NATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK

The schools of Burkburnett are joining the schools all over the nation this week in the celebration of "National Education Week." This generation has taken many things for granted that would have been miracles in any other period. The efficiency of the schools is one of the things that they have accepted as a matter of mere routine. Such weeks as this one serves to remind the citizenship of the fact that a good school results from progressive and zealous policies.

The fact that there is an excellent system here means that some has done a lot of hard work and more hard study. No other science in the world is advancing as rapidly as the science of education. More experiments are being tried in this field than in any other. The difficulty is in choosing that which is good and discarding that which is unworthy.

A school dare not disregard progressive steps or experimental ideas. A system that does not examine each new thought will find itself hopelessly lost in the rapid forward movement. Those who attended school last Tuesday night saw many things that they did not recognize as school routine, because of the difference of the present status of educational science and the status in the days that those now mature citizens attended school. To many of them it was like stepping out on the new planet.

In a few years there will be even more radical changes. The whole community has had an opportunity this week to catch a glimpse of the system and how it functions. The school administration would appreciate an active and intelligent interest in the system throughout the year.

"SUDDEN DEATH"

The City Council of Burkburnett ought to pass a law requiring that every person that drives a car read the article recently published in the Readers Digest "Sudden Death." No magazine or news story has ever been so widely read or caused so widespread comment. It is the most horrible thing that we have ever read. Every person that reads it cuts down their speed of driving about 10 to 20 percent, and actually is more careful and considerate in driving.

Since the magazine was published the accident rate of the country has dropped several percent. In some cities every man that has an accident is required by the judge to copy the article word for word. The gruesome pictures of head chopped off, post and steering wheels sticking through bodies, glass windshields completely decapitating people, have a strange effect on the speed and careless driving laws.

We feel that it is the duty of every person that can read the article. It may make you a little sick, but it will make you more careful about your driving in the future. Nothing seems so essential now as the reduction of the accidents in this area. It must be done. How? Well let's try making everyone read this article when they have a wreck.

VALUABLE PICTURES

We have realized that there is real value in the old pictures of the city and its progress as the result of all the ballyhoo about the centennial.

There are in the possession of people in Burkburnett many very valuable pictures of the growth, development and history of the city. At the present these pictures serve no valuable purpose other than satisfying the vanity of the people of the community who own them. These pictures could become a real valuable civic and educational asset.

If some organization, such as the Chamber of Commerce, Lions club, Rotary club or any other group were to establish a museum for the pictures, promising that they would be given protection and care, we are sure that many people would be glad to turn the private collections, or copies of the collections over to such an agency.

POLL TAXES

The most important contests that have been presented to the people of this section in many years will be presented in every field of politics this year. The balance of power in the city school, and the county boards will be in the contests locally. The new deal of national politics will receive its first major test. The state races will include a senatorial and governor's race of real interest.

For this reason it is well that every person in Burkburnett should pay the poll taxes as soon as possible. We have a unique arrangement here that provides both city and state poll tax must be paid for local election. Therefore, do not neglect paying the city poll tax if you expect to vote in the city elections for the coming year.

The poll tax scheme is unjust. Its original purpose has been outgrown, and we have retained it as a relic from a disturbed social and political situation of the Civil War period and reconstruction days. Even if it is unjust, it still must be paid if any semblance of orderly and efficient government is attained in Texas. Large groups of people are organizing in Texas to defeat orderly government. There are 75 members of such an organization in Burkburnett. These people will pay their taxes and may hold the balance of votes here. They will hold the balance unless the civic minded persons register.

The poll tax law has come under fire, and it will never be repealed until some means of adding that much to the school fund is discovered. At the present the law provides a big part of the state school allowance. Until a better system is established every citizen should pay the registration fee and be ready to watch the campaigns that develop next year.

News of Week

The legislature finally decided to pass the pension bill after more than fifty days of argument. It all seemed very simple to the laymen. The vast majority voted for the constitutional amendment, and most of the voters were under the impression that all the legislature had to do was acknowledge the vote by formal resolution. However, the selfishness of the representatives showed up in the argument more than in any recent legislation. It became a political football to be kicked around by the conflicting interests.

The bill on the governor's desk allows for a possible maximum of \$22.50. That does not mean that every person will secure that amount. The article reads "As much as is consistent with the standard of living to which the person is accustomed." That means that the negroes and Mexicans will receive much less than other people.

The Money For Pension

But where is the money coming from? The smart legislature ordered the payments to start by next July 1. However, no funds were provided. The state is already \$9,000,000.00 in the red. That order was just like a husband telling a wife to go down town and buy a fur coat, but forgetting to give her the money to do it. A special tax or act will be necessary to provide the money.

Unconstitutional

A federal judge in Baltimore, Maryland has declared the holding company bill unconstitutional. The holding company law virtually would have eliminated the large electrical concerns in seven years. The federal judge held it was illegal on three counts. It applied to intra-state companies as well as inter-state companies. 2 It denied the use of mails to companies not cooperating. 3 It was arbitrary.

The case will be taken to the supreme court. That is inevitable and the present administration will meet another test of its power to deal with an emergency with legislation. The NRA was thrown out, and several other acts have been hastily revised. Now the administration meets another major legal test.

Bond Payment

The British government has verified the decision that was recently made by the United States supreme court. This decision gained little notice. A few papers placed it on the front page, but it is one of the most important stories of the year. When the United States pushed the dollar down to 59 cents, that left the British investors holding the bag. A test case was set in the British courts, and now the American companies

The little men of Japan are faced with the problem of either starving to death or fighting. Any day you get a man or a nation hungry that man or nation is going to fight for the right to exist.

About Ethiopia

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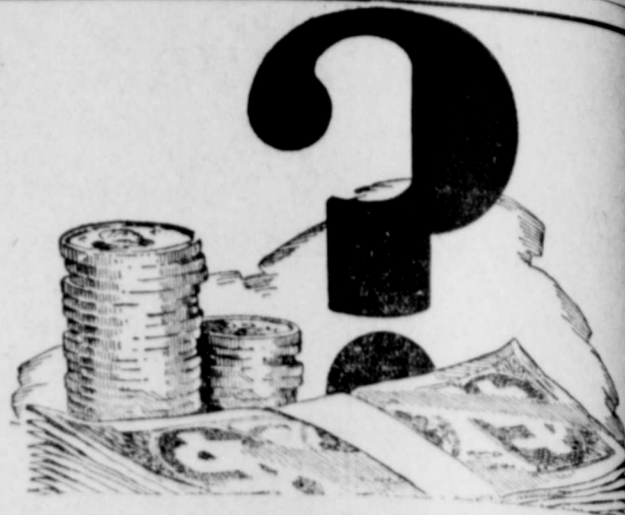

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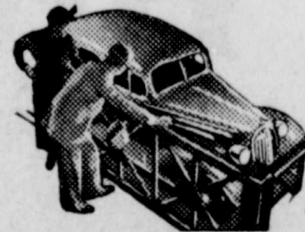

The next stage in teaching beginners to read was the word method. This method was introduced by Horace Mann, and was adopted by most progressive schools by 1880. The word method was a means of presenting to the beginner something that was not entirely strange to him as the alphabet had been. He already knew the names of the objects around him—as whole sounds, but knew nothing about the letters of which the words were composed. The A B C method was abandoned by all progressive schools after the introduction of the word by all progressive schools after the introduction of the word method. The reforms that followed the word method consisted of the teaching of phrases and short sentences instead of words. At the present time a combination of the sentence, word, phrase, and phonetic method is used. The use of the sentence tends to lead the pupil to get the thought from the printed page, while the phonetic method trains in word mastery. The sentences used are developed in a conversation between the teacher and pupil or from some activity upon which the pupil has been working. The sentences are written on the board and read. They are printed and these charts form on the board read. They are printed and these charts form the first reading material for the beginner. The pupil becomes familiar with the words and phrases, and in this way acquires a vocabulary of sight words before he is given a primer.

Endless leisure never yet has developed a superior man; what reason have we to believe that nature's scheme will change? Robert K. Quillen.

The present trend in commercial education is decidedly that of social or informational rather than technical training. In other words, emphasis is placed more and more upon the student's appreciation of business in its different phases. Thus, we have not only the old idea of educating the consumer. The former aspect is readily discernible by all. The latter is found even in subjects formerly thought to be wholly technical in nature, or solely for the producer.

Typewriting, shorthand, book-keeping and the related subject commercial arithmetic, though predominantly technical in their nature and treatment, and originally justified in the curriculum because they prepared boys and girls to become stenographers and bookkeepers, are now pursued because of their added value to the individual. The student types his themes and takes detailed notes from the teacher's lecture, the newspaper reporter acquires a fuller and more accurate report for the paper in a shorter time, the farmer keeps and accurate account of his financial condition, and the business man better understands the statements prepared for him by his accounting staff. This consumer aspect can be better appreciated when we consider the fact that over eighty percent of the students taking book-keeping in high school never become bookkeepers or accountants. Often the stenographer uses his knowledge of shorthand merely as a stepping stone to a better position. In no other position can a person become better acquainted with the business executive than in that of private secretary. The employer is more likely to give the promotion to the employee who is best known to him, other things being equal. The number of business men today who were the stenographers of yesterday

is evident proof of this value that stenography has for a person of unusual ability.

Commercial law and commercial geography are wholly subjects that offer social or informational training, and are designed solely to give the student a keener appreciation of the business world. In other words, they are consumer subjects. No one would be so insane as to say that a course in commercial law would prepare a student for the bar. To the contrary, the purpose of business law is to enable the future business man, through his knowledge of legal principles, to avoid litigation, or to know when litigation is advisable. Is this not consumer education? In a study of commercial geography the student acquires a knowledge and appreciation of his immediate surroundings, which in turn tend to stimulate his interest and arouse his curiosity in conditions more remote. He studies the "How" and the "Wherefore" of natural resources, commerce, industries, transportation facilities; people, their progress, inventions, and discoveries; foreign countries and our relations with them. These social subjects are, of course, contributory to those of a more technical nature and of a higher learning level.

Despite the present trend of commercial education from the technical to the social phase and the fact that this trend means for the training of better citizens, the technical phase cannot be belittled. If a person cannot obtain a livelihood from the society of which he is a member how can he appreciate that society? How can he become the better citizen? How can he become the better business man? We cannot cross the river by cutting the supports from under the bridge.

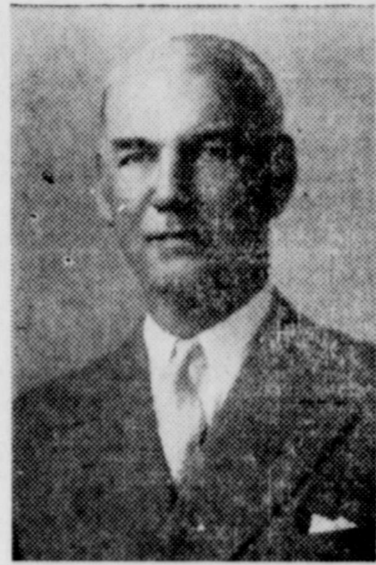
BULLDOG BASKETEERS WIN OVER EXES

The reports from the Gins in Burk Burnett indicated that the cotton crop of this area would reach the total of 4,000 bales with the top of the year 3365 bales up to Wednesday noon. Both gins reported that they were working rapidly since the sun shine of the last two days, and that cotton had reached 11:65 to 11:75 during the week.

Other farm products, with the exception of wheat held a strong market. Turkeys reached a top of 20 cents during the early part of the week, but order from the market to stop buying held up the further trade in the fowls for two or three days here. Other fowls and farm products kept steady.

Elvin Gorman of Lawton, Okla., tried Tuesday before Judge Ernest M. Robertson of the 89th district court was acquitted on a charge of car theft by a jury which deliberated the case for three and a half hours.
