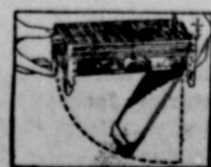

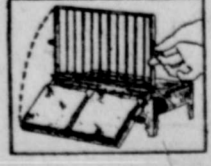

The New Home Of Dodge and Plymouth

Chrysler Tells How He Did It
By B. C. Forbes

Browning Brothers, Bob, Paul, and Wylie will hold their formal opening of their new building, 323 E. Main Street, Saturday, September 8th, beginning at 7 o'clock. They have arranged an interesting program for you and after the opening a number of prizes will be given away to the holders of the lucky numbers. The numbers will be printed on each guest upon entering the building.

Twenty years ago the Browning boys came to Burkburnett and with a few dollars and a handful of tools established a repair shop which was located across the railroad and was known as the White Garage. That was the year when some forty-odd boys were running from the city to the new town, a new oil field some miles Northwest of Burkburnett. The boys owe the biggest part of their success to a successful business in Burkburnett to the part they received most of the repair work of these 40 busses. They thought that there were two reasons for the fact that they received the most of the work. One was the fact that the roads were impassable east and the busses were forced to load and unload in front of their place of business and another reason is the fact that they kept experienced mechanics at all times. They operated at this location for about one year until the boom began to slow down and a better location became necessary. They leased the Blue Goose Cafe which was located two blocks east of their location for one year at the price of \$112.50 a month. After the lease had expired, they purchased the ground and built a brick building which was at the time, and still is, the only brick building that has been built west of the railroad track. Soon after this building was completed they secured the Buick automobile franchise which they operated for 12 years.

Paul Browning stated that probably some of the people still residing in Burkburnett who purchased their first car from the Browning Motor Corporation, and at that time the lowest priced car sold for \$1800. Mr. Browning further stated that at the time they started handling automobiles in Burkburnett, there was no automobile finance company

operating in the south and that they either had to sell the cars for cash or handle the notes themselves. However, it wasn't long before finance companies began to organize in the south and automobile companies could sell their cars for a third down and the balance in monthly payments. Before the advent of the finance companies, there had been very few automobiles made in the United States, and today, over seventy-five per cent of all cars are made and sold in the United States.

Back in 1930 an economic condition came about over this country which made it impractical to operate a high price car franchise, so the Browning boys moved from across the railroad track to 323 E. Main and purchased the Ford franchise which they operated for about one year at which time they purchased the Dodge and Plymouth agency. They operated the Dodge and Plymouth agency at this location until the spring when the building they were occupying was purchased by the Barrow-Grace Chevrolet Co. They then purchased the lots across the street on which now stands their present home.



now stands their present home. In the building of this new structure the Browning boys left no stone unturned to make it one of the most modern and up-to-date display rooms and garages in Northwest Texas and Southern Oklahoma. The building has a floor space of 10,000 square feet and cost approximately \$20,000. The sales room is located in the front of the building and compares favorably with any in this part of the country. The repair shop is located in the rear of the main building with two entrances—one on the west side and one on the east side, entering through the used car lot. Otis Wood-dell is shop foreman and has charge of several experienced automobile mechanics. Between the display room and the repair department is located the parts department where a complete stock of Dodge and Plymouth parts will be carried at all times. Blake Browning will have charge of this department.

To the east of the main building is located the body repair and paint department. Mr. Cassel, an expert paint and body repair man, will have charge of this department. South of the paint and body repair department is located the used car lot. The cars located in this lot will be completely overhauled and will carry their personal guarantee.

Dodge Dealers' Total To Date 169,372 Units

Detroit, Aug. 31. — The latest Dodge sales report issued by Dodge Brothers Corp., including activities of the week ending Aug. 25, shows that since the first of the year dealers' retail deliveries have amounted to 98,093 Dodge passenger cars and trucks. They also delivered 71,279 Plymouths, making a grand total of sales reported so far of 169,372 vehicles. Dodge dealers' deliveries for the like period of 1933 amounted to 112,536 units.

Deliveries tabulated for the single week ending Aug. 25 were 3,054 Dodge passenger cars and trucks and 2,482 Plymouths, or a total of 5,536 vehicles. The week's sales of Dodge commercial cars and trucks alone reached their highest point for the year, accounting for 1,151 units. The total of Dodge truck deliveries between Jan. 1 and Aug. 25 was 30,630, against 11,557 deliveries recorded for the like period of 1933.

Chrysler Sales Hold High Level

Sales in July Better June's, Uncle Sam Says

Washington, Aug. 31.—The value of automobile sales in July increased 27 per cent beyond the same month last year and was five per cent higher than the level attained in June of this year, according to Department of Commerce figures just released here.

As compared with July, 1932, the increase this year was 136 per cent. Moreover, the aggregate increase in dollar value of sales for the first seven months of this year was 45 per cent above the corresponding figure for 1933 and 52.5 per cent above the level for the first seven months of 1932.

With the period 1929-1931 used as a base of 100, the index of dollar sales of passenger cars in July was 66.5, the calculation shows. This compares with an index figure of 63.5 in June.

The index is constructed by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce to show the trend in consumer expenditures for new automobiles. It is based on average daily figures giving equal weight to all the days of the calendar month involved.

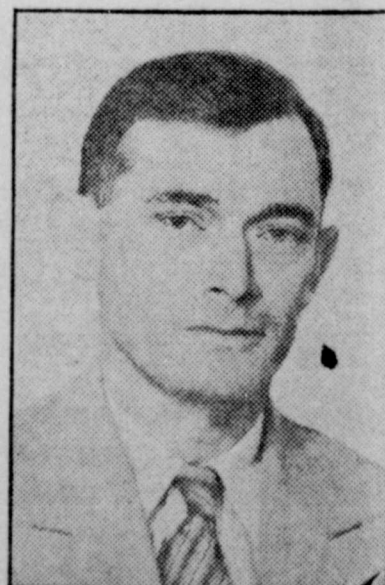

detail, including air brakes, and capable of developing speed. The forty-two-inch long locomotive finished, he next built an eighth-of-a-mile track and gave demonstrations which attracted grownups as well as all the local children. It is now a cherished family heirloom.

A locomotive came in with a cylinder head blown out one day at the time Mormons were flocking into Salt Lake City to pay their tithes. With traffic at its peak, every pound of motive power was needed. The disabled locomotive was scheduled to pull out a mail train for the West at three o'clock that afternoon. The superintendent of motive power was in a quandry, even panicky. No cylinder head had ever been replaced in the few hours remaining before the starting time. The superintendent, in this pressing emergency, singled out Chrysler, hurriedly explained the circumstances and excitedly asked, "Can you possibly do it?"

"I'll tackle it," was young Chrysler's business like reply. Calling for a helper whose ability Chrysler had already spotted, he fell to the job. His every move was tensely followed by the superintendent who fidgeted around, watch in hand, as three o'clock approached. On the dot, the locomotive rolled out of the station.

That achievement made the round house worker a marked man. In three months he was made foreman; later he became general foreman of the Trinidad division of the Colorado & Southern shops, then master mechanic of Trinidad. Chrysler found out that he owed this signal promotion in large measure to the lightning rapidity with which he had replaced that blown out cylinder head when a youth; his old superintendent, Hickey, had been asked to recommend a man and not unnaturally, he enthusiastically endorsed Walter Chrysler. Even while an apprentice, Chrysler had learned not only how to repair locomotives, but how to build them. He had also acquired experience in handling other men successfully. He made good.

He visited the 1905 Chicago automobile show, not through idle curiosity, but in quest of information about the infant industry which it was his determination to enter eventually. The most attractive exhibit of the whole show, a dazzlingly white car, upholstered in bright red leather, captivated him. He must possess it. The fact that he had only \$700 in the savings bank and that the cost of the car was \$5,000 did not daunt this career-carver.

He immediately wired for his \$700 and started out to raise the balance of \$4,300. Those he approached regarded him as stark crazy. The idea of squandering so much money on a glittering extravagance of this kind did not appeal to them. There was in Chicago, however, one banker who realized that Chrysler was not bent on buying a costly toy for his own pleasure but was eager to make an investment which he was confident would yield him untold dividends later in his life. So he advanced the money.

The roads being in too bad a condition to drive over, Chrysler had the car shipped home. When the millionaire's car arrived and Chrysler confessed to his wife how he had acquired it, she would not speak to him for a week! She had not the slightest desire to lord it over her friends and neighbors. Being a sensible wife and mother, she was more interested in building up a savings account against any possible rainy day.

Soon, however, she understood. Instead of using the car to make a splash, her husband proceeded to take it all apart. Every nut and bolt and bearing was eagerly scrutinized and analyzed. That done, he began rebuilding it. He made himself so familiar with all the parts that he felt confident that, when the time was ripe, he could build cars himself and even make not a few improvements in design and construction.

The most spectacular Chrysler coup occurred on May 29, 1928, when the announcement came, out of a clear sky, that he had taken over Dodge Brothers.

In making the announcement, Mr. Chrysler said: "I am particularly pleased to bring under one general management two organizations so similar in their ideals of service to customers and high quality of product."

E. G. Wilmer, then President of Dodge, explained: "It is the present purpose to conduct the two businesses as separate manufacturing and selling units, each continuing with the assistance of the other, to render even greater service to the motor buying public in the manufacture and sale of high quality products of conspicuous value."

"Why did you buy Dodge?" I asked Mr. Chrysler.

"When you are riding a bicycle you either have to go ahead or you fall off," he replied. "We had been going ahead, and the opportunity to acquire Dodge afforded opportunity to make another advance, to take a constructive step. It so happened that both Clarence Dillon, the dominant factor in Dodge, and I felt that the property was

more valuable to our company than to anybody else. If we hadn't taken over Dodge, we would have found some other channel for expansion. "Dodge is going to prove a great asset."

When Walter Chrysler acts, he acts quickly. The Dodge deal was finally consummated after 5 o'clock one afternoon. The next morning the Chrysler men were running it.

Chrysler is today commander-in-chief of an enterprise having total resources approximating \$235,000,000, with capacity for producing 750,000 cars a year, at an approximate value of three quarters of a billion dollars, with dealers covering not only the United States but 100 foreign countries, and with capital stock having a market value at this writing of over five hundred million dollars. Chrysler employees and dealers combined total nearly 60,000.

But Chrysler is less ready to talk about mere bigness than he is about the quality, the style, the power, the flexibility, the value built into his cars. Also, he likes to talk about giving workers and dealers a square deal—plus something not contained in the pay envelope or the commission rate, namely humane, man-to-man, democratic treatment such as he liked to receive when in overalls.

"Think of the change that has occurred in this country's buying power since wages were raised—doubled," said Mr. Chrysler. "There are now as many individuals and families able to pay \$600 or even more for a car as there were able to pay \$350 seven years ago."

"Skilled workmen have better homes today than I had when I was superintendent of motive power. I am proud to be a citizen of a country that has made such progress."

Concerning dealers, this master motor-maker, who habitually speaks with great emphasis and force, occasionally banging his big fist on the desk, declared:

"No company can be successful unless its dealers are successful. You must make it possible for them to make money. The dealers from the bridge over which the cars travel from plant to public. Unless you can keep that bridge in splendid working order, the procession is slowed up. We have been fortunate with our own dealers, and every body knows the character of the Dodge dealers."

"It is the problem of management to satisfy four essential groups: workers, dealers, the public, stockholders. Difficult? It hasn't struck me that way. In fact, I think I have

always got as much fun out of my work as any man ever did. The bigger the job, the greater the thrills in swinging it."

Common Courtesy

According to a survey of traffic accidents the first three months of this year it is not so much mechanical failure in the car that causes them as the lack of law observance. Particularly is this true with speeding. The figures show that a large percentage of drivers involved in accidents were operating their cars at a speed less than 40 miles an hour. More than half of them had straight, dry roads ahead, and more than half of the accidents happened in daytime. If every one in Burkburnett will strictly observe driving rules, and show the same courtesy to other drivers that he would like to have shown him, it will be next to impossible to have an accident. Obedience to law, whether traffic law or otherwise, is nothing more or less than common courtesy to the other fellow and should come much

easier to the average citizen than violation of the rules which are set up for his own safety. If we had a little more of the Golden Rule in driving we would have fewer accidents.

Nature gives every Burkburnett citizen a hint. The fatter you get the harder it is to get up close to the table.
