Forum On Haskell's Water Condition Ed L. Reed. Consulting Hy- would for all practical purposes drologist, of Midland, retained be depleted and would no long-

by Haskell's prior city council to make a study of Haskell's underground water, spoke and conducted a question-answer session in the community room of the Haskell National Bank on Thursday morning, May 12, at 10:30 a. m. Reed explained in detail the results of his survey begun last fall

The hydrologist stated that the report previously made was only a preliminary report, and was given at the request of the then active council because they desired "some information" to use prior to augmenting the water reservoir project now pending. The report which was given was not complete, and was described to the council at that time as "not being good."

The report indicated that the

nitrates in the underground

water supply were increasing sharply and had long been far beyond the point approved by the State Board of Health for public consumption. He cited again the condition which could be produced by this high nitrate concentration as being referred to in the vernacular as blue babies." more simply known as "nitrate poisoning. There is, Mr. Reed most emphatically pointed out, no remedial measure that can be taken for this condition that is currently known. The system of water treatment utilizing reverse osmosis of electrodialysis processes, and used in the prior council's political campaign for re-election, is prohibitive in price, since such a treatment device, the cost of which runs excess of one-half million dollars, would have to be supplemented by a regular filtra-tion plant which would cost half that much again. In addition, the main problem would not be solved, and that is the disposition of the "brine" or waste water that would come from the treating equipment. Such wastes would only have to go into the ground again, and the situation would become pro-

gressively worse. Mr. Reed stated that the projected" estimate of twentyfive years of water was based on a maximum estimate and depended upon the factors so cited in the report. IF the rainall pattern remained the same; the population of the area did not increase; IF the amount of irrigation for agricultural purposes did not increase; IF present conditions remain same. Mayor Finch, who moderated at the meeting, stated that it was unfortunate indeed, that this report was utilized as it was during the "political season" and that the people were "led to believe some things that simply were not substantiated by the report? Rather than something to be elated over, the condition of our water as reported by the hydrologist should be construed as a "warning" that rational action should be taken without too

much delay. Mr. Reed further stated that half way through his survey he informed Mr. Yeatts of Yeatts and Decker, City Engineers, that the most economical thing that the city of Haskell could do was to seek a surface water supply, and that Mr. Yeatts

agreed with him.' Mr. Reed also informed city officials that those persons who base their opinion upon the amount of water in the underground reservoir upon the amount of water "in the well in their backyards" were using an untrue, unscientific and inaccurate basis for their assumption The level of an individual well in or near the city simply has bearing upon the level of the whole Seymour alluvium. The Mayor added that the citizens of Haskell must learn that we must depend upon the professional people in areas of for our information instead of upon "folklore, superstition, or self devised methods to satisfy our own prejudices.

Reed reiterated that the sole recharge for the Seymour basin is rainfall and nothing else There are no underground rivers feeding water into the reservoir. All of our water comes from rainfall. The level of the reservoir has fallen one and a half feet per year even with a normal rainfall pattern as we have experienced. The recent abnormal heavy rainfall will reflect in a better picture during the peak consumption months this summer, specifically July. Mr. Reed will at this time (in July) make a "draw down" test on all of the city wells as a part of his continuing survey on behalf of the city.
