Parade At 5:00 P.M. Today Opens Jaycee Rodeo Here

The Rice Springs Rodeo, an annual event organized by the Haskell Junior Chamber of Commerce, will get underway tonight, Thursday, at 8:00 o'clock in the Rice Springs arena and will be followed by nightly performances Friday and Saturday.

In this area as in all others, we must pay for goods and services that we desire and need. The more taxes you pay, the more of this world's goods you are privileged to enjoy. The more income tax you pay, the more income you have. Sometimes, however, our "negative personalities" will not let us correctly see these facts of life.

Taxes are a means by which we provide ourselves corporately with certain goods and services that we could not possibly have individually. Taxes

are the sign of freedom and of private enterprise. The only other alternative is for the government to own everything.

Some people have a tax-phobia. They feel everyone is out to "take them." They desire to take everything out of an economy or a society and put just as little back in as they can get by with. They also spend much time trying to shift their rightful tax burden to someone else.

Such people are generally very patriotic and claim to be lovers of their country...and they probably are...as long as it doesn't cost anything. But a person who has tax-phobia is a person who, whether he realizes it or not, is one who is not in accord with the American way of life...because the right to tax and the willingness to be taxed is the basis of our whole system of free enterprise.

Haskell County Test Is Slated For 3,700 Feet

Richard L. Dennie et al of Dallas No. 1 Noah Lane is to be drilled as a proposed 3700-foot wildcat in Haskell County. Location is six miles south of Haskell on a 284-acre lease. It spots 2,310 feet from north and 2,640 from west lines of section 12, block 1, W. J. Montgomery survey.

Operator and depth have been amended for a wildcat three miles northeast of Haskell. It is No. 1 J. W. Robertson. The venture was originally staked as 1,999-foot test by Horn Drilling Company of Seymour. Ausanka Oil Operations, Wichita Falls, is now the operator and depth has been amended to 4,000 feet.

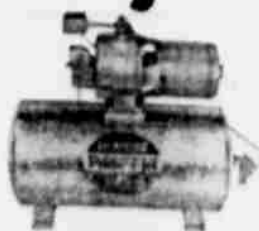

It is No. 1 M. M. Cobb, 2,970 feet from north and 330 from east lines and section 101, Indianola RR. survey. The project was originally drilled as Paramount Oil Co. No. 1 M. M. Cobb and plugged in 1958 at 1,478 feet.

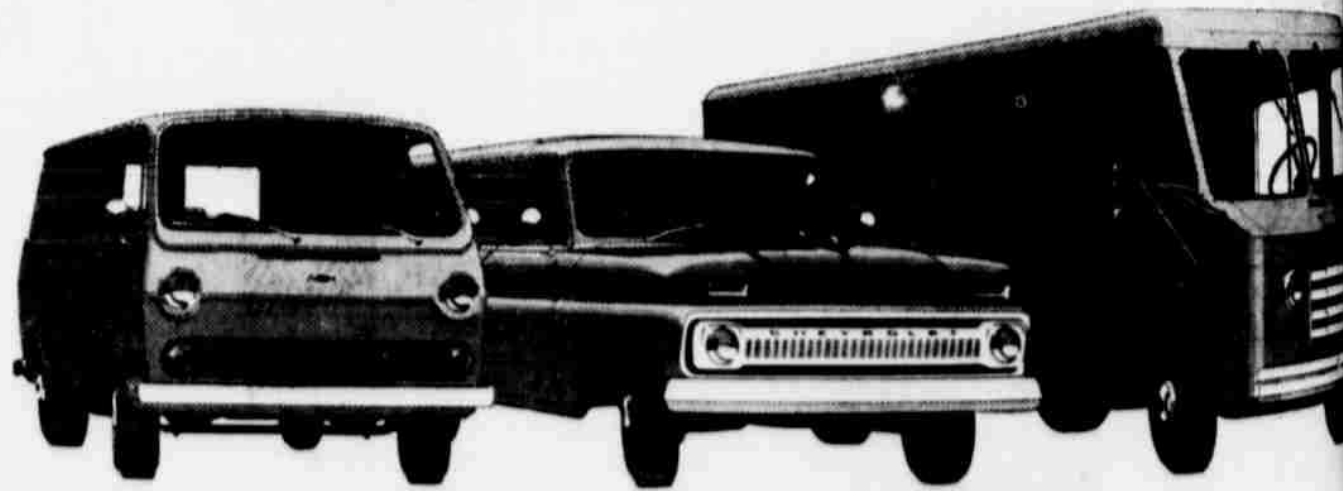
