

a motion to substitute the Patman Bill for the Vinson Bill which had been reported by the Ways and Means Committee. A standing vote of 183 to 142 gave the Patman Bill a comfortable lead at first. But a teller vote was taken with the result of 180 to 157 in favor of the substitution. The Vinson Bill advocates then demanded a roll call which sustained the motion by 202 to 191, a majority of only 11 votes. The most intense part of the fight developed Friday when Congressman Vinson was recognized to make a motion to send the bill back to the committee. At the end of the roll call the vote stood tied 204 to 204 and Speaker Byrns promptly voted for the recommitment. Cox of Georgia then switched his vote from "present" to "nay" thereby creating another tie and before the House knew what was happening, Oliver of Alabama switched from "aye" to "nay" and Sumners of Texas switched from "present" to "nay" thereby defeating the motion to re-commit by 204 to 207. The final vote on the measure for passage was 318 Works Relief Bill

Just as the House has been devoting a major portion of its time to the Adjusted Service Certificate question, so has the Senate been working constantly on the Works Relief Bill. Tuesday, March 19th, a determined drive was begun to cut the huge appropriation. Senator Byrd first offered an amendment proposing a pruning of \$1,880,000-000 but the proposal was immediately defeated. Senator Adams then proposed to pare the total to \$2,-000,000,000 and limit the act to one year instead of two, but both of these were defeated 57 to 30. Wednesday one amendment was adopted allocating \$40,000,000 for schools. Thursday, Senator Borah offered an amendment to restore the anti-trust laws but this was also defeated. Friday Senator Thomas started a filibuster for a silver inflationary measure and addressed the Senate for almost six hours.
