The faculty and administrative staff will be composed of individuals meeting the approval of school officials of Burkburnett Independent School District, and the courses will be taught at Burkburnett High School.

Anyone meeting the entrance requirements of VRJC may enroll in this college level program. Generally, if an individual is a high school graduate, has a GED or is 21 years of age or older, he may enroll. Registration will be con-

ducted on Wednesday and Thursday evening at 6:30 p.m. September 6 and 7 at Burkburnett High School.

Students may enroll for one or two courses, either 3 or 6 hours college credit, at either of the registration periods. Tuition for all students in the Continuing Education Program will be \$30. The cost of textbooks and any other supplies needed by the student will be in addition to tuition. There is also a nominal lab fee for some courses offered.

### John F. Parrish

Funeral services for John F. Parrish, Jr., 52, were held Monday at 2:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church. A resident of Burkburnett since 1953, Parrish was recovered from Lake Texhoma late Friday afternoon, the victim of accidental drowning. Parrish's boat was found running wild at the lake Friday, with only his dog on board. Authorities at Kingston, Oklahoma said Parrish had left his lake home in the Willis Bridge area Thursday to go fishing. A rope found entangled in the boat's propeller, lead officials to theorize that Parrish might have been knocked overboard when it caught.

Justice of the Peace Robert Dean of Sherman, Texas ruled the death as accidental drowning.

Rev. Lamoin Champ, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Burkburnett officiated at the service. Burial was in the Burkburnett Cemetery under the direction of Owens & Brumley Funeral Home.

Born December 1, 1920, in Windom, Texas, Parrish served 25 years with the U.S. Air Force and retired as a chief master sergeant in 1967. He then worked as plant foreman for Leer Manufacturing of Burkburnett until resigning to accept the position as maintenance supervisor for the Burkburnett schools. His duties were to begin this fall term.

Parrish was a member of the Baptist Church choir and was also a deacon of the church. He was past secretary of the Burkburnett Evening Lions Club.

Survivors include his wife, Margaret; a daughter, Mrs. Troy Slayden of Burkburnett; a son, John F. III of College Station, Texas; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John F. Parrish, Sr. of Burk-burnett; a grandmother, Mrs. R.L. Winchester of Honey Grove; two brothers, Bob of San Francisco, Calif. and Bookey of Dallas; and one grandchild.







### Think twice before you open this door.

The habit of opening refrigerator and freezer doors only when it's really necessary is a saving habit. The cold air that rushes out each time has to be replaced, which causes the unit to run more and use more electricity. Make a mental list of the items you need before you open the door, then take out as many of them as you can at one time.

#### NEWS RELEASE FUEL SHORTAGE **RELIEF SOUGHT**

AUSTIN-Greater oil and gas production to pare down Texas energy shortages is the aim of companion bills introduced in the Texas Legislature this week.

The measures would liberalize unitization requirements for oil and gas fields so as to increase production of oil and gas reserves, according to sponsors of the legislation, Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon and Rep. Dave Finney of Ft. Worth.

They said the legislation would help accomplish one of Gov. Dolph Briscoe's goals: To get the maximum recovery from reserves as one of the means to solve the energy shortage.

A major obstacle, aside from technological aspects, preventing the tapping of part of the 98 billion barrels of Texas oil reserves has been an obsolete oil-gas unitization law that requires 100 per cent agreement from operators and royalty owners in a field to unitize, the lawmakers said. The requirement has been so restrictive that only one of every 10 Texas fields now operates as a unit. Under terms of the Hightower-Finney proposal, a consent

The reason is "pinkeye". Pinkeye is an infectious eye disease of cattle of all ages and breeds. However, younger animals under two years of age

than older ones. The eye inflammation occurs most often in summer and fall and is greatly more prevalent in white-faced animals. Dry, dusty conditions, bright sun-light, feeding in tall grass and the presence of flies all tend to aggravate the condition.






