## ROTARY HOSTS PPG SUPERS

Two superintendents of the giant PPG Industries, now under construction at Bacon Switch, were guests of the Burk Burnett Rotary Club Tuesday at noon. The two gentlemen are also new residents of Burk Burnett.

Hoot Gibbs and Stan Degreve who are now residing in Burk, told Rotarians and guests of the glass making process as it will be conducted when construction is completed in the future.

Hoot Gibbs, who will be in charge of the "Hot end of the factory" explained that 4 major steps will be under his supervision. It will be up to him to see that all raw materials arrive by rail and are separated into their respective storage areas. Then the "batching process" will begin. This process mixes the proper materials and readies them for melting. A batch is made of 70% sand with soda ash and

lime stone comprising the remaining percentage.

Hoot explained that the second step is to melt and refine the glass into the molten product with step three following with forming, cooling and readying the glass for cutting. The final step in Hoots department will be cutting, weighing, and stacking the product.

Stan Degreve will then take over with his department which is called the "Wareroom". Ac-

ording to Stan, the wareroom is the largest part of the PPG factory. It consists of approximately 21 acres of space and it is here that the glass is prepared for the customer. In the wareroom the glass product is washed, cut to customer specifications with a score and snap cutting process, packaged and shipped to the customer. Stan stated that approximately 9,000,000 board feet of lumber per year would be required for packaging of the PPG product. The wareroom will work approximately 650 of the 900 employees at the Plant.

Stan and Hoot also mentioned that of the 900 to be employed by PPG, 10% would be for the professional and supervisory force and would probably be moved in from another area. This leaves a very large percentage to be hired from the immediate area. Both are looking forward to working with area people in the efforts of PPG.

Mayor T.M. Cornelius was in charge of the program and presented the two executives to club members. Following the program, the Mayor welcomed Hoot and Stan to Burk Burnett and stated that these people and others like them stand for quality of product and people and expressed his certainty of PPG employees making good citizens and neighbors.

### School Board Approves 73-74 Appropriations

Unanimous approval was given by the School Board for the 1973-74 Budget of more than \$2.2 million dollars for the Burk Burnett Independent School District. The budget was presented in an open meeting held Monday night.

Estimated expenditures of \$2,244,000, was presented by Superintendent James Pearson. This amount includes \$78,000 for administration; \$1,744,200 for instruction; \$67,000 for pupil transportation; \$152,000 for operation of plant; \$32,000 for plant maintenance; \$40,000 for capital outlay; \$63,100 for debt service; \$12,000 for student activities; \$25,000 for fixed charges; \$18,000 for health services; and \$12,700 for food services.

A revenue of \$2,244,000 of which \$276,000 would be from local taxes, \$1,622,974 from state appointment, \$344,928 from federal sources and \$100 from county sources is expected for the year.

The tax rate previously approved by the Board was \$15.0 per \$100 valuation. The assessed valuation of the Burk Burnett

## Wichita Co. To Start Stamp Program Oct. 1

The new statewide food stamp program will start operation October 1, 1973, in Wichita County.

This was announced today by Mr. William E. McKinney, Food Stamp Program Director, State Department of Public Welfare.

"The statewide food stamp program will replace the commodity foods program currently operating in this county," explains Mr. McKinney. "The statewide program was made possible when the 1972 Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a state-administered, state-financed statewide food program."

The State Department of Public Welfare will administer the new program and the United States Department of Agriculture will provide the food stamps and bonus stamps.

Eligible households pay a set amount for food stamps and are then given bonus stamps based on size of household and their total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for a nutritious diet.

Also, bonus stamps mean many dollars worth of new business for the community. Bonus stamps represent money that low-income households would not otherwise have to spend at local grocery stores.

A recent study of three rural food stamp communities showed that food stamps represented from five to ten percent of the total retail food sales.

Households are certified eligible for food stamps at the food stamp office at 401 Burk Burnett Road, Wichita Falls.

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### Food Stamps Program

Certified households will then receive Authorization To Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

The ATP card and the necessary cash are redeemable for food stamps at local post offices.

Participating grocers accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic beverages, tobacco and most imported items.

Participation in the food stamp program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from receiving any other benefits for which the members might be eligible.

Food stamps increase the food purchasing power of low-income households. And food stamps are also good for the community's economy. Studies show that food stamps generate new economy and create new jobs.

### Letter To The People

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Burk Burnett Schools serve nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for the following prices: Grades 1-3: 45¢; Grades 4-6: 50¢ and Grades 7-12: 60¢.

Children from families whose income is at or below those shown on the scale are eligible for free meals. If your income is greater than those shown but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

To apply for free meals for your children at anytime during the year you may obtain an application blank from the school office and return it to the school. The school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible within five (5) days of receiving your application.

If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the Superintendent of Schools, 408 Glendale, Burk Burnett, Texas, phone 569-3326.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have such children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

If we can be of any further assistance or if your income changes during the year, please contact us.

#### U. S. 287 Extension Officially Open

Thursday, August 9 was a big day for residents in parts of Wichita and Wilbarger Counties. On Thursday, at 2:30 p.m., the new 13,058 mile U.S. 287 Expressway between Electra and Oklaunion was officially opened.

Speaking at the ribbon cutting ceremonies was State Highway Engineer B.L. DeBerry of Austin. He also spoke at a noon luncheon in Electra prior to the ceremonies as members of civic clubs of Electra and Vernon held a combined meeting.

The ceremonies were held atop the westbound U.S. 287 overpass in Harrold. Traffic was rerouted on a service road from 1:00 p.m. until the conclusion of the ceremonies about 2:45 p.m.

The project was started February 1, 1971 and cost some

\$3,247,882.00. The contractors were the Zack Burkett Company of Graham, Herber Brantley Construction of Vernon and the L.H. Lacy Company of Dallas. Martin L. Raabe was the Texas Highway Department Supervising Resident Engineer in charge of the project.

The new highway starts one mile east of Oklaunion and ends one mile west of the Wichita County Line near Electra. The contractors were given 350 working days to complete the work when the contract was awarded.

Representatives of Electra, Vernon, Harrold, Oklaunion, Iowa Park, Wichita Falls, the Texas Highway Department and other areas were on hand to take part in the ceremonies at Harrold.

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#### School Board

School District is \$18,603,130. Revenues from state sources include \$477,517 per capita apportionment, \$1,052,709 for salary and operation; \$39,348 for transportation; \$5,99 for vocational travel; \$30,000 under Title I; \$6,000 for driver's education; \$7,500 supplemental salary aid and \$4,000 sick leave.

The Board has previously approved an athletic activity budget of \$28,542; band budget of \$9,245; and choir budget of \$825.

Further action taken by the School Board was in the employment of John Parrish as maintenance superintendent, Robert Johnson as high school coach and Clarence Gilstrap as a junior high school coach. A leave of absence for one year was granted to Mrs. Sharon Martin.

A ten cent increase in the cost of school cafeteria meals was approved with future prices to range from 45 cents for primary students to 75 cents for adults.

Endorsement by the Board was given to the proposal of Vernon Junior College to use the Burk Burnett High School facility for extension courses.

For instance, one 100-watt bulb gives more light than three 40-watt bulbs, it uses less energy and costs less to buy, too. Be sure to check the fixture for its maximum bulb wattage rating.

5. Use fluorescent lamps where you can. They give more lumens per watt and have longer life. They can also produce a color of light comparable to incandescent bulbs.

I spent several hours this past week visiting with local game wardens about the prospective upcoming hunting seasons. I thought at this time I would give you a several county outlook. Dove season opens in on September 1st in the North Zone with shooting hours from noon (12 o'clock) to sunset, bag limits of ten birds per day, and possession of 20. The season ends on October 14, 1973, and the second dove season runs from January 5th through January 20th, 1974. Bill Evans from Archer County, David Hancock from Young County and Paul Corona from Wichita County all reporting fair to good hunting prospects. All three wardens report some bird hunting would be spotty. If possible, plan your hunt near feed fields and sun flower patches. More than likely you will find heavy concentrations of mourning doves in these areas. The Texas deer season opens on Saturday, November 17th and ends on Tuesday, January 1, 1974. No doe permits will be issued in Jack, Young, Palo Pinto or Stephens counties. David Hancock, the game warden from Young County attributes the issuing of no doe permits to these counties to the smaller deer population resulting from poor habitat and hunting pressure. The drought, fires and the smaller number of doe deer brought this about. There will be more hunters than ever before in the field, and a smaller deer kill is expected. Only two buck deer may be taken in the above counties. The Quail season will be open on December 1, 1973, and will continue until February 15, 1974. The exception of this will be Hardeman, Foard, King and

Dickens Counties. The season for these four counties will be from December 1, 1973 until January 31, 1974. If you are planning a hunt out of town it would be wise to check your map for bag limits, possession limits and shooting hours. The quail outlook for Wichita County is quite good according to state warden, Ken Holder. Bill Evans reports spotty hunting in Archer County, and in fact, some areas may even rate close to poor. David Hancock, in Young County also reports some spotty hunting. It really is too early and too soon to give a closer run down on the quail situation. The first item to purchase should be your new combination hunting and fishing license. Hunting season is here, so to speak, and now would be a great time for all sportsmen to review their field manners. The farmer and rancher has never in my lifetime needed help as bad as he needs it now. Cattle rustling is at a peak that would even astonish the old timers. Road side hunting is going on every night. In other words, cattle are being stolen by the truck loads in this area. Fat yearlings are being butchered in the pastures where they were shot from automobiles. All of the activity plus the usual bad habits that hunters have are costing these boys money. When I say "boy", I mean farmers and ranchers. If you really want to make an impression on the landowner that you hunt and fish on, then help him control these money losing acts. You can do this by reporting all strange vehicles in his immediate area to the proper authorities. Don't worry about turning in your buddy because if he is innocent, he doesn't have anything to

worry about. Report all open gates and spot-lighters. Report newly made roads that you know are not supposed to be there. Call the land owner and report all suspicious looking strangers that might be sizing up a ranching operation. These are just a few things that you can do to help prevent the tarnishing of the sportsman's name. I do not know of a single landowner that would not appreciate help.

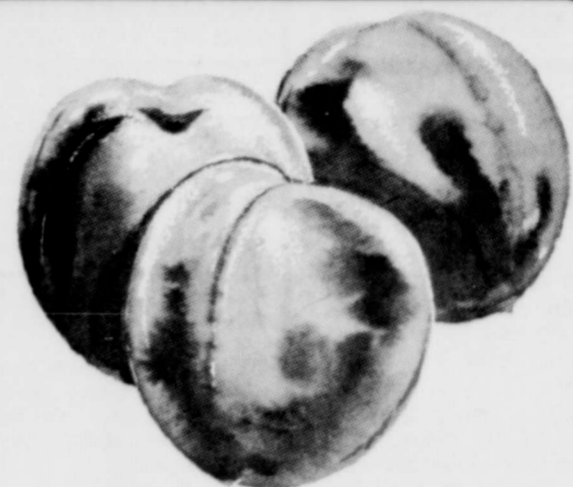
