Field House To Be Located On South End Of Stadium

met Monday night for their regular monthly meeting. The board set Monday, April 8 as the date of the opening of bids on the erection of a new field house. Contract for the structural steel system of the new building was let on Feb. 19 to Bill Buchanan Construction Co. for \$11,130.

The board discussed floor plans of the new athletic facility and approved the acceptance of the basic plans and newly-decided location for the 6,000 square ft. field house facility with preliminary adjustments.

In discussing the building's location, the board decided to locate the new field house at the south end of the football stadium rather than the north end. The approximate actual cost of construction is less that \$50,000; however the value was rated as being considerably higher.

Governor Briscoe, for example, reported he owns about 332,000 acres of South Texas ranch and farm lands and has vast banking and investment interests, although he did not place a dollarvalue on his holdings.

Mrs. Farenthold placed her family net worth at \$314,684 assets (including \$200,000 worth of jewels) at \$495,771. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby listed

assets of \$3.9 million, and a net worth of \$599,483. Atty. Gen. John Hill reported assets of \$3.1 million and a net worth in excess of \$2.9 million.

CONVENTION LIVENS -After a dreary, extended wrangle over educational provisions, the Constitutional Convention finally agreed on the school-college article and went on to pound out promptly voter qualifications and elections provisions.

Delegates agreed to restore voting privileges automatically to ex-prisoners. They voted to leave it up to the legislature whether to scrap the ancient requirement of signing paper ballot stubs.

Another controversial provision passed would require voters in bond elections affecting property taxes to be property owners.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

The Department of Public Welfare may refuse a client's request for a copy of his complete file only where information is excepted from the open records law and has not been used concurrently in determination of the person's rights.

Whether or not tips are part of the sales price of taxable food and drink depends on whether the employer derives a benefit from their collection.

The Water Development Board need not get a permit from the Antiquities Committee before archeological resources on public lands can be tampered with. But the Board has responsibility to assist the Committee in locating, protecting and preserving such resources. funds can be used to study antiquities to be affected by a reservoir, but it may not engage in salvaging operations.

Boards of regents cannot meet in closed sessions to consider granting honorary degrees, unless the honoree is also being considered for appointment or employment.

If a person sells a mobile home that does not meet new code requirements, the Bureau of Labor Statistics can get an injunction and fine the seller. (A variety of other questions on mobile home regulations were answered by Hill).



tight through 1974, and producers can expect prices to hold generally steady. Smaller red meat and poultry supplies coupled with increased demand sent pork prices to new heights during 1973. Barrows and gilts at seven markets averaged \$40.61 per hundredweight last year, up 52 per cent from the 1972 average.

Increasing exports to Japan may also keep the pressure on pork supplies. Hog numbers increased slightly from 1972 to 1973 and inventories during the first half of 1974 should be similar to those during the first six months of last year.

With current high prices, why aren't producers expanding their operations? Taking into account the high price of sorghum for feed, producers need to receive about \$44 per hundredweight for gilts and barrows. Since this is above current prices, many pork-grain producers are holding down their swine herds and marketing their sorghum directly.

Barrow and gilt prices should be at \$41 to \$43 per hundredweight during the January-March quarter and a bit higher during the April-June period due to continued short supplies and high beef prices. However prices may soften during the July-September quarter to go along with the expected decline in slaughter cattle prices. If fed cattle marketings take a big jump during the last few months of

Are you interested in learning 1974, as some predictions indicate, hog prices could take a sharp plunge to the \$33-36 level.

> Never give fire a chance to watchwords for any fire prevention program at home, on the farm and during leisuretime activities and travel. Since people cause most fires, they can also prevent most of them. Here are some suggestions for an effective fire prevention

In the house and buildings on the farm, get rid of possible fire hazards and try to change habits that could be dangerous.

Tour the house, barns, sheds and other farm buildings and discard everything no longer needed, especially from storage areas where all sorts of "stuff" tend to accumulate. Keep in mind the fact that, in case of fire, the more fuel there is to feed the flames, the worse the fire will be.

Next, check all buildings and see that hazards are corrected. Look for faulty electrical equipment and worn cords, combustibles stored too near sources of hear, defective cooking equipment, and heating systems that haven't been cleaned or inspected since last

Finally, indoors and out, make a conscious effort to correct habits like carelessness with smoking materials. Never smoke in bed. Never smoke where there is hay and straw which burn easily. Never smoke while handling gasoline. Never leave matches or lighters within the reach of small children.

Dr. John Pickle, area specilaized agent in entomo logy, reports that parasite populations of the greenbug are increasing to the point that the greenbug is being brought under control in most parts of SW Oklahoma. There are, however, a few isolated areas of heavy infestations of greenbugs in those areas where wheat is still being damaged. Moisture at the soil surface is low and wheat is very susceptible to greenbug damage even when greenbug populations are very

Dr. Pickle also reports the following information on the alfalfa weevil. The alfalfa weevil eggs have been hatching for the past few weeks. We have been hoping for some more very cold weather to prevent further hatching.

In talking with Dr. Berberet from Stillwater this week, he suggested that in fields where there are large numbers of weevil larvae (fact sheet 7166) control might be deemed necessary.

The chemicals used should probably be parathion, malathion or sevin, etc. These chemicals are rather short-lived and, in general, rather inexpensive. The producer can then wait seven to ten days and see whether or not the weather will help. Normal control of the weevil will probably start in mid-March. The reason for early control is to get the alfalfa started and to decrease the

The alfalfa weevil egg survey taken Feb. 4 through 8 indicated that we can probably expect weevil problems throughout the area. Dr. Berberet indicated that egg levels of fifty to one-hundred per square foot would provide sufficient numbers of weevil larvae to be of economic levels. Also, there were large numbers of larvae in all samples.

In Cotton County, the egg General Hospital in Wichita survey shows 82 eggs per square foot.

Good freezer management homemaker must practice good management techniques.

For example, she can take full advantage of store specials by puchasing in quantity and freezing them. However, to make sure these "bargains" are buy food on a planned basis. By purchashing meat in quanitity, a consumer usually gets better quality at lower costs. Day-old baked goods offer additional good buys. Freezing them restores lost moisture. However, don't clutter a freezer with bulky, inexpensive items.

Turning to home-prepared foods, freeze fruits and vegetables at their peaks for the best quality and economy. For slightly brown and crisp, drain, convenience, freeze foods in proportions usable at one time. extra and freeze it for another overnight. day. Also, freeze leftovers for later use in home-made TV dinners. Remember, quality coming from a freezer can be no better than the quality put in, until browned. Sprinkle with However, that quality can be lost without proper wrapping and storage.


