Dick Vestal Receives Howard Farmer Award at Banquet

BAIRD-E.I. (Dick) Vestal, Jr., vocational agriculture teacher at Baird High School for the past seventeen years, was the recipient of the Howard Farmer award during the annual Baird Chamber of Commerce dinner meeting Friday night, April 20, at the school cafeteria. This coveted award is presented to a deserving individual for his/her outstanding service to the chamber and the community.

Vestal was born in Cross Plains on Thanksgiving Day Nov. 28, 1929. He attended school there, and graduated from Cross Plains High School in 1946.

He attended college at Tarleton State University 2 years and at Texas Tech for 2 years, before graduating in 1950 with a B.S. degree in Ag. Education. He received his Master's Degree from Tarleton State University in 1974.

He began his long affiliation with school agriculture departments in 1950-51 at Priddy, located in Mills County.

Vestal married Joann Eckerberger in 1951 at Ft. Worth. He served in the Korean War from 1952 to 53, and was discharged from the service in Jan., 1953.

Vestal then taught vocational agriculture at Jacksboro from 1953-54. From 1954-55, he farmed in Cross Plains. He returned to Mills County in 1955 and taught agriculture there for the next 5 years. Vestal assumed his duties as Baird agriculture instructor in Oct. 1961, and has held that post for the past 17 years. Prior to moving in Baird, he operated a private business.

An array of both state and local organizations have been an active part of Dick's life over the years. He has been on the Board of Directors for the Vocational Agriculture Teacher's Assn. of Texas

for seven years, serving as State Secretary in 1975, State Vice President in 1976 and State President in 1977. He has been involved with the local Lions Club for the past several years, and has held most offices of the organization. He is currently serving as President of the parish council of the St. Ann's Catholic Church.

Dick Vestal has been one of the major factors in the success of local rodeos as well as in Big Country rodeos with his sparking commentaries and natural announcing abilities. He and the Baird FFA Chapter have sponsored the Baird Jr. Rodeo for the past 17 years. In other areas of FFA, judging teams under the direction of Vestal, have participated in the State judging meet all but three years of Vestal's seventeen tenure.

Dick and his wife, Joann, have six children: Ricky, an ag teacher for the last 4 years at Grady High School; Danny, an ag teacher for the last 1½ years at Grapevine High School; Andy, Asst. County Agent for Howard County; Cindy McCulloch; Chris, who will graduate from B.H.S. this year and Davy, a B.H.S. sophomore. The Vestals have one granddaughter, Kelly McCulloch.

Before the award presentation, guests enjoyed a delicious meal prepared and served by the Baird FFA. Following the meal, a short business program was held with chamber president Jane Ringhoffer presiding.

Rick and Holly entertained the crowd with 20 minutes of delightful music. During that time, Holly Dunn sang two of her original compositions. The duo ended the program with a medley of "Texas" songs and encouraged the crowd to join in.

Baird Kindergarten Pre-Registration May 2

BAIRD-Registration of kindergarten students for the fall term of school (79-80) will be held on Wednesday morning, May 2, from 8:30 to 10:30 at the Baird School cafeteria.

Children who will be five years of age on or before September 1 will be enrolled in kindergarten.

Parents of kindergarten students are asked to bring their child's birth certificate and immunization record. A hospital certificate of birth is not acceptable.

Immunization requirements for school are as follows:

1. Polio. Three doses of oral polio are required, provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

2. Diphtheria/Tetanus/Whooping cough. At least three doses of DTP are required,

provided one dose or a booster has been received on or after the fourth birthday.

3. Measles. Measles vaccine is required on or after the first birthday, or provide a history of measles illness.

4. Rubella. One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the twelfth birthday.

5. Mumps. Mumps vaccine will be required for all students under eight years of age. A history of mumps illness will be accepted in lieu of vaccine, if it has been validated in writing by a physician.

There will be a free immunization clinic at the time of registration. This will enable the parents to have their child fully immunized before the beginning of school.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN BY CALLAHAN COUNTY OF ITS RENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.
