Maskat Temple divided its \$4,000 among four children's organizations in Wichita Falls. Oklahoma has yet to win a game in the Oil Bowl, but the Sooner coaches this year have vowed they have the boys now to do it.

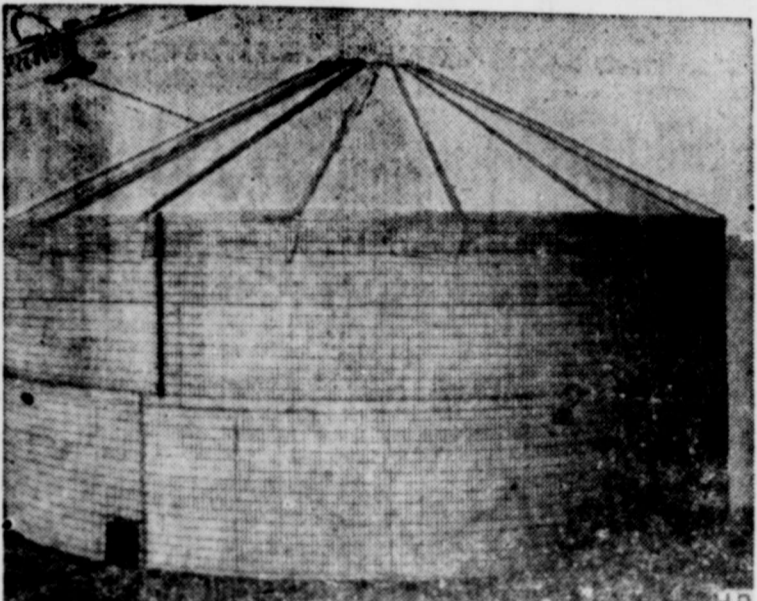
Tips to Farmers:

Roll Roofing Grain Bin Easily Built

Use in farm areas where storage facilities are inadequate. A weather-tight grain bin built of asphalt roll roofing and welded wire fencing gives it an appeal to farmers who are confronted with the alternative of building bins themselves or letting grain stay in piles on open ground.

As a basis is placed on grain bins, estimates that the 1949 crop will be about 1,300,000 bushels, almost as great as in 1947 when an all-time high was reached. Including a hold-over from last year of more than 1,000,000 bushels, the total supply will be greater than the big harvests of other years. Big harvests of other crops also are expected to exceed storage space now available.

While the Commodity Corporation is guaranteeing loans up to 85 percent of the cost necessary to construct bins on farms in some cases, the CCC makes loans available.



This grain bin, made of asphalt roll roofing and welded wire fencing has a capacity of about 1,300 bushels. It can be constructed in about 30 man-hours of work.

Crops Gain in Value

Farmers who need storage for wheat, corn, rye, oats, and grain sorghums are eligible for loans on this basis. Applications should be made to the Agricultural Conservation Committee.

An overall incentive to build, because the cost of construction would be paid back by the value of stored grain in the next few years under government's price support plan.

It has been shown that the roll-roofed grain bin, which was developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for storing dry grain, can be constructed in 30 man-hours. Circular in plan, the bin is filled with material. The second strip of roofing is added and fastened to the first strip with twists of wire. The second strip of roofing is put in place and more grain is added;

forming a circle, 16 feet in diameter, on the ground with a 50-foot length of 48-inch-wide wire fencing. Ends of the fencing are joined. Asphalt roll roofing, 55-pound or heavier, is placed inside the fencing and temporarily held in place by clamps made of wooden lath.

All Joints Cemented

The floor is made of overlapping strips of roofing, turned up about 6 inches where they meet the wall. All floor joints, as well as the joints in the wall, are cemented with asphalt cement.

After the floor is laid, the bin is filled with grain to 6 inches of the top of the first strip of roofing material. The second strip of roofing is added and fastened to the first strip with twists of wire. The second strip of roofing is put in place and more grain is added;

then the third strip of roofing and still more grain, heaped to form a cone.

The roof consists of triangular pieces of roll roofing, lapping each other slightly as they are laid with their points at the top of the cone. They are supported by 1-by-4-inch rafters which lie under the joints and meet at a wire mesh collar at the top. The side laps of the triangular pieces are fastened by putting a lath over each lap and nailing through it to the rafter beneath. A cap of roll roofing and hardware cloth goes on top of the cone.

Estimated cost of materials for a bin of this type is \$50. Complete instructions for building have been published by the Department of Agriculture and can be requested of county agricultural agents.

Does she throw it at you in the shape of a plain patty? Indeed not. If it be a patty she seasons it with thyme, onion, parsley, salt and pepper. Sour cream is added to pan drippings after patties are sauteed and there is the most delectable gravy to top a meat dish fit for a king.

For another occasion a small nugget of golden cheese is buried in the center of beef patties to surprise and please the happy diner. Then when ground round goes to a meat loaf, it becomes a "different" meat loaf. Without a trace of bread crumbs, this specialty calls for chopped vegetables instead. It, too, is well seasoned. It, too, is just plain delicious.

If economy is an issue, a genius of the kitchen, such as Best Foods' home economist Nancy Holmes, would combine ground beef with feather-light Pinwheel Biscuits and turn out a dish all the family will go for.

Beef and Pinwheel Biscuit Casserole

3/4 to 1 lb ground beef 1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 small onion, chopped 4 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons 1 can green peas
vitaminized margarine 1 recipe baking powder biscuit dough
1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup chopped parsley

Brown beef and onion in margarine. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and flour. Stir in peas. Pour in greased shallow casserole. Set aside. Make biscuit dough, turn out on lightly floured board and knead gently 1/2 minute. Roll or pat 1/2 inch thick and spread with melted margarine; sprinkle with chopped parsley and roll up like a jelly roll. Cut in 1/2 inch slices and place cut side down on top of meat and vegetable mixture. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

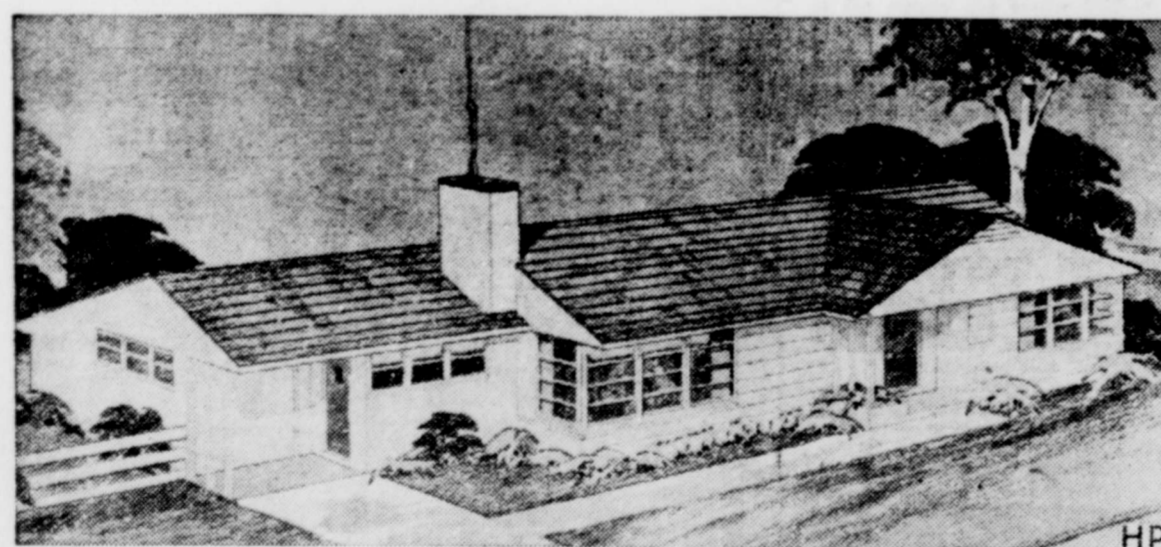

Single-Story House Has Plenty of Space

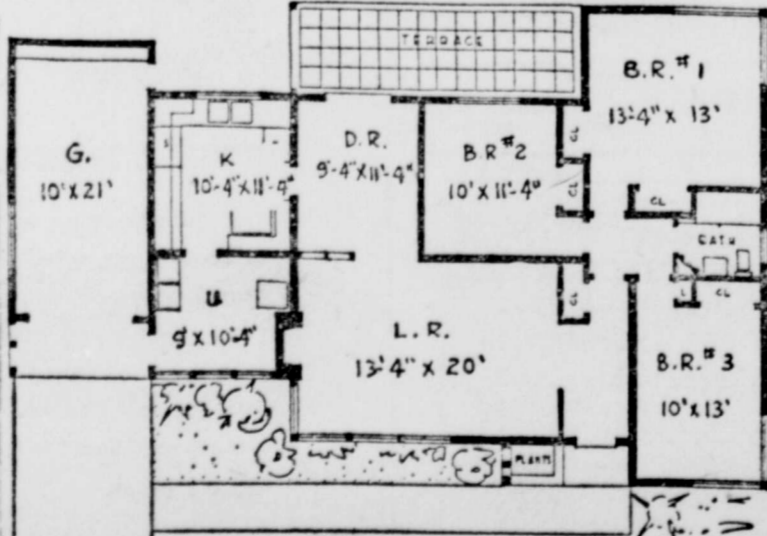

Overall width of the house is 58 feet. A 65-foot lot or a 50-foot corner lot would be required. Mr. Anicka, who is consulting architect of American Builder magazine, gives the area of the house as 1,310 square feet and the cubic content as 15,720 square feet, figures useful in estimating approximate construction cost.

Exterior sidewalls would be of wood or cinder block, painted white. The architect recommends a roof of fire-resistant asphalt shingles, offering the owner a wide choice of colors for enhancing the attractiveness of his home.

The living room-dining room combination forms the nucleus of the home, and the spacious terrace is convenient for outdoor living. The kitchen is readily accessible to the utility room and



the garage and contains a built-in breakfast set. Cupboard space in the kitchen is abundant. As an economy measure, the basement is eliminated and radiant heating is provided.
