School Board Approves 73-74

Appropriations

Unanimous approval was given by the School Board for the 1973-74 Budget of more than \$2.2 million dollars for the Burkburnett Independent School District. The budget was presented in an open meeting held Monday night.

Estimated expenditures of \$2,244,000, was presented by Superintendent James Pearson. This amount includes \$78,000 for administration; \$1,744,200 for instruction; \$67,000 for pu-pil transportation; \$152,000 for operation of plant; \$32,000 for plant maintenance; \$40,000 for capital outlay; \$63,100 for debt service; \$12,000 for student activities; \$25,000 for fixed charges; \$18,000 for health services; and \$12,700 for food services. A revenue of \$2,244,000 of which \$276,000 would be from local taxes, \$1,622,974 from state appointment, \$344,926 from federal sources and \$100 from county sources is expected for the year.

The tax rate previously approved by the Board was \$15.0 per \$100 valuation. The assessed valuation of the Burkburnett

Start Stamp Program Oct. 1

The new statewide food stamp program will start operation October 1, 1973, in Wichita County. This was announced today by

Mr. William E. McKiney, Food Stamp Program Director, State Department of Public Welfare. "The statewide food stamp program will replace the commodity foods program currently operating in this county," ex-plains Mr. McKinney. "The statewide program was made possible when the 1972 Texas Legislature appropriated \$7.7 million for a state-administer-

ed, state - financed statewide food program." The State Department of Public Welfare will administer the new program and the United States Department of Agriculture will provide the food stamps and bonus stamps. Eligible households pay a set amount for food stamps and are

then given bonus stamps based on size of household and their total net income. Bonus stamps make up the difference between what a household can pay for food and what is necessary for a nutritious diet.

Also, bonus stamps mean many dollars worth of new business for the community. Bonus stamps represent money that low-income households would not otherwise have to spend at local grocery stores.

A recent study of three rural food stamp communities showed that food stamps represented from five to ten percent of the total retail food sales. Households are certified el-

igible for food stamps at the food stamp office at 401 Burkburnett Road, Wichita Falls. Continued on Page 2

Food Stamps Program

Certified households will then receive Authorization To Purchase (ATP) cards in the mail which will tell them how many stamps they are eligible for and how much money, if any, they must pay for them.

The ATP card and the necessary cash are redeemable for food stamps at local post

Participating grocers accept food stamps for the purchase of most foods and food products. Food stamps cannot be used to buy alcoholic bev-

erages, tobacco and most im-ported items. Participation in the food stamp program is voluntary and does not prevent the household from receiving any other benefits for which the members might be eligible.

Food stamps increase the food purchasing power of lowincome households. And food stamps are also good for the community's economy. Studies show that food stamps generate new economy and create new jobs.

Leitner was born January 6, 1915 in Durham, Oklahoma to John W., Sr. and Flora Leitner. He was also an Army veteran of WWII.



A lighting specialist tells what to look for when you're buying light bulbs.



Here are some suggestions that may help you in the wise selection of light bulbs for your home.

. All general service incandescent bulbs now have three ratings on their packaging. (A) Lumens tell you about the light output or performance of the bulb. (B) Watts tell you how much electricity is needed to produce that light. (C) Bulb life is stated as an average, and is an indication of the hours of use you may expect before the bulb burns out.

2. When the amount of light is more important than bulb life - for reading, studying or working - choose a standard bulb that provides the most

lumens for its wattage. **B.** Where bulbs are difficult to change and when the amount of light needed is not so important, choose an extended life bulb. You'll get longer bulb life, but you'll give up some light. Considering two bulbs of the same wattage, longer life means less light. You give up one for the other.

4. In some cases you can take advantage of the fact that one large bulb may give more light at lower cost than a group of smaller bulbs. For instance, one 100-watt bulb gives more light than three 40-watt bulbs; it uses less energy and costs less to buy, too. Be sure to check the fixture for its maximum bulb wattage rating.

5. Use fluorescent lamps where you can. They give more lumens per watt and have longer life. They can also produce a color of light comparable to incandescent bulbs.

The quail outlook for Wichita County is quite good according to state reports spotty hunting in Archer County, and in fact, some areas may even rate close to poor. David Hancock, in Young County also reports some spotty hunting. It really is too early and too soon to give a closer run down on the quail situation. The first item to purchase should be your new combination hunting and fishing license.

Hunting season is here, so possible, plan your hunt near to speak, and now would be a great time for all sportsmen to review their field manners. The farmer and rancher has never in my lifetime needed help as bad as he needs it now. Cattle rustling is at a peak that would even astonish the old timers. Road side hunting is going on every night. In other words, cattle are being stolen by the truck loads in this area. Fat yearlings are being butchered in the pastures where they were shot from auto-mobiles. All of the activity plus the usual bad habits that hunters have are costing these boys money. When I say "boy" I mean farmers and ranchers. If you really want to make an impression on the landowner that you hunt and fish on, then help him control these money losing acts. You can do this by reporting all strange vehicles in his immediate area to the proper authorities. Don't worry about turning in your buddy because if he is innocent, he doesn't have anything to
