Postal Rates To Increase

Postmaster W.T. Zimmerman announced today that new increased postal rates will go into effect Saturday, March 2, 1974.

All first-class mail weighing 12 ounces or less except postal and post cards will now cost ten cents per ounce instead of eight cents. Single postal cards sold by the post office will now cost eight-cents each, and airmail letters and packages weighing 9 ounces or less will cost thirteen cents per ounce instead of eleven cents.

Heart Fund Drive Ends Soon In Burk

The American Heart Association has had one mission since its founding as a national voluntary health agency in 1948: reduction of premature death and disability due to cardiovascular diseases.

Heart diseases are too many and too complex to hope for a total cure. But a reduction of the appalling toll of lives of this modern-day epidemic is realistic. And it is being achieved in even greater proportion through

the support given to the Heart Fund campaign now in progress in Burkburnett.

Downtown chairman of the Heart Drive in Burkburnett is Reeford Darter and Residential chairman is Contemporary Study Club headed by Mrs. Frank Miller.

District captains of the residential phase of the drive are Mmes. Gene Anderson, Robert Rogers, Edgar Fulcher, Robert Norriss, Harry Elliot, F.T. Felty Jr., Tom Smith, Cliff Wampler, Joe Boucher, Morris Cheney, Tom Brooks, Joel Ellet, Bill Wood, Robert Miller, Dan White, Gad Garland, Bill Pittard, and Frank Miller.

Heart Fund dollars support research leading to new surgical techniques that correct one-fatal inborn and acquired heart defects. Heart Fund dollars that financed development of the heart-lung machine now support work leading to the development of mechanical devices to augment effective circulation, such as "booster" heart pumps and pacemakers. Heart Fund dollars help make possible such things as the replacement of defective heart valves. Heart Fund dollars aid scientists in their discovery of new drugs which enhance recovery and prolong life.

Despite the many achievements, heart and blood vessel diseases continue to claim more than one million lives each year, or 53 per cent of deaths from all causes. An estimated 27 million Americans have cardiovascular diseases. And more than 875,000 died last year from heart attack or stroke.

Thoughts Of A Newsmen

The Informer/Star staff got the newspaper ready to go to press just in time last Tuesday night, Feb. 19. We had finished putting all the copy together and made the pages camera-ready by about 8:30 p.m. About five hours later our Ace typesetter was taken to the hospital to have a baby.

Since last week was the first time we used our new typesetting machines, it had been a pretty hectic week (what with having to learn how to operate them and get used to their individual characteristics). The major part of that burden was on our typesetter, Mrs. James (Marsha) Warf.

Generally she starts on Thursday or Friday setting copy for the next week's paper, but week before last she had to learn how to operate the new machines on those two days. Therefore, she had to set almost 70 stories on Monday and Tuesday, and that doesn't include cutlines and other miscellaneous items. The typesetting machines are quite a bit more complicated than a regular typewriter and are much slower (due, in part, to having to develop the set copy which is on photographic paper). Working against a strict deadline makes the typesetter's job even tougher.

While in the midst of setting the mountain of copy, Mrs. Warf said, "If this doesn't make me have my baby, nothing will." The new machine was acting up a little bit and the

Mr. Spencer served as chairman of the steering committee to establish the Friberg-Cooper Water Supply Corporation, and when that Corporation was formed he served as its President until his death.

He was for many years Precinct Chairman for the Wichita County Republican Party, for Precinct #2, and also served as an election judge in primary elections.

Mr. Spencer was an elder in the First Presbyterian Church, Wichita Falls, and had served as Clerk of the Session. He also belonged to the Men's Bible Class, and the Christian Education Council of the Church. In that capacity he had initiated and developed the audio-visual program of the church, and was primarily responsible for promoting the participation of high school seniors in the church in the Career Development Conferences at Austin College, Sherman.

The funeral service was conducted by Dr. Earle W. Crawford, pastor, in the First Presbyterian Church, Wichita Falls, on Saturday, February 23, 1974, at 10:00 a.m., with the burial in Burkburnett Cemetery, under the direction of Hampton-Vaughn Funeral Home. The pallbearers were: Messrs. James Hillis, Ted Hanks, Dale Dublin Sr., Kenyon Cox Roy Beeman, and Howard J. Aldrich. The honorary pallbearers were members of the Session and the Men's Bible Class of the church.

Mr. Spencer is survived by his wife, Francis, his daughter, Mrs. Jacob Maestas of Maryland, two sisters, Miss Amelia Spencer of Cashion and Miss Laura Spencer of Parkersburg, West Virginia, and two grandchildren.

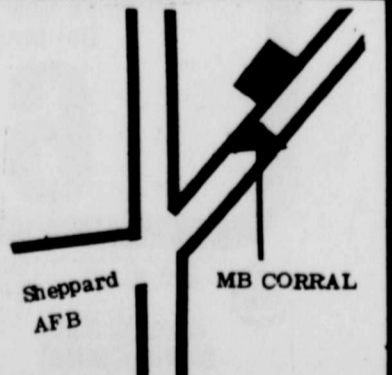

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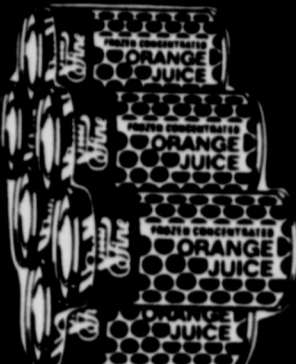

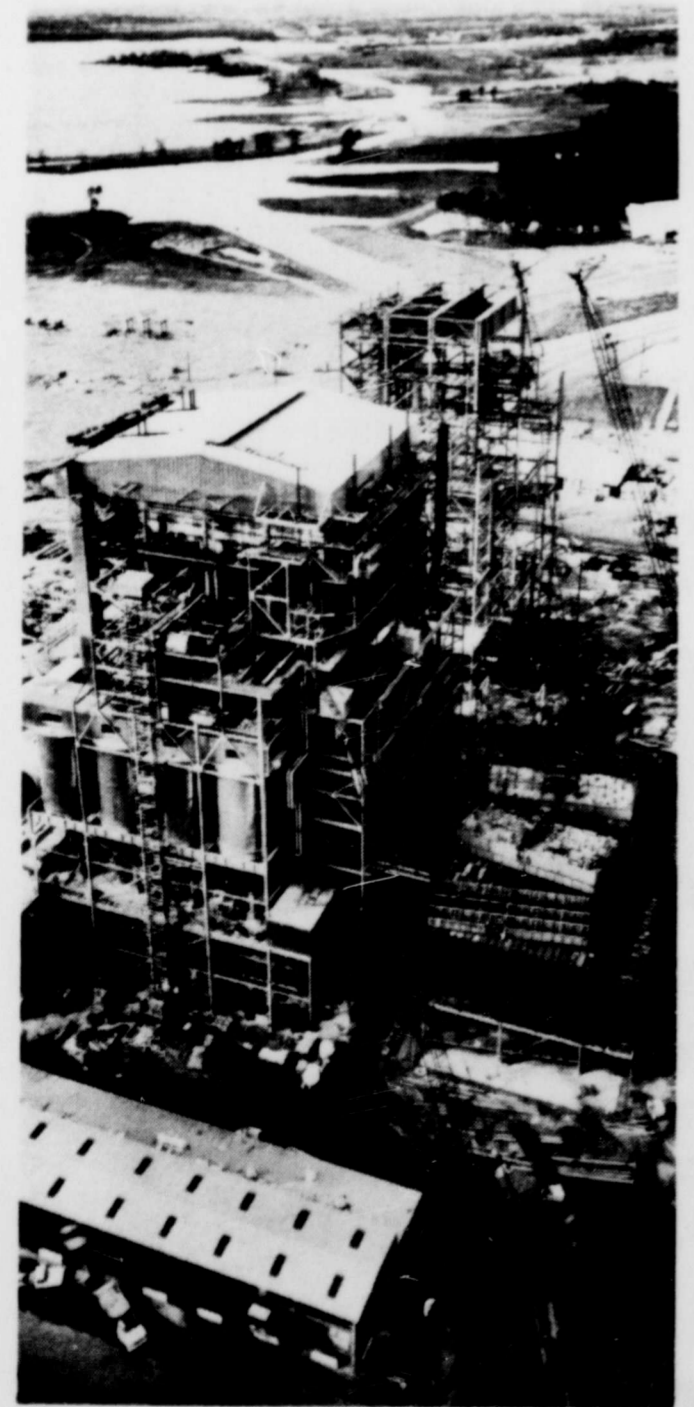

WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

COLLEGE STATION - Consumers could be paying 13 per cent more for food now than they did this time last year, one authority said yesterday.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, predicted that the current "retail food price index may average about 13 per cent above the first quarter of 1973."

The forecast lower meat supplies along with higher prices for meat and other foods in upcoming months.

"Fruits and vegetables—fresh, frozen, canned and dried—are less plentiful than a year ago at this time, but production plans include larger crops, if conditions permit," the specialist said.

"These conditions would include favorable weather, available energy and fuel for energy needs, fertilizer and labor."

This week, most markets will feature a few cuts at special prices, but finding "real bargains" will demand close attention, Mrs. Clyatt noted.

"Best beef values likely will include chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, stew meat,

ground beef and beef liver. Pork values will appear on hams, ham portions, picnics, Boston butt roasts, end-cut loin roasts and chops, shoulder roasts and steaks.

"Fryer chicken prices are about the same as the past couple of weeks, and frozen turkeys feature attractive prices—mostly medium to smaller birds. Also, check prices on turkey parts."

Egg prices are a bit lower this week.

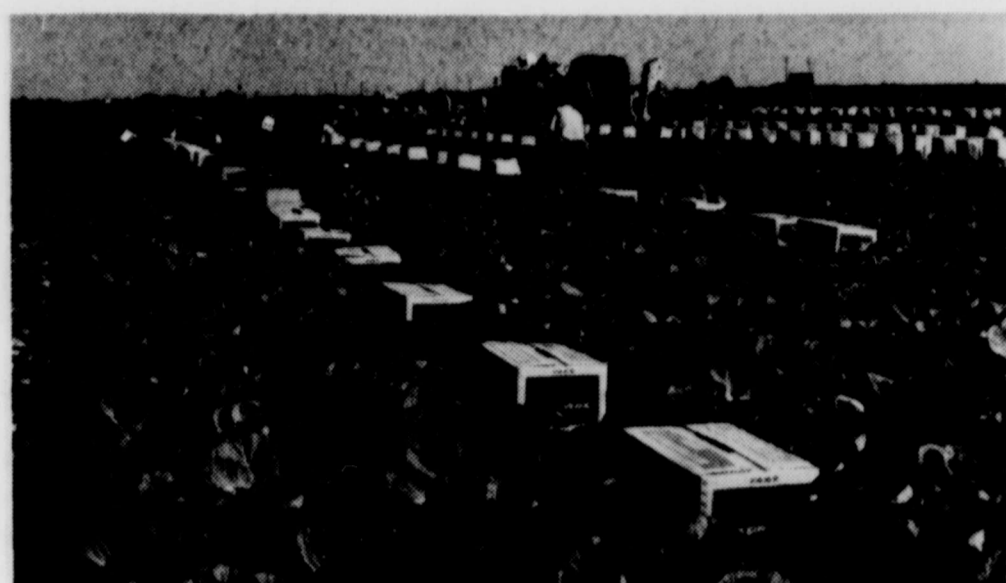
Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at the most economical prices include oranges, grapefruit, apples and bananas. Also, cabbage, carrots, head lettuce, collards, mustard greens, rutabagas, turnips and greens, celery and broccoli. Potato, dry onion and sweet potato prices continue higher.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Most stores feature high-quality foods as "specials."

Purpose of a food ad is to attract customers, but the store also depends on repeat business, so poor merchandise would defeat that purpose.

Specials are possible through a store's quantity buying, shaving of the profit margin, or a good buy offered by the supplier. Often a food will be on "special" because it's in season—a good time to incorporate it into menu plans.

Home Demonstration News

March is Nutrition Month and a good time to let good nutrition practices help you save money.

Scientists have helped by developing a guide, the Four Food Groups, to help consumers choose wisely. When foods are chosen from these four food groups it is possible to get all the nutrients necessary for good health without knowing about amino acids, or polysaccharides or any of the complicated chemical reactions that go on in the body. The foods within a food group are similar in the nutrients they supply, so you can choose many different foods each day and still follow the four food groups. Since there are many foods in each group, consumers can follow the guide and save money by choosing lower cost items in each group.

The meat group includes pork, lamb, veal, poultry, fish, beef and meat substitutes such as eggs, peanut butter or dried beans. Everyone needs two

servings of meat group foods each day. Less popular cuts of meat, variety meats, fish, poultry and dry beans can be nutritious money savers.

The milk group is a favorite with time and money conscious consumers. The milks, cheeses, ice-creams, and custards found in this group are usually quick to fix, moderate in cost and always nutritious. Everyone needs at least two servings from this group each day, but children, teenagers, pregnant and nursing mothers need more than two servings each day. Instant non-fat dry milk and processed cheese are two economical choices in this group.

The fruit and vegetable group also gives the consumer many choices. Wise consumers will choose canned or frozen forms of fruits and vegetables that are "out-of-season" in the early spring. For example, canned tomatoes or frozen strawberries might be better choices than the

fresh produce. Cabbage, carrots, sweet potatoes and grapefruit should be "in-season" in the early spring and make good choices for consumers who want fresh produce. Everyone needs four servings of fruits and vegetables each day.

The bread and cereal group also offers many choices for the penny-wise consumer. All kinds of enriched or whole grain breads, cereals, spaghetti, macaroni, rice and tortillas are in this group. Everyone needs four servings from this group. Enriched white bread and cooked cereals are good choices when you consider cost and nutrients.

Other foods like candy, soft drinks, and fats may be used to round out meals and fatten food bills. Wise consumers will let nutrition help them save by choosing foods from the four food groups.

They should be able to save \$200 to \$300 a year on their grocery bill. Home grown vegetables also tend to have superior flavor and freshness, and gardening offers wholesome, outdoor recreation and exercise.

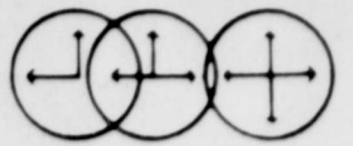

TESCO Manager Warns Of Kite-Flying Dangers

Young kite fliers are urged to follow a few simple rules for their own safety, according to B.J. Vincent, company manager for Texas Electric Service Company.

Vincent warns them of the danger of flying kites in the vicinity of electric power lines.

"If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company," Vincent says. "Someone will be sent to get it down for you."

Vincent recommends the following safety rules for kite flying: Always use dry string,

not wire or anything metallic; always use wood and paper in your kite, not wire or metal; always avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.

Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a snagged line; always fly your kite far from electric or power lines; always fly your kite away from TV and radio aerials.

"Posters containing these safety rules have been distributed by the company to all schools," Vincent said. "so youngsters will get more fun out of flying kites and at the same time keep from getting hurt or losing their kites."
