M. K. & T. Orders Six New Diesels

The Missouri - Kansas - Texas Lines placed order today for six 1,000 h. p. diesel switching locomotives, at cost of approximately \$3,000,000 D. V. Fraser, Katy president, announced. Order was placed with the Electro Motive Division, General Motors Corporation, and the locomotives will be built in that company's plant at LaGrange, Illinois. Delivery is expected early next year, and the locomotives will be placed in service in the railroad's Dallas terminal, replacing steam operations at that terminal.

The Katy recently ordered diesel equipment for its streamlined passenger train service on the Texas Special route to Texas.

Clothing Collection Drive Organizing

More than 2000 men and women thus far have agreed to serve as local chairmen in their communities for the Victory Clothing Collection for overseas relief scheduled for January 7-31, Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman for the drive, announced tonight.

Wisconsin leads the states with 237 acceptances, topping New York's 178. Texas is third with 163, Pennsylvania has 132, Illinois, 131 and Nebraska 127 chairmen.

The goal of the January drive is 100,000,000 garments, in addition to shoes and bedding, for the needy and destitute in war-devastated lands. The collection is conducted on behalf of UNRRA.

Governor Names Dec. 8 As Kenny Day In Texas

Governor Coke R. Stevenson has proclaimed Saturday, December 8, as Sister Kenny Day in Texas. The 1945 appeal for the Sister Elizabeth Kenny Infantile Paralysis Foundation Fund is now underway throughout the nation and in Texas. George C. Francisco, Jr., of Houston, heads the state committee directing the campaign, and has announced that the Texas campaign, quota for which is \$250,000 will officially end with Sister Kenny Day, but that due to lateness in getting organized the campaign will be extended in many counties.

A LUCKY NATION

A striking fact of the tumultuous war years through which we have just lived, a fact which no one can truthfully deny, is that the people of the United States wanted for nothing. They kept more than twenty million autos running. Their homes remained brightly lighted and well heated. Their diet, in spite of griping, was nothing less than abundant. They had plenty of clothes and plenty of luxuries. The families of men in the service were, by large, the only ones who had the vaguest notion of the horrible sacrifice and destruction being endured elsewhere. This is not a criticism of the home front. It is merely stating facts. It was because of continuing high living standards that we were able to turn in a war production miracle.

It is worth reflecting upon the reasons for the maintenance of such living standards. Of course, there was rationing and price control to insure stability. There were also hundreds of thousands of miles of paved highways, railways, countless fleets of trucks, trains, planes, ships; there

were countless business organizations, manufacturing plants, and millions of individual producers topped by a mass distribution system of hundreds of thousands of retailers. All of this vast activity functioned with clock-like precision. Temporary stresses and strains were absorbed without hitch.

Now that the war is over, we can begin to appreciate this intricate machine. What it did in war it can do on an even greater scale in peace, providing we don't underestimate its ability and turn to paternalistic government in a futile search for perfection.

BACK TO THEIR PARLORS

Those feminine figures participating in club work, social service jobs, gracing bridge tables, lunching in town during shopping sprees, might, but a few months ago, been clothed in snoods, oxfords and slacks, using electric drills and welding torches. Called to take part in the war effort, the woman stepped forward with the lunch box to receive her pay check for war production. Unskilled she soon became a trained, valuable worker. She worked in factory, office and store, to help make our victory possible. Some women have not given up their jobs, others have returned to homemaking. Some are not certain what they will do. However, the femininity of American women always asserts itself. Whether it is dishwasher or machine oil on our women's hands—bless 'em.

In his statement to the Chief of Police of Burkburnett, Bill

Stapp, who investigated the accident, Mr. Jones said that as he approached the scene of the accident, that four children rushed onto the pavement and started across from in front of a car that had been parked at the side of the road.

"Three of the children started hurrying back to the south side of the road, but the fourth one remained alone." In an attempt to swerve and avoid the entire group Jones' car smashed into the tiny seven year old girl and dragged the body of the school child several feet.

The last service of Orlee Franklin (Bubbles) Buffalo were held at the Church of Christ at Charlie Wednesday afternoon. The 11 year old boy was killed Tuesday afternoon when the cotton truck on which he was riding crashed into the underpass at the north end of Ohio street in Wichita Falls.

CHICK CHATS

LAYING HOUSE SANITATION

To keep a flock of chickens healthy and in profitable condition, sanitation and cleanliness are very important. Some people believe that sanitation takes care of all diseases but our better judgement knows that this is not so.

Diseases such as cholera, pox and even worms may occur even under what is considered the most sanitary and ideal conditions. Therefore, we must depend upon proper medication and vaccination when the birds need them as aids in maintaining

health. However, sanitation must not be neglected. Keep the farmyard tidy up burning or burying deeply all chickens and other animals that die on the farm. Never let them lie around the place where they spread disease. Keep the weeds mowed down, rake up and burn litter, manure and other waste. These can harbor parasites and infectious bacteria. Clean the house frequently.

After the cleaning is finished make up a disinfecting solution and spray it thoroughly around the house, under the roosts, over nests and other equipment.

Fumigation

In getting rid of germs, the source of infection, one may go even further than that. One may fumigate the house just as a hatcheryman fumigates the incubators. Close the ventilators, doors, and windows as tightly as possible and use a good commercial fumigant as recommended by the manufacturer. The fumigant is released on a hot stove or on hot bricks. Leave the doors and windows closed over night. If the house is fairly tight this does a good job of fumigating.

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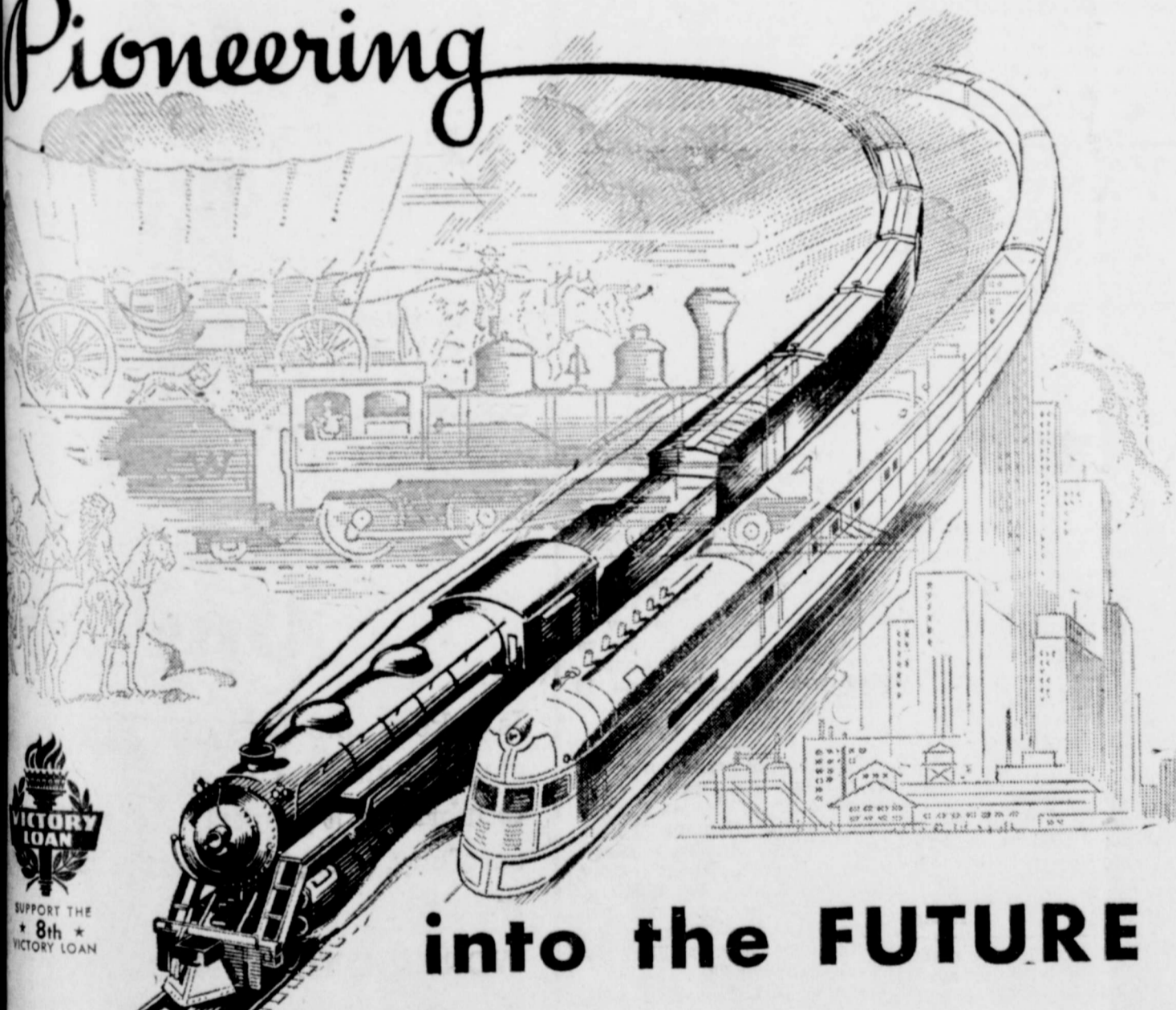

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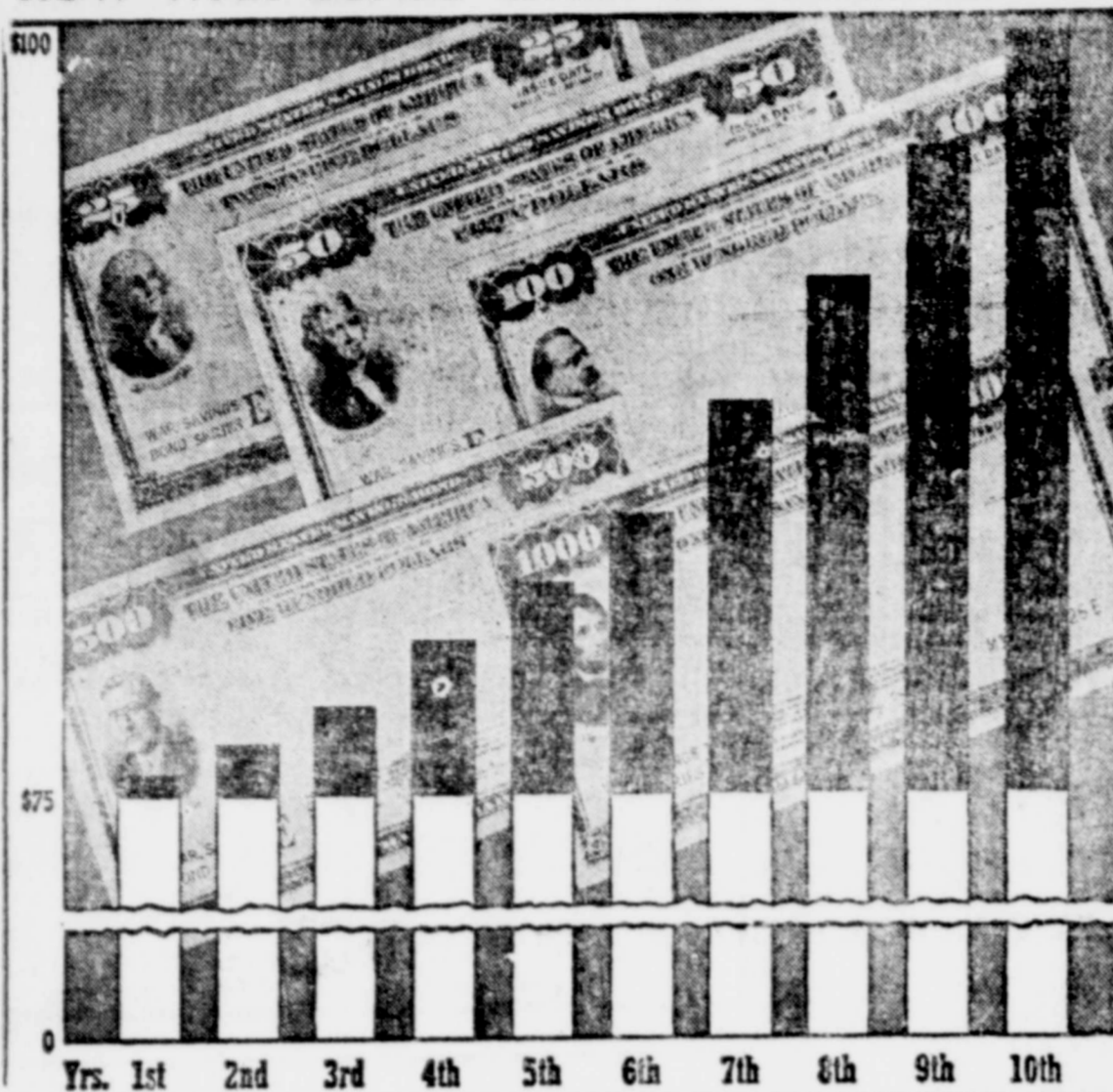

Study the increase in the \$1,000 bond. Holders of bonds the last few years, considering the above, would literally be throwing money away to cash them prior to maturity. The New York Stock Exchange in the more than 150 years of its existence has never recommended other bonds than those of the United States.
