**FOURTH of JULY**

Each year we find the celebration of America's most patriotic day, the Fourth of July marred by the high number of accidents. No other single day in the year is there so many and so many kinds of accidents. Burns, drowning, car wrecks, explosions draw a line of death across the nation each year. There will be much noise and excitement. Then a day of reckoning. It is a sad travesty that the greatest day of our history should be the day that takes most lives. Let's try to make this holiday be Independence day in the true sense. Let's try to allow the flag and not the fire cracker, or excessive speed and drunkenness be our symbol. It merely means a little common sense, to prevent all the sorrow.

**MASS HYSTERIA**

We haven't seen anything that illustrates the idea of mass hysteria better than the excitement of the Black Widow spiders. For the next few days every body that sees a bug or an insect will jump with fear. The spiders have been with us for a long time. Now the freedom of children and picnickers will be greatly restrained. It isn't very complimentary to our human intelligence that such a fear should develop over such a trivial thing. However, it does prove how close we remain to the superstitious savagery, and how easily we avert to the instinctive fear that caused our less civilized ancestry to cringe with unnamed fears.

**THANKS**

One editorial on the same subject is enough, but we can not refrain from thanking the police department for taking the action that they are taking this week in issuing the notice to the violators of the local traffic laws. Human beings are like sheep in the respect of social acts. They follow each other with blind disregard of consequences. They have done this in the traffic regulations. Our city has had more than its share of tragedies during the last year. Only two of them happened within the corporate limits. But we can offer a prayer of gratitude that there haven't been more. It isn't our fault that there haven't been several.

Now that the police have exhausted their patience, and we expect to see some immediate action to follow. We hope that they will not have to issue any tickets; but if they do issue them; we also hope that the violators have good sense enough to cooperate in the future. So we wish to thank the police department for this attempt to protect us against our own foolishness.

**A TRAGIC ANNIVERSARY**

Some few thoughtful people over the whole world will pause Friday, June 28, to think of the tragic and futile incident that started the World War 21 years ago. With the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria by an insignificant student in Bosnia Servia, there was set into motion a string of reactions that eventually caused the death of 17,000,000 fighting men and almost as large a number of civilians indirectly.

Ferdinand and his wife Sophie Chatek were valuable persons, but not as valuable as the millions whose blood was spilt in the holocaust. There was set loose a power of distinction that could not be controlled until the blood of 20 nations stained almost every square foot of European soil. The heart breaking suffering of the non-combatants is the most terrible consequence of the conflict.

This assassination was not the cause of the war. It merely gave the men on both side excuse to fight a war they had been wishing to fight for many years. The real cause for the war was the economic pressure of a over-crowded civilization. In days before civilization, man had to earn his living by the dexterity of his hands and swiftness of his feet. Battle meant life to him. Probably war is inevitable, and we can never squelch the instinct that has taken millions of years to develop into a part of human consciousness.

However, since wars are economic, we might delay them by two means. First conscript wealth as well as men. That would make war unprofitable to the selfish ghouls that stir them up each time. Second, we might give our masses occasion for the outlet of those battling instincts by competitive contest systematically arranged for the whole citizenship.

**SHARE THE WEALTH**

There is a lot of real active campaign in the whole nation that includes our little city, that calls for the complete adoption of the "share the wealth program." In the face of expenditure that are staggering even to the mathematically minded, it was necessary for the government to take some action to provide funds. It is our Christian duty to take care of the indigent, but it isn't our duty to make the path easy for the indolent.

Russia has tried the idea of equalizing the matter of personal wealth, and abandoned the idea. They found that personal initiative and selfish greed was necessary to prompt a man to create physical wealth. Very few of us work for the absolute thrill of our work. We work for gain. We personally believe that the president is right in trying to bring a more even balance, but at the same time he is right in not adopting the extreme measure that some demagogues have suggested. Before many years every normally ambitious person can earn a living, and a good one if he wishes to, and is not physically or mentally handicapped. Until that time, those who have money are going to have to carry an extra burden for those who are penniless.

**Weekly News Summary**

The fact that President Roosevelt introduced the bill calling for many of the parts of the now nation-wide share the wealth program, came as a distinct surprise for this session of congress. The whole nation knew that the President had leanings toward the program, but even the most hopeful politicians thought that he would delay action until he had better control of congress.

The adoption of a five point plan just about takes the wind out of the sails of the sage from Louisiana. Huey Long won't have much to yell about now. The program includes: 1.—Imposition of inheritance tax and gift taxes on top of the present estate taxes to be segregated for the reduction of the national debt. 2.—Higher taxes on incomes above a million dollars a year. 3.—Graduated taxes on corporations. 4.—Taxation of tax free bonds on state, city and county government. 5.—Elimination of holding company by taxation.

**Black Spider**

Clara Phillips left prison this week. The marks of many years of penal servitude have stolen her youth. We remember the violent pledges that her husband made after her sentence to be waiting at the gate when she was released. He wasn't there. He can be found nowhere. Death or a dimming memory has obscured him. Not one person in ten recalls the case which we thought then would never be forgotten. When she beat a rival to death the world ostracized her. Now she will pay a greater price than she ever paid behind the bars.

**Holy Grail**

For about the thousandth time some scientist claim to have found the authentic grail. It is the sacred cup from which Christ drank the last supper wine. Tradition holds that a few drops of his blood was caught in the cup while he was on the cross, and that the cup thenceforth became a glowing vessel. The recent discovery is a cup of vitreous material that authentically was of the same period, but it is only surmise that it is the actual grail. We would rather have it remain unfound. The stories of the king Arthur knights lose much romance if the actual cup is located.

**Burk Will Be Represented At A & M Short Study Week**

Several women of Burkburnett plan to attend the short course given for farmers and their wives at the State Agriculture and Mechanical college next month.

Plans are nearly completed for five days of elaborate program for the farm women of Texas at the farmers Short Course, July 28 thru August, it was announced by Miss Ona Jacks, Extension Specialist, and chairman of the women's committee.

Outstanding speakers, demonstrations, laboratory work, and recreation will be the keynote of the keynote of the women's program this year.

Miss Margaret Furry, textile chemist from the division of textiles and clothing, department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. has accepted an invitation to take charge of a series of laboratory demonstrations on "Natural Dyes and How to Use Them."

Dr. Samuel E. Gideon, professor of architectural design and history from the University of Texas at Austin, will speak on the program of Housing and Home Improvement which varies from architecture to landscaping and interior decorating.

Some of the demonstrations will be on: Making Soil and Potting Plants; Fabrics, Wool Scouring, Control of Rose Pests, Attractive Touches to Bedrooms, Interior Decorations,

and many other phases of farm life of interest to Texas farm women. Each day will be divided into morning sessions consisting of meetings and talks by well-known men and women and Extension specialists on Texas farm life. The program, as planned, will be a section on Texas Folk Life History.

On the last afternoon, Dr. Walton, president of A & M College, and Mrs. Walton will be at a reception held on the president's lawn in honor of the farm women attending the Course.

Recreation hours consisting of entertainment and relaxation have been planned for each day of the Short Course is in motion.

"My uncle is going to get a lawyer and I'll have nothing more to say until after that," he added.

#### First Time In Jail

Foster, in a cell on the second floor of the jail with a white haired jailbird, seemed nervous, but completely confident. "This is a new experience to me," he smiled. "I've never been inside a jail before." Sweet stood out on his sun-browned forehead and he seemed excessively warm, but he still kept on his white shirt, in contrast with the shirtless inmates around him.

P. S. Kendrick of Abilene, Foster's uncle by marriage, came to the jail about 9 o'clock to talk with his nephew. Kendrick was in Seymour at the home of Foster's mother when the arrest was made Tuesday afternoon.

After Mrs. Foster's body was found in the cellar at the home at 6:30 o'clock this morning, Justice of the Peace W. T. Vance returned a verdict of suicide. After working on the case most of the day, however, County Attorney Mike Anglin announced his investigation had not been definitely closed.

#### Husband in Tears

The woman's husband, a rural mail carrier in Burkburnett for 12 years, was questioned by Mr. Anglin. Foster said a quarrel preceded the shooting. He said the quarrel took place when he returned home at 2:30 a. m. from an American Legion meeting in Wichita Falls and that he had not considered it serious.

Regarded as an unemotional man by associates, Foster was in tears at the Burkburnett city hall after he had been questioned almost two hours by the county attorney. Mr. Anglin was called into the case by Police Chief N. H. Harris. Sheriff Pat Allen, Deputies O. A. Robertson and Dick Chapman and Chief Harris assisted Mr. Anglin in his investigation.

"It was all my fault," the grief-stricken man said. "But I don't know how she was killed."

He said he did not know his wife was dead until their little girl discovered the body on the cellar floor.

#### Pistol Found

A .45 caliber army automatic pistol was partly covered by the body, officers said. One empty shell was found nearby and a steel jacketed bullet was found beneath the body, apparently having entered Mrs. Foster's right temple and emerged behind the left ear.

Walls of the cellar, which is located about 20 feet from the house, were lined with shelves of home-canned food.

"After we quarreled we went to bed," the grief-stricken husband said. "I thought it was all over. I awakened at 6 o'clock this morning and my wife was not in bed. I thought she was up stairs with the children."

#### Girl Finds Body

"I called the girls to see if she was with them. They answered she was not in their bedroom and I told the girls to find her. Wynona went to the cellar and came screaming back to the house," Mr. Foster said.

W. E. Riddle, a next door neighbor, was called to the home by Mr. Foster. He told of seeing the body lying in the cellar.

Officers said the body was on the left side. The lips were bruised and several bruises were found on the hands and arms. Dr. Ruel Slaughter was called and pronounced the woman dead. Time of death was not fixed definitely.

The county attorney said the investigation was incomplete Sunday, but that Foster would not be held. Evidence in the case will be offered to the grand jury, he added.

#### Verdict Given

"All I can say is that it is a result of a family quarrel," Foster said. "How it happened is unknown to me. I thought the quarrel was over when we went to bed. When I awakened she was gone and I hate to think about it. There are lots of things she might have done."

Judge Vance, the justice of the peace, returned a verdict of "suicide by self-inflicted wound" Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Foster was well known in Burkburnett. She was regarded as one of the leading experts in the community on home-canned food products. Her death was a shock to the entire community. The family owned their home, which Mr. Foster had been adding to for several years, and it was regarded as one of the most attractive homes in the city.

Mrs. Foster, who was 28, is survived by the husband; a son Ralph Foster Jr. 7; three daughters, Juanita, 12, Wynona, 10, and Fay 3, her mother, Mrs. D. M. Shannon of Burkburnett; four brothers, Roy Shannon of Throckmorton; J. M. Frances, and Troy Shannon of Burkburnett; and three sisters, Mrs. Jesse Gerald and the Misses Dorothy and Ruthie Shannon of Burkburnett.

Funeral services for Mrs. Foster were held from the Owens-Brumley Funeral home chapel at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. The Rev. Miles B. Hays, First Baptist church pastor, officiated. Interment was in the Burkburnett cemetery.

Pallbearers were C. B. Beldon, H. B. Buckalew, Leonard Warren, Neal Hall, Neeley Vaught and Dan Woodard.

## What Fans Ought To Know About Football

By Coach Volney Hill

(EDITORS NOTE:—This is a discussion of the question of "Why Punt" It has been written by Coach Volney Hill to give the public a better understanding of the game.)

### Why Punt

It is well in the start, in taking up the application of kicking to the game of American football, to consider it at once as a form of attack. We can admit at once that kicking can not be placed in the same category with either the running game or the forward pass as a pure weapon of attack. Kicking so often has been considered simply a defensive measure, that it is excellent to abandon that notion.

Kicking is part of the attack, and not simply a defensive measure to be used when every other form of play has failed. There is of course the vital phase of running and passing attack. The running game is called anywhere in the hope of a gain. The passing game is called anywhere in the hope of a gain. The passing game is called in more specific situations and instances.

### Zones

So interwoven with both of these general types, there is the punt as an offense weapon. For the purpose of discussion, the football field should be divided into zones. The first division of a field is, of course, in your half of the field, and in the opponents half of the field.

Obviously your half is nearest the goal that you are defending. The opponents is nearest the goal he is defending. All the ground on your half is considered defensive territory. The other fellows half is called the attacking or offensive zone, and the offensive idea is to get into the attacking zone—in order that you can open up your plays—that is to work out your scoring attack.

Given the ball on your own 20 yard line, there are several ways of carrying out this attempt to get into

the attacking zone. If your team is manesly superior, it will be possible to rush the ball across the goal line, provided your attack stands up. Since your team, if it is really a great deal better than the other team, will not need anything else other than a rushing game; and rushing alone will take care of touchdowns.

### Even Teams

If the teams are more evenly matched, something more subtle and slightly more involved than merely the rushing attack will have to be called upon. One play is the forward pass, which is, it is admitted, a very dangerous weapon in your own territory; and it should not be used there very often. Another is the quick kick, or ordinary punt formation, the accurate kick.

What is most often encountered in football is purely defensive kicking because you have to kick. This means waiting until the third or fourth down then kicking as far as you can. You have waited until later downs in an effort to gain with the running or passing attack. These have failed; therefore, you are forced to kick. It is almost the universal practice to wait until fourth down.

Here, then, all elements of doubt are removed. The receiving side often is able to put an extra man back with the receiver, and the ends and whoever else was able to get down under the ball have a great deal more burden thrust upon them.

The next logical consideration is the ordinary term of offensive kicking, which is so similar to that just described as to be a counter part. It is generally started by a team because of the teams belief that it has a kicker able to punt farther than the opponents. The exchange of punts will eventually result in a gain. Every gain made by a punt has saved your team that long grind from one end of the field to the other. Then we have what is called accurate kicking. That is, putting the ball where you want it. It is not impossible to kick from well in one's own territory, the ball carrying forty or fifty feet in the air to fern territory and then rolling down into coffin corner. The opponents then are forced suddenly from the kicking teams' defensive territory, by the act of one foot, into a dangerous de-

ceptive position in their own territory.

Thus the opponents themselves are forced to defend their own goal line with the chance against them because this very thing can happen again any time.

Now in summary of these three kicks discussed, we take up the defensive punt. It is used only when you are forced to punt after you have tried your other offensive attacks, and everything has failed, therefore you are forced to give up the ball by punting it. The offensive kicking, where a team has a boy that can kick long kicks and all he can do is try to pick out the other fellows dangerous positions. Against a team with a good safety man who can return these punts this is dangerous.

In 1932, in the Burk vs. Olney game, Joe Bryarly, kicked from 50 to 60 yards straight down the field. St. John returned the ball from safety position for Olney from 20 to 40 yards every time. Thus the actual gain on the kick averaged only 20 yards.

In the latter part of this game, Joe Earl kicked for the side lines. In other words, he kicked accurate kicks. There could be little or no return. Then accurate kicking is kicking to a certain spot. Keep the ball away from the safety so that he can not return it. That will save your team a lot of yardage and sometime a lot of grief, such as punts returned to a touch down.
