**TWO BRAVE MEN**

The whole world benumbed with the tragic swiftness of the accident, can scarcely conceive the reality of the fact that Will Rogers and Wiley Post are dead. It is like a horrible nightmare from which every individual hopes to awake and find it untrue. It is easy to believe that old and inactive men have died. It is easy to conceive the passing of dignified jurors or great statesmen. Such men just naturally are expected to die occasionally, but no one can feel it real that the man who has made us laugh and think for years and the man who added romance and adventure to our dreary routine have entered the great adventure.

These two men are examples of opposite types of courage. Rogers never faltered in his fight for the under dog. High or low no man ever escaped the rapier like thrusts of his keen mind. The weakness of the great and the foibles of the famous and infamous, regardless of the power and influence of the individuals, were material for his humor. But it may be said of him, that he never hit a man who was down. When the Republicans were in power he laughed and made us laugh at them. When the Democrats were in the driver's seat, he never hesitated to laugh at them. No man has ever done more to take the hypocrisy out of politics. That takes real courage. This man was known in more nations than our president. A French class once was asked "who is the president of the U. S.?" The answer was "Will Rogers." The world knows and loves a man who can make us laugh. And we didn't hate him even tho he made us think.

Post gave us a time of adventure. With all the courage possible, he did what every red blooded man wants to do,—blazed new paths. High in the air and free from earths restraining ties he wrote in immortal deeds a record that will last through written history. Finally the earth, jealous of his arrogant independence of her laws, brought both of the courageous individuals smashing down in smoking ruins.

When Will Rogers and Wiley Post started on the trip that ended fatally, every newspaper in the world of any size was sent an "obit." The papers were to use this "obit" only in case of the death of either or both men. That is why the Burkburnett reporter is so inquisitive about your life some times. He wishes to keep an "obit" so that in case of sudden accident a true account of your life can be given. That sounds goulsh, but it is more describe than to print a garbled bunch of information.

**Angry Farmers**

There was a solemn warning to us all in the small story that was printed in the papers last week about the farmers that mobbed a Marshall of the federal government in Plattsburg, Mo., when he tried to collect a mortgage. The story received very little space in the papers. Only an occasional paper even placed it on the front page. However, it may be the forerunner of a violent revolution. When the some 27,000,000 farmers of the U. S. get so aroused that they will mob federal agents, something is going to happen. Every progressive move that has been sponsored to aid the farmers has been blocked by some special interest. Such a condition will boom-a-rang and cause the opposition a lot more suffering than they have bargained for in their opposition.

**Italy's Intention**

Italy placed all the cards on the table Friday and announced very frankly that nothing but complete occupation of Ethiopia would satisfy Mussolini. Ethiopia offered to grant a large slice of their country in trade for an outlet to the sea. Italy refused to trade. In a few months they may be in the position of the bear that raided a bees hive. They may wish that they hadn't wanted so much.

Italy now has a million men under arms to Ethiopia's six hundred thousand. However, it will take a lot of Italians to protect the home land from possible invaders—such as Japan and spank the negroes at the same time.

**Beak In Friendship**

The story about the eviction of Falls from his palatial home in New Mexico is an irony. The men for whom he stole the U. S. Oil reserves are showing their appreciation by asking him to move and forcing by

law his eviction from his home-stead which they had leased. Very few people recall the famous Tea pot dome scandal in detail, but they all remember that something very crooked took place. These men that banded together to steal the tremendous oil reserve, now find themselves separated by the same selfish spirit that characterized their tremendous cupidity in 1921.

**"Hooy Long"**

Huey Long says he will accept nomination of president on three conditions. 1.—That Roosevelt is nominated by demos, or 2—Hoover is nominated by Republicans, or 3—if there is not other liberal candidates running. Long can't win, but he may cause the defeat of a man that would win in a two way race. It is possible that his strength lies in the south. If he divides that vote a Republican may be elected.

**Cotton Peg**

The announcement of the Cotton Co-op to give a 10c cash advance on cotton for the members created the possibility of a shortage of free cotton, according to the comment of the big news associations. The loan action will permit the farmers to hold all of their cotton until the government announces a definite policy on the loan. The loan is posted on the market valuation of the cotton and should the price fall below that peg, the farmers will be required to place a margin in the car of the organization or be sold out. This policy will have the definite effect of keeping the supply from flooding the market with the new crop, and that should hold up the price. When the government announces its loans position, it is possible that the farmers will be in a much stronger position than they have in many years.

The Fairview softball 10 defeated the Kenko team in a game played at the softball stadium Friday night, by a score of 15 to 4. The game was originally scheduled with Electra, but that city phoned a cancellation just before the game. **Burk Area Schools Get Final Checks**

The schools of Burkburnett received the final apportionment checks for the year on the 1934-35 year. This is the first time in many years that the schools of the state have received the entire apportioned amount during the year. Cashion, Fairview, Clara, and the Burk Independent Schools received a total of \$336.00 on these checks that were mailed from the Austin office on August 10. This represents the last of the \$16.50 apportionment that was made last year. This year the apportionment was raised to \$17.50 per scholastic, and in spite of the hike, the school tax for the year was decreased to 62c on the hundred dollars. This decrease represents a 16 percent drop in the assessments in the past three years.

Respecting newspaper men women agree that the fault of films with a newspaper background can be traced directly to the producers who haven't the faintest idea of what a press picture looks like.

Men and women who gather for their "sheets" don't make practice of writing fan letters, but never hesitate to protest when a picture they see in the papers looks like a pack of fools.

Producers, when concerned, admit that with the possible exception of "Five Star Final" and "Mellie," their films apparently failed to paint a true picture of editorial room and the going of reporters.

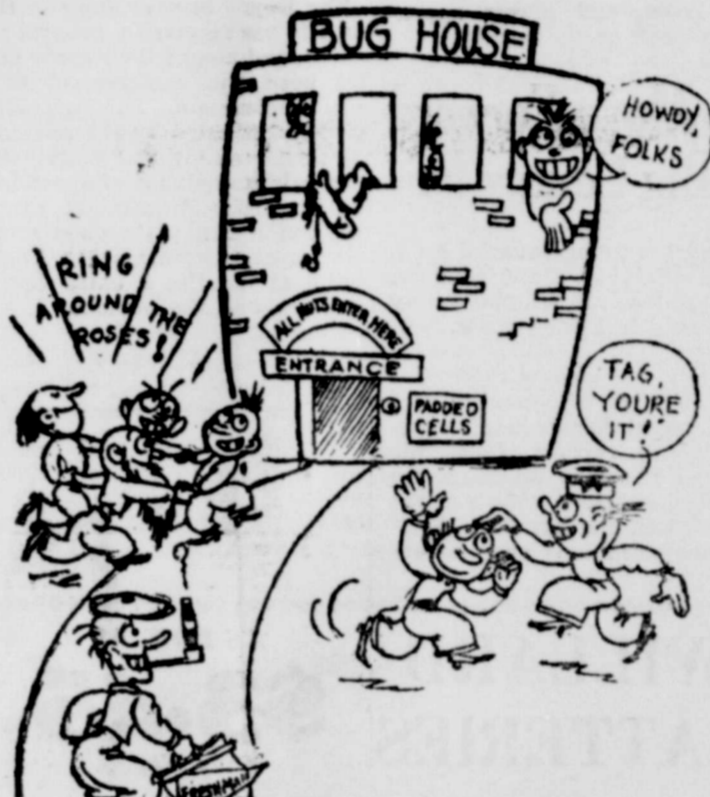

**Star Has Played Important Part In History Here**

Starting its career in what was almost a wild ranch territory, the Burk Burnett Star has played an important part in the history of the city. When the town was founded, this city was only the meeting place of a few ambitious and courageous ranchers and farmers, and a stopping place in the long trek made by others into the Indian territory. An ambitious young man F. J. Garves brought to the city its first newspaper which he named the 6666 Star in honor of the famous ranch of the area.

From the very beginning this little news sheet took the leadership in community affairs, and with the city it has prospered or felt the pangs of drouth and depression. In the early days there were only a few persons that were hardy enough to face this wide open territory, and these were richly rewarded for their persistence and courage. In good years it was discovered that this land would yield greater dividends than any in the state.

**New Volume**

In this issue there appears a new number, Volume 27 No. 1. This will be the 16th time that the present owner has changed the number, and this issue starts the 27th year of service for the paper. The first paper offers some startling and interesting information about the people of Burk Burnett.

Soon after the paper was established it was changed to the Burk Burnett Star and published by the Star Publishing Company. Among the owners and editors have been characters that are of importance in journalism. E. P. Reynolds acquired the paper after Graves left. Among the other men associated as owners and editors have been J. F. Gillet, J. E. and R. D. Laney, Milton Clendenin, Ben McDonald, W. F. Billingslea and Sam Roberts.

The most hectic experience of the paper was during the boom days. In that period there were an unimaginable spirit of excitement in the city, and the little news sheet was unable to keep up with the fast moving world. Things happened so rapidly that before the ink was dry on one issue a new story had broken of greater importance.

As the bottom dropped out of the oil boom and the population shifted elsewhere, the Star kept steadily plugging on as a community influence, and today is doing its part in the rebuilding of the city.

**Present Staff**

Fred Brookman has been associated with the paper as a linotype operator and printer for the last 16 volumes. He came here in 1921. For the last three years he has operated as editor and owner of the paper. John Brookman has worked as compositor and printer and now linotype operator for the past six years. Both of these have been printers and news men most of their lives. Harry Dodson, printer and compositor, recently started to work for the paper. He has worked for 11 years on the Iowa Park Herald. Curtis Cook for several months has handled the news for the paper. He has been associated with the Times and Record News for several years.
