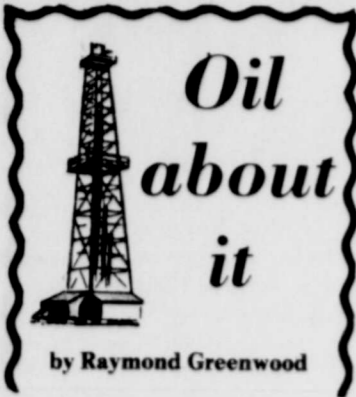

Final Work Begun On United Way Drive

Advance Gift Drive Committeemen of the United Way were almost 100% in attendance for an education and organizational meeting Monday in the National Room of the First National Bank.

The meeting was headed by Alvin Hill, chairman of the advanced gifts committee. Hill told the group that all information for the advanced gift drive would be in the hands of the workers by Friday whereby they could begin work immediately.

Jack Aaron, who is campaign chairman of the United Way, stated, "After much deliberation and study we feel that the best solution to the many needs of Burk Burnett and its many organizations was for Burk Burnett to join with Wichita Falls in a county United Way effort."

He went on to say that the real key to the success of the campaign locally will be educating the workers about United Way in order that they will be able to answer the many questions that will be asked by the general public.

Bill Link, executive director of the United Way, stated that the United Way worked to review the services of its member organizations, to fund these services and to help develop programs for these organizations where they might better meet the needs of the people.

Agencies that receive monies from United Way get three visits from United Way officials each year. Two of the visits are unannounced and one is pre-arranged. Link went on to say that the unannounced visits were means of getting a view of

the agency's work as would be seen by any citizen that entered the agency for help. "United Way has an accountability to the communities that give and support it," continued Link.

Link went on to say that for an organization to become an agency of the United Way they had to provide a valid community service that is not being duplicated somewhere else to that particular public.

Also the organization had to have a local steering group to administer the affairs of the agency.

In addition to this adequate books of all the financial matters of the organization had to be kept and the books must be submitted to the United Way for an annual audit.

Too, the organization must each year assure the United Way Board that the organization is continuing to perform the services that it was first intended to do.

Finally, the organization, before it can become an agency of the United Way must be a chartered organization and in operation for at least three years.

A few of the local organizations that could qualify for United Way are the Senior Citizen Center, child care center, youth center and the school lunch fund. In addition to this local Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and the Red Cross will also be able to receive United Way funds.

Working locally in the various divisions of the United Way campaign will be Jack Aaron, chairman; Jeep Elliott, vice-chairman; Alvin Hill, advanced gifts; Jim Lemley, public relations; T.M. Cornelius, major firms "B"; Marcey Roland, commercial and industrial; Ray Smart, public service; Rev. Lamoin Champ, professional; and Mrs. Robert Norriss, metro.

Each of the above committeemen urged citizens to give their workers a little bit of time and to listen to what can be accomplished for Burk Burnett through the United Way effort.

"Once people realize what the United Way is really all about," stated one worker, "then I don't think we will have much problem in Burk Burnett coming up with its 'Fair Share'."

Bulldogs Ready For Upcoming Season

"When the night of September 6 comes, we'll run 11 men on the field and we'll be able to play," stated Bulldog head football coach Pat Smiley, in answer to questions from interested Rotarians in their Tuesday meeting.

To many Burk fans that statement sounds like an old recording. Dating back for several years now Bulldog coaches traditionally respond with "We'll field a team and will be able to play" when asked about the Bulldogs chances of capturing a District 4-AAA crown.

When the final analysis is done though, fans usually find the Bulldogs hot in the running in the district race. Numerous times in the past four or five years only a single game separated the Bulldogs from the district champions. Of course local fans still remember the famed Bulldog team that ground its way to the state quarterfinals before being stopped by one of the best high school football

teams ever to play in Texas. Although Coach Smiley and his staff say its too early to be making predictions, they will give a few solid facts for local football enthusiasts to chew around.

Currently 29 varsity, 38 junior varsity and 50 freshmen boys are working out for the coming season. Of the varsity players only three are returning starters and only eleven are lettermen.

Ken Eaton, Phil January and Tommy Rushing are the three returning starters to the Bulldog team.

"We've got some big linemen this year," reports Smiley, "we've eight or ten boys over 200 pounds and a couple over 220." This immediately brings memories to local fans of the big bruising team of only a couple of years ago.

"Our kids are working real hard, but the weather is about to kill us," continued Smiley. "Usually we get some let up from the sweltering heat and humidity, but that just hasn't

happened this year. It's rugged having two-day workouts in this type weather. Luckily our boys came into practice in fair shape."

The heavy senior laden squad has some tough positions to fill from last year graduation.

Boys like Zac Henderson who played wing back, defensive back, was one of the state's best punters, ran back punts and kick-offs are hard to replace, related Smiley.

Henderson, as fans will recall was one of the best all-state ball players ever to come from the Bulldog ranks. In fact, as far as is known he is the only former Bulldog player to play in both the Coaches All-Star game and in the Oil Bowl.

Local fans will get a chance to see Smiley and his staff "field 11 boys and play" tomorrow night at 6:00 as the Bulldogs scrimmage with Altus in Bulldog Stadium.

Next week the Bulldogs will scrimmage the Wichita Falls Coyotes.

The 761st Air Force Band is stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base and consists of 45 outstanding concert and jazz musicians. Popularly known as "The Air Force Band Of The

Oilbelt", it is under the direction of Captain Kenneth M. Green.

The band plays throughout Texas and Oklahoma at state fairs, parades, dedications, and military functions, as well as appearing on national television. Because of the

JanLee Acre Citizens Inquire On Annexation

The regular scheduled meeting of the Burk Burnett City Council had a large number of guests Monday night as residents from Jan Lee Acres came before the council for information concerning possible annexation of the area into the city limits. The group's main concern centered around bringing the existing streets up to city specifications and also the cost to the homeowner of connecting to the city sewer.

Residents of Jan Lee Acres will be canvassed by those present and a formal petition made to the council if residents

there decide in favor of annexation.

Don Lawrence, president of the Evening Lions Club of Burk Burnett, presented the council with a request that the city provide matching funds with the club, not to exceed \$1,000 with the money to be used for park playground equipment. The aldermen okayed the request.

An oil well drilling permit was granted to Toss H. Brown to drill an oil well adjacent to an existing well in the east city limits of Burk Burnett.

The council voted to hire a

part-time employee at \$2,270 annually to assist at the Community Action Corp.

In other action, Mayor Cornelius appointed Donald Pate as representative on the Nortex Regional Planning Commission.

The council also named Margaret Williams as municipal judge and Gary Bean, city manager, was granted a six per cent cost of living raise.

Monthly reports showed a bank balance of \$181,512 as of July 28. Accounts were paid totaling \$20,000.

Sergeant Wright was first named noncommissioned officer of the quarter at the hospital and competed with nominees from the other major organizations at the base for the STTC honor.

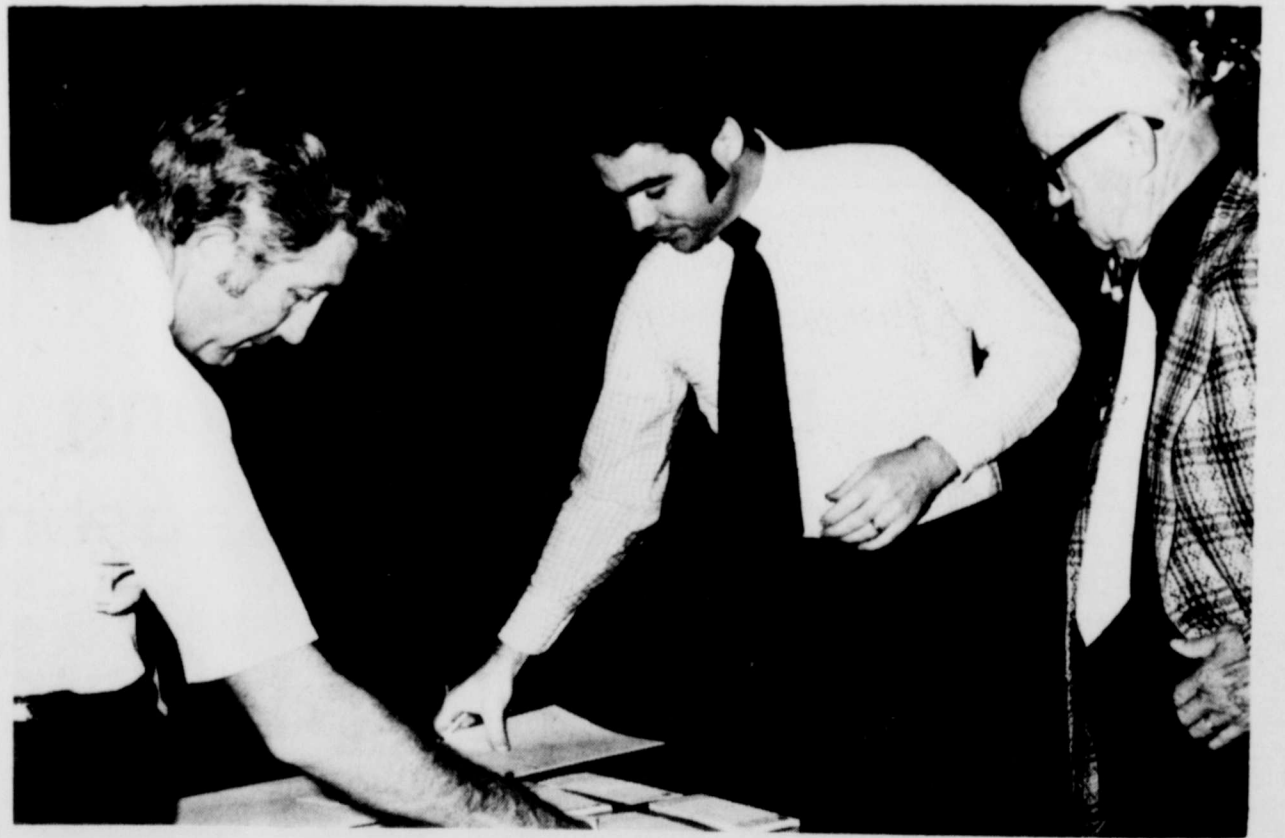

We're building power plants that use different fuels so you'll continue having the electricity you need.

Natural gas is the major fuel we use in our generating plants, and will be for several years. Oil is used on a standby basis.

But new supplies of these fuels are extremely difficult to obtain and increasingly expensive. To reduce our dependence on them, we've begun using lignite coal. We now have one lignite plant in operation, and two others under construction.

We have adequate supplies of lignite for the operating life of these plants and for some additional planned units. Even so, we will need another dependable fuel source for the future. That's why we're planning to have a nuclear-fueled plant in operation by 1980.

The use of lignite and nuclear fuels is necessary to provide enough electricity in the years ahead. Supplies of these fuels are more abundant and neither is

being used extensively for any purpose other than the generation of electricity.

But building plants that use these fuels is a difficult and expensive job. Lignite and nuclear plants cost much more to build than gas/oil plants. While this means electricity will have to cost more in the future, the cost will be less with lignite and nuclear fuels than it would be with natural gas and oil, even if adequate new supplies were available.

We're continuing the orderly development of our power system so that you'll continue having the electricity you need.

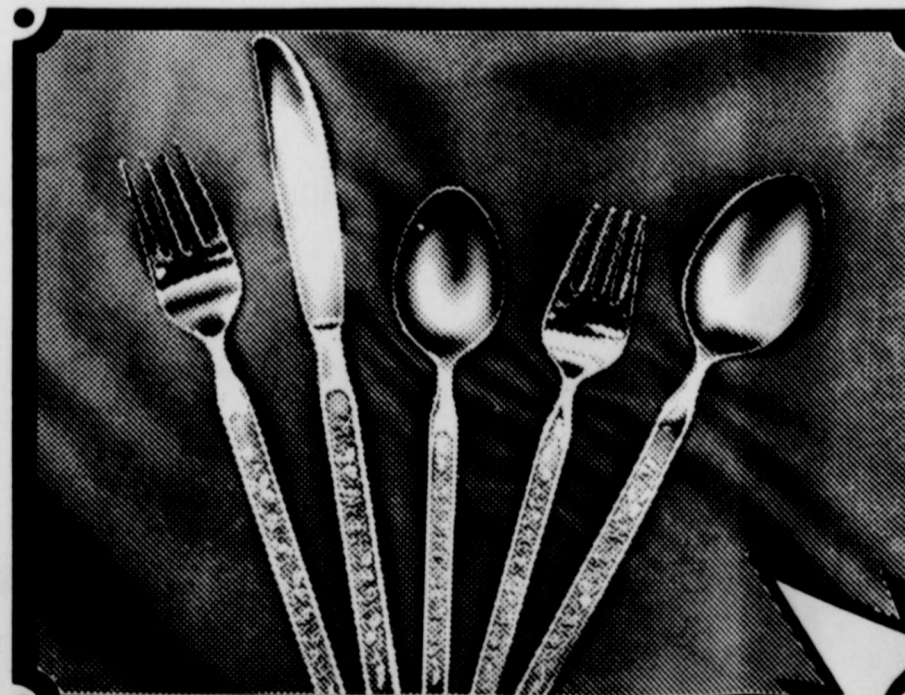

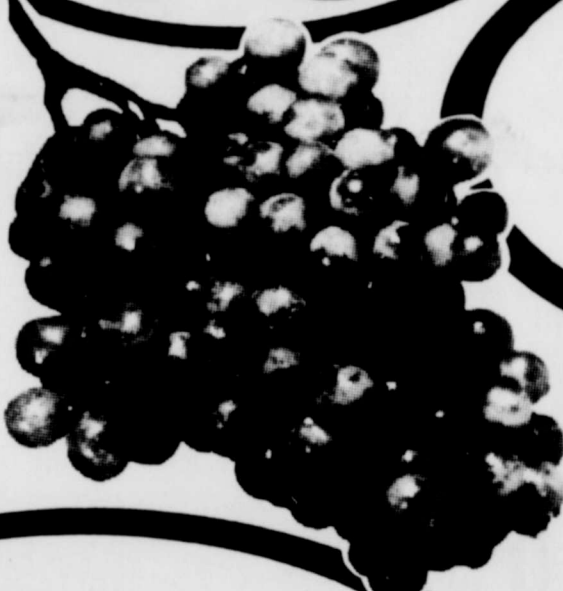

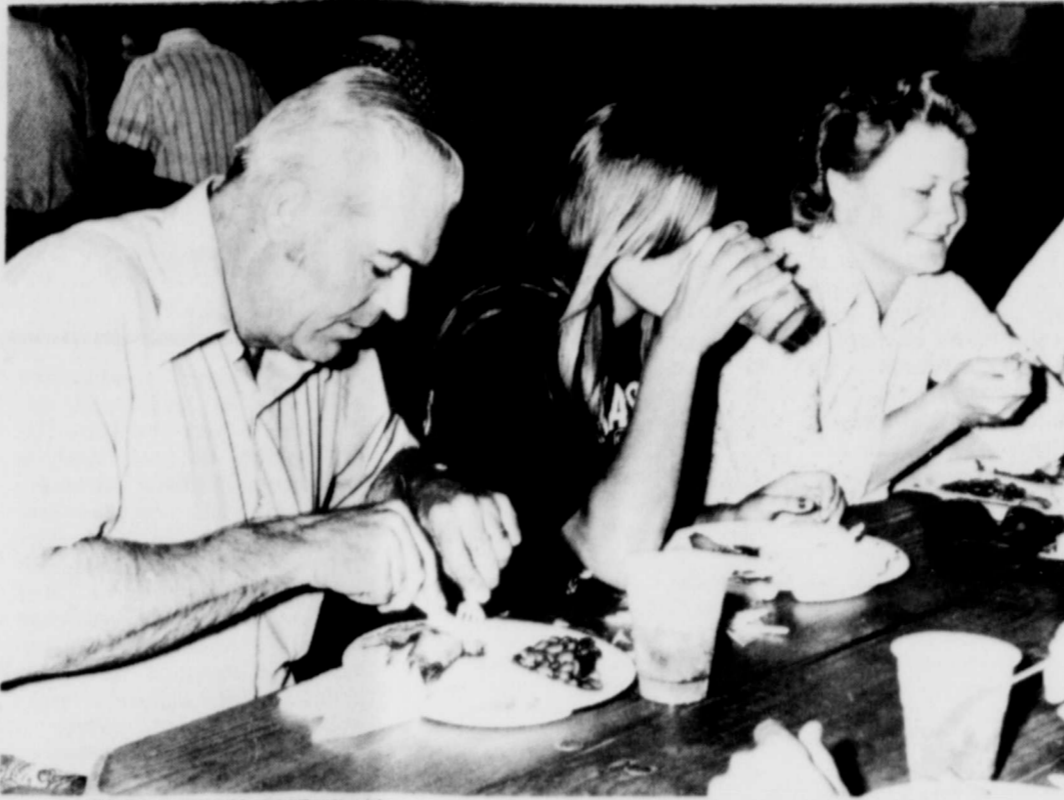

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Home Demonstration News

By Dee James

Parents can do more than anyone else to encourage their child's creative ability—if they only will.

Youths who fully utilize their creative capacities are invariably the ones whose parents have encouraged their abilities and skills.

There are several practical ways parents can help young people respond creatively.

- Provide an atmosphere in which each child is accepted as he is and in which he feels he belongs, has status, and respect of adults and peers.
- Set a good example. Children learn from day-to-day experiences.
- Help each child understand and accept himself and his own thinking.
- Build each child's confidence. Encourage him to try, and to accept his results, whatever they may be. A "can do" feeling enables a child to try new things and to approach school and other life situations with confidence.
- Provide each child freedom, not freedom from responsibility, but freedom to explore, to experiment by himself and with his environment—freedom to learn.
- Reward the inventive, the different. Don't always follow a prescribed formula rigidly. Leave room for new things to happen and develop.

--Listen to yourself and to your child. Are your children learning what you think you are teaching?

--Always search for alternatives, and help each child find "other ways." Encourage him to look beyond the obvious.

--Focus on "Dos" instead of "Don'ts".

--Help him develop a questioning attitude—one that makes him want to ask "why" and not accept things just because someone says they are true.

--Listen to each child. Understand his thinking and feeling. See how the situation or problem looks to him. Show empathy.

--Accept the child's decision if you are given a choice. Many conflicts of wills develop between parents and children because a parent thoughtlessly gives a choice when he is only willing to accept one answer.

--Give the security of limits. Each individual needs to have his boundaries defined.

--Show your love to a child in ways he can understand. Perhaps the easiest way and one that is used the least is the warm, friendly smile. Words can also portray feeling. Other ways you show a child you love and care for him are by giving him your undivided attention at times, by reading a story, listening to him talk, or playing with him.

Burk Helps Crippled Children's Auction

"Thanks to the goodness of ranchers, farmers and other citizens of Burkburnett our total now has reached \$83,399.88" said Joe Parker, general chairman of the sixth annual Crippled Children's Livestock Auction.

"The total reported to date represents the amount which has been turned into the rehabilitation center," explained Parker, a Byers rancher. He noted that "We feel like there may still be some pledges which have yet to be paid and that the final tally may climb even higher."

Parker urged anyone who made a pledge to send in a check as soon as possible to the rehabilitation center at 516 Denver, Wichita Falls, Texas 76301.

"Any others who have not

made pledges but who would like to make a contribution certainly may do so," said Parker, noting that the entire proceeds go toward operation of the rehabilitation center. The amount raised, "as great as it is" still will not provide the amount of money needed to operate the center for one year, he said. The budget is now \$184,411.59.

Parker had high praise for the Burkburnett members of the auction committee. "Without their dedicated efforts, long hours and unflinching interest, this auction would not have been a success," he said.

"I think the people of Burkburnett should be reminded of who the people are in this county who care about handicapped children and adults," Parker said.

Preston One Of New Owners Of Santa Rosa Grounds

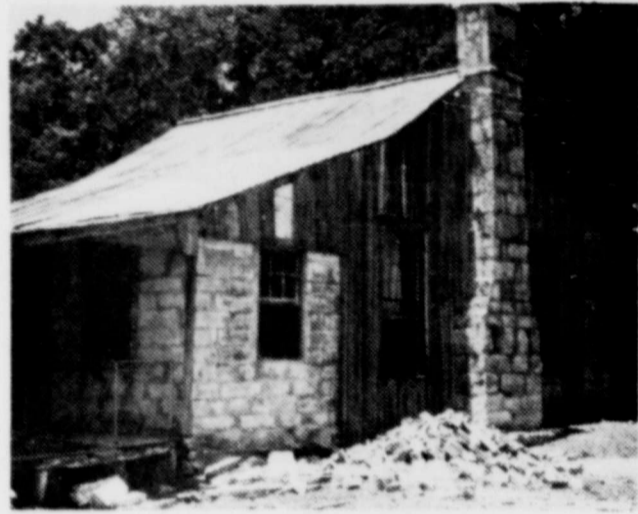
VERNON, Tex.--Sale of Santa Rosa Roundup grounds, 150 acres with rodeo arena and several barns and stables, was completed Thursday and the famed rodeo grounds became Santa Rosa Stud Farm.

New owners include Dr. Grady Stowe and Jim Miley of Wichita Falls, Hugh "Buddy" Preston Jr. of Burkburnett and John Colville of Los Angeles. Purchase price was not disclosed.

Colville is owner of Tiny's Gay, a 2-year-old Quarter Horse whose new home will be at Santa Rosa. Tiny's Gay is undefeated in 12 starts and has won \$305,000 this year.

Colville reportedly has refused an offer of \$2 million for the horse, which is a favorite to win the "world's richest horse race," the All-American Futurity at Ruidoso, N.M., on Labor Day.

Family Land Heritage Deadline August 31

AUSTIN--Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reminded farm and ranch families who wish to qualify that the deadline for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program is Aug. 31.

White said only 50 completed applications out of 700 requests for them had been returned by Aug. 1.

"We hope that qualified landowners haven't put their applications aside and forgotten that the deadline is fast approaching," White said.

He suggested that anyone needing help with the application call the department in Austin, 512-475-6467.

The Family Land Heritage Program was instituted to honor farm and ranch families who have devoted a century or more to Texas agricultural production. Though the program will be ongoing, only landowners



qualifying by Aug. 31 will be eligible for recognition at a special ceremony at the State Fair in October.

To qualify, families must have owned and continuously operated a farm or ranch since 1874 or earlier. Applications must be certified by the county judge in the county where the land is located.

White said a number of interesting pictures, old deeds and family histories have been arriving with the applications. He said information such as this will make interesting reading in the Family Land Heritage Directory which is being compiled.

Most producers will probably take a "wait and see attitude" as far as fall fertilization of crop land is concerned. Fertilizer prices are high now and supplies are generally short. In most cases complete fertilizers (those with nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) are all that are available, and the percentage of active ingredients has been reduced. This means a larger volume is needed, adding to transportation and handling costs. Soil testing will be especially important in determining profitable fertilization practices for each field and each crop.

Beef cow farms are increasing in number in Texas as a result of a new type of landowner who is buying land for other reasons and then deciding to raise cattle. Beef cow farms increased by more than 17,800 from 1964 to 1969, with the largest percentage increase among those farms with 20 to 99 cows. This means that purebred breeders have an expanded market for bulls ad heifers.

A successful retirement must be planned. Retirement planning is especially important for farmers and ranchers and other self-employed people who often work past the age of 65. When they do retire, it's often due to poor health or adverse business conditions. With Social Security providing only for the bare living essentials, additional income may come from renting the farm or ranch, selling the farm and investing the money from the sale, or making an installment sale of the farm or ranch.

The cattle feeding business is finally straightening out.

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may amortize or depreciate the cost of certain pollution control facilities and equipment over five years (60 months) even if the equipment has a longer, useful life.

Such facilities must have been installed and appropriately certified by state and federal pollution control certifying authorities after 1968 and prior to 1975. Also, the Internal Revenue code provides that the facility must be "a new identifiable treatment facility used in connection with a plant (or other property) that was in operation before 1969."

Any facility that is used to control the pollution or contamination of air or water is eligible, if the other conditions are set.

Many recent pollution control investments are viewed in two parts—one that qualifies for the fast write-off and one that will not. Thus, the same investment may end up with two depreciation schedules. This may complicate bookkeeping a bit but will be well worth the tax savings.

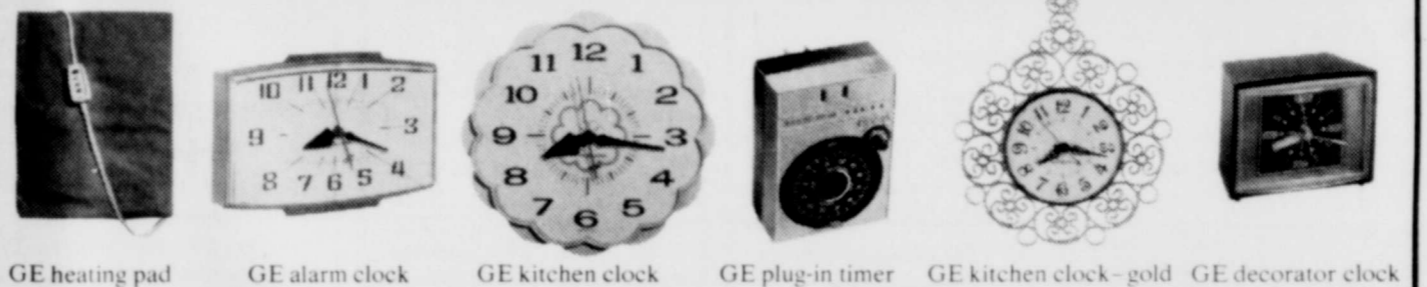

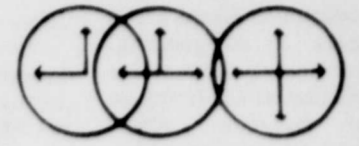

There is little doubt that Moses walked among these columns in ancient Egypt. The remainder of the city lies in dust—but the rock has stood 3,000 years.

There is a timelessness displayed by the rock of ages, Almighty God, which causes the age of these columns to pale into insignificance.

God asked Job, "Where were you when I spoke the world into existence?" It was with those thoughts that I watched city officials place coins, newspapers, photographs, hair pins, and a man's razor in a "time capsule" recently. "To be opened in 2074" the inscription said, and the crowd murmured with awe.

God buried a phrase in John's gospel one day that has been opened by every generation and each has found it indestructible and applicable. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him shall have everlasting life."

Heaven and earth shall pass away, but the word of God liveth and abideth forever.

Of course Powell had passed away by then and a Scottish Lord donated property near London, named Gilwell Park, and this became the center for world-wide Wood Badge. Hurst's beads, neckerchief and woggle came from this center and this name is registered there also.

The Wood Badge Course is the climax to much training and it lasts 7 consecutive days. At the conclusion, the trainee must work all phases of what he had learned, to the satisfaction of his counselor.

The work areas are called 'Competencies' and all hope to be good Managers of Learning. Too few take the course and a poor percentage complete it, but you can spot those who have by the little beads around their neck and the neckerchief with the patch of blue plaid on the back.

All churches, organizations and individuals are urged to join in this worthy cause. Admission

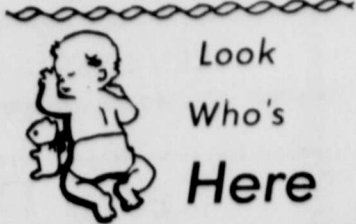
