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SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Approximately three-fourths of the terrace has been built on the H. C. Obenhaus farm. The terrace will have well vegetated buffer strips. George Streit is assisting on his farm. The Soil Conservation Service is assisting the Wicher-Wichita Soil Conservation District run the lines.

A pond is now in progress on the Har-raming farm East of the pond will have over 100 feet depth which will provide water supply. The evaporation for this state is usually about 40 inches per year. Therefore, it is essential to have a deep pond.

Elevated irrigation lateral constructed on the Carl farm East of Wichita. Elevated irrigated ditches much better opportunity to receive a bigger water, and to, most of

the water is above land to be watered. When ditches of this kind are constructed, with check and tile turn outs installed into borders most farmers report irrigation time is cut in half.

Dewey Steed who owns an irrigated farm South of Iowa Park reports he can tell to the row on his cotton where he had clover and grass last year. He states the cotton has much greener color and is several inches taller than on land where no clover was grown. He also states there is great difference in ability of soil to absorb water on clover and grass land over the non-clover land. On the first watering this year he thought water was running in holes since it traveled so slow down the row. Clover with its large tap root penetrates sub-soil areas of soil and is an excellent soil conditioner. Mr. Steed is definitely of the opinion that clover and grasses have a place in the irrigation valley as a money crop by grazing and soil conditioner.

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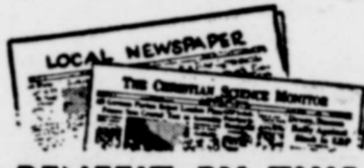

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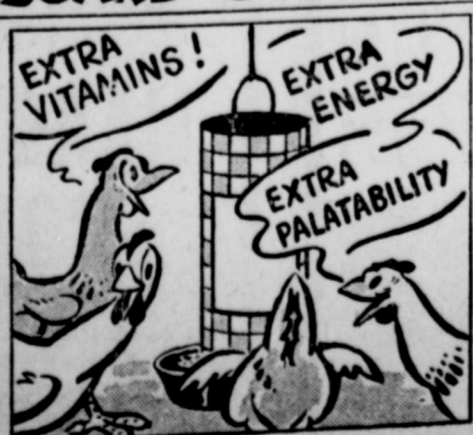

Pack Eggs in Cases With Large Ends Up

Eggs should be packed in cases with the large ends of the eggs up, according to J. W. Goble, poultry and egg marketing specialist at the University of Nebraska.

The air cell of an egg is at the large end, and if the egg is inverted the cell might break loose. Mr. Goble says government standards prohibit grading an egg with a loose air cell higher than Grade B.

Pack puffed rice mixture in bottom and on sides of greased custard cups leaving center part hollow to make a cone. Cool thoroughly. Remove cones from custard cups. Fill with ice cream. Makes 12 cones.

Washington News Letter

Congressman Ed Gossett

The House this week cut five hundred and eighty million dollars off the Administration's one billion four hundred and fifty million dollar program for military aid to Europe. Notwithstanding some of the speeches made in the Congress, none of our military experts in their testimony before the House Committee on Foreign Affairs would say that this military aid program was necessary. They did advocate the program but refused to go on record to the effect that it was vital in any way to our national defense. As a matter of fact, the House action did not drastically curtail the program. The Administration's bill called for a two year authorization, whereas the House bill provides for only a one year program. Those of us supporting this cut — the reduction from two years to one year — want to see how the program works out. We want to know how these European countries use the supplies to be furnished. These European countries have not yet worked out a plan for the use of this equipment. If they use it efficiently, if they work out a sound program of self-help, then Congress will probably go along with further aid. Otherwise, the program will be reduced rather than increased by subsequent Congresses. From my brief travels in Europe, and from my study of European affairs, it seems to me that the biggest need of those folks is to go to work. Someone has said that the only thing wrong with Europe is Europeans. In many places in Europe, it seemed to me the people were putting in one half their time making wine, and the other half drinking it. While in Paris and Madrid last

October, I was impressed with the vast numbers of peoples on the streets in both cities who were trying to sell lottery tickets. Both France and Spain conduct national lotteries as a means of raising public funds. This, to my mind, indicates a form of national depravity. (Incidentally, I am glad to see our F. C. C. cracking down on these radio give-away programs. They . . . should be stopped.) Furnishing guns to Europeans is not going to make good soldiers out of them. Furnishing them billions in equipment is not necessarily going to make them work. On Monday of this week, Representative Francis Walter, of Pennsylvania, introduced two new Tidelands bills. He did this at the request of the Speaker of the House, the Honorable Sam Rayburn, of Texas. One bill is known as the Administration bill, the other as the States' bill. Both bills were drawn as a result of several months of negotiations between State officials and Federal officials in an effort to reach a compromise on the tidelands issue. The chief difference between the two bills is in the matter of control and ownership. Both bills provide

that the States shall receive 62½ per cent of the income from submerged lands, i. e., the so-called Tidelands, while the Federal government will receive 37½ per cent. Both bills provide that the States and the Federal government will share 50-50 in the income from the Continental Shelf, i. e., the area beyond the so-called marginal sea. Tidelands is somewhat a misnomer. What is meant by tide-lands, as currently used, is the area from the low watermark three miles seaward. In the case of Texas, however, this means the area from low water mark ten and one-half miles seaward, or three marine leagues. The Texas boundary was described by the Republic of Texas in 1836 by metes and bounds. Our boundary was reaffirmed in the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, and was recognized by all the nations at that time, including the United States of America. It described our boundary as beginning at the mouth of the Sabine River, thence extending into the Gulf three marine leagues from the shore, and extending in a line parallel to the shore to a point opposite to the mouth of the Rio Grande, and thence up the Rio Grande including what we know as the Republic which then included portions of New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Oklahoma and Kansas.

In the so-called States' compromise bill, the Texas boundary is recognized to conform with the line set up by the Republic of Texas. In the Administration's bill, our line is recognized as being only three miles seaward. Hearings on these two alleged compromise bills are set for Wednesday of this week. It is extremely doubtful that Congress can or will act on either of these bills during this session of Congress.

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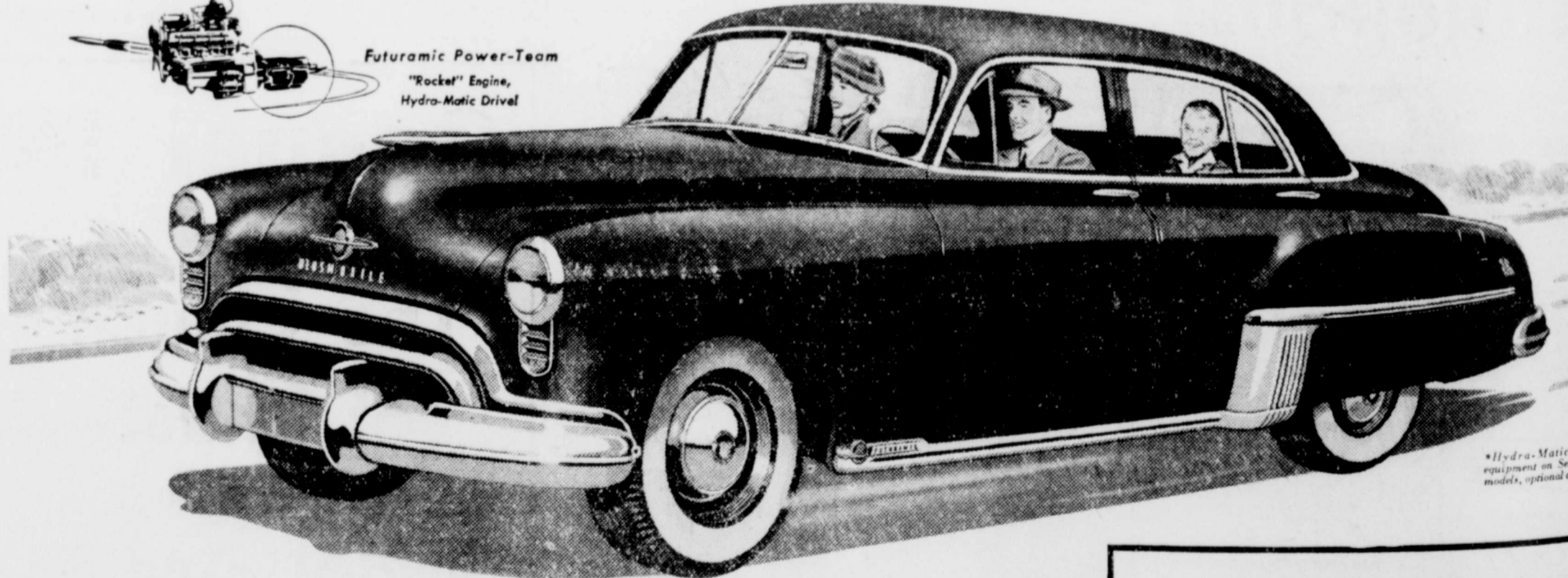

Buyers Like 'Package' Cost Of New Home

The "packaged mortgage," in which equipment and appliances are included in the selling price of a new home, is widely appreciated by home buyers and is helping to keep the sale of houses at record levels, according to American Builder magazine.
