## School Board Hires Jr. High Principal, Vocational Director

The Burk Burnett School Board held a special meeting Monday night and hired Jim Phillips as the new Junior High School principal. Phillips had been serving as head basketball coach for the high school.

According to Superintendent James Pearson, Phillips has been attending school on his own time in an effort to someday become an administrator. He said, "We need more young people in administration and I recommend that we employ Phillips as Junior High principal."

The board unanimously approved the hiring of Phillips.

In other action, the board established a vocational director position in the school and hired James Easter to fill the vacancy.

According to Pearson, the Texas Education Agency recently approved Burk Burnett's establishing a vocational director position. To be authorized, a school must have at least 10 vocational programs, and Burk Burnett has 12.

Easter has 14 years experience as vocational agricultural director, and was unanimously approved by the

board for the position. Pearson said of Easter, "I think we have a real fine ag program, and James has been real instrumental in it. I think he'll be an asset in building the programs we have and the ones we'll add later."

High School Principal Bill Darland said that he would miss the two men in their former positions, but was glad they would remain in the local school system.

Board member John Gill said, "As long as we're keeping good men like this in the system it is real good."

The school board voted to purchase a 5,000 gallon underground gasoline storage tank and pump to be used this school year, and agreed to purchase about \$275 worth of concrete blocks for the new fieldhouse.

The board agreed not to force students to buy identification cards or pay an activity fee this year. It was reported that other schools who had the ID card are eliminating it this year because of dissatisfaction with students and parents, therefore Burk Burnett will not charge an activity fee.

The insurance committee of Ira Schroeder, C.J. Lippard, Frank Morton, and James Pearson will review a business application by a Burk Burnett insurance agency and John Gill and C.J. Lippard were named delegate and alternate to the convention of the Texas Association of School Board Members and Administrators, which will be held in San Antonio Oct. 5-7.

Also discussed was reinforcing the football stadium bleachers and ventilating the bus barn.

## Individualized Education Program To Begin In Burk Burnett Schools

The Burk Burnett Independent School District will offer students something new this year--the Plan A concept of individualized education.

According to Carl Dixon, director of Plan A in Burk Burnett, the state funded program is designed to meet the needs of all students in the Burk Burnett Independent School District by offering individualized assistance to children who are strong in some areas of study and not so strong in others, the idea being to insure maximum development in all areas.

The Burk Burnett Plan A philosophical concept is as follows:

"It is the responsibility of the schools within the Burk Burnett Independent School District to insure the development of each pupil to his individual maximum potential, with regard to physical, social, emotional, academic, and vocational achievement and adjustment.

Our belief is that the services to be provided will allow the majority of these children to remain in the regular school program. Those pupils who are unable to function in this program will be provided with services that meet their individual needs.

Burk Burnett Independent School District's Individualized Education Program will meet the individual needs of students through a program coordinating the interrelated elements of child, program, personnel, and community."

Assisting Dixon with Plan A are Thelma Campese, diagnostician; Bob Carpenter, counselor; Arbury Ritter, vocational adjustment coordinator (VAC); eight teacher aides; 9 resource teachers, 3 speech therapists, and 3 self-

contained classroom teachers. According to Arbury Ritter, vocational adjustment coordinator, Shakespeare is not the answer for all students. These students want and need to learn how to enter the world's work and business force. "Our goal is

to integrate them into the world of work," said Ritter. "This is a very much needed part of the educational process and is often neglected. We try to individualize education in a practical sense."

Thelma Campese, who is the diagnostician, gives children various screening tests to find out which strengths and weaknesses each child possesses. "Then," she explained, "we try to work toward his strengths and remediate his weaknesses."

She said, "Texas is one of the states leading in this program, and others are watching to see how successful we are. We've needed this program for a long, long time; it has marvelous potential."

Counselor Bob Carpenter's duties consist of promoting communication between the parents and the school, and of testing and appraising students' abilities. He is the link joining the parent, school (homeroom teacher), and child.

There will be approximately 400 students benefiting from Plan A in the Burk Burnett school system this first year, with all the instructional teachers and personnel being professionally certified. Most classes will consist of around 10-12 students per class, with from 15 to 20 per cent of the student body associated in some way with the Plan A program.

Plan A is aimed at providing every student with the educational opportunity to reach the ultimate goal of individual self-sufficiency, said Dixon. "It strives to make the student's educational experiences meet his individual needs."

All schools in Texas are required to adopt the Plan A program by the year 1976, and several schools already have the program in operation. In some areas where the average daily attendance is small, schools will form co-ops to unite and share in the same Plan A program through several school systems. Burk Burnett, however, has a large ADA and will operate the Plan A concept in its system alone rather than joining with other school systems.

United States figures show that there are approximately 5-7 million children in the nation who have learning problems and are not being given help. Plan A is designed to lessen this number by giving students individual help in isolated problem areas.

## Crippled Children's Livestock Auction Seeking Pledges

## WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

As long as the outdoor cooking season continues in full swing, forequarter cuts of both beef and pork remain the favorite choice for economy, one expert said.

She's Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Good beef buys this week are on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks and roasts and ground beef.

"Pork values can be found on shoulder roasts and steaks, picnics, hams, end-cut loin roasts and chops, and pork liver.

"Fryer chicken prices are beginning to climb slightly," the specialist noted.

Frozen turkeys--including turkey parts and boneless birds--are readily available in most retail stores.

"Egg prices are low when compared to other protein foods. Grade A Large and medium sizes continue to give the best quality and economy," Mrs. Clyatt said.

Large supplies of cherries and nectarines are on the market now.

Other good quality and reasonably priced fruits are bananas, peaches, grapes, oranges, pineapples, cantaloupe, and watermelon.

"Potato prices are coming down with the increased supplies of new crop potatoes.

"Tomatoes should cost less as more growing areas come into production," the specialist reported.

Vegetables in good supply at economical prices include squash, cabbage, carrots, purple hull and blackeye peas, dry yellow onions, radishes and green onions.

**Consumer Watchwords:** Santa Rosa plums are in good supply now and prices likely won't go any lower.

Look for ripe plums to have a dark red to purple color and be soft enough to yield to slight pressure.

Store ripe plums in the refrigerator but immature plums may be ripened at room temperature.

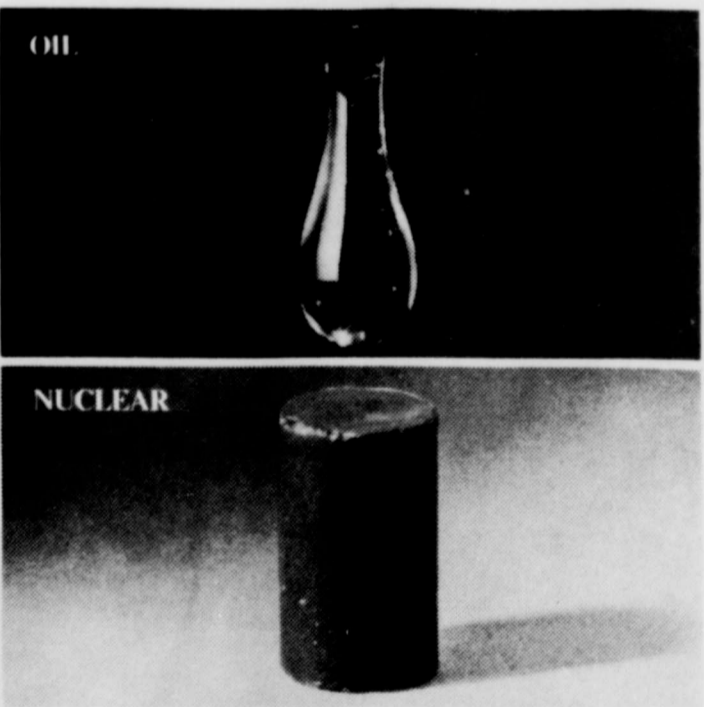
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**We're building power plants that use different fuels so you'll continue having the electricity you need.**

Natural gas is the major fuel we use in our generating plants, and will be for several years. Oil is used on a standby basis.

But new supplies of these fuels are extremely difficult to obtain and increasingly expensive. To reduce our dependence on them, we've begun using lignite coal. We now have one lignite plant in operation, and two others under construction.

We have adequate supplies of lignite for the operating life of these plants and for some additional planned units. Even so, we will need another dependable fuel source for the future. That's why we're planning to have a nuclear-fueled plant in operation by 1980.

The use of lignite and nuclear fuels is necessary to provide enough electricity in the years ahead. Supplies of these fuels are more abundant and neither is

being used extensively for any purpose other than the generation of electricity.

But building plants that use these fuels is a difficult and expensive job. Lignite and nuclear plants cost much more to build than gas/oil plants. While this means electricity will have to cost more in the future, the cost will be less with lignite and nuclear fuels than it would be with natural gas and oil, even if adequate new supplies were available.

We're continuing the orderly development of our power system so that you'll continue having the electricity you need.

County Agent News

The fifth annual National Youth Horse Congress along with the 1974 Texas 4-H Horse Show will be held July 29-August 3 at the State Fair Grounds, Dallas. In addition to qualifying classes in the state 4-H show, events will also include an open youth all-breed show, championship 4-H contests and open youth contests. More than 600 Texas youth plus more than 200 youth from 20 other states are expected to compete.

The Texas A&M University System has approved funding of more than \$67,000 plus a federal grant of \$15,000 to provide continued educational training for elected county officials. Workshops and meetings will be held and regular newsletters will be disseminated to all county officials to provide information on new procedures and legal interpretations that will affect county government responsibilities.

To keep roses producing even during hot weather, fertilize them each month, water and prune regularly, and follow a regular spray schedule to provide protection against insects and disease. If leaves begin to yellow, apply iron chelate or iron sulfate. When pruning, cut above the top most five-leaflet leaf on weak stems and above a three-leaflet on strong stems.

Anaplasmosis is a continuing problem in Texas cattle. Anaplasmosis is an infectious blood disease of cattle which constitutes a serious threat to the health and well-being of Texas livestock. It is caused by one-celled parasites in the bloodstream which attack and destroy the red blood cells, resulting in anemia and sometimes death. The disease does not affect humans.

Symptoms of the disease are similar to some other cattle diseases. They include anemia, a yellow appearance of the skin and mucus membranes, difficulty in breathing, dehydration and constipation. Affected animals may become excited and death may occur within 24 hours after symptoms are first noted.

Anaplasmosis is less serious in young cattle. However, unless adequately treated, cattle of any age that recover from the disease usually become carriers for life and can spread the disease. The disease is one of the most costly in beef cattle in this country. Some 50,000 to 100,000 cattle die of it each year. The beef cattle industry suffers an estimated \$100 million loss annual due to livestock deaths and decreases in beef and cattle production.

The disease has been a problem in large sections of the United States for many years and may continue to spread from the increased transportation of carrier cattle to previously uninfected areas.

Currently control is up to the individual. Vaccinating will reduce the severity and cut death losses but does not prevent the disease. Low level feeding of antibiotics during the season that transmission can occur helps prevent the disease and reduces the severity of the cases.

National Junior Angus Show Set

The spotlight of America's beef industry will be on the Texas State Fairgrounds in Dallas on July 29-30 when 372 young cattlemen from 15 states compete for top honors in the sixth annual National Junior Angus Heifer Show.

White Motor Corporation has reported that its North American farm equipment sales rose 37 per cent to \$194.4 million during 1973, and earnings from operations in this market totaled \$10,000,000. Net income at White Motor in 1973 was \$23.7 million or \$2.74 a common share, up from \$8.6 million or 99 cents per share in 1972. Sales for the year of \$1.179 billion represented a 25 per cent increase over 1972 for this international manufacturer.

July 25-31 Farm Safety Week

County Judge Calvin Ashley has proclaimed the week of July 25-31, 1974, as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Wichita County at the request of Wichita County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is joining efforts with other farm and ranch agencies within the county and many of its 209 counterpart FB's across the state.

In the proclamation Judge Ashley said "There are many practical, common-sense precautions that farm people can practice to prevent deaths and injuries." Some of the suggestions made by the Judge include: Replace the faded Slow-Moving Vehicle emblems on farm equipment on public roads, use protective equipment at work, drive defensively, buy tractors with rollover protection, and follow good safe practices at home and recreation.

Like the cost-price crisis, farmers and ranchers have

become increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural safety through regulatory requirements for their hired labor and the added cost of new equipment as a result of these regulatory requirements.

Reviewing the report of Fatal Farm Accidents in Texas for 1973, Farm Bureau President Roberts said, "We are concerned with more than just crop and livestock productivity alone." He expressed concern of the 214 fatal farm accidents which occurred in 123 different counties. "Of particular concern is the 59 deaths occurring to young people under 20 years of age and the 73 deaths occurring to the older group over 60 years of age," he explained. "Forty-two people died as a result of firearms accidents and there were 40 drownings - and only a small percentage of the total fatalities were involved in agriculture labor."

Home Demonstration News

A home freezer can save you time in marketing and meal preparation. It can also mean that you can have a variety of fresh flavored foods of high nutritional value throughout the year which includes fruits and vegetables. The amount it will cost you will depend on the amount of food you freeze and use. The faster the turn-over of food in the freezer, the lower the cost of operation.

Freezing Fruits and Vegetables At Home

Frozen fruits and vegetables spice year round menus with garden-fresh flavor. But the nutritive value and quality of these fruits and vegetables depend largely on the treatment before freezing, storage temperature and method of cooking and serving.

Most fruit can be frozen satisfactorily. Select sound, ripe fruit which is slightly riper than for canning but not soft or mushy. Tree or vine ripened fruits contain more vitamins and a richer flavor than fruits picked green and allowed to ripen before freezing.

In general fruit is prepared for freezing as for eating. Keep fruit cool until it is frozen. Wash it in cold water but do not allow it to stand in the water. Some fruit loses food value and flavor and some gets water soaked.

Some fruits, such as peaches, apricots, apples and pears, discolor easily. Ways to prevent this are: Ascorbic acid (vitamin C) is available in tablet, crystalline or powdered form. Use 1/2 teaspoon of this per quart of syrup to prevent this discoloration.

If you don't want to pack the fruit in syrup, sprinkle dissolved ascorbic acid over fruit just before adding sugar. Use 1/2 teaspoon in 1/2 cup cold water to each quart of fruit.

Some special commercial antidarkening preparation of ascorbic acid are now on the market.

These materials can be found at drug stores or where other freezing supplies are sold.

Most fruits have better texture and flavor if packed in sugar or syrup. Some may be packed without sweetening for use in special diets.

The way you plan to use the fruit determines the method of packing it. Fruit packed in a syrup generally is better for dessert use; fruit packed in dry sugar or unsweetened is better for most cooking because there is less liquid in the products.

Quickly getting vegetables from the garden to the freezer is a must for top-quality frozen vegetables. During hot weather, harvest vegetables in the early morning before they absorb much heat.

Vegetables at optimum maturity will have best flavor and texture. If you must store vegetables before freezing spread them out loosely in a cool, well-ventilated place or pack loosely in the refrigerator.

Prepare vegetables for freezing similar to cooking them. Wash thoroughly in cold water, drain and sort, peel, trim and cut.

Heat vegetables in boiling water before freezing. Use one gallon of boiling water to each pound of vegetable. The length of heating time varies with the vegetable.

This kills enzyme action in the product. The enzymes help the plants grow and mature but if not deactivated the vegetables will develop off flavors and often discolor or toughen during freezing.

Place the scalded vegetables immediately into running cold or ice water. When the product is cool to the tongue when tested, it is cool enough to pack.

After the vegetables have been heated, cooled and drained, pack in airtight moisture-vapor-proof containers leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Seal according to type of container you use.

Cook all vegetables in the frozen state, except corn-on-the-cob which should be partially defrosted. Cook them only until tender in a small amount of water.

# County Agent Receives Superior Service Award

B.T. Haws, County Extension Agent for Wichita County, has received the Texas Superior Service Award for distinguished educational achievement and outstanding leadership programs.

The award was presented during the annual conference of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University, July 19. Haws was cited "for outstanding success in assistance to rural and urban families in adopting more effective farming, ranching and community improvement practices through local program committee action and outstanding result demonstrations."

The county agent, serving in primarily a metropolitan county, has done an outstanding job in planning and conducting effective educational programs for businessmen and professional people engaged in agriculture as well as for part-time farmers. Through a series of breakfast meetings, he has reached these people with timely information on livestock and forage production, horticulture and financing.

He has conducted an outstanding community improvement program and has inspired rural communities to organize and compete in the Texas Community Improvement Program. Several communities in his county annually compete for top honors in the program.

Through short courses and an effective result demonstration program, Haws has provided timely educational information on crop and livestock production to farmers and ranchers in Wichita County. Some 18 short courses during the past two years have been conducted on livestock production and have dealt with pregnancy testing, nutrition, internal and external parasites, cow-calf operations, marketing, financing, stocker cattle operations and related topics.

Haws annually conducts 25 to 30 result demonstrations on livestock and crop production. These have proved effective in increasing the quality of production as well as boosting income. For instance, wheat yields have doubled from 12 to 24 bushels per acre.

Through a weekly horticultural column in the Burkburnett Informer/Star, the county agent provides the latest information on fruit and nut production, vegetables and ornamentals to both rural and urban people.

Another strong suit in Haws' Extension educational work is an outstanding 4-H program.

## With Teams From Burkburnett TCBA Becomes Largest Bowling League In Nation

Sill in Oklahoma. Establishments currently involved include Boomtown Bowl, Falls Bowl, Fun Bowl, Holiday Bowl, Town & Country Lanes, Greenbelt Lanes, Thunderbird Lanes, and Altus Bowl.

Other major areas currently involved in this association, which spans more than 650 miles across two states, include Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Texoma Land and North East Texas, Houston and far West Texas. Houston and far West Texas are currently developing their areas for TCBA membership this season too.

A prospective prize fund of \$6,400 will be awarded to all 14 teams competing in the TCBA playoffs. The first place pay-off will be \$2,250.

The TCBA is a 935 maximum team average men's traveling league that requires an 875 minimum line-up to qualify for membership. The three-year old TCBA has developed into one of the nation's top bowling organizations.

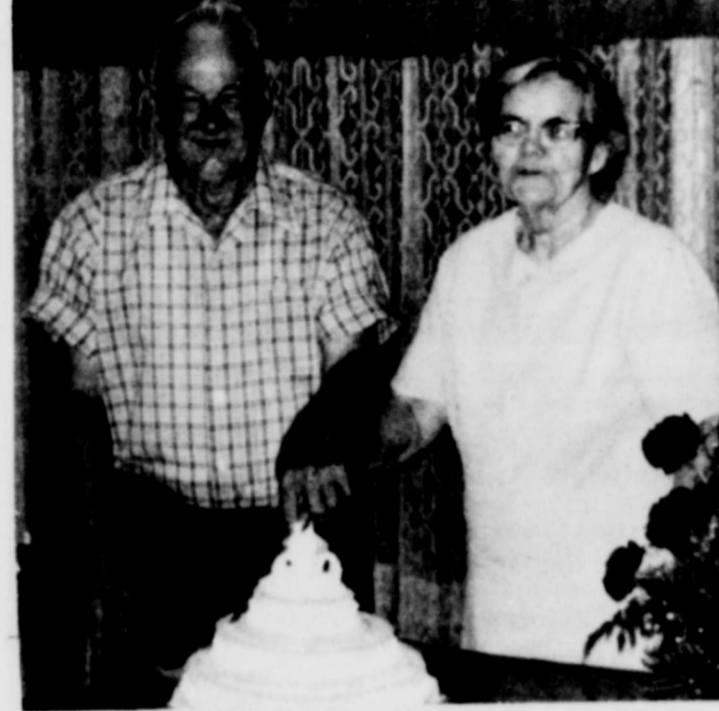

**Sheppard Notes**

Members of the 3750th Student Group of the School of Applied Aerospace Sciences (SAAS) at Sheppard Air Force Base, Texas, have compiled a scrapbook, documenting their activities in the area communities.

The scrapbook was compiled by Second Lieutenants Jeanne M. Sturm, administrative officer with the 3781st Student Squadron, and Stephen M. Reeves, administrative officer with the 3762nd Student Squadron, SAAS.

The book, which records 2 1/2 years of outstanding service to the civilian community, will be used to give students a better feeling of inter-community relationships.

To recognize a few of the worthwhile activities in 1972, the scrapbook portrays various contributions made by Student Groups. For example, one article concerns members of one squadron helping Community Action Corporation renovate the Help Center; official funds available for the project did not cover the cost of labor, so student airmen helped to paint and repair doors, windows, and buckled floors.

Another article tells of Camp Letoli of the Camp Fire Girls, Camp Perkins of the Boy Scouts and the Boys Club Camp at Lake Kickapoo which have all benefited as a result of volunteer labor efforts by members of Student Group. One article tells of a squadron adopting an American Indian, contributing \$12 a month to his support in addition to gifts and contributions for his health and welfare.

Contributions for 1973 are numerous. A few typical ones include twenty volunteers who collected pledges for over \$1000 and participated in the 20-mile March for Children Walk sponsored by the March of Dimes; members who participated in a door-to-door collection for money to fight muscular dystrophy and others who gave blood for two hemophilic children.

This year has been no exception for the student group in its continuing history of furthering community relations. Similar to the extensive Lucy Park project which occurred last year, student airmen worked with the Jaycees in the Lake

Wichita Project. One squadron sponsored an Easter egg hunt for underprivileged children of

the area, and one squadron participated in the YMCA 24 mile Bike-A-Thon to raise money for scholarships, while another squadron helped with a general clean-up at Burk Burnett's Boomtown Oil Park.

Airmen of the 3750th Student Group can gain a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction through reading the new scrap book and recognizing the many contributions they have made during their working relationship with the civilian community, explained Lieutenant Sturm.

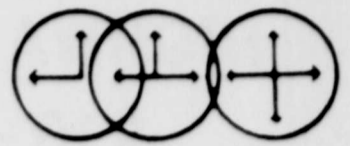

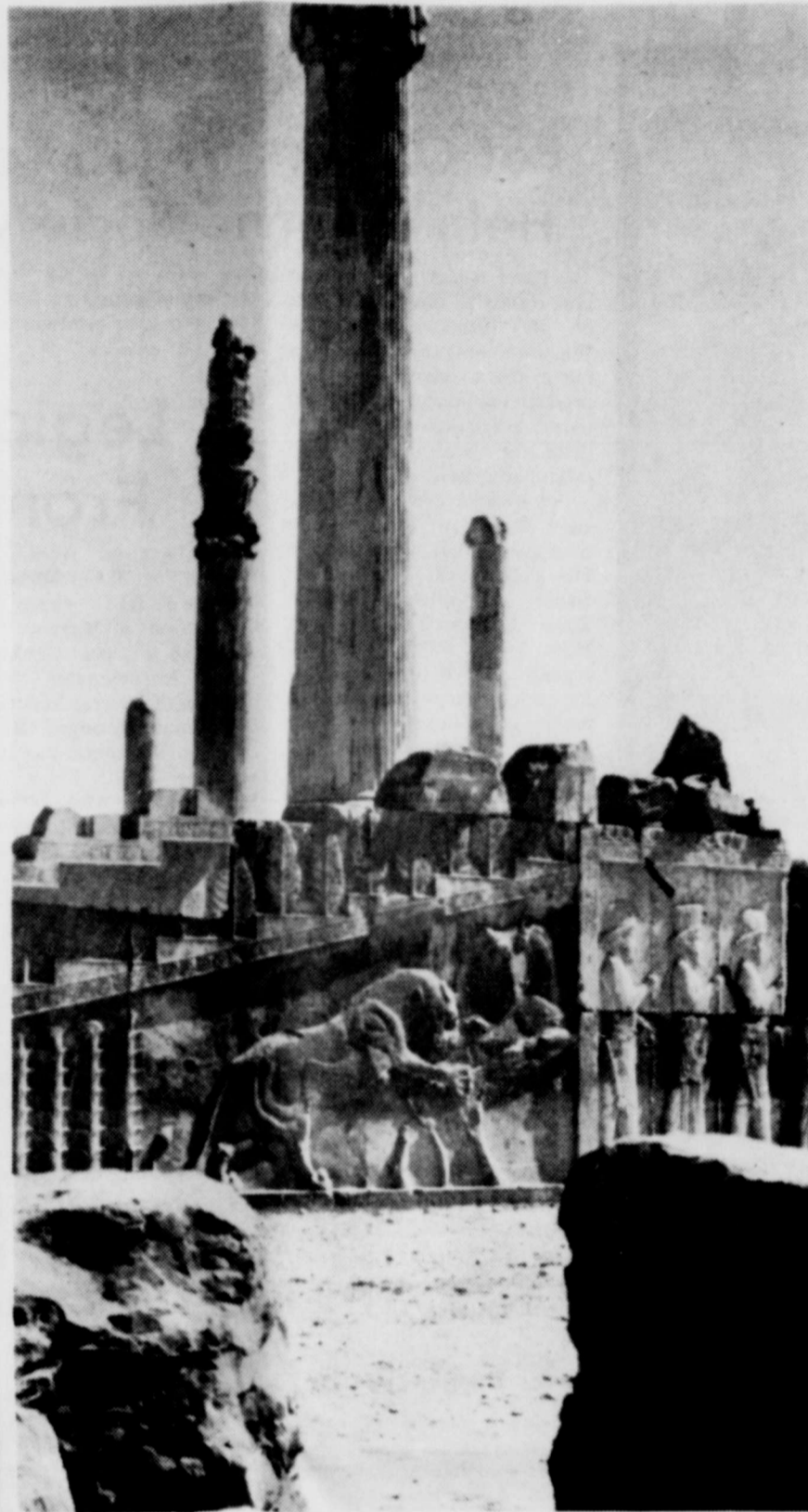

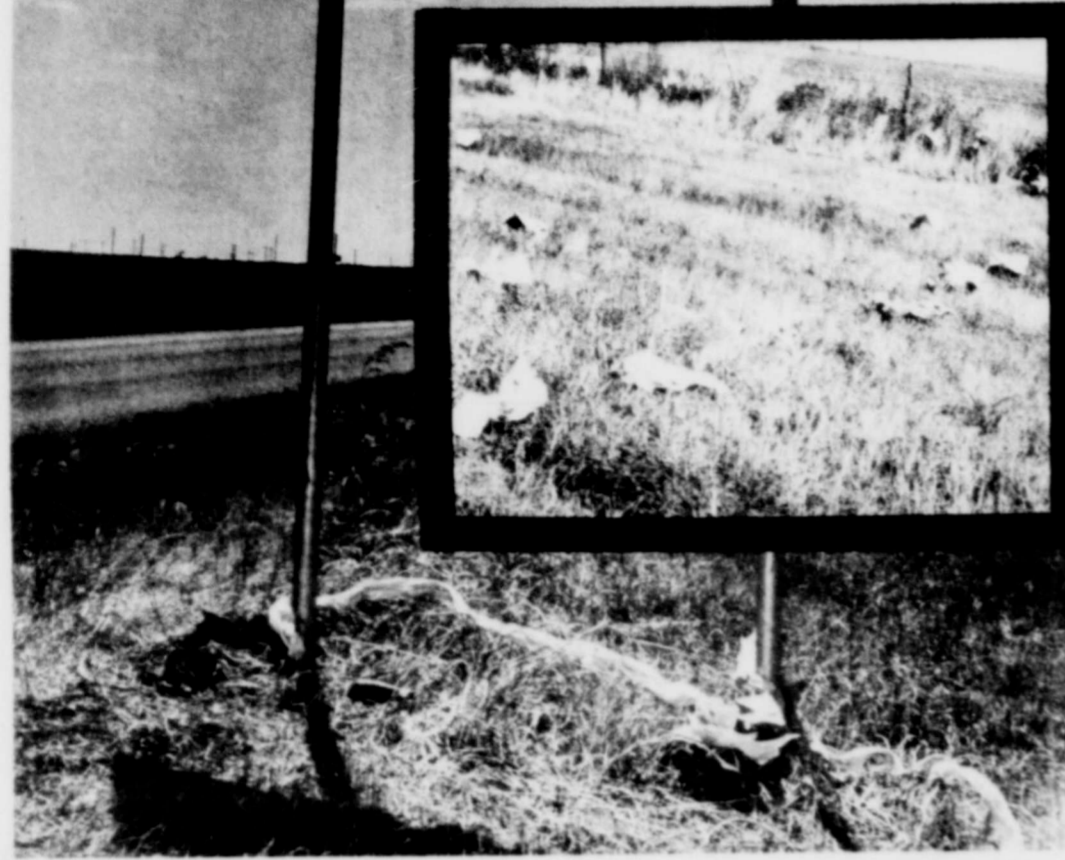

Delegates from Frye-Vaughn Post 264 of Burkburnett returned from their State Convention at Laredo, which was held this past weekend.

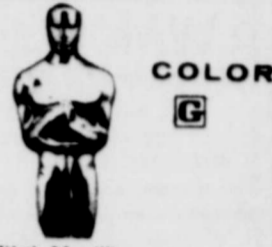

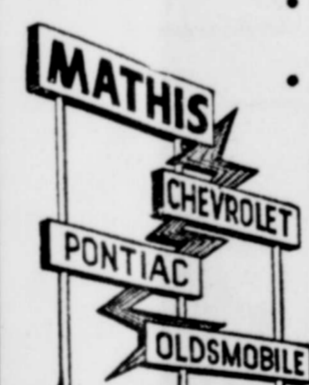
