Water Emergency Declared In Burk

Citizens Requested To Stop Watering Lawns, Shrubs

An emergency has been declared by the water situation in Burkburnett. Continued drought has brought no relief for water-thirsty grass, plants and shrubs. As a result, people have tried to supply this needed water by running their hoses day and night, to bring water consumption to an all time high—well above 600,000 gallons per day.

Storage Low
Storage at the water plant has steadily dropped in the last week until the supply on hand is alarmingly low.

Voluntary Conservation Not Satisfactory

Last week an appeal was issued asking that citizens cooperate in conservation by alternating with their neighbors on days of watering in yards. That appeal was not heeded, even to a small degree. Instead of conserving water, consumption increased every day since the appeal was made. A lot of people have shown little regard for the needs of their neighbors. While people in the south part of town were running their hoses full blast in their yards, while people in the west and north part of town could not get enough to drink. For as many as three hours in the evenings not a trickle would come out in some parts of the city. Those living in the south part of town have an advantage. As long as the pumps are running they can always get water, but the north part of town, which is quite a bit higher, and the west part of town, farthest from the pump station, will have empty mains. It is unfair to take advantage of our neighbors in their helplessness.

Problem Being Studied

City Manager Leon Carver and the City Councilmen are trying to work out measures to give everybody enough water for necessities. It can and will be solved. Measures taken will be drastic enough to control the situation. If necessary, those who do not heed the NO WATERING warning will be cut off entirely. It is hoped such action will not be necessary. But, an emergency must be combated with whatever steps necessary.

CEASE ALL WATERING IN YARDS AND GARDENS IMMEDIATELY. THIS MEANS EVERYBODY.

This emergency will exist until rain comes and/or we get relief from extreme heat.

City Discontinues Discount On Bills

The City of Burkburnett is discontinuing its practice of allowing a 10 per cent discount on Utility Bills. Bills soon to be made out (to cover part of July and up to meter reading time, August 10-15) will not carry the discount.

Bills already mailed out, payable by the 10th of August, carry the discount.

The new billing method will greatly simplify work in the office, cut down the possibility of errors, both at billing time and at the time bills are being paid. Under the new system the billing machine, which carries five totals forward, can be used to carry the total number of gallons of water and the kw's of electricity billed for. By taking the number of gallons of water pumper from the plant and the number of kw's generated at the plant, and comparing the figures, losses can be noted and corrected.

Texas Electric to Co-operate
Texas Electric Service Company is also discontinuing discounts on bills, in accordance with the charter they operate under here, and their agreement with the City.

Payment of delinquent bills will also be pressed, even to the point of cutting off service if satisfactory arrangements for payment are not made. By another agreement between the two distributors of service, a customer who has been cut off by one company may not get service from the other until the original bill has been paid.

City of Burk Buys Police Patrol Car

City Councilmen Monday night accepted the lowest bid submitted on furnishing the Police Department with a new patrol car. The car will be a 1951 Chevrolet two-door sedan, to be purchased from the Acme Chevrolet Company. Two other bids were considered.

Delivery of the new car will be made about the 20th of August, complete with large siren, red blinker lights and other equipment considered necessary for such a car.

W. D. McFarlane Announces For Congress 13th Dist.



Graham, Texas, August 6th—W. D. McFarlane opened his candidacy for Congress, in the special election to be held September 8th, in his hometown, Graham, Saturday evening, August 4th, speaking to a large and enthusiastic crowd on the Court-house lawn. He was introduced by John J. Gallaher, prominent Graham businessman and former mayor. Mr. Gallaher cited Mr. McFarlane's record of service which includes eight years in the House and Senate of Texas and six years in the United States Congress, his outstanding legal career, and his proved ability to render to the people of this district honest, efficient service. He added to this the pride and esteem with which Bill McFarlane is held by those in Graham, his hometown for thirty years.

Mr. McFarlane, expressing his deep appreciation for the honor paid him on opening his campaign by his hometown, stressed that he has "always been a candidate on my record of service rendered and not on the demerits of any other candidate, and in this campaign I hope to keep the discussion strictly upon the issues now pending solution before the people. I have voted consistently for what I believed to be right, whether or not it agreed with the administration program."

The platform upon which I ask the privilege of representing the people of this district is as follows:

1. National Defense:

I have favored a National Defense second to none. As a World War I veteran I became acquainted with our national defense equipment, as a member of the House Naval Affairs and Appropriations Committees I have become familiar with and have continued an active interest in the problems confronting the national defense program in Congress.

2. Agriculture:

I have always favored parity for farm and ranch products. We should continue the program of assistance to the farm, including soil conservation, rural electrification and cost of production plus a reasonable profit on all agricultural products. We should continue to improve federal highway aid for farm-to-market roads.

3. Labor and Management:

I have favored fair treatment for labor and management to protect each other's rights. We should now enact such legislation as is desirable: to establish a just body of rules to assure free and effective collective bargaining to determine in the public interest the rights of employees and employers and to enable unions to keep their memberships free from communistic influences.

4. Anti-Trust Laws:

I have favored strengthening and intensifying enforcement of anti-trust laws. We should enact legislation providing that violation of our anti-trust laws should be punished on the same basis as violations of other criminal laws. We must stop monopolies, unfair trade practices and unfair competition and give

Private Enterprise Did The Job

August 26th will mark the beginning of Farm Electrification Week. During the Week, one of the greatest advances in the history of agriculture will be celebrated. Power has literally revolutionized life and work on the farm.

Moreover, this week will also be a testimonial to the spirit and progress of the light and power industry, which pioneered rural electrification, led in its development across the continent, and still leads. The first experimental rural power line was built only 28 years ago. Today some 94 per cent of all the occupied farms in America have electricity available, and the great bulk of them are using it. And 80 per cent of the farms are served by the private utilities, either directly over their own lines or through local farm electrical co-operatives.

Electricity is the cheapest and most efficient "servant" the farmer has. Last year, the cost of power amounted to only 1.29 per cent of total farm income. And in the matter of cost, private enterprise, not government enterprise, does the job of serving the farm for the least money. On the average, the government's so-called super-cooperative generating plants charge local co-ops 1.48 cents per kilowatt hour. Municipal systems charge 1.22 cents. And business-managed power companies charge but 0.93 cents—despite the fact that these companies pay heavy taxes and the government systems do not.

The job of making power available to rural America is virtually complete. But agricultural use of power is still in its infancy—in the future, the farm experts say, the average farmer will consume ever-increasing amounts. Taxpayers free enterprise will see that he gets all he wants, at the lowest possible cost.

CONFISCATION

Late in June, Roswell Magill, Chairman of the Committee on Federal Tax Policy, issued a statement in which he said: "The tax bill just passed by the House of Representatives is the largest and probably the most badly devised tax measure in our history. At a time when we are relying heavily on increased production to strengthen our defenses, the new tax bill incorporates confiscatory rates on individuals and corporations and thus levels serious blows against the nation's productive machine by destroying incentives to build up production—

"The bill as passed includes . . . a 94½ per cent rate on incomes over \$80,000, subject to an over-all ceiling of 90 per cent of an individual's taxable income. How much incentive to expand production remains with a taxpayer who is allowed to keep only 5½ cents of every additional dollar he earns? How much is his incentive increased when the 90 per cent ceiling applies and he can keep 10 cents of every dollar of his taxable income—in some cases, not even enough to pay his state income taxes?"

Mr. Magill found that the bill contains fundamental shortcomings all in three main categories of tax revenue—individual income tax, corporate income tax, and excises. And, if the Administration has its way, taxes will be jacked up higher yet—and more barriers will be placed in the way of the way of the country's ability to produce the goods we need for war and peace.

Current tax policy totally overlooks the fact that rigid government economy should precede any tax increases, and that confiscatory taxation can destroy a nation from within—which is just what the Communists are hoping for in our case.

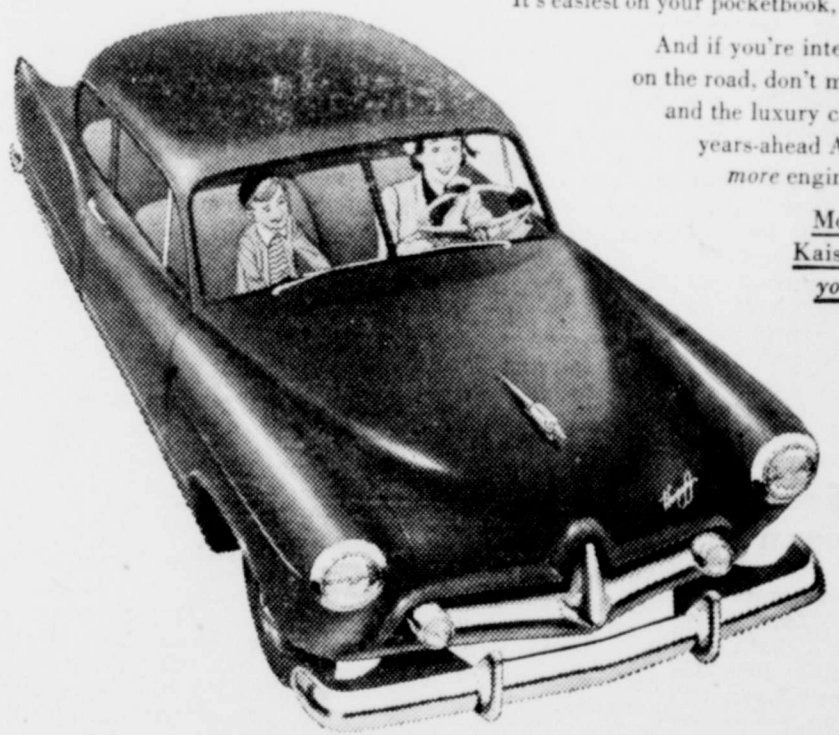

W. D. McFarlane Opens Campaign For Congress



Graham, Texas. — W. D. McFarlane announced last Saturday his candidacy for Congress in the Special Election to be held in the thirteenth district September 8th. 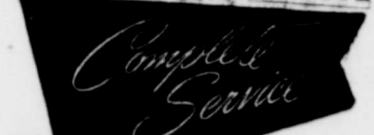

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING A MINIMUM RATE TO BE CHARGED BY ANY PERSON, PERSONS, FIRMS OR CORPORATION SELLING ELECTRICAL ENERGY, POWER, OR JUICE IN THE CITY OF BURKBURNETT, COUNTY OF WICHITA, STATE OF TEXAS AND PENALTY.

SECTION 1.
RATES: The following rates are hereby established as the minimum monthly amount that shall be collected by any seller of electrical energy, power, or current within the City Limits of Burkburnett, County of Wichita, Texas:

Residence
Minimum \$1.00
1st 20 kw @ \$.08
all over 20 kw @ \$.05

Commercial
Minimum \$1.00
1st 100 kw @ \$.07
2nd 100 kw @ \$.06
all over 200 kw @ \$.03

Stove Rate
Minimum \$3.00
30 kw @ \$.10
all over 30 kw @ \$.03

SECTION 2. It being deemed by the City Council that an emergency exists, this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and publication according to law.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. Any person, firm, corporation or company violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200. Each violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

Burkburnett X-Ray Days Are August 9th and 10th at Mills & Fleming Store

The 1951 Chest X-Ray Survey for Wichita County beginning on August 9th at the Mills and Fleming Feed Store is made possible by several agencies: The Texas State Department of Health.

The Wichita County Tuberculosis Association. The Wichita Health Unit. Approval for the survey was authorized by the Wichita County Medical Society.

The Texas State Department of Health is furnishing the three X-Ray machines and 6 X-Ray technicians, two for each machine.

The Wichita County Tuberculosis Association made the request for the Survey and is coordinating all schedules and all other activities incident to the survey.

The Wichita Health Unit is to be responsible for all "follow-up" work, by public health nurses calling at the homes of families where an X-ray reveals a chest "condition," whether tuberculosis — either in minimal, moderately advanced or far advanced stage; chest tumor, chest cancer, or heart abnormality. If tuberculosis exists, each member of the family and all close contacts will be urged to visit the Wichita Health Unit to be given a free X-ray. (Each active tuberculous person usually spreads his germs to several others, thus endangering their health.)

Who Is To Be Given X-Rays
 Every person who has passed his or her 15th birthday.

In County X-ray surveys thru out the United States, whether the service is performed by the US Public Health, a State Health Department, or a Tuberculosis Association, no one under 15 years is X-rayed. This is because tuberculosis, usually, does not manifest itself before that age. If older members of a family are found to have the disease, then all persons in the family will be given a FREE X-ray at the Wichita Health Unit. (The X-ray machine at the Health Unit was bought and paid for from tuberculosis Christmas Seals — the Only Source of Income to the TB Association.)

No person or agency is given information on results of X-ray findings except the Wichita Health Unit. The Health Unit guards that information with the strictest of secrecy. The Health Unit is given that information SOLELY for the purpose of tak-

ing the necessary steps to protect the health and lives of all concerned.

Reports of X-Ray Pictures
 When people are given X-Rays they usually inquire when they will hear from the examination. Each person will be notified within two or three weeks after his or her X-ray is taken. Each person will receive the post card which volunteer workers will fill in, attached to the official report.

small business an equal opportunity to survive and prosper.
5. Rights of the Aged and the Veteran:
I have always voted for uniform treatment and benefits for veterans, their widows, and orphans. Their rights under law should be made uniform for all wars, including the Korean, which so far has received little consideration by congress. I have voted for the Social Security Act and the corrective amendments to provide \$40 per month pensions for the aged. We should now increase old age assistance commensurate with the increased cost of living.

6. States Rights Free From Federal Domination:
I have favored states rights whenever this question has arisen and favor the states' title claim to the submerged lands.

7. Debts and Taxes:
As a member of the Appropriations Committee I have favored rigid economies in government spending and have advocated placing of safeguards on administrative agencies and limiting their expenditures. I favor reduction of taxes on incomes under \$10,000 and more liberal exemptions for each dependent. I have always favored retention of the community property exemptions and depletion allowances, which have been a part of the statutes for many years.

8. Socialized Medicine:
I am opposed to socialized medicine as it now exists in England. We should enact legislation that will encourage and provide more doctors, and thru insurance programs care for those unable to pay for needed care.

9. Foreign Affairs:
Under our bipartisan foreign policy we won World War II, and have been winning the cold war against communistic hostility whenever and wherever it has shown its ugly head. We should continue to strive for preparedness, not weakness; collective security, not isolation; our people everywhere want peace, not war.

10. Price and Wage Controls:
During the Korean situation and any other war emergency when and where our government is purchasing tremendous war supplies we should immediately have price and wage controls to protect consumers against the perils of inflation. Because the last three republican administrations followed their fundamental policy and principles that a government exists for the benefit of the privileged few, they wrecked our governmental economy. In this campaign it has been charged and not denied that the Republican National Committee has a man in Wichita Falls directing the republican candidate's campaign in this district, to try to win this race and thus lead us back down the road of Hoover's prosperity into an economic state of collapse. In 1932 the Democrats were entrusted with the responsibility of correcting these wrongs which under Republican neglect of the people's rights had blighted their hopes, had squandered the fruits of prosperity and had plunged the nation into the depths of our worst depression and despair.

You remember these chaotic conditions confronting the nation back in 1932. Cotton was selling at 5 cents per pound, corn at 10 cents per bushel, wheat at 25 cents per bushel, cattle at 3 cents per pound on the hoof, crude oil at ten cents per barrel and all other products in proportion. Our nation was staggering under the heavy load of poverty, unemployment, and want. Farms and homes were being foreclosed, by the thousands, and farm products were rotting in the fields for lack of a market and buying power to purchase them. Fifteen million men were unemployed.
