City Accepts Petition, Places Question On General Ballot

In a regularly scheduled meeting Monday night, Burk Burnett City Commissioners voted to accept a petition from the residents of JanLee Acres, who are seeking annexation to the city. The proposal will be placed on the general election ballot in April.

A committee was also assigned to study the possibility of annexing other areas at that same time. It is hoped that the city will be able to square-up its city limit borders.

In other action the council donated a reserve truck to the newly-formed Wichita County Volunteer Fire Department. The truck is not used by the Burk Burnett Fire Department, but could be a

benefit to the rural department as an aide to controlling grass fires. Formal presentation of the truck will be made within the next few weeks.

Corporation court figures revealed a total of 56 violations were cited, 46 of which were traffic citations. Total fines collected by the court was \$1,012.

Tax collections in

November were reported in the amount of \$46,454. In addition some \$634 in old delinquent taxes were collected.

City Manager Gary Bean reported to council members the results of an investigation of city personnel policy by the Federal Labor Board. The council endorsed a resolution to establish the times city employee work

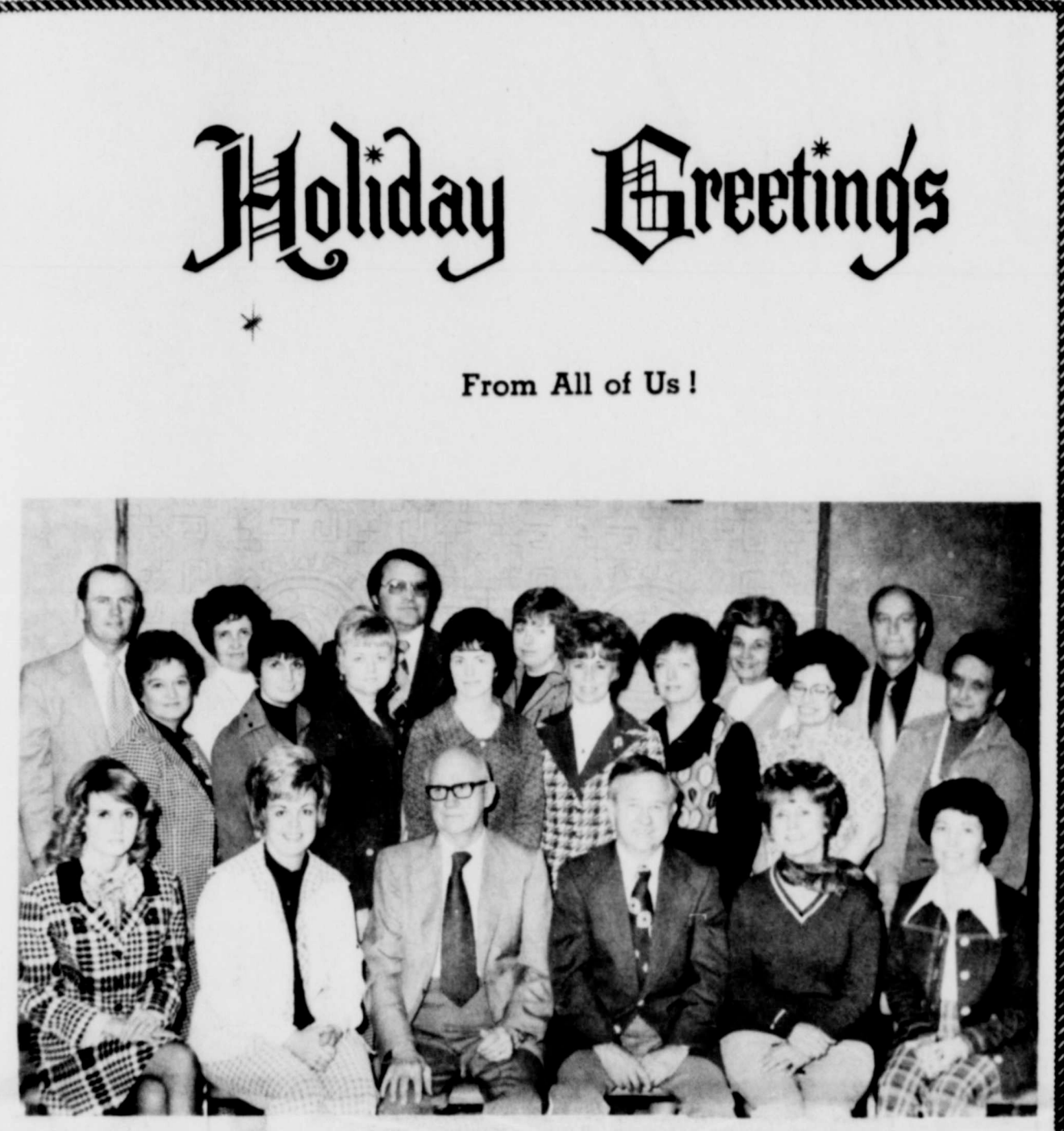

processing, and distributing farm food products. Meat products cost the most to market, followed closely by fruits and vegetables.

All of last year's \$3.0 billion jump in the marketing bill reflected steeper costs of marketing services.

Normally, a rise in volume marketed and more marketing services add to the bill. But farmers marketed less food last year than in 1972. Labor costs rose over 7 per

cent to \$40.3 billion last year, almost half of the marketing bill.

The increase came from mounting labor costs and total hours worked by employees of food marketing firms.

Packaging farm food products cost \$10 billion -- about 6 per cent more than in 1972.

Wholesale prices of many containers rose sharply. Petroleum-based materials such as plastic wrap, trays, and cartons were in tight supply. And prices spurted during the last half of 1973.

Rail and truck transportation remained at \$6.1 billion and accounted for 7 per cent of the total marketing bill. Although boosts in transportation rates averaged about 4 per cent last year, they were offset by a drop in volume of farm foods handled.

Costs to truckers have been climbing because of fuel price hikes, reduced speed limits on highways and higher wage rates. Capital costs, including

depreciation, rent and interest, rose to \$6.9 billion or 8 per cent of the food marketing bill.

Parts of this total was due to growing construction costs which upped depreciation costs and commercial rental rates for food marketing firms.

Advertising again took almost 2 cents of each food dollar. Food processors spent half of the \$2.3 billion for advertising all farm food in 1973.

Advertising costs were three times greater for television than for newspapers and other print media.

Corporation profits reached \$4.6 billion before federal income taxes -- a \$1.1 billion increase from 1972. These profits represented 5.6 per cent of the marketing bill in 1973 compared with 4.5 per cent in 1972.

Business taxes climbed 3 per cent to \$3.3 billion in 1973--almost twice what they were 10 years ago.

Soil Survey Can Help Builders

How homebuyers can use soil surveys to avoid later regrets is explained by a new publication of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The colorful brochure, "Homebuyers . . . Soil Surveys Can Help You," was written by the Soil Conservation Service as an aid to consumers.

There are tens of thousands of different soils, and many of them cause serious problems when used for house lots. The new booklet explains how a soil survey can pinpoint areas subject to flooding, seasonal wetness, septic tank failure, erosion and other hazards. By checking a homesite on a soil map, prospective homebuyers can find out what soil hazards, if any, they risk by buying the house.

Christmas Tree Calf Promotes Food Gifts

AUSTIN--A lot of people had to look twice to be sure they were seeing a calf hanging from a Christmas tree.

They were. The calf, enclosed in a large wooden box decorated like a holiday gift package, was the star attraction at the Texas Department of Agriculture's kick-off of the Holiday Gift Certificate promotion.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, who appeared at the Dec. 9 event, said the

promotion is being sponsored throughout the state by Texas agricultural organizations to help farmers and ranchers hit hardest by the cost-price squeeze.

Passersby were invited to register for a drawing of free packages of beef, turkey, ham and dairy items and to take a look at the live product -- hogs, cattle and poultry in pens that had been decorated with balloons and red ribbon to carry out the holiday motif.

The promotion is being held to help the state's agricultural producers caught in the cost-price squeeze.

The event was held a block from the Capitol. White said the certificates are now available in major chains throughout the state. "There should be no problem in redeeming them," he said.

Certificates read, "Good for Texas Meat, Poultry and Dairy Products." Some chains are using their regular food certificates with a message urging recipients to buy the products promoted. All certificates come with decorative envelopes.

White said certificates can be purchased for any amount. In addition to TDA, the promotion is supported by the Texas Farm Bureau, Texas State Grange, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and seven other organizations and commodity groups.

TDA and Farm Bureau offices around the state also have a supply of envelopes and stuffers for people who prefer to send a check but want to suggest buying food with it.

Deepwater Ports Are More Efficient

Until Congress passes legislation authorizing deepwater ports, which are essential to accommodate supertankers carrying petroleum, the U.S. will be the only major industrial nation without one, reports the American Petroleum Institute.

Eighty per cent of the construction tonnage on worldwide order is for tankers larger than 200,000 tons, which require the deepwater ports. These bigger ships are more efficient and economical to build and operate.

Pesticide Publication Available

AUSTIN--Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced publication of the 1974 Sample Analysis of Economic Pesticides, a book to provide Texas pesticide buyers with information about products available in the state.

The 122-page book contains the results of laboratory tests on nearly 1,500 products from 154 companies. It notes products on which stop sale orders were issued.

Soil surveys contain detailed maps of a county's soils and interpretations of the data for a variety of land uses. Information is based on test borings to a depth of about six feet or to rock. More than 70 percent of the land in Texas, or about 120 million acres, has been surveyed. In areas not covered by a published survey, land users may obtain recorded information from a survey in progress at the appropriate Soil Conservation Service Office.

Select a Christmas tree with care. Make sure that the tree is well filled out, has a triangular shape, and isn't too large for the allotted space. Shake the tree to see if needles fall. If only a few needles fall, the tree is fresh. Cut an inch off the butt end of the tree and place it in water. Place the tree away from heating vents, radiators, fireplaces and other sources of heat. Add water regularly to the tree holder.

Feed supplies and prices will remain the critical concerns of the livestock industry in the coming months. Reduced grain and soybean production has resulted in rising feed prices and cutbacks in livestock feeding. Hog prices are expected to decrease this fall but should increase next year. Fed cattle prices should increase during the first half of 1975 along with feeder cattle prices. Lamb prices are expected to continue under pressure.

Damaging greenbug in-

festations do not occur at regular intervals in any predictable pattern. Whether we will have an outbreak of greenbugs this year, only time will tell. The preferred hosts of greenbugs are wheat, oats, barley, and rye; although they may occur on several other grasses and grain sorghums.

The greenbugs are aphids, approximately one-sixteenth inch long, light green bodies with a dark green stripe down their back. The legs are green, except for the "feet" which are black. Greenbugs may be winged or wingless, with both forms in the same colony.

Greenbugs give birth to living young, and all offspring are females. The optimum temperature for greenbug reproduction is approximately 75 degrees F. Newly born greenbugs may begin reproduction in as short as seven days or as long as 30 days, depending on weather conditions and temperature. One female can produce about 80 offspring during a 25-day reproduction period. There may be 20 or

more generations in a single growing season. The following table will provide information and serve as a reliable guide in determining the need for treatment when greenbugs are found in small grains:

Plant Height In Inches	No. Greenbugs per Linear Foot
3 to 6	100-300
4 to 8	200-400
6 to 16	300-800

Occasionally, populations of 25-50 greenbugs per linear foot of row on young, small grain plants may warrant treatment. This is especially true on oats or barley. For control of greenbugs on small grains, choose one of the following insecticides: Dimethoate, Disulfoton, Malathion, Methylparathion or Parathion.

Dimethoate is cleared for use on wheat only. Disulfoton should not be used on any small grain that is to be grazed with livestock. Malathion is not as effective as disulfoton, methylparathion or parathion, but may be used where a less toxic material is preferred for ground application. Parathion is not cleared for use on rye. Dimethoate should not be grazed for 14 days after application; malathion, 7 days; methylparathion and parathion, 15 days.



Small Grain Helps Prevent Soil Erosion

"To reduce soil erosion, plant small grain and/or winter peas on your cotton field soon after harvest," advises Bill Lewis, Soil Conservation Service, Iowa Park.

The growing Cover Crop will hold soil in place by softening the impact of raindrops and reducing the soil surface exposed to wind. Cover Crops also add organic matter to the soil and improves the soil's ability to take in water and air while improving soil tilth.

To be most effective, Cover Crops should be left until about April 15 and return 2000 lb. of plant residue per acre to the soil when the field is returned to cotton in May.

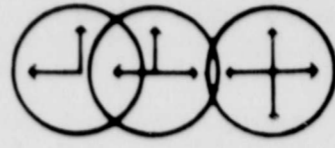

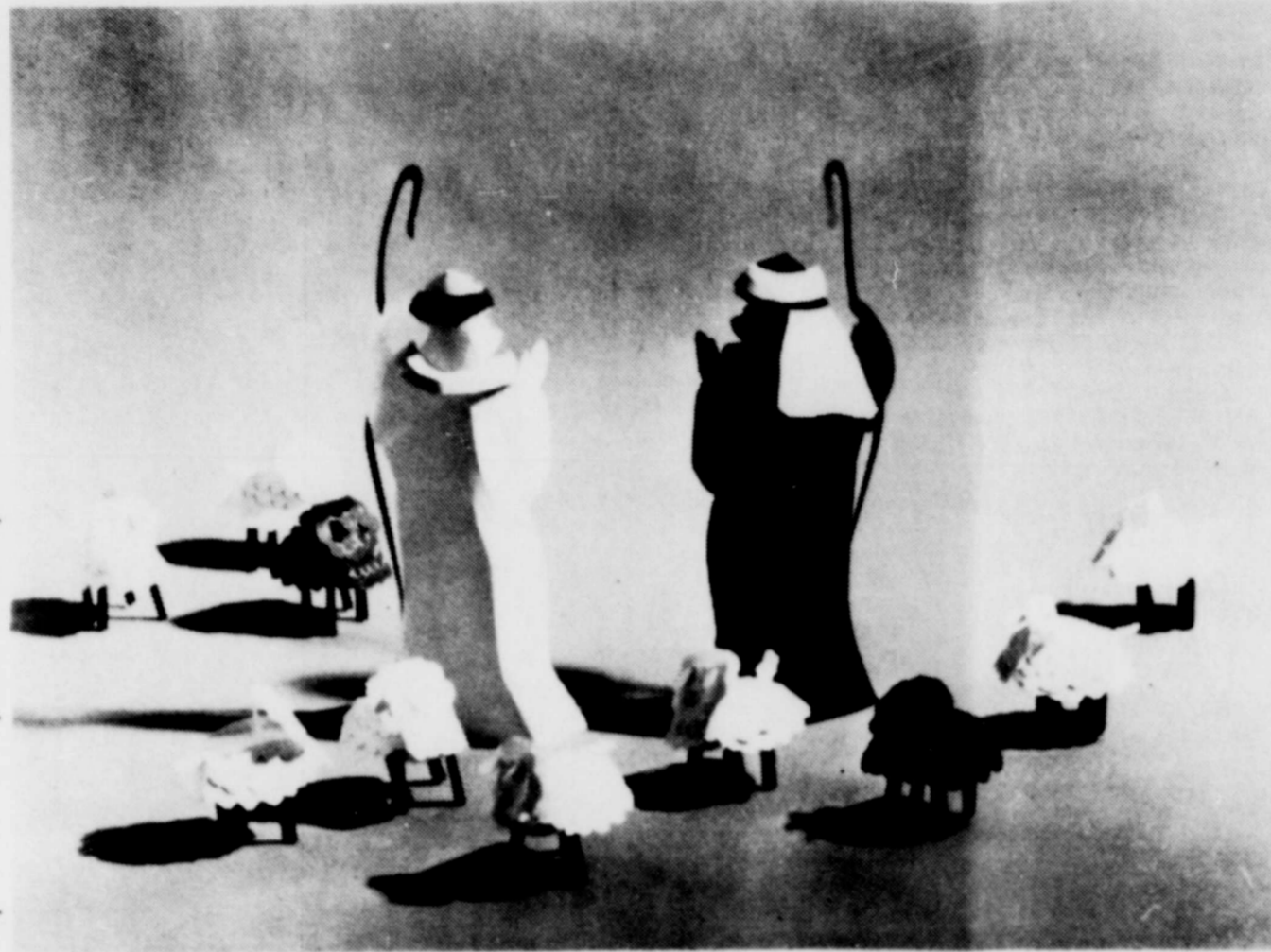

Christmas legends 'round the world

Mistletoe was once considered a healing herb; and wearing it hung around the neck was believed to ward off disease.

December — the winter solstice — has always been a festive time. In ancient Rome, December 17 marked the start of the week-long Saturnalia, a time of festivities in which people gave presents, lighted candles, and adorned their houses with greens.

The Twelve Days of Christmas are a carry-over from Roman times; the festivities of the Saturnalia were followed by Twelve Holy Days, which ended on January 1, called the Calends of January.

In Spain, tradition has it that children's gifts are left by the Wise Men, passing through on their way to Bethlehem. Youngsters leave their shoes on the window sills, filled with straw for the Magi's horses; next morning, the straw has been replaced with toys and sweets.

In Ireland, the church candles lighted at Christmas may be snuffed only by someone whose name is Mary.

Children in Holland and Belgium get their Christmas gifts on December 6, which is St. Nicholas Day.

Decorations of greenery at Christmas were forbidden by the early church fathers, because of its association with Roman customs. It wasn't until the 16th century that greenery began to be used.

The Christmas tree came to England when Queen Victoria married Prince Albert. The Prince brought the custom with him from his native Germany.

Christmas carols were banned by the Puritans in 17th century England. But for 200 years, many carols were kept alive by country people, and finally rediscovered in the 19th century.

French peasants believe that daughters born on December 25 will be wise, witty and virtuous.

Polish children receive their gifts not from Santa but from Mother Star, who wears a long white dress and veil, and her companion, Father Star.

In Italy, children's gifts are supposed to come from La Befana, an old woman of legend. The children hang their clothes in a conspicuous place on Epiphany Eve, and the next morning find their pockets filled with goodies.

In 1644 under Oliver Cromwell's regime, the observance of Christmas was forbidden by an act of Parliament.

The Pennsylvania Dutch name for Santa Claus is — *Pelznickel*.

"Christmas" got its origin from "X," an abbreviation of Christ deriving from the Greek letter X (chi) beginning His Name.

In the Philippines, Christmas is known as *Santo Nino* and children sing carols and parade through the streets behind a band.

Christmas Seals originated in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1904. It was the idea of a postal clerk named Holboell, who dreamed them up as a benefit for a children's hospital.

In Czechoslovakia, fortunes are told after the evening meal on Christmas by pouring melted lead or wax into water and studying the shapes formed.

In Puerto Rico, children at Christmas put boxes on the roof — instead of hanging stockings.

An age-old Christmas custom: Cut an onion in half, peel off 12 layers (1 for each month to come) and fill each with salt. On the next morning, the peelings containing damp salt indicate rainy months.

Some Folks Have a Year-Round Christmas

There are five towns or villages in the United States that are named "Christmas." They are in Arizona, Florida, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee.

There is a Christmas Island in the Indian Ocean, south of Java, attached to the Singapore settlement, under Australian administration, and the British have two Christmas Islands: one of the Line Islands in the center of the Pacific Ocean near Hawaii and another in Nova Scotia on the Atlantic Ocean.

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Kissing Under Mistletoe

The word "mistletoe" derives from the Anglo-Saxon word "misteltan." It is a parasitic plant which grows on evergreen trees, with small yellowish-green leaves, yellowish flowers and waxy white, poisonous berries.

Under a sprig of mistletoe men are by custom privileged to kiss any women standing under it. The man is supposed to first remove one of the berries and present it to the woman. When all the berries are gone, this kissing game is over. It is thought this custom comes from an early pagan marriage rite.

Mistletoe was considered sacred by the Druids in ancient Britain and they performed elaborate ceremonies around it at the winter solstice. Because of these pagan associations, it is seldom used in church decorations.

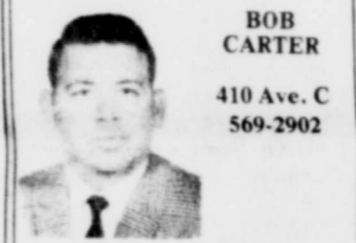

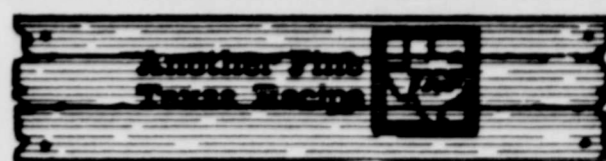

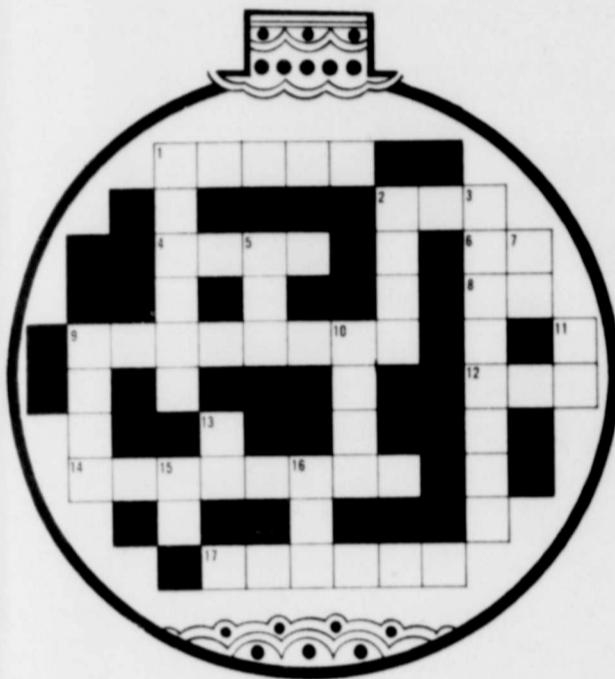

Local Library Qualifies

The Burkburnett Library was among a total of 32 libraries in the 21 county area for which Fort Worth serves as the Major Resource Center that has qualified for membership in the Fort Worth Major Resource System organized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act.

"Some 83 percent of all Texans are served by the 232 libraries that are members of the ten library systems," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, the agency that administers the Systems Act.

Like the people of Texas, library resources are unevenly distributed. In fact, forty percent of all Texans are served by the ten largest libraries. Grants made to the systems assist in giving all Texans access to materials and staff expertise that would otherwise be available only to users of the large libraries.

The Fort Worth Major Resource System will receive a \$271,600 grant. This includes \$4,966.25 in State funds from the \$50,000 appropriated by the legislature in 1973 allocated on a per capita basis and \$266,633.75 in federal Library Services and Construction Act funds being used to demonstrate how systems can improve library service in Texas.

Groundbreaking Held For 200 Housing Units

Sheppard AFB, Texas - Official groundbreaking ceremonies for the 200 new housing units for airmen at Sheppard Air Force Base were held Monday morning at the site.

Manning the three-handle shovel for the event were Major General Robert L. Petit, commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center, Chief Master Sergeant Richard L. Ralston, senior airman advisor at Sheppard, representing the Air Force; and Mr. Richard Dye, president of K and D Development and Construction Company, Inc., contractor for the \$4,826,739 project.

Location of construction is a 43-acre site at Sheppard bounded by Moates on the east, Skaggs on the west, Hart on the north, and Reames on the south.

Forty-six of the units will be for senior airmen in the grade of technical sergeant and above and the remaining 154 units are for junior airmen.

All 200 units are four-bedroom. All have living, dining and family rooms and are equipped with central heat and air, double sinks, garbage disposals, refrigerators, 50 - gallon water heaters and gas ranges. They also have carports and patios.

There are five floor plans ranging from 1,340 to 1,440 square feet of net living area. Eighty-four units are of two-story town-house plans with two and one-half baths each, and the remaining 116 units are one-story duplex plans with two baths each.

The project is a one-step turnkey procurement package, with the same firm doing both the design and construction within guidelines issued by the Air Force. Project development began as early as the spring of 1973 when initial programming action was started by civil engineering at

Sheppard. After Congressional authorization of the project, a market survey was conducted to determine the feasibility of using turnkey procurement. Site surveys and environmental assessment and utility investigations were made prior to request for proposal which was issued April 19, 1974.

Five proposals received in July were evaluated by base and Air Training Command civil engineering people under a rigid set of procurement guidelines to determine a price quality rating upon which to base a selection decision. Winner was K and D Associates of El Paso.

Notice to proceed with design was given Sept. 12. The contractor was given 120 days to complete his design. The design and the contractor's final plans and specifications must be approved by the Air Force before the notice to proceed with construction is given. That is expected in mid-December. Construction time is then 480 days.

First Lieutenant Gary L. Anderson is project officer for the base civil engineer and Orville Hutson is chief inspector.

Air Force representatives attending the ceremonial groundbreaking in addition to General Petit were Colonel John H. Allison, base commander; Lieutenant Colonel Eugene Garove, base civil engineer and commander of the 3750th Civil Engineering Squadron, and John Weissenec of the civil engineering office.

Representing the contractor, in addition to Mr. Dye was Mr. William Van Haselen, project manager of the construction company.

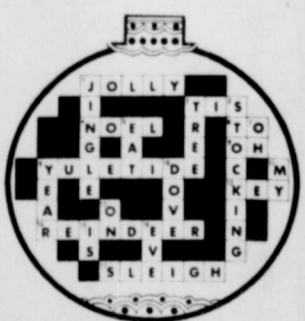

Erma Stayton reported she attended the Home Coming Party for Wanda Potter, Department Auxiliary President, Saturday in Fort Worth.

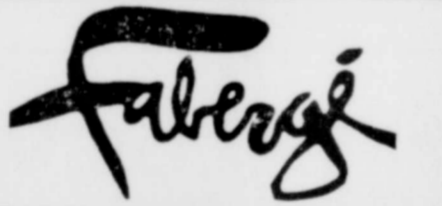
Mrs. Hubbard announced the membership of Unit 264 has now reached 150.

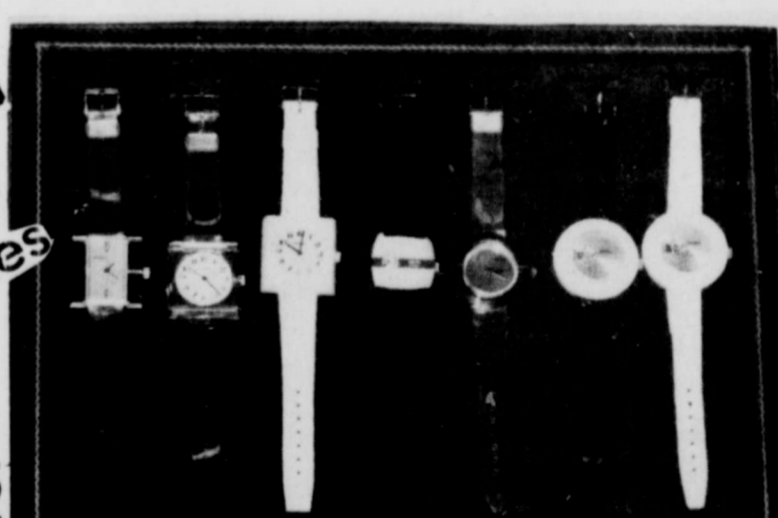
