### RULE MAN GOES WHOLE HOG OVER PIG BUSINESS

Wallace Allison of Rule has an air-conditioned pig pen. Not evaporative coolers, mind you. Refrigerated air. Two huge units, \$300.

"I thought he was joking," said Otis Cochran, the utilities salesman at nearby Stamford, who sold him the coolers.

"I ran across Wallace in a cafe and he said, 'Say, I've got a hog pen that I want air-conditioned.' I said 'fine.' I really thought he was kidding.

"Then he called the West Texas Utilities office. He wasn't kidding. So I sold him the coolers."

"The hog business has gotten

pretty advanced in the last few years," chuckled Allison, a bronzed, affable farmer whose land skirts this West Texas community.

He said some South Plains farmers installed refrigerated units several years ago and the use of evaporative coolers is widespread.

Allison raises purebred Hampshires, which he calls the "No. 1 meat hog."

Hampshires of all sizes and shapes roam his farm, which resembles a miniature military base as one approaches through vast cotton and maize fields.

Amid the cluster of buildings rises an air-conditioned farrowing house, a spotless maternity ward for the sanitary sow set. It is empty now.

But during the farrowing season, breed sows jam the building, floundering in cool comfort while their litters frolic under heat lamps.

"The summer before last, I lost 60 pigs," Allison said. "Heat. That's all it was." Then he decided to go whole hog, so to speak.

So last summer he installed the coolers to combat the fierce Texas heat and cut down on moisture which he said contributes to a variety of diseases, some fatal.

"When I got that first electric bill, well, I wondered if it was worth it," he laughed. But it cut his losses 99 per cent. "So it was worth it."

He added:

"The major problem now is my wife. She wants refrigerated air, too."

### VIETNAM VIEW

For Corporal Robert T. McCarter, the word responsibility means more than family, civilian job, friends, and that sort of thing. It means the lives of the men of the 1st Platoon, "B" Co., 1st Bn., Fifth Marine Regiment.

McCarter, 20, Greer, S. C., began his tour of duty in Vietnam last March as a fire-team leader. In less than a month he advanced to squad leader, and only three months after his tour began he found himself in the position of platoon sergeant.

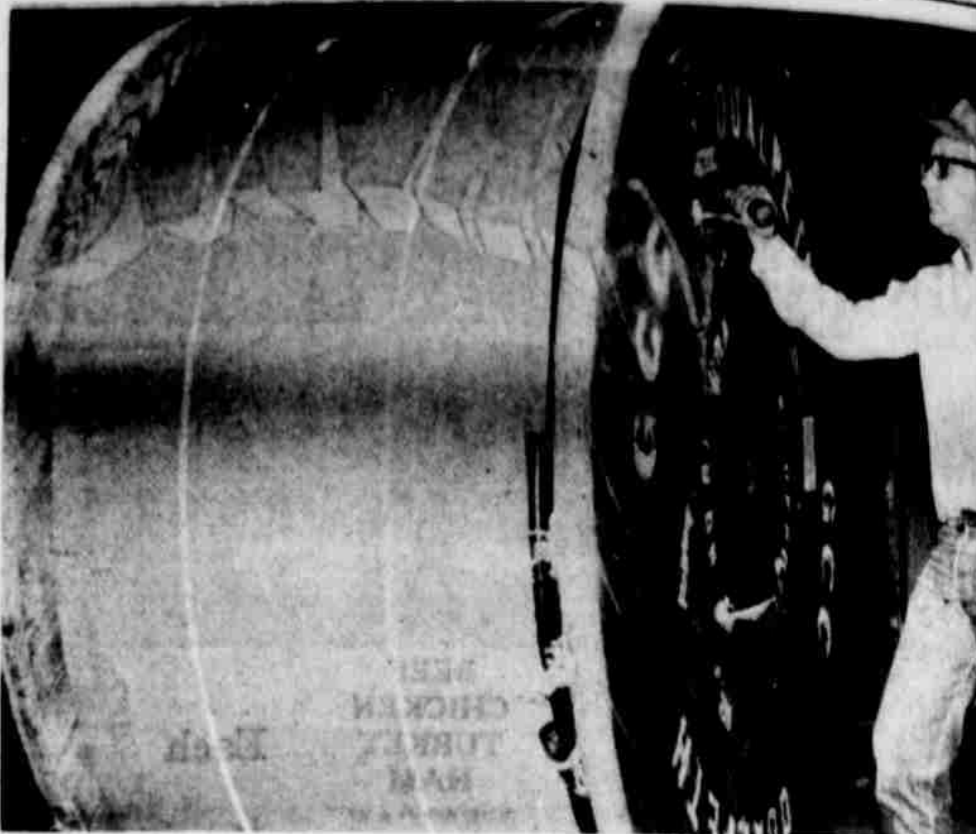
Then, on September 15, when his platoon commander became hospitalized, McCarter took over that job.

Going from fire-team leader to platoon commander in less than six months might cause problems for some people, but not for McCarter.

"I really like the responsibility. It was a little strange at first, I'll have to admit," he commented. "But I've been fortunate to have a lot of good men to work with."

He went on to say, "Once or twice at the beginning I found myself hesitating to give orders, or tell a man to do something which only a little while ago I was being told to do. But now I've gotten over that feeling and everything goes smoothly."

His men respect their tempo-

they just kept coming.

"The babies were estimated to weigh between four and one-half pounds.

The babies are doing fine. All the mothers, except one, returned to their homes. The other was taken to Da Nang to live with relatives.

"One thing seems kind of strange, though," states the doctor.

"After the babies are delivered, the mothers light up a Vietnamese cigar, shake our hands, take their babies and leave."

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### Cotton Classing Report

Receipts at the Munday Cotton Classing office increased and almost 13,000 samples were classed for the week ending November 1, according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the U.S.-D.A. Consumer and Marketing Service Office.

Grades remained high but percentage of Light Spotted grades increased. White grades made up 52 percent of the week's classing with 41 percent in the Middling grade. Light Spotted grades accounted for 47 percent of the volume with 37 percent being in the Middling Light Spotted grade.

Staple lengths stayed near the same with 15 percent 29/32, 38 percent 15/16, 9 percent 31/32, 13 percent 1 inch, 7 percent 1-1/32, 19 percent 1-1/16 and 4 percent 1-3/32 and longer.

Micronaire readings continued to drop and this week's tests showed 75 percent in the premium range of 3.5-4.9, 22 percent 5.0-5.2, and 3 percent 5.3 and higher.

Pressley test results on fiber strength continued to be high. Market activity has been slow with a few scattered sales of mixed lots selling at 300 to 400 points over CCC Loan price.

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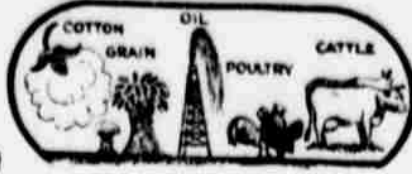

### Stitching And Stewing

By Ruth Ann Fansler  
County H. D. Agent

The spider is an unwelcome guest in the home; but as the temperatures drop in the Fall, spiders invade the home in search of a suitable place to set up for the winter.

To prevent spiders from making your home their home, sprays (probably best) or dust containing lindane, dieldrin, or chlordane can be used effectively. When using these insecticides, follow the directions on the manufacturer's label for mixing sprays.

The outside walls, foundation, and about five to six inches of soil surface next to the foundation should be treated. Special attention should be paid to cracks and crevices that spiders might use to gain entrance into the house. Insecticides can be painted onto window sills and door thresholds with a paint brush.

Frequent cleaning of closets, cellars and other places which are not disturbed often, will decrease the number of spiders. A 0.2 to 0.5 per cent lindane, 0.5 percent dieldrin, or 2 per cent chlordane household spray can be used in areas within the home where spiders are found. These materials can also be used to treat door facings, around windows, and around bathroom fixtures to keep spiders on the outside.
