COST OF RELIEF

That means \$208,000 an hour for every hour of the 24 in a day, or \$5,000,000 a day. The total for a single month of 30 days is exactly \$150,000,000. In May, 1933, there were 17,000,000 persons on relief. Today, two years later, the number is 22,875,000, and yet in the past two years the sum of \$3,207,000,000 of federal, state and local funds have been expended to ameliorate the problem. FARM HINTS

CONTROL OF LOOPER N. T. A. C., Arlington, Texas

This spring we have had many inquiries already in regard to worms that have appeared on plum trees. These worms or caterpillars are commonly known as measuringweems, inch-worms, or loopers. Their color may vary from light green to black, depending a great deal on the plants they are feeding

These worms are primarily foliage-eating. The tree may be entirely defoliated within a few days after these pests have made their ap-

pearance. They usually found to be in greater numbers and to be more destructive in regions near wooded areas. They will feed on practically any kind of shade and M. B. Lebo, Prof. of Horticulture fruit tree foliage. However, accord-





CONTROL OF LOOPER M. B. Lebo, Prof. of Horticulture N. T. A. C., Arlington, Texas

This spring we have had many inquiries already in regard to worms that have appeared on plum trees. These worms or caterpillars are commonly known as measuringworms, inch-worms, or loopers. Their color may vary from light green to black, depending a great deal on the plants they are feeding

These worms are primarily foliage-eating. The tree may be entirely defoliated within a few days after these pests have made their ap-


