★ City Says 'Aye' To TESCO Rate Hike ★

In Final Reading

The Burkburnett City Council approved the third and final reading of a proposed rate increase by Texas Electric Service Company Monday night. The motion had one condition added to it—that the increase would not go into effect until Wichita Falls approved a rate increase there. The Burkburnett increase will average 9 1/2 per cent.

TESCO representative Bill Vincent told the councilmen before a vote was taken that out of the 70 towns TESCO has filed in for an increase, 60 have approved the hike.

Councilman Al Lohefener then made the motion that the council approve the rate increase; it was seconded by James Spinks. Councilmen Lohefener, Spinks, Cornelius, McCandless, and Pate voted for the rate increase and councilmen Lindenborn and Musick voted against it.

Wichita Falls city council did approve the electricity rate increase Tuesday; therefore, new rates go into effect in Burkburnett April 1.

In other action, Jim Foyce, representing the Burkburnett Senior Citizens, told the council that the elderly of Burkburnett do not have a convenient place to meet. He urged that the council work with him to try to obtain a building for the elderly. He asked their support for a senior citizen's program, and possible sponsorship of a permanent club.

Foyce said, "There are 1500 elderly in the area. These are our mothers and fathers. If the city council would take the lead on this, I think you could probably get businessmen to

donate." He added that if the council would present this project to the people of Burkburnett, localites would go for it 98 per cent.

Mayor T.M. Cornelius said, "I don't think anyone on this council wouldn't want to do something good for the Senior Citizens of Burkburnett." He added that the council would work with Mr. Foyce to help promote a center for the senior citizens.

LeRoy Mullins told the council that some property near his residence is being junked on, is a fire hazard, and is a health hazard. He urged them to enforce the city ordinance against this.

City manager Gary Bean told Mullins to report cases of these actions to him so that fines can be administered to guilty parties at the time when the city ordinance is being broken.

Revenues for February in-

cluded \$25,444.41 in tax collections and \$995 in corporation court fines. All councilmen agreed to the motion of paying current accounts totaling \$7,143.96.

City Manager Bean announced to the council that work has begun on Riverside Park to rid it of fire hazards. Men are beginning to fill in ravines in the lower 50 acres and work has begun on the low water crossing.

Councilmen approved the appointment of Dr. Jerome Adams as city health officer, accepted rededication of the plan for Preston Heights subdivision, approved the installation of timers on city-served tennis court lights, and set the next meeting for April 15.

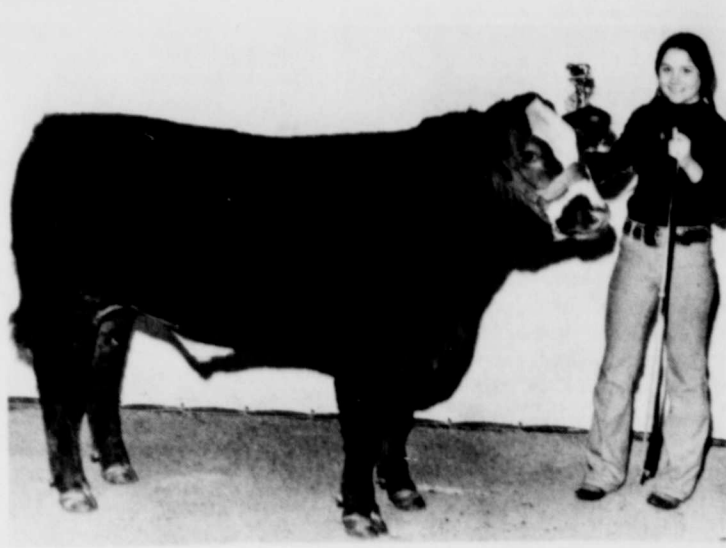

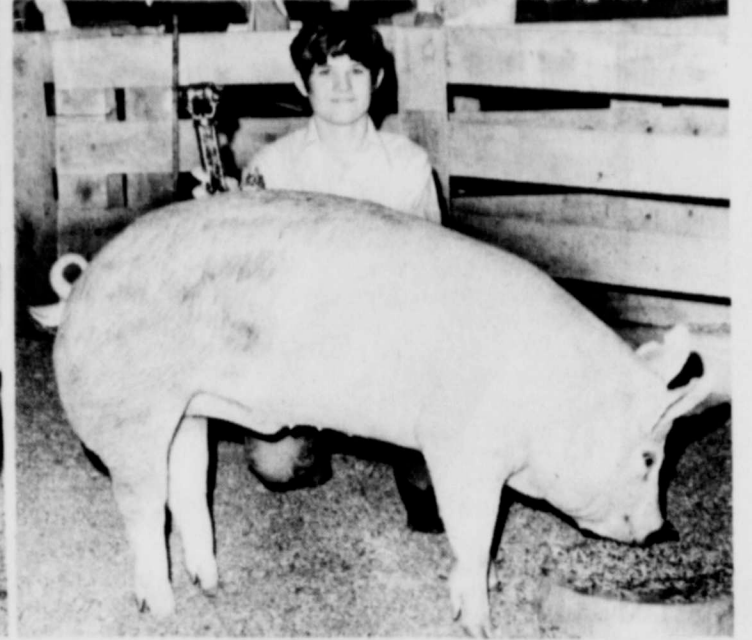


Kerl Morton--Grand Champion Steer

Home Demonstration News

Fathers play essential roles in helping children develop into well-balanced adults. Fathers are necessary, not just to be "good providers" or wield the discipline stick, but for more far-reaching and important reasons.

Knowing what "daddy" means to children helps point out the unique contribution men make to their children's development. Just being a man is one of the most important things a father does. In order to grow up and take their places in the world as either men or women, children need an image of how men act.

No matter how successful or unsuccessful a father may be in his life, children learn much about masculinity from watching and listening to him.

However, since his influence is strong, a father must be careful not to hand down too rigid a concept of what a man does and doesn't do. It is a good thing for boys and girls to see their father engaged in various activities and responsibilities--which include helping with home and child care. In conversation, how a father

answers questions also may influence the child's life.

Whether he knows it or not, a father interprets society's codes when answering questions about why people fight wars, why the family can't buy a new car, or why they can't go hunting this weekend.

While children are still young, parents are their primary link with the larger world. A father's answers create impressions and build links with that larger world.

A child also learns a great deal simply by listening to his father's comments as he reads the paper, talks with the man at the store about current events, or discusses work with the child's mother. From such observations, the next generation weaves its values and opinions.

An infant needs encouragement in trying things for himself. This part of his development helps him build trust in his body and what it can do.

Learning processes involve even the simplest things--reaching for a toy, creeping,

crawling and walking around furniture, and also his first solo steps.

To help develop independence while learning, a child needs an encouraging pat or extended hand.

Children need different amounts of assurance--some demand more, others less. However, a child should get assurance when he seeks it. Besides encouragement, an infant also needs various objects and toys to stimulate learning. This includes furniture to walk around.

When he's about six months old, an infant may go through a "fright stage." As such, he may act differently toward strangers than family members. Some screech and some hide while others stare.

Don't be alarmed--this behavior is normal. It's simply an individual matter.

Social sensitivity in relationships with others can vary throughout life. A person may be friendly one day--and withdrawn the next.

During infancy, sleeping difficulty may or may not arise. Most children have less difficulty if on a consistent sleeping schedule--because they know what to expect and what's expected of them.

To maintain a sleeping pattern, it's best for children to fall asleep in the same room and bed in which they'll wake--and follow a regular bedtime procedure.

Spring gardening season is at hand and many homeowners are already preparing seedbeds and planting their favorite vegetables. Numerous vegetables which are tolerant to cold weather may be planted four or more weeks before the last frost date. These include beets, broccoli, Brussel sprouts, cabbage, carrots, lettuce, onions, Irish potatoes, and turnips.

Those less hardy which should not be planted until about the time of the last frost date include snap beans, Lima beans, sweet corn, cucumbers, cantalopes, mustard, squash, and tomatoes.

Before planting the seedbed should be prepared to a depth of eight to 10 inches so that it is loose and not coarse and lumpy. Apply two to three pounds of complete fertilizer such as 12-12-12 per 100 square feet and work it into the soil. Then form the beds for planting.

Plant as early as possible depending on the hardness of the particular vegetable crop. Select varieties well adapted to this county. Use transplants where possible to get the crop off to a head start.

Although fewer dogs are infected with rabies each year, the dreaded disease is still a major threat to humans due to wildlife. Skunks are most recently infected with the disease, but bats, foxes, raccoons, ringtails and coyotes are also infected and account for a number of cases. Rabies is most prevalent in hot, summer weather. Infected wild animals often become tame and approach people and their environment. Children should be taught to be especially cautious of such animals.

How much beef do Americans really eat? By carcass weight, the per capita consumption in 1974 will be 115 pounds, up four and one-half pounds from 1973, says the USDA. But the actual cooked, edible "on the platter" beef eaten will be 44.8 pounds in 1974, compared to 43 pounds in 1973, says the Meat Board's nutrition education department. Based on cooked lean and marble weight, the per capita serving of beef each day will be less than two ounces; smaller than the recommended nutritional serving. The figures make a good argument against those people who say Americans consume too much meat protein.

Americans will eat more meat in 1974. We estimate that U.S. consumption of red meat will be 180.4 pounds per person, up nearly four pounds over 1973 but below 1972 levels. Beef consumption will average 115 pounds, up from 110.4 pounds in 1973 but down from 116 pounds in 1972. Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz estimated that meat imports for 1974 will be 1.375 billion pounds. That's 15 per cent above 1973, which

Larry Martin of Burkburnett set a new record in the 880 run for Division II. He ran it with a time to 2:01.4.

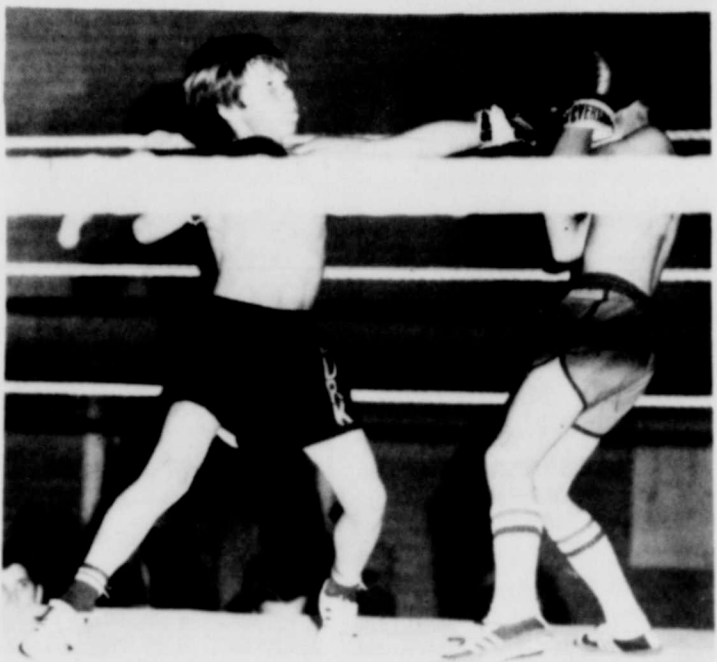

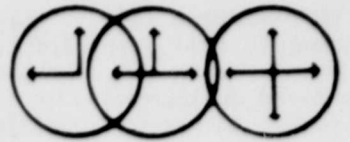

Boys Tie For First In Local Tennis Tournament

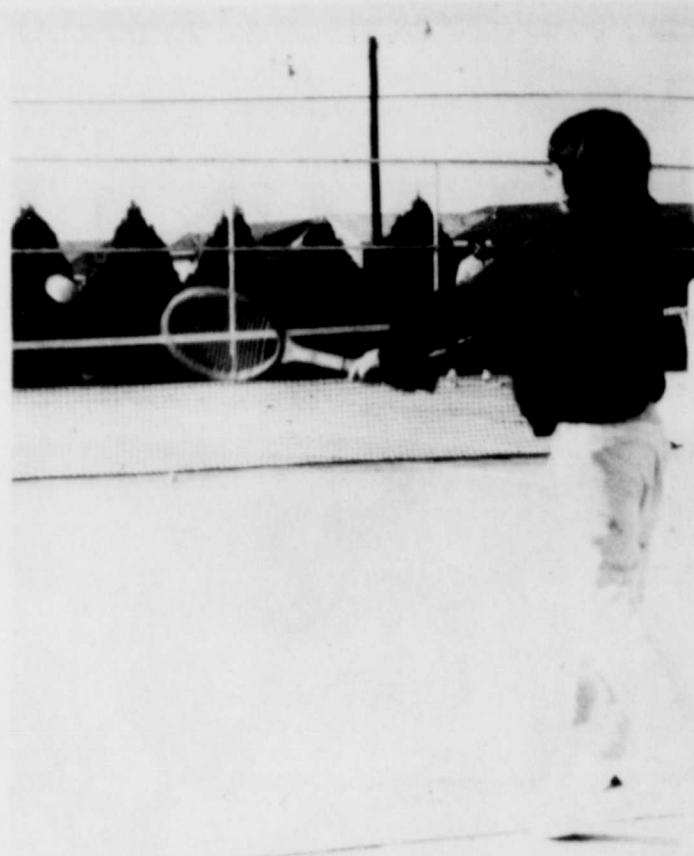

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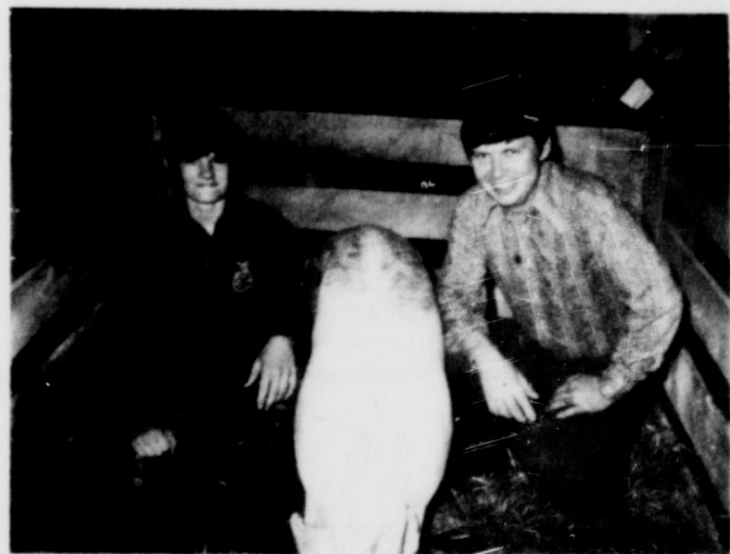
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
