Dedication of the new educational facilities at Central Baptist Church, 814 Tidal St., will be Feb. 10, 1974.

The schedule for the occasion is as follows: 10:40--Dr. James Landes will speak; 12:00--All Church Dinner; 2:00--Special Dedication Service with speakers Mr. O.E. "Cotton" Kinard, Mayor T.M. Cornelius, and Rev. Edgar Jones; 6:30--Dr. Kenneth Bradshaw will speak.

Dr. Landes is the Executive Secretary of the Executive Board Baptist General Convention of Texas. He is a former pastor of the First Baptist Church, Wichita Falls; First Baptist Church, Birmingham, Ala.; First Baptist Church, Richardson, Texas; and has served as president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Landes has also served as president of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, Texas. He is very active in other denominational and civic responsibilities.

Dr. Kenneth Bradshaw is the former pastor of Central Baptist Church. He has pastored other churches in the state, and served on the staff at the University of Corpus Christi.

The new facilities provide space for eight departments: Children I, II, and III; Youth I and II; Adults I, II, and III. The new construction contains 10,211 square feet of floor space at a cost of \$122,000.

Asks \$150,000 Damages

Walton Files Suit Against City

A suit asking \$100,000 for losses and \$50,000 in punitive and exemplary damages was filed against the City of Burk Burnett last Wednesday. Seeking damages totaling \$150,000 was Sam H. Walton, a Wichita Falls oilman.

In the suit filed in the office of District Clerk Wayne Wiggins, Walton accused Burk Burnett of acting unlawfully in refusing to grant him a city permit to drill four wells on an oil and gas lease he owns in the city. The petition alleged that re-

fusal precluded him from fully developing the lease and violated his state and constitutional rights. In his petition Walton said he would show he was the owner of an oil and gas lease involving some 290 acres of land of the Sam Ander-

son survey. The suit claims that Walton was denied the permit to drill without being given the right to be heard at the January 21 meeting of the City Council. The case was assigned for trial in the 89th District Court of Judge Temple Driver.

Grass Fires Plague City

The presence of extremely dry weather in the North Texas area during recent weeks has helped multiply the number of grass fires.

Burkburnett Fire Chief Bill Mize urges citizens to be extra careful, since fires "easily spreading about two grass fires a day," commented Mize.

He reminds citizens that it is illegal to burn trash without a permit in Burk Burnett, since there is a city ordinance regulating the action. A permit can be obtained from City Hall, whose hours are 8-5 Monday through Friday. He added that it is especially dangerous to burn trash on windy days.

Two Burk Policemen Are Elected To Criminal Investigator Posts

Burkburnett Policemen Scott Newton and Curtis Salyer were installed as president and secretary - treasurer, respectively, of the Texas and Oklahoma Criminal Investigators Association January 29 in Wichita Falls.

The Association meets once a month at which time members in the North Texas, Southern Oklahoma area exchange information that might be helpful in solving crimes. They also attempt to keep track of criminal movement.

There are about 35-40 members in the Association. Meet-

ings are attended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Office of Special Investigators, Security Police at Sheppard, and the Department of Defense and Investigation Service.

The purpose of the organization is to assist persons who are actively engaged in police work in an organized body so that the profession and all its branches may be standardized, effective, and scientifically administered.

Each meeting begins with a luncheon and the business meeting follows. Some meetings are held in Texas and some in Oklahoma.

Contracts Not yet Signed

City Awards Contract For New Jail

Kenneth Myers Construction Co. of Wichita Falls was recently awarded contract for construction of a new jail in Burk Burnett at the bid price of \$33,333, following the opening of bids. This is subject to the approval of the Criminal Justice Council.

Other bidders were F&W Construction Co., \$33,352; Meyers Brothers Construction Co., \$36,700; Bill Buchanan Contractor, \$39,800; Texoma Construction, \$40,700; and M.A. Vordenbaum and Sons Inc., \$41,392.

The location of the new jail will be in the rear section of the present police department building, where new detention quarters are planned to occupy 800 square feet. There will be seven individual cells in the jail. Presently, the department uses a two cell unit at the rear of the fire station.

Part of the construction financing will come from state and federal sources. A \$22,500 grant from these sources has already been received by the City.

The manager at Hidden Valley Golf Club is Rudy Eller, who will live on the premises. According to Swiney, the Club will have a golf professional in the spring of 1975. He is Bob Johnson, who will retire from the Air Force. Johnson is presently stationed in Alabama.

The club's policies will basically be the same says Swiney. There will be more benefits than ever, members will have golfing privileges, there will be organized competition, men

and women golf associations will be organized, and an active junior program will be in effect. There will be free golf instructors for men and women in April on Mondays.

The local club will be a member of the Texas Golf Association, which will entitle members to TGA Benefits plus reciprocating privileges with all Texas clubs. This means that the members card will be honored at other golf clubs for golf or social activities. The charge at such club would be billed to Hidden Valley Golf Club and in turn billed back to the member.

Swiney said of the project, "I have been interested in Burk Burnett for quite some time. I'm very impressed with the town and its people. I love the North Texas area and have been looking for a way to contribute

to its betterment and hopefully this venture will be a stepping stone for me. I have ambitions for a championship 18-hole golf course in this area for the future. I will need the support of you, the people, to make these dreams come true. I'm looking forward to meeting and serving all of you."

Thoughts Of A Newsman

There is a convention taking place in Austin - A Constitutional Convention. As almost everyone has heard, delegates are rewriting the old constitution--trying to update many of the provisions which are completely unusable in our modern society.

Since the constitution will be for all the people of Texas, all Texans should take part in its construction.

Suggestions or questions are being accepted through the mail at P.O. Box 2910, Austin, Texas 78767 or by telephone (you can call toll free 1-800-292-9600).

One provision we feel should remain in the constitution is one requiring that three-fourths of the revenues produced by state motor fuel taxes be used for highway construction and maintenance. The rest would go for public school funding.

Some people think that the alleged fuel shortage is a good excuse to omit the highway construction provision from the new constitution since people might be using roads less. We disagree.

Since transportation is the backbone of our society, and a great means of communication, good roads are essential in Texas. Roads are used in business and industry, and better roads help promote both of these. Safety is another reason for the provision. There must be a constant maintenance on Texas roadways to help insure a minimum of accidents. Therefore we urge delegates on the committee to place the provision in the new constitution.

Provisions for Initiative, Referendum, and Recall should also be placed in the new Texas Constitution. These devices would provide checks on arbitrary or arrogant governmental actions and officials and would give the citizens of Texas methods of directly participating in the lawmaking process if it becomes necessary due to an inaction of the Legislature. These three powers might really become important with the new longer terms of office which will soon go into effect for our elected representatives.

Little Miss—Ideal Miss Pageant Entry Deadline Is Saturday

Wichita County's 1974 Our Little Miss and Ideal Miss Pageant will be held February 16, Mrs. Darrell Nichols, pageant director, said.

Entry deadline is February 9th in the three divisions: LaPetite, ages 3-6; Little Miss, ages 7-12; and Ideal Miss, ages 13-17. Any young lady within these age categories living within a 35 mile radius of Wichita County is eligible to compete for the coveted title.

LaPetites compete in party dresses and sportswear (no swimsuits). Little Miss and Ideal Miss entries compete in party dresses and sportswear and also do a three minute talent presentation.

Winners in the LaPetite and Little Miss divisions will compete in Waco, Texas in June for the Texas title. The Ideal Miss winner will go directly to the international competition to be held at Baylor University in Waco, Texas in July.

A winner and two-runners-up will be selected in each group. A talent winner will be selected from the Our Little Miss and also the Ideal Miss age divisions. Talent, which is only one-third can be anything that shows a girl's poise before an audience: pantomime, humorous skits, poetry or dramatics, singing, dancing, mus-

ical instruments, baton twirling, etc. Talent winners can also advance to the state competition.

First place winners in the LaPetite and Our Little Miss divisions will have their entry fees paid to the official State Pageant. The Ideal Miss winner will proceed directly to the international finals with entry fee paid by the local pageant.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — A total of 332 separate proposals have been submitted to the Constitutional Convention.

Last day for filing the recommendations for individual or wholesale revisions of the constitution brought the expected outpouring.

Each has been referred to an appropriate committee for study and processing before consideration on the convention floor.

Delegates who wish to submit proposals in the future must get permission of two-thirds of their colleagues.

Meanwhile, the convention has progressed through preliminary approval of the preamble and Bill of Rights — with no changes over the old constitution.

Next article to get floor consideration this week will be rights and suffrage.

At least two controversial items in that article are a provision allowing a property ownership requirement for voting in bond elections and denial of voting rights to felons.

Another recommendation of the rights and suffrage committee would provide a constitutional requirement for a secret ballot. There is now no such requirement in Texas although courts have held secrecy must be maintained.

TAX FORMULA APPROVED — The Legislative Property Tax Committee approved a modified version of the Texas Research League's proposal to gather data for a new school finance formula.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. had urged rejection of the plan, which El Paso Rep. Luther Jones charged was slanted in favor of big business.

Jones later asked Daniel to order an investigation of the

Research League. He objected to state reliance on the privately-financed League for assistance in tax studies. Seven such studies have been done by the organization since 1964.

ELECTION RULES CHANGED — As the Monday filing deadline for candidates neared, Secretary of State Mark White Jr. reminded of new election requirements.

He told candidates they must designate campaign managers before they accepted any political contributions or make any election expenditures, including filing fees.

Designations of the managers must be filed with the Secretary of State for candidates seeking offices involving more than one county. County clerks receive the designations for one-county positions or those within a county.

DREDGING POLICIES APPROVED — The Parks and Wildlife Commission under a new regulation can cancel licenses of shell dredgers who cause silt over live oyster reefs.

Another recently-approved policy to protect coastal and inland wetlands expands control over spoil dumping from dredging.

COURTS SPEAK — Attorney General John Hill sought a stay of a single-member district plan ordered by a three-judge federal court for seven Texas counties, pending appeal.

The court reversed an earlier decision to allow filing in the districts until February 18 and left the deadline at February 4. It also eliminated residency requirements in the districts for this year's election in Tarrant, Travis, Jeffer-

son, McLennan, Nueces, El Paso and Lubbock counties.

The State Supreme Court held that, once a couple signs a sales contract on their home, they must go through with the deal.

SHORT SNORTS

A consulting firm has been hired on a \$55,000 contract to help reorganize and streamline the 600-employee State Board of Insurance.

A number of state agencies have moved Austin offices to a new block-square Stephen F. Austin building north of the capital.

Texas Water Rights Commission approved a \$55,000 bond issue for Cameron County Water Control and Improvement District 10.

State Rep. John W. Bryant, 26, is the legislature's newest member. He won a special vacancy election, and is now installed as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

All members of the State Board of Education must run for election this year from congressional districts. Attorney General Hill held in a recent opinion.

A special committee has been named by House Speaker Daniel to study feasibility of bringing about uniformity in ad valorem tax appraisal, assessment and collection.

Legislators are pushing for special session action to take Texas off year-around Daylight Savings Time.

Package Tours of Texas were put on the international market by Texas Tourist Development Agency and Gray Line Tours.

Air purification devices will be installed in Constitutional Convention Hall to filter away the cigar and cigarette smoke that bothers some delegates.

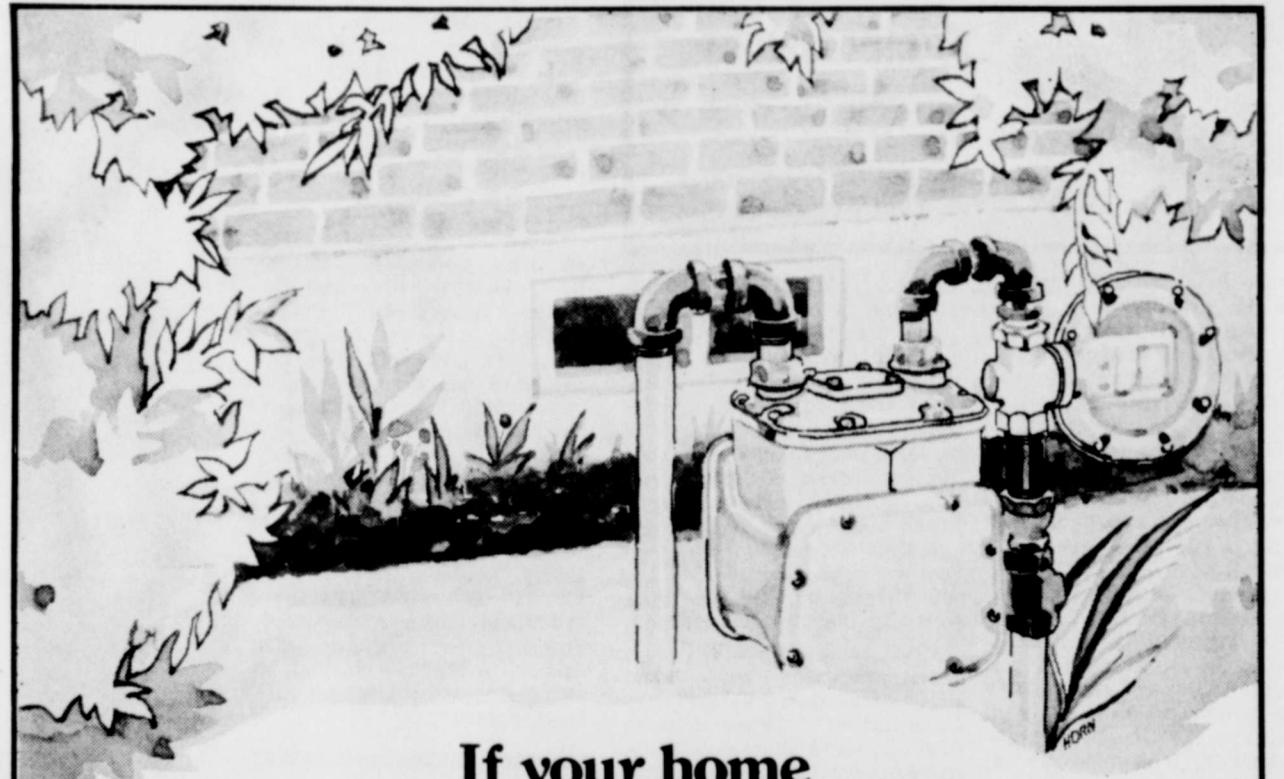

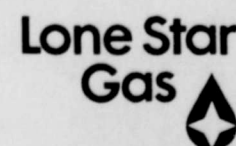



Taxpayers Can Designate Money For Campaign Fund

Area taxpayers preparing their 1973 tax returns can take part in the 1976 Presidential Election Campaign Fund by checking a box on the front of their Form 1040 or 1040A.

Under legislation enacted by Congress in 1971, every taxpayer with a tax liability of \$1 or more for 1973 may designate \$1 of his tax to the 1976 Campaign Fund if he wishes to do so. If he has not already done so, he may also designate \$1 of his 1972 tax to the same

fund, according to Omas T. Roberts, Administrative Officer of the IRS for the Wichita Falls area.

The Campaign Fund question appears as line 8 on both the short Form 1040A and the 1040 Form. If a taxpayer did not earmark \$1 of his 1972 taxes for the fund, he can do so by checking the box just above his signature on either form.

On a joint return, a husband and wife with an income tax liability of \$2 or more may

each designate \$1 for the fund, for a total of \$2. If a husband wishes to designate \$1 and his wife does not, or vice versa, one should check the appropriate box and leave the other box blank.

"Participation by a taxpayer in the Campaign Fund will neither increase his tax nor reduce any refund due," Roberts said.

Vehicle Registration Deadline Is Set

February 1 was the opening date for person motor vehicle registration at county tax offices and substations. April 1 is the deadline for Texas motorists to display their 1974 license plates.

Or, drivers can save themselves a trip downtown if they register by mail prior to March 1. Simply send in the complete three-part form, the registration fee, plus one dollar for each vehicle to the Tax Assessor-Collector in the county in which they live.

After March 1 it will be necessary to go to the county tax office or substation in person as 30 days are required for mail delivery. In any case, owners will find the procedure simplified by using the computerized forms.

With the form, a certificate of title and last year's registration receipt are not needed.

Whether applying by mail or in person--the important thing for the driver to remember is do not separate the THREE-PART APPLICATION FORM. The entire form must be mailed or taken to the county tax office or substation. A stick-down strip showing the new license number is attached to all sections of the form. The tax office separates the form, returning part of it as a receipt for the owner.

Applications for license plates should be sent only to the local county tax office. Motorists should not send their payments to the Texas Highway Department because this will delay their registration.

STORE HERBICIDES IN SUITABLE PLACE - With planting season soon here, many Cotton County farmers are now buying their herbicide supplies. If buying herbicides early, store them in a suitable and safe place where children and pets can't get to them. And keep the storage place locked at all times.

Store liquid herbicides where they won't freeze. Freezing may break some containers and can cause some herbicides to crystallize or "salt out".

Store wettable powders and granular herbicides in a cool, dry place. Though the area doesn't need to be heated, the containers should be sealed so the material doesn't get wet.

Store herbicides only in the original containers. If the label is gone, dispose of the herbicide. Many crops are lost because chemicals are placed in other containers and later used for the wrong crop.

Store herbicides away from food, fertilizer or other chemicals. Check herbicides for open or broken gags and containers and seal or dispose of them.

Since some herbicides are volatile, they may get into food or other products stored nearby.

Fertilizers can absorb enough of some herbicides to be toxic to certain crops when the fertilizers are applied to the crops the following spring.

COLLEGE STATION--Citrus continues to highlight most fruit counters this week, according to one source.

"Grapefruit and oranges of several varieties are well worth considering," Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, Texas A&M University System, reported.

"Beef prices are slightly higher than a year ago, but most markets feature various cuts as specials, so study ads and meat counters for family preferences.

"Best beef values generally are chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks and roasts, ground beef, beef and calf liver."

She listed pork values as picnic, ham portions, end-cut loin roasts and chops, pork liver, shoulder roasts and steaks.

CONSUMER WATCHWORDS: Crisp cabbage is plentiful almost year 'round.

Regardless of color and shape, look for heads that are solid, firm, and heavy for their size. Leaves should be fresh, crisp, firmly attached to the stem and free from insect injury or bruises.

Also, buy "enriched" or "whole grain" bread and bakery goods--they cost no more. Be sure pasta products are marked "enriched", too.

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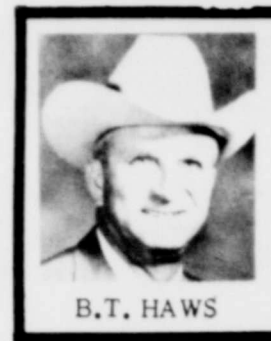
Publication Describes Pesticides

AUSTIN--With the growing concern over the possible dangers of improper use of pesticides, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced the publication of a book to give Texas pesticide buyers more information about the products available in the state.

"The 1973 Sample Analysis of Economic Pesticides can help buyers more than the generalized claims in advertisements," White said.

The 160-page book contains the results of laboratory tests on more than 1,600 products from 232 companies. The book also notes the products on which stop sale orders were issued for failing to contain the percentage of pesticide given on the label, he said.

County Agent News

B.T. HAWS

Livestock producers in Wichita County will have a definite interest in the 1974 Texas Brucellosis Eradication Program, which officially began January 15.

Texas became "Modified-certified" in August 1973 which meant that less than five percent of the cattle herds and less than one percent of the cattle were infected. The new plan will make Texas a Brucellosis-free state.

Brucellosis, commonly called "Bangs", is a costly, contagious disease of livestock that may also affect human beings. The disease in humans is known as undulant fever. Although it may attack most farm animals, it is more common in cattle, swine and goats. Herds with brucellosis may produce as much as 20 percent less milk and 40 percent fewer calves. Thus millions of dollars are lost across the state each year.

The new program is designed to locate the infection, contain it and assist the owner of infected animals to eliminate the disease. Three different methods are used to locate infections: Brucellosis Ring Test for dairy herds, Market Cattle Test for all breeding cattle slaughtered, and Blood Test of all breeding cattle exchanging ownership.

All infected and exposed cattle are quarantined and their movement is limited to slaughter only. Blood testing procedures are used to assist owners of infected herds to free their cattle of the disease.

The new Brucellosis Eradication Program is as follows: All cattle, except steers, sprayed heifers and vaccinated animals under two years old, must be tested within 30 days of any change of ownership. A relatively simple "card" test has been developed that gives quick results -- improvement over the old system of sending blood samples to a laboratory. The cost of this initial test by a practicing veterinarian or other authorized person must be paid by the cattleman.

If a brucellosis reactor is found at a sale yard or slaughterhouse, federal or state personnel trace the animal back to its herd of origin. Traceback tools include registered back tags or ear tags that many sale facilities are routinely putting on consigned animals. Ear tags are required for interstate shipment of most cattle. Other animals in consignment where the reactor was found can be handled any of three ways -- sold immediately for slaughter, sent to a quarantined feedlot, or returned to the ranch for quarantine.

All members of the herd of origin are considered exposed to the disease and must be tested at 30 and 120 days after the first reactor is found. Government agencies conduct these

additional tests and pay the direct costs. All reactor animals must be branded with a "B" on the jaw and sold immediately for slaughter. Meat from these animals is not tainted.

Final clearance on a state basis can be granted when no more than one per cent of the herds in any one county and not more than two percent of the cattle in that county are confirmed reactors during an 18-month testing period.

The program is vital to Texas if we want to keep our interstate trade with Brucellosis-free states.

It may be important for farmers and ranchers to claim as much depreciation as possible on 1973 income tax returns. It is suggested that you claim the full amount of extra first-year 20 percent depreciation on new or used tangible personal property acquired during 1973 that has a useful life of six years or more. Fast methods of depreciation should be used on new machinery and equipment and breeding stock that has a useful life of three years and has not been used.

Some people may try to beat the energy shortage by storing large amounts of gasoline. But this may create other problems. Gasoline stored on the farm or around a house becomes an expensive convenience if the storage period is longer than six months.

First, the fuel contains a blend of several parts, one of which is extremely volatile and provides engines with easy starting. It evaporates rapidly. When the storage tank is exposed to the sun or high temperatures, most of this ingredient is lost in about 60 days.

Secondly, gas becomes gummy, similar to shellac, after it "ages." This gum may stop up the carburetor and cause engine deposits. It also may cause damage when mixed in small amounts with fresh gasoline.

Furthermore, seasonal changes in grades of gasoline spell trouble if fuel blended for one season is carried over in storage tanks until another season.

For example, winter-grade fuel should not be used during late spring. This gas may cause the engine to skip because of vapor lock. The condition occurs when gasoline boils in the fuel lines, fuel pump, or carburetor.

Vapor lock may even cause an engine to cut off. When this happens, the engine must be allowed to cool. Water may be poured on the fuel lines or fuel pump to speed the cooling process.

Summer grade fuel may cause hard starting during cold weather.

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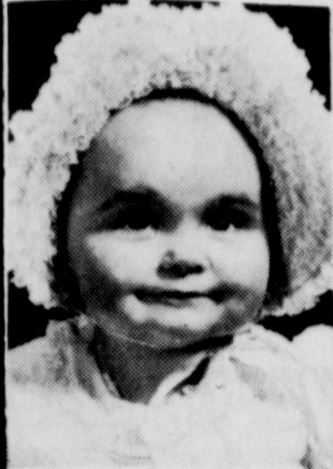
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Welding Class To Be Taught

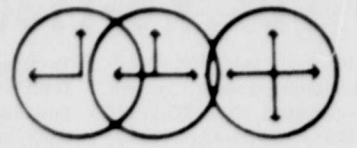

Bob Price Announces Bid For Re-Election

Congressman Bob Price officially announced today he will seek re-election to a 5th term as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives from the 13th Congressional District of Texas.

In his announcement, Price re-affirmed his commitments to a strong national defense, a viable domestic economy, continued revitalization of rural America, law and order, a stepped up fight against the rise in illegal drug use, agricultural profits equal to other businesses in the country, and increased water supplies for Northwest Texas.

He promised to push for passage of legislation he and others have introduced to solve the energy shortage, such as removal of Federal Power Commission price restrictions on natural gas at the well-head, and equitable tax incentives to production of oil and gas.

"As we approach our country's 200th anniversary, I think it is paramount to reawaken the American people's confidence in their ability to do things for themselves," Price said. "Washington, D.C., is not the final repository of wisdom," he stressed.

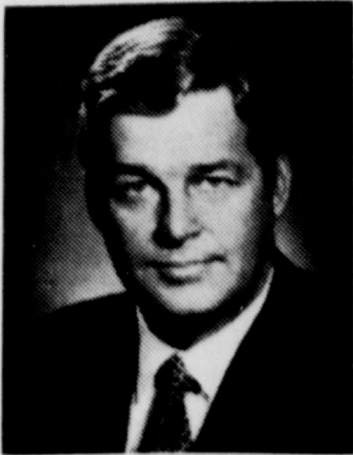
The Congressman made his announcement Friday evening at a gathering of friends in Pampa, and goes on to repeat his decision before press conferences Saturday in his district offices in Amarillo (9:30 a.m.) and Wichita Falls (3 p.m.).

Among Price's announced supporters are former Texas Governor John Connally, who

recently lauded the Congressman's "understanding of people, intelligence and honesty, integrity, reliability and steadfast beliefs and convictions;" and former State Senator Grady Hazelwood who said Price "has a proven record on the issues and is just beginning to attain the seniority in the Congress which can benefit us all."

Price is presently serving in his 8th year in Congress. He is ranking minority member on the House Agriculture Departmental Operations Subcommittee. He is an influential member of the full committee as well, and will be 4th ranking minority member if re-elected. He also serves on the important Livestock & Grains, and Cotton subcommittees. In addition, Price is a member of the House Armed Services Committee -- one of the few House members with two major committee assignments. He is active on the Armed Services Research & Development Subcommittee and is mindful of the important role played in our national defense structure by Sheppard Air Force Base near Wichita Falls.

Additionally, he serves on the House minority Policy Committee and the Committee on Committees, which determine policy and committee assignments, respectively.

An informal poll conducted by the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe found Price named most often as "most admired Texan;" and, the Adobe Walls Boy Scout Council recently awarded Price its highest honor, the coveted Silver Beaver Award.

Price, 46, has owned and operated a ranch near Pampa the past 20 years and served four years active duty in the Air Force flying 27 combat missions as a fighter pilot during the Korean Conflict.

He lives with his wife, Marty, and three children, Grant, Carl and Janice, in their Virginia home while Congress is in session, and also maintains his Pampa ranch.

He is a member of the Baptist Church, the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Air Force Association, and the Masonic Order. He is past president of the Top O' Texas Kwanis Club, a member of the board of development of Wayland Baptist College, and a director at large of the Top O' Texas Rodeo Association. He has been active in the Texas & Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, the Texas Cattle Feeders Association and the Panhandle Producers & Royalty Owners Association.

Price is a graduate of Oklahoma State University, where he majored in Agriculture, with a minor in field crops and business, and where he was active in Sigma Alfa Epsilon fraternity.

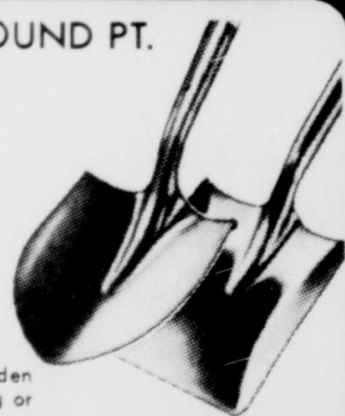
