Thieves Break In Corner Drug Store Take \$770 Cash

Professionals did a thorough job breaking into the Corner Drug Store some time Wednesday night. Time estimated at about 3:30 A. M.

Entrance was gained by a skylight, which had double bars over the glass. Just enough bars were removed to let a small man down from the roof via a rope. The combination to the safe was not damaged when it was opened; further proof that the job was done by big-time thieves. After checking up this (Thursday) morning, Geo. McClarty, owner of the store, said the loss in money was \$770.00. \$400.00 of this amount was from the sale of rodeo tickets.

\$1,400.00 worth of checks were scattered around the floor. Some HOT checks were not bothered. After taking all the morphine they could find, the burglars made their escape through a back door.

Mr. McClarty states all the loss is covered by insurance.

PARADE CROWD SPILLS INTO STREETS AT BURKBURNETT — Burk Burnett was a-booming again Tuesday afternoon when the mammoth parade to open up the annual rodeo performances stretched through the main streets of the city. So thick were the crowds that floats and horses moved cautiously and slowly, beating a trail through, as the photograph above shows.

The parade here Tuesday at 5:30 P. M. which officially opened four days of Celebration and Rodeo shows, was undoubtedly the largest which ever passed down Burk Burnett's streets. Plans were to have the parade turn at the railroad and come back up the street, but the parade was so long that it couldn't be turned in so few blocks.

The parade had probably 1200 to 1500 horses, mounted by gaily clad cowboys and cowgirls.

Decorated floats, cars and novelty entries competed for prizes, and floats entered by the Lions club and Rotary club carried their candidates for queen.

Winners In Floats Contest
First place in this division went to the Band Parents club with a theme of Ghost Riders in The Sky.

Second place went to the Junior University Study Club float, sponsored by the Burk Burnett Motors.

Third was awarded to Burk Burnett Study Club, which was sponsored by the First National Bank.

Burkburnett Motors had the best decorated car, with second place going to Mrs. Ollie Ratliff driving a Rose Lawn entry.

Other floats were: Lions club, Blue Bonnet Garden Club, sponsored by Mills and Fleming; Corner Drug Store, City Grocery and Market, Rotary Club, Camp Fire Girls, sponsored by Joy Sessums; and Current Literature Club.

Some 5000-6000 people jammed the foot ball stadium to witness the first rodeo performance of this year's four nights' offering. Every available seat in the grand stand, plus seats erected on either side of the chutes were packed. Hundreds were standing around the fence watching the fast-moving, big-time rodeo show. Contestants from all over the United States, with some of the best in the business, competed for prize money. Beutler Bros. of Elk City, Oklahoma, furnished the tough rodeo stock.

New Nursery to Open Baptist Church Sunday, July 24th

The First Baptist Church will open its new Nursery this Sunday at 9:45 A. M. Nursery I and Nursery II will occupy this new building. This is ages from birth to four years. Hundreds of dollars have been spent to prepare the building for the babies and little children. A closed in passageway leads from the main building to this one. The building has 1199 square feet of floor space. All floors are covered with linoleum.

For Nursery I here will be a large room for the babies in beds and then a smaller room where the toddlers will have a Sunday School class of their own. Nursery II for children two and three years old, will have a large assembly room with piano and two other rooms where classes will be held. There is a bath room with commode and lavatory.

Everything is strictly sanitary. The floors will be mopped each week with disinfectant. The workers in Nursery I are asked to wear white uniforms. Two paid attendants are in charge during preaching services Sunday morning and night.

Two nursery workers and church membership extend a most cordial invitation to everyone to visit this Nursery building on this opening day. T. Lynn Stewart, says "If you have a baby or if your neighbor has a baby, let's see that the baby is here for the opening day. Summer and Recreation

It costs to play and last year Americans spent \$94 million for recreation. It cost cities money to help us spend these dollars for play by the building of parks, swimming pools, recreation centers. Though there are more soft ball diamonds maintained by cities than swimming pools, swimming comes first in the country's recreational activities. Many cities provide courts for volley ball, tennis, basket ball, horse shoes, have base ball diamonds and supply table tennis. In their national recreational program certain urban centers offer programs in ceramics, clay modeling, needlecraft, weaving, woodwork, dancing, programs for children including storytelling, picnics, hikes, skating and so forth.

A town the size of Burkburnett can't afford to give such a varied number of activities to adults and children, but it behooves civic fathers to try to establish some kind of leisure time programs if possible. Summertime swimming can be without cost to local government when it points to neighborhood creeks, streams, rivers and brooks, for free, in some localities. But these city fathers caution summer swimmers who seek cool, refreshing waters, to make sure those refreshing waters are not contaminated. Many prominent lakes, public beaches and rivers, are named unfit for swimming. Let us not add to the cost of recreation in doctor's bills.

All For \$15.33

In defense of the American system called "capitalistic" by some, "free-enterprise" by most, a company in an ad asks, "Would you wreck American business for \$15.33?" Each of us would receive \$15.33, by the government taking ALL earnings of persons with reported incomes of \$50,000 a year or more. This is the way it works. In 1946 there were not quite 50,000 persons who reported \$50,000 incomes for taxation. They paid 15 per cent of all taxes though it was but one out of every 76 taxpayers and their taxation was one-half their earnings. Now, if the government had taken all their earnings, it would have meant \$15.33 per capita in tax revenue. So, for \$15.33 you would do away with financial, industrial and business leadership. Could the wealthy carry the entire load of running the government, even if you think in such terms?

THE CONCERN OF MEAT EATERS

Food prices may be down, but not meat, for meat rise. Don't blame cattlemen or government bureaucrats for this, just blame business.

By-products of cattle are not being used. Folks used to make soap from tallow and grease and now they buy soapless cleaners and detergents. Bakeries used lard and now they buy chemical emulsifiers. Chemists have found ways to replace cowhide that was used for shoe soles. So, with a loss of the market for by-products, meat, poultry and dairy prices rise. Synthetics have put us here.

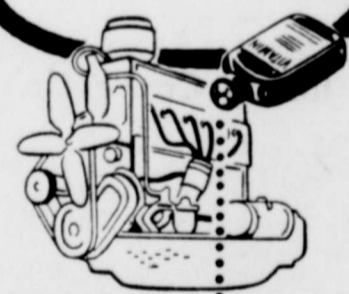
The "clothing" which weighs so little consists of one Olympian type gown, zephyr light in weight, and one nightie, even lighter.

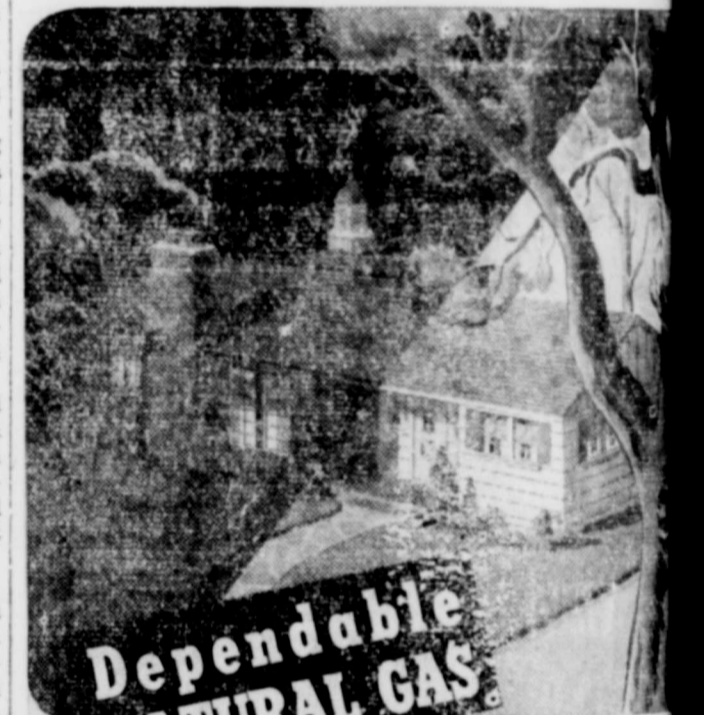
A Fish Story

9,000 Oldsmobiles From June 20 to 30

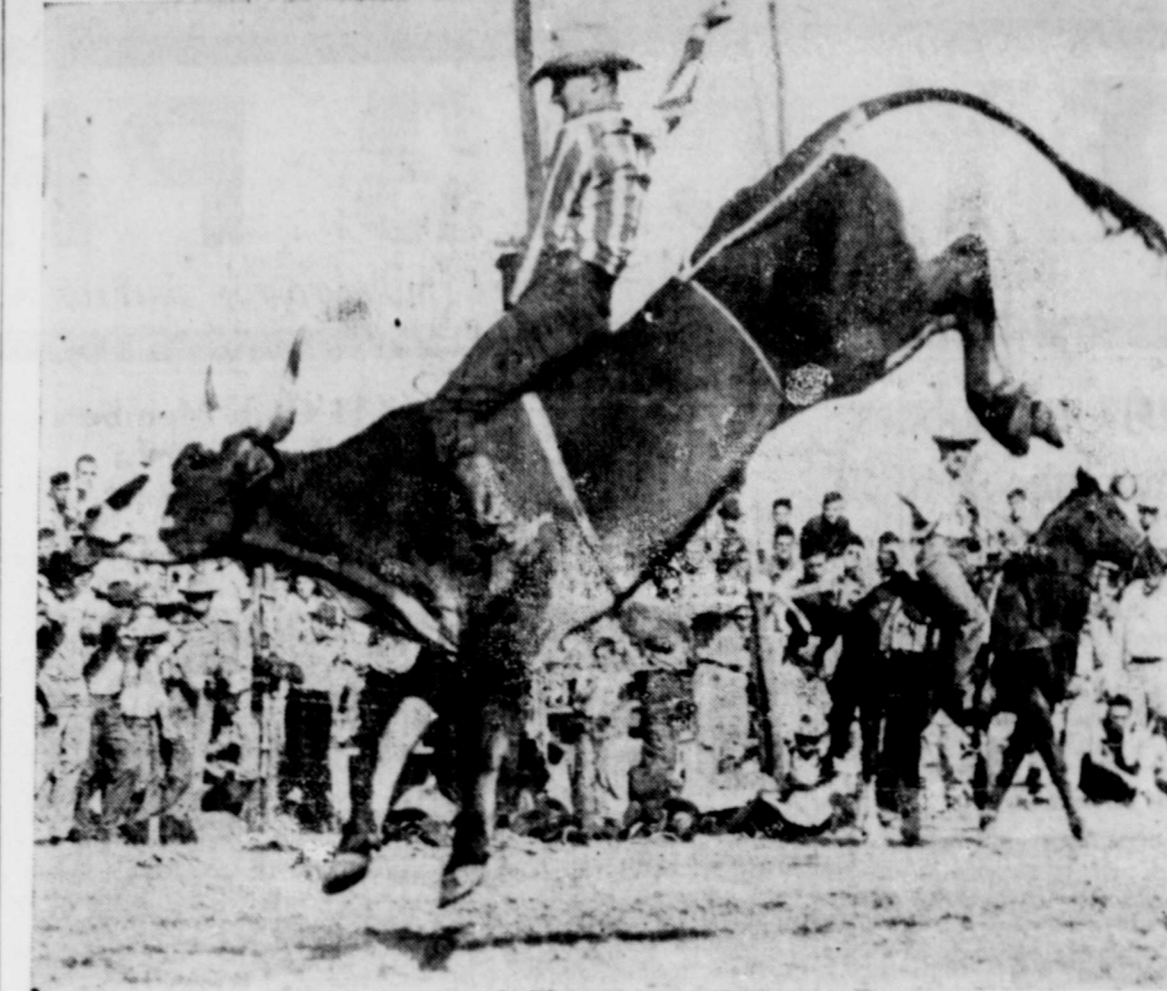

Those tough, hump-backed Brahmas are known for their ability to dislodge cowboys from their backs, and once the rider is thrown his troubles have just begun. Brahmas have big horns, are dangerous when angry, and a bull has never left a chute yet that wasn't plenty mad. They will fight a man-on-a-horse as readily as a man on foot. Fear is just not in their make-up. The old bull pictured above is No. 2, one of the many in the Beutler Bros. string of wild buckers. Each bull has a system of his own to get rid of a wouldbe rider. Some come out of the chute twisting and turning in the same direction. Others suddenly reverse the field and this is usually when some cowboy bites the dust. Still others depend on going high in the air with a kind of double action of the rear quarters to accomplish their aim—throw the rider then try to gore him with their horns. Some depend on straight hard bucking; high in the air then hitting the ground with their fore legs stiff. Any system they use is plenty rough.

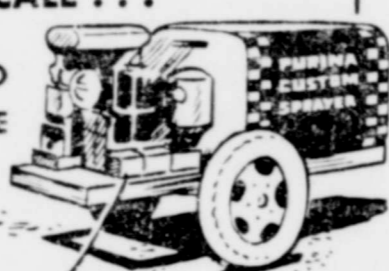

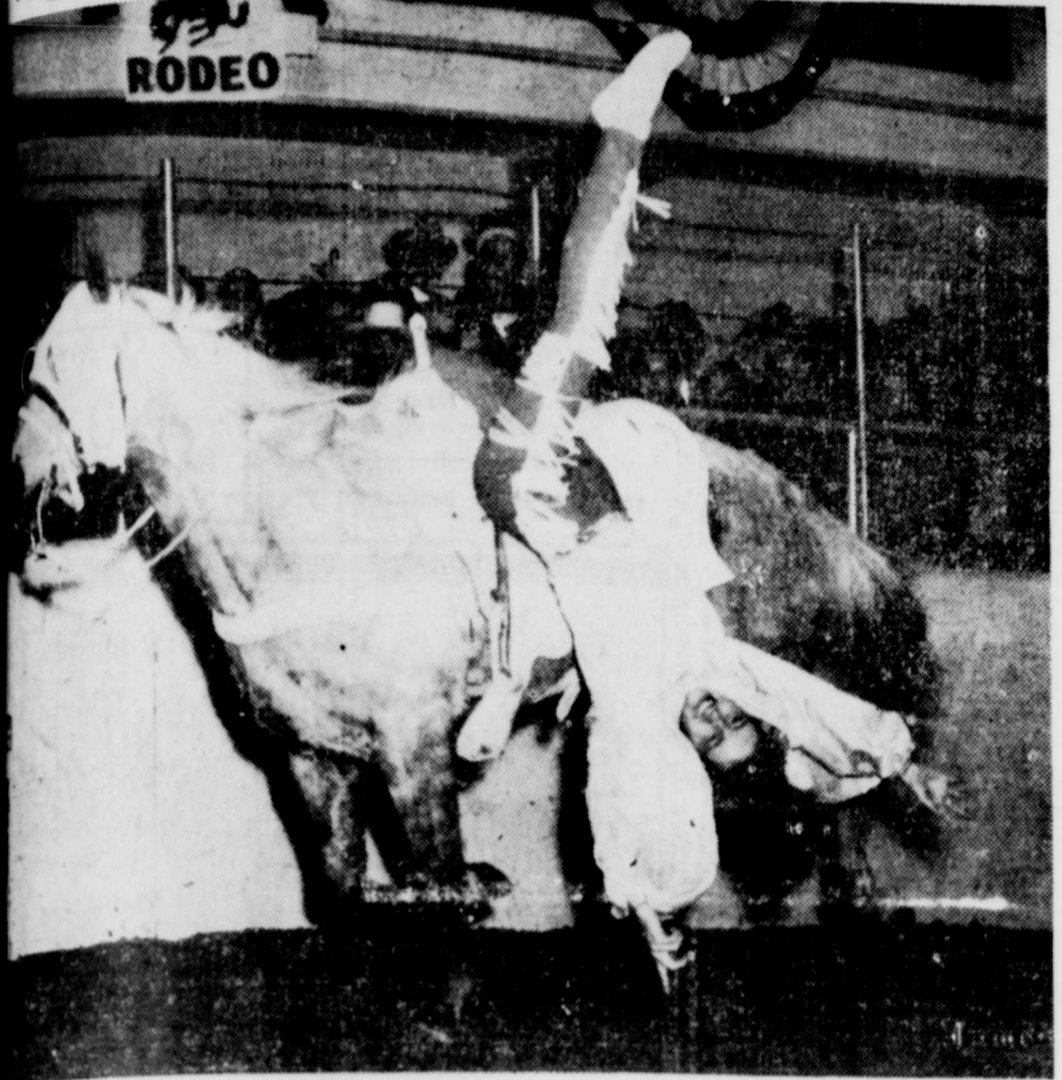

Wichita County Farm Bureau News

By Senator "Cotton" George Moffett. In the days following the untimely passing of Governor Beauford Jester, there have been many inquiries as to who now becomes the lieutenant-governor. The answer is that since Lieutenant-Governor Alan Shivers has moved up to the governor's chair that the lieutenant-governor's office is actually vacant. However, the state constitution provides that in such a case the president pro tempore (temporary president) of the senate shall perform the duties of the lieutenant-governor. Therefore, Sen. G. C. Morris of Greenville, who was elected president pro tempore of the senate on the last day of the session, will now become the acting lieutenant-governor, and if Governor Shivers leaves the state Senator Morris will become acting governor during his absence. When a special session of the legislature is called, probably in January of 1950, the senate will elect another of its members as president pro tempore. Therefore, Senator Morris's term will only be temporary.

Since the unfortunate death of Governor Jester occurred only five days after the legislature had adjourned, there were dozens of bills on his desk awaiting his approval or veto. The constitution provides that the governor shall have twenty days, exclusive of Sundays, in which to act upon bills reaching his desk during the last ten days of a session; therefore, Governor Shivers will now find it his duty to approve or veto

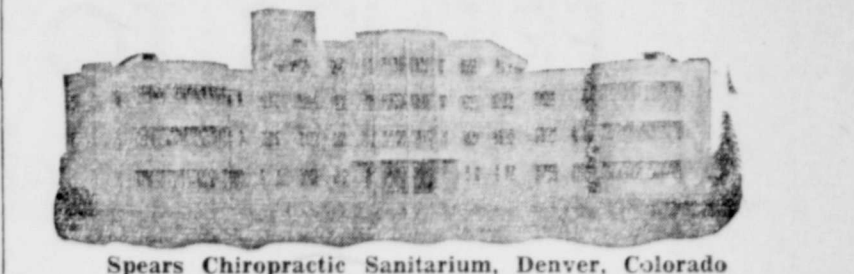

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

1.2 miles of terraces have been constructed on the Oscar Klinkerman farm North of Iowa Park this week. The terraces were constructed by elevating terracer. The Soil Conservation Service run the terrace lines.

1.3 miles of terraces were run this week on the Nieman Estate farm North of Pumpkin Center, and 1.8 miles of terraces on the Malinda Bingel farm of the same community. C. H. Arnold is the tenant on these farms. Commissioner H. H. Haynes of Electra will construct the terraces.

Several cooperators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District are now leveling land, constructing borders, and new irrigation laterals on their farms. Some of the farmers carrying out these practices are Rufus King, Louie McCarthy, the Malabar Farm, and C. H. Adams. Most of the land that is being leveled will be planted to alfalfa for hay and pasture and to cool weather grass mix of Perennial Rye, Orchard grass, Alta Fescue, and Brome grasses with suitable legume. Equipment owned by the irrigation district is doing most of the work.

The week of July 24th thru July 30th has been proclaimed by the President of the United States as "National Farm Safety Week." In 1948 at least one resident of each six farms throughout the Nation was victim of an accident involving valuable time loss (17 million man days) the total medical bill from such accidents amounted to 36 million dollars. Most accidents can be prevented with proper precautions and care.

Most farmers are following the practice of stubble mulching each year. Stubble mulching is the leaving of crop residue on or near soil surface. By having crop residue on soil surface it helps retard wind erosion, increases organic matter in top layers of soil and this increases water holding capacity of soil. Probably the increase in wheat yields the last few years, over years in the past, can be attributed to the return of straw to land by combine, chisel plow, more power and better farming implements.

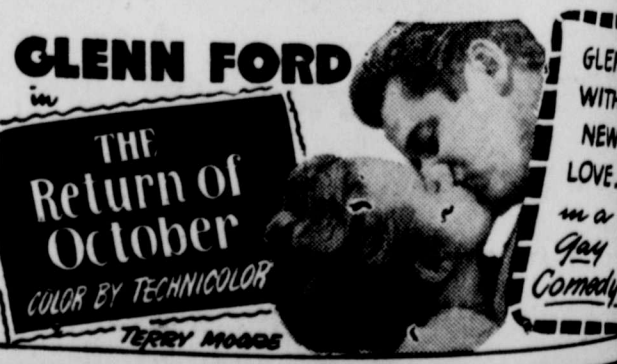
