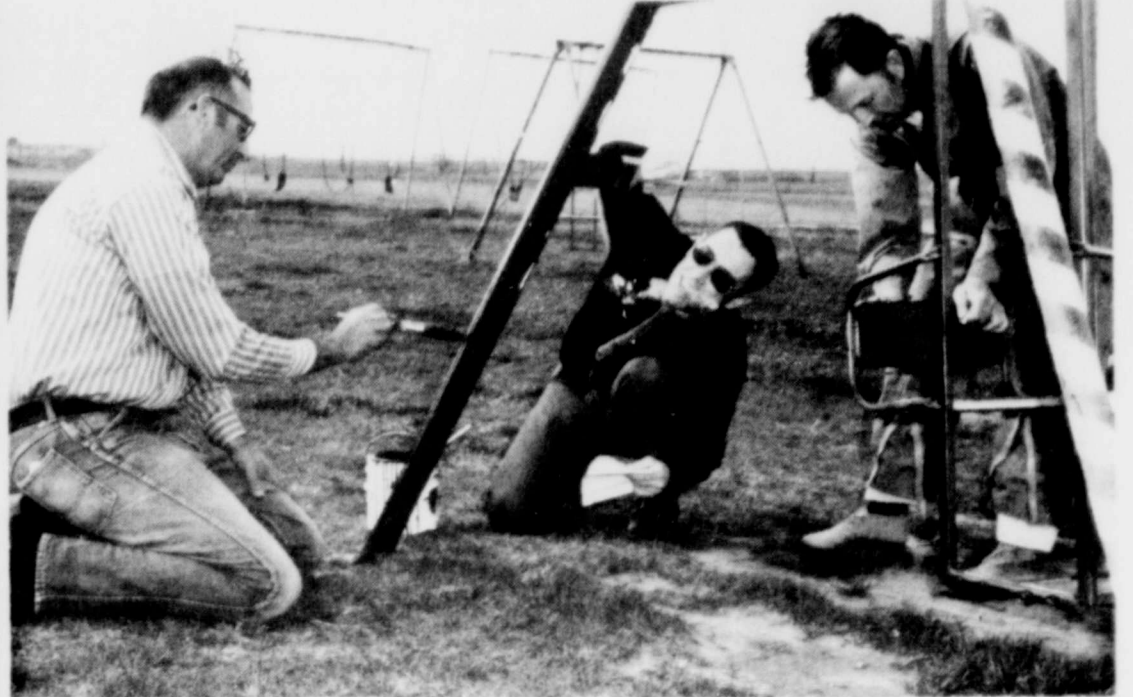
Quick Thinking Saves Life

SHEPPARD AFB, TEXAS--When you're into your ninth day of basic training and you step into a room and find a person lying on the floor unconscious and bleeding, how do you react?
If you're Airman Basic John Madden you automatically do what needs to be done.
For his life saving actions at Lackland AFB, Texas, in December, Airman Madden received the Air Force Commendation Medal here March 12.
The medal, presented by Colonel Carl Brunson, commander of the School of Applied Aerospace Sciences, is believed to

be possibly the first ever learned by an airman basic.
Early last December Airman Madden, then of the 3760th Basic Military Training Squadron, was pulling dorm guard for a new flight, supervising two dorm guards in their third day of basic flight, supervising two of basic.
At 3:30 a.m., on a routine fire check of the dorm, Airman Madden walked into the upstairs latrine and found a trainee sprawled unconscious in a pool of blood. He immediately began applying digital pressure on the airman, and sent one trainee guard to the man in charge of quarters to call for an ambulance.
As the blood flow began slowing, the injured airman went into shock and stopped breathing. Airman Madden began artificial respiration at once until breathing was restored.
When medical personnel arrived with an ambulance, the bleeding was under control and breathing was steady.
What does one think of while saving a man's life?
"I didn't think of anything. I just did what I knew needed to be done," said a modest Airman Madden.
Airman Madden learned what "needed to be done" before entering the Air Force. For 3 years before enlisting he worked in his hometown of Waltham, Mass., on the City Drug Commission.
"Just shortly before enlisting I had worked with three heavy OD's (drug overdose victims). You get used to the possibility of death, but you learn to do what needs to be done without thinking or getting too emotionally involved," he said.
Airman Madden of the 3775th Student's Squadron, is presently a student disbursement accounting specialist with the Department of Comptroller Training, School of Applied Aerospace Sciences.

The loudest noise across the nation at present seems to be coming from the housewife over food prices and beef prices in particular. I guess those years I spent at the end of a hoe handle and the long hours of milking and feeding cattle in some of the most adverse weather conditions imaginable; not to mention the sleepless nights I've spent delivering baby pigs has made me a little more sentimental toward our farmers and ranchers.

I know meat prices are high, but isn't everything else? As one man remarked as we were talking about the meat prices, "There goes a man wearing a \$30 pair of slacks, a \$12 shirt and a \$7 tie and his wife is wearing a \$45 pant suit and \$30 shoes, driving a \$5,000 automobile, living in an \$8,000 home and yet we consider them only an average family."

I'm not taking a swipe at the clothing, automobile or lumber businesses, but only pointing out that everything costs more.

I noticed in a clipping the other day that if the price of choice steers had gone up as fast since 1950 as the price of a first-class postage stamp, steers would be bringing \$77 per hundred, compared with Monday's market price of \$49.50.

If beef prices had increased as much as medical care, steers would be selling for \$72.34.

If the rise had been as fast as hourly pay, the figure would be \$80.50.

Compared to the cost of having a baby, steers would be bringing \$19.13.

Compared to the daily cost of hospital service steers would bring \$79.69.

As I say, I'm still not convinced that the farmer and rancher are getting a penny too much for their products, especially when you consider the tremendous costs of land, machinery, feed and his living costs. Incidentally prices in all four of those categories have risen tremendously in the past years too.

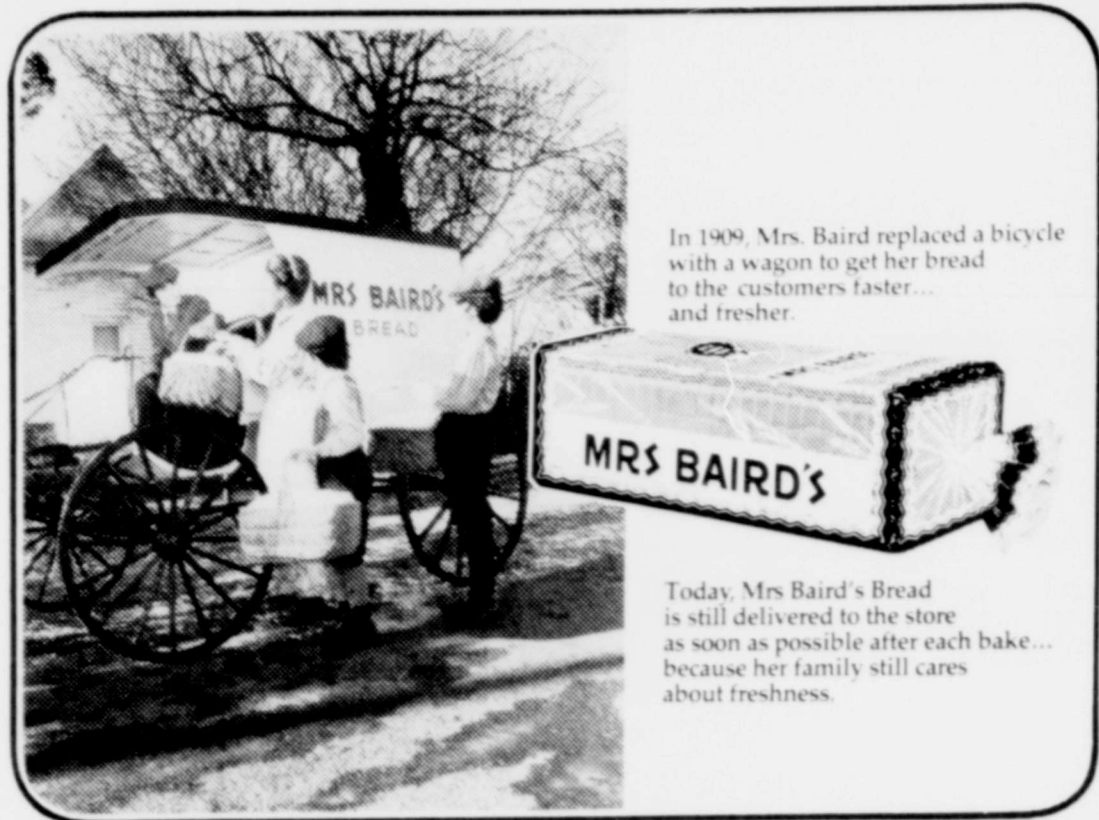
Edwards encouraged North Texans to support the rehabilitation center, which serves the people of Burkburnett as well as those throughout North Texas with their Easter Seal gifts.

He pointed out that Easter Seals helped make it possible for 528 children and adults to receive needed therapy at the North Texas Rehabilitation Center during the past year but stressed there are more needing help and they can get it only if the center receives the funds it needs. The 1972-73 budget is \$32,847.20.

Prior to start of the luncheon, Edwards toured the center, signed autographs for young

patients and met with members of the board of directors and others from Wichita Falls and area towns.

Easter Seal letters from Roger Staubach, Dallas Cowboys Quarterback and state Easter Seal chairman were mailed to residents of Burkburnett asking for their support of the rehabilitation center. 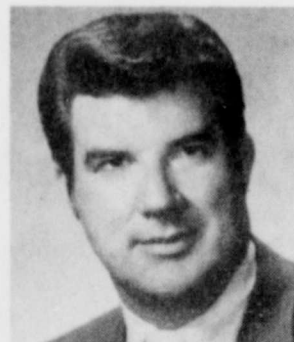

TB, TODAY'S THREAT

Living is a difficult business for everyone. But especially for older people in our society. Bodily defenses tend to break down in old age and people become vulnerable to a variety of ills. Active tuberculosis is one of those ills.

Many older people who develop active TB today were infected years ago when the disease was widespread. But they showed no noticeable symptoms. Gradually their bodies walled off the TB germs. White blood cells first encircled the germs, then special tissues, and finally calcium. The TB germs were encased.

When the body's defenses weaken, however, the barriers around the germs start to crumble. Then the TB germs escape and multiply. Fatigue, weakness, coughing, and weight loss can be symptoms of active disease. Spitting up blood in the sputum and loss of appetite may be signs of well-developed disease. Drug therapy can cure the disease; but many older people do not receive proper medical care.

Poor diet and falling general health are some of the conditions that help weaken the body's defenses. And diet is often sadly neglected by older people. Their dietary requirements shift with age—they need fewer calories but just as much protein—and most older people eat the wrong kinds of foods. Fresh meat and vegetables are expensive; many older people

are living on marginal budgets. Shopping and cooking is difficult for them. Younger relatives and friends can take an increased interest in seeing that older people eat better and be healthier.
