Most Important Event In Annals Of City History In Discovery Well

SCHMOKER NO. 1

Excitement ran high in Burkburnett, but not even the most optimistic thought that the small well Schmoker No. 1 would mean that ultimately over one hundred million dollars of wealth would be drawn from the earth in this area, and that many millions would be spent and acquired by the people of the city. Many things have happened that have changed the history of our city, but no single event ever meant

All the romance imaginable is in the story of the struggling group of pioneer oil men that opened the territory for the first time. The epic started back in 1911 on Christmas day, when J. R. Sullivan, local farmer and geologist accompanied the superintendent of the Corsiciana Oil company to a small farm west of the city along with the field superintendent, Mr. A. B. Smith and the stake for the location.

The stake was driven on a cold Christmas morning in 1911, and 20 days later, January 14, only one day before limit time, the men started drilling. The historic hole was one of the most difficult that has been drilled in this area. It was in the early days of petroleum history, and modern efficiency was not known.

In the last month of the drilling the drillers lost the bit of the cable tool outfit, and were delayed. For a few days the well seemed to be a Jonah. Ed Rampin and Jack Shaffer were faced as drillers with trouble galore. They conceived the idea of dynamiting the hole below the bit. The charge of 20 pounds was set off, and the casing was broken in several places, but the

The casing, 8 inch in ten inch hole was reset, and the last few feet of six inch placed. The well then developed a spell of salt water, and seemed doomed to disappointment for the drillers. After three attempts the water was plugged, and the salt water removed.

Capitol News Letter

by W. D. McFarlane

Taxes, government finances, and the redistribution of wealth have been holding the center of the stage at Washington during the past week.

Monday last week the House passed by a vote of 247 to 117 the bill extending the so-called nuisance taxes. .

These extended taxes are estimated to probably bring the Treasury additional receipts during the next year of approximately \$500,-000,000. The major revenue producers

of these taxes are automobiles, trucks, accessories and fuel and oil for these, and the taxes on telegrams and phone calls, and also the inman of the Ways and Means Committee stated that while undoubtedly these taxes should be repealed when the Treasury could bear the loss of these additional receipts, at the present time there was no choice except their extension. He did however, state further that this measure was the only general legislation planned at this session.

Chairman Doughton was referring to the increases in inheritance and gift taxes proposed by the Secretary of the Treasury. Whether this attitude still persists is highly questionable now for late in the afternoon of Wednesday, June 19th, the presithese increases in gift and inheritance taxes but also increases in the tax on incomes in the higher brackets. Basing this request on the desirability of a more equitable distribution of the national income, the President made three suggestions.



In King Tuts Day

Veneered furniture from King Tut's tomb and from the tombs of many other Egyptian kings have the student of furniture. A mural decoration of wallpainting made 3,-000 years before Christ, shows in detail how they made plywood furniture 49 centuries ago. It was discovered in the tomb of Rekmara at Thebes, dating from the reign of Thothmes III, the Pharaoh of the Exodus rescribed in the Bible.

Roman furniture was costly and magnificent. Roman taste despised solid block pieces as being essentially barbarian and crude. They loved the beautiful effects of cross cut veneers; some of their table tops resembling the spots of the leopard, others a swarm of bees, some the tawny lion or the stripes of the tiger.

Cicero is said to have paid \$45, 000 for averaged table of citrus wood and we have the historical statement of 2,000 years ago that the prodest possession of Caesar was a table beautifully veneered.

Coming to America, we find the great art of veneered furniture still in evidence. The desk of George Washington was plywood and veneered. He used this desk from 1789 to 1797. It is now the property of the United States, purchased by Congress, April 23rd, 1880.

Thus it happened that the first trained woodworker came to an English speaking colony on the American Continent. Moreover, Alden prospered and seems to have devoted the 67 years before his death to office holding, farming, trading with the Indians and doing a little furniture making. Occasionally he is referred to in colonial as a "joiner". This does not mean that he devoted himself to the affairs of Plymouth's Chamber of Commerce, Rotary club or lodge of Elks. Instead it was the style of the day for a man who did cabinet work.

A & Plymouth

Four years of the founding of Plymouth, Alden moved to Duxbury, eight miles from Plymouth. This was America's first suburban development. Here he cleared a farm of 169 acres and in 1653 built the house that is still standing. By 1665 Alden, after many years of membership in the Colonial council, was appointed deputy governor. Not bad for a man whose only reason for sailing on the Mayflower was to care for as genuine John Alden furniture. ment. He was born on April 29, 1599, and thus was 30 years old when he reached the New World. Evidently he had learned his trade in the home land and did not adopt a new calling on reaching Massachusetts, for there is an entry dated January 6, 1633, in which he is styled "joiner." It also shows that he was prosperous enough to have a helper for it concerns the indenture to him of Samuel Jenny as an apprentice.

Edward Winslow

Further study of this second Plymouth furniture maker discloses him to have been chosen, in 1640, town surveyor. The next year for neglect of highways he is fined ten shillings. Then he quit Plymouth and betook himself to Marshfield where in 1637, he had obtained a grant of land. With this shift of abode Kenelm seems to have abandoned his trade for thereafter the records refer to him as a plantr and sometimes interested in shipping. Like Alden, with whom he may have worked for al lwe know, Winslow did not mark the products of his hand. So we do not know for a certainty just what furniture he vive. In Pilgrim Hall, Plymouth, is Governor Edward Winslow's wainscoat chair. This the catalogues describe as "made in Cheapside, London in 1614," but careful students now question this statement. They are prone to feel that instead of being made of English oak the wood is New England light oak. If this be true, then quite possibly it was made by no other person than the Governor's brother, Kenelm. To prove or disapprove this beyond doubt is a task that should be undertaken by some qualified student of old furniture. It is a challenge not to be overlooked.

But while Alden was quietly going his way on his Duxbury farm and Winslow was concerning himself with crops and ships at Marshfield, things were happening in other parts of New England and hap-

"Sturdy as an Oak". What school the forest as the symbol of strength briskly back to polish and character? In a multitude of hal owed associations, Oak has rooted itself deep in the affections of man, and from the earliest days of recorded history, has been highly valued for its utility and beauty, with th ewidest range of use of any known wood.

There was even a law in the ancient "Twelve Tables" concerning the ownership of acrons, should they by any chance fall upon another man's ground. Scattered throughout ured through centuries because of some incident or ceremony that took palce beneath their wide spread branches.

Care For New **Furniture**

One of the problems that the modern house wife in this area of the state meets constantly, is "How to keep furniture New." The dust and smut of the area make this al-most impossible. However, there are a few things to remember.

Varnish finishes should never be dusted with pressure. We can assume that ninety percent of the present day pieces are flat or "dull rub" finishes. If using so called, dustless duster, always wipe of the furniture with the grain of the wood. If dusted with a down duster, then do the same. Remove finger marks with moist cheese cloth rag on which a few drops of some good furniture cleaner has been applied.

Stroke or wipe with the grain until the surafce will appear smoky from moisture. Then clean off with new, soft, but absolutely clean rag. Remember that too much friction brings back polish, and in a few months the furniture will be almost a high polished as possible instead of mat surfaced.

Chests because of the manifold uses to which they were put, were the chief pieces of furniture in New England homes for the first 75 years. At first there were many that were brought over from the old country, but the frequency with which the earliest of the New England homes burned down seems to account for the rarity of English-made chests of this period. At first the thiscountry-produced chests were practically like those from the old home land, only simpler. Then suddenly commenced. For many years it has been known that two distinct types these chests were made. One wa alled the Connecticut and the othe Hadley. Careful study of the carve dozen years ago when Luke Vincent Lockwood of New York obtained possession of a two-drawer chest ornamented with an elaborately carved all over design on the front. On the back of the lower drawer of the chest is written in seventeenth century handwriting.

"Mary Allyns Chistt Cutte and Joyned by Nich Disbrowe

Allyn, for whom this chest was made was the daughter of Colonel John Allyn secretary of the colony. She was born in Hartford in 1657 and died in 1724. In 1686 she married William Whiting

Of Nicholas Disbrowe we can only find the following data: He was born Walden, Essex County, England, in Hartford, Conn., by 1639, where he lived at the north end of Burr street, now North Main street. He married Mary Bronson in 1640 and 20 years later obtained permission to vbuild a 16 foot square shop on the highway. For service in the Pequot War on May 11, 1671, Disbrowe was granted 60 acres of land. Likewise ne held the office of "chimney view-
