Home Demonstration News

By Dee James County Extension Agent

Parents can do more than anyone else to encourage their child's creative ability--if they learning what you think you are only will.

Youths who fully utilize their creative capacities are invaribly the ones whose parents have encouraged their abilities and skills.

There are several practical ways parents can help young people respond creatively.



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


