DEMONSTRATION FARM WORK

Owing to the importance of the demonstration farm work, and as it is being introduced for the first time in Haskell county, I wish to say that in order that we may not be misunderstood, that this work is the so-called government method, and differs somewhat from the system known as the Campbell dry land plan. In the demonstration work we wish the farmer who is going to take a plat of ground for demonstration purposes to do so with the understanding that the work is not experimental, for we have gone beyond the experimental stage.

Our system means better crops on less land and at a smaller figure of cost as to production. We furnish all the information, advice and instruction relative to the work that the farmer is doing on the demonstration plat, and the object of the dem-

onstration is to show the value of the better methods of farming, in a sense, we might say, to what the better modes of farming will do for them and for the country. We shall be glad to have as many names on our roll of government farmers as possible, and any one desiring any information relative to this work can get the same by seeing me or County Judge Smith.

CLEAN UP YOUR PREMISES

The Haskell Civic Club, composed of many of the best women of the town, issues the following appeal for a cleaner Haskell, designating October 18th as clean-up day:

"Since the beginning of time women have figured largely in public affairs. Through their efforts cities have been made to improve in civic beauty; homes may contribute more to character building; rural life may march side by side with city life—the fresh, buoyant breath of one mingle with the commercial spirit of the other, then hands joined in common cause for common good—for all, their voices raised in unison shouting the command: "Advance all along the line, there is something for woman to do!"

"With only a faint realization of what we can do for the health and welfare of Haskell as loving christian wives and mothers let us join hands and put forth a co-operative effort when our mayor names October 18 as clean up day for Haskell and wagons are put on the street to remove all cans and trash at the city's expense, let every wife have her yard in good condition and all cans and trash in a barrel or box and ready to be carted away to the dumping ground. For the welfare and health of our loved ones let us clean up more thoroughly than ever before.

"If this important matter is longer neglected some plague or pestilence may visit Haskell. Diphtheria is already in our midst and new cases are being reported nearly every day. If it costs a few hundred dollars to clean up our city it may cost several thousand to stamp out some epidemic, not to mention the lives of many loved ones and friends that will certainly be lost.

"Our mayor and city council have performed their duties nobly. Greatly hampered by want of funds they have done all that could be done under the circumstances.

"And now we appeal to the makers and keepers of our homes, in the name of health and human life, to respond to the mayor's proclamation and see that your premises are in a sanitary condition on October 18th and thus do all in your power to protect yourself, your loved ones and your neighbors from the ravages of disease."

It ever has been, is now, and ever will be, the purpose of this paper to commend where commendation is due, to co-operate in all things for the betterment of our town and community, religiously, morally, socially, and otherwise. And we gladly give space to the above appeal from the Haskell Civic Club, and endorse the spirit of civic pride and humane interest exhibited. We sincerely trust the people of Haskell will respond to the call made and have their premises looked after. The men as a rule neglect these things, but women whose natures are more refin-

ed and who are more largely concerned as to the beauty and appearances of their homes, necessarily are more alive to the importance of cleanly kept premises, and we feel sure that this call made by the Civic Club will be heeded. Aside from the attraction it will add to the premises, the sanitary feature should cause all to respond to the call. We must preserve our health, and in keeping clean our premises, we are using an ounce of prevention where it allowed to remain as they are we may have to use a pound of cure.

LONG STAPLE IN HASKELL CO.

Last spring Mr. F. G. Alexander gave Mr. G. W. Bedford of this city about a dozen seed of long staple cotton.

Mr. Bedford planted the seed and got some stalks of the cotton. This cotton fruited well and Mr. Bedford gathered about two pounds of the cotton. He will save the seed for planting.

We examined a boll of the cotton and found that the lint was one and a half inches long.

Mr. Alexander says this cotton is worth 26 cents per pound.

The experiment of Mr. Bedford seems to demonstrate that long staple cotton may be successfully grown in Haskell Haskell county.

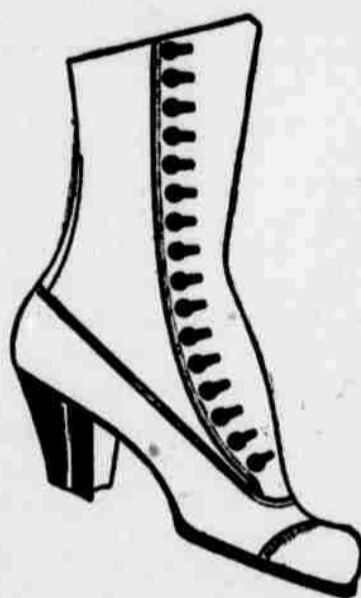

Beet Industry Growing.

Plainview is being promised a \$600,000 sugar factory, as the first result of a test proving that beets grown in this territory contain 17 per cent sugar against 15 per cent in the far famed Wisconsin products.

An investigation made by an expert representing the Sugar Beet Factory at Chippewa Falls, Wis., resulted in the discovery that the possibilities of Plainview beets exceeded those of Wisconsin, out of which great manufacturing profits have been made. He reported his findings to his employers, and they have begun plans for the erection of a big plant in Plainview. It is believed the industry is assured and that the acreage in beets in this district will be increased. The expert reported that Plainview is an ideal location for a beet sugar factory, as the soil is suitable, the climate particularly adaptable and water plentiful.

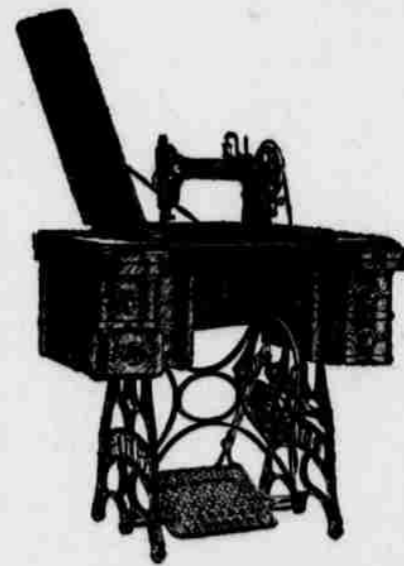
