**YOU WILL HAVE TO PAY**

An enormous amount of notice was given to the nominal tax reductions which have taken place at the federal level in the last two years. The question now is whether this moderate measure of tax relief is to be something of a snare and a delusion.

On January 1, 1966, social security taxes are to be substantially increased. This, for great numbers of people, will wholly or largely offset the past reductions.

Then, what will happen in the future is a subject of much speculation now. For example, in one of his recent columns, David Lawrence wrote that the people know little about "...what burdens for future years will result from the commitments made by the last Congress. Expenditures to fulfill these commitments will grow year by year in the various fields in which the federal government has heretofore not entered. This will inevitably mean hereafter a bigger and bigger tax burden on the American people.

You may or may not favor medicare, the war on poverty, federal aid to education or any of the government's other ventures into unchartered areas of authority. But you and everyone else will have to pay for them...in increased taxes of one kind or another and, if the government continues to operate on a deficit basis, in a steady decline in the value of the dollar.

**THE AMA AND MEDICARE**

July 1, 1966, the controversial medicare law will go into effect. It will provide payment for certain medical services to 18 million Americans who have passed the age of 65. As everyone knows, this measure was strongly opposed by the American Medical Association...for the reason that a great majority of the nation's physicians believe that it seriously endangers the quality of care that will be available.

Government officials, sensing the problems that lie ahead, invited the AMA to help write the regulations that will govern medicare. The AMA accepted. The Association's president, James Z. Appel, M. D., has said: "I feel...that the only statesman-like and rational behavior of our Association today, after the enactment of this law which we so strongly opposed, is to try...in the most effective way possible...to bring about regulations and other implementing actions that will mitigate the baneful effects that we know are likely to occur...this law is certain to be one of the most difficult administrative problems in history unless the doctors of the nation exert their utmost efforts to help make it work."

The AMA, Dr. Appel went on to say, must offer amendments which will gradually mold the law in a sounder direction. And, he added, preparation must be made for the next and more crucial battle over the means of financing the health care of the entire population.

The AMA's position is progressive and sound. The flaws that are implicit in medicare must be corrected. And the fight against more political domination of medicine, at the expense of standard, must be intensified.

**LIKE IT OR LUMP IT**

When the government moves in, the rights of private citizens are frequently moved out. Take, for instance, a situation down in the Tennessee Valley Authority area.

TVA is building a community at the site of a new dam. When the work is finished, there will be some land left over, it having been used for access roads and other purposes during the construction stage. Previously, this surplus land has been auctioned to the highest bidder.

But, apparently, that isn't going to happen this time. It has been announced that the government will hold the land and sell it only to buyers of its own selection. That caused the Richmond, Virginia, News Leader to say: "In other words, the Federal government will decide who will and will not do business in the new community... The government's reasoning? In the past it didn't like the use certain land was put to by its private owners. TVA spokesmen speak of improving the economy, achieving regional goals, producing more jobs as the motivation for their Federal community. Their logic overlooks the existence of a free competitive economy and also the right of property owners to do as they please with their property. Such is not the concern of TVA or its parent, the Federal government. Down in the valley, like Topsy, they jes' grow...and grow and grow."

**The Good Earth**

Happy New Year to All! We had such a happy fun-filled holiday I nearly forgot to write this column.

My sister-in-law and I gathered flowers from our yards for our Christmas table. We had a mari-gold, two chrysanthemums, one gallardia, one California gold iris and some roses. They all came out of Mrs. Sam Scott's yard with the exception of the iris. It came from our yard. Things are killed from the frost much worse at our place than they are at the Scott's. Their castor beans and umbrella plants are still pretty and green this the 27th day of December.

Mrs. John Tubbs gave me some cuttings of scarlet sage about 2 months ago. I took them and buried the stems about six inches in the ground. I watered the bed well and only thought to water them twice more as I had a siege of flu that kept me confined to the house for some time. I was out back today, Monday, and was surprised and very much pleased to see every limb I put in the ground is alive and growing. The leaves are dark green and luxuriant.

Bulbs can still be set in the ground until it freezes too hard to dig the holes.

I dug my amaryllis this year. They shall have a month or so resting period, then I shall put them in pots of soil for Easter flowers. It has almost become a tradition with us to have amaryllis for Easter.

I have some rich composted soil that will be just right for the amaryllis bulbs.

When one plants amaryllis in pots, only bury one half the bulb in the soil. Water the soil well and set aside in a dark, cool place. By this time buds or leaves or both should begin to appear.

Any good potting soil can be used for the bulbs. Good drainage is important. Rocks, broken clay pots or gravel can be put in the bottom of the pot to promote drainage. Watering from the bottom is best. Only re-water when the soil feels dry to the touch.

The Lord willing, I will try to bring you a clear picture of what Haskell Garden Club does and what it stands for. Many think we work too hard. There is a wonderful mixture of both. I'll try to tell in simple words soon just what we have accomplished and what we plan for the future.

Aracaju, Sergipe Christmas, 1965

Dear Friends: On Christmas Eve an enchantment falls upon the earth. It is a time when the Spirit of a new born Child, whose name is Love, possesses the world.

Oh, if only this Spirit of Love would continue to reign throughout the New Year, and envy, hate and jealousy would disappear.

We know that everyone wants to be loved, but I have never realized how much hope and happiness love brings to the hearts of those who do not have earthly possessions of food enough to keep the hunger pains away. It is wonderful to be able to love, to give courage and hope to hundreds of people each week. Especially to let them know of One, whose love is greater than our love for them.

Like the young mother who came to me crying because she had been told that she would have to return to the mental hospital. Her eyes full of fright, trembling, she asked me for help. We read God's Word, we talked to Him, we repeated the scriptures of His love for us, and as I held her hands in mine she became quiet and calm. Each day she came back for our devotional period. She took Christ as her Saviour, her face shown with joy and a smile was on her face. Our fine nurse began her medicine the doctor had ordered. Yes, we returned to the mental hospital to see her doctor, and he was amazed at the change in her, so calm and smiling. The One who is called Love does change you, when you confide in Him.

"Friendship House" in Aracaju, seeks to make Jesus known to its 430 members. Many come from sections dominated by "Xango" worship, which was brought over from Africa. A young mother came into my office and said "I must talk to you." Immediately I took her into a room for a conference. She said, "I must find something else or I will go crazy, so my husband sent me here to talk to you." Then she explained that her mother and sisters did everything to make her go to the Xango meetings. "Oh, it is so terrible that I am afraid to go with them," she said. "My sisters kill birds and drink their blood before they die, if the saints tells them, so many terrible things." We read what the Bible said about these things, then we prayed. After I told her of the plan of Salvation, she said, "Oh, this is what I want." She has been faithful to come each day to read our Bibles and accept Christ, when I took her to our Mission.

Many come to our Friendship House, not to join the Bible Clubs, but to the small clinic for medicine, a shot or treatments. Children are the largest group who come, and malnutrition is so evident among them. We are grateful that we can give them some foodstuffs from the "Progress for Peace Supplies." Since our opening three and a half months ago, over 1,030 people have received help in the clinic. If they come only to the clinic, I always have a conference with them, and they leave with a Gospel of John in their hand.

As Christmas approached, the young people made decorations for the club rooms. We divided the members into groups of 40 and 50 and had eight Christmas parties for them, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. Seventy-eight people received awards as they had not missed a single class. Have you ever had eight Christmas parties? Well, we were exhausted, but happy when all was over.

How grateful I am to the Foreign Mission Board, First Baptist Church in Gladewater (my church) and many friends, who help us and pray for us each day. Please continue to pray for us that we may have health to be used by Him.

The 1965 pecan estimate has been moved up to 263.8 million pounds, better than 90 million pounds more than 1964. Farm sales of native pecans in mid-December were running about 4 to 6¢ a pound less than for the same period during 1964, so add special flavor to your favorite dishes with pecans.

California's record grape crop totaling around 3.9 million tons will be sending large quantities into local markets this January. Emperors are expected to be in best supply.

Production of potatoes is up 25 per cent over the 1964 fall crop—creating the largest on record. And USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service reports heavy shipments of sweet potatoes arriving at local markets.



## DECEMBER DRAFT CALL IS BIGGEST IN TWELVE YEARS

State draft boards will be authorized in December to draft young married men without children, regardless of the date he was married, to fill the biggest Texas draft call in more than 12 years.

This was announced Wednesday by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who said the new policy pertained to men 18 through 25 years old.

The state draft quota for December calls for 1,714 men, the biggest since June, 1953, when a call for 1,749 was made on Texas boards. The November quota has been increased from 1,231 to 1,456.

The December quota of 1,749 is the state's share of a national call of 45,224 men, 40,200 for the Army and 5,024 for the Marine Corps.

No married man with children, or an expected child, will be selected to fill the December call.

"Draft boards, of course, must have the information about children," Colonel Schwartz said, "and an unborn child must be certified by a physician. Otherwise, a young husband and father may find himself selected."

The state draft director explained that childless married men will be ordered for induction when boards exhaust pools of examined and acceptable single men 19 through 25 years old.

Approximately 9,000 men will be sent for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in December. The December local board quotas for induction and examination are scheduled to be mailed to the boards on or about November 10.

Childless married men may be forwarded for physical and mental examinations in both November and December, as well as men down to age 18 years, 11 months if necessary.

Inductions are scheduled to proceed throughout each week in December.
