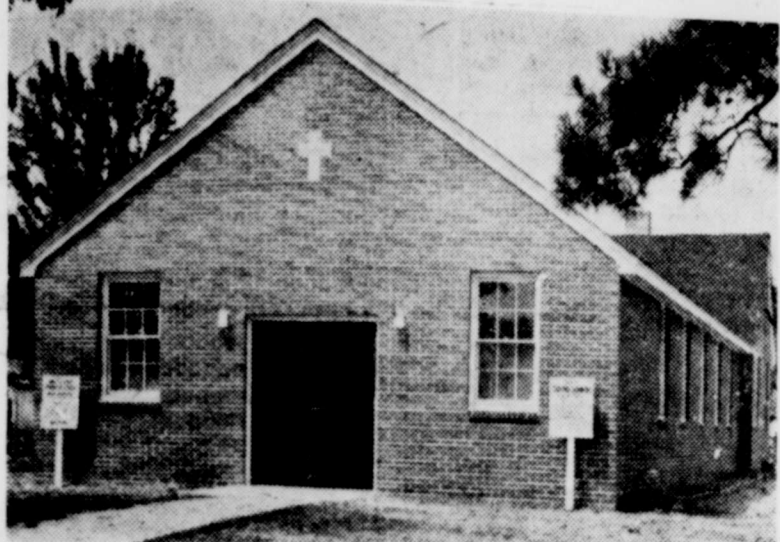

## Burk Overpowers Henrietta 52 to 6

Although the team from Henrietta was much larger, and had several men back from last year's team, the little Bulldogs scored against them almost at will here last Friday night.

Starting for Burk Burnett were Donald Gee, E. C. Mann, Jack Bernethy, Arnold Oliver, Wendell Hale, Don Joe Prescott, Harold Turnbow, Hugh (Pude) Fewin, James Kelley, Bowden Maben and Billy Bean.

**1st Quarter—**  
Hugh Fewin grabbed the opening kick-off and raced thru the whole opposing team 85 yds. for a touchdown. Several good blocks by his teammates made this beautiful run possible. The try for extra point was no good.

Minutes later Kelley went over from the 3 for six more points. Maben went off right tackle for the extra point.

Just a few plays later Kelley again scored around left end. Maben hustled around left end for the extra point.

**2nd Quarter—**  
Maben skirted 30 yards around left end for a touchdown. Kelley kicked the extra point.

**3rd Quarter—**  
James Kelley went 50 yards around left end for another score. Maben found easy going around right end for the extra point, 34-0.

Kenneth Richardson, a young promising player found a hole off right tackle and dashed 39 yards for a tally. Kick ng. 40-0.

Wayne Walker passed to Charles Arnett for a 26 yard pass-touchdown play for Henrietta's lone score. The try for extra point was broken up.

**4th Quarter—**  
Coaches Tyler and Whitaker began sending in less experienced boys for get the feel of the game. They found they could score against the big boys too.

Gerry McCabe went around right end to cross the goal line. Richard Ragsdale's kick was too low for the extra point, 46-6.

Before the game ended, Lloyd Muhlinghouse found Harold Turnbow in the open and hit him with a pass on the 42 yard line on Henrietta's end of the field. Turnbow hooked up and went over without having a hand laid on him. The kick again failed, 52-6.

All the Burk boys who played looked much better than the previous Friday night. E. C. Mann, usually in on his share of breaking up opponent's plays, received a hard blow early in the game and was rendered more or less ineffective the balance of the game, though he rallied a few times to bring would-be ball-carriers down behind the line of scrimmage. Donald Gee was making tackles all over the field. His blocking was at times very effective. Billy Bean, moved from the line to blocking back is catching on fast. His blocking was responsible for many long gains for Burk, at times he was going into his block a little premature, killing its effectiveness.

First downs were Burk Burnett 12, Henrietta 6.

Henrietta made 14 incomplete passes and had four intercepted. They managed to complete five.

This Friday night the Bulldogs and a great number of local fans will go to Archer City.

## Open House Junior High School Sunday 2:30 to 5 P. M.

### Public Is Cordially Invited to Inspect New Bldg.

### Building Complete Some Equipment Lacking

Every citizen in this area is cordially invited to attend open house at Burk Burnett's new Junior High School, Sunday afternoon, September 30th, from 2:30 to 5:00 P. M., guests of the School Board and Officials of the Burk Burnett Independent School District.

From the beautiful front entrance, with just enough Austin Stone to make it outstanding, to the exit at the rear of the gym, one is overwhelmingly impressed by the ultra-modernness and durable construction of the new Junior High building. It is as new, as modern, and efficiently arranged as modern architects and modern building contractors know how to make it. It seems that nothing has been overlooked to make the plant a complete unit within itself for instruction of Junior High students.

The outside of the building, with the exception of a small portion of Austin Stone at the front entrance, is constructed of two shades of cream brick. The first five feet from the ground has a pinkish-cream cast, while the upper walls are of cream.

Nine class rooms, a library, principal's office, teacher's lounge, clinic room, janitor's supply room, boiler room, rest rooms, near class rooms, and still others near the gym, book room, are all conveniently arranged.

Upon entering the hall, the picture is one of pleasing color combinations, from the two-toned asphalt floors to the semi-sound proof ceiling. The walls are of glazed tile brick for the first five feet up. Then painted concrete blocks up to the ceiling. A two-way clock is located in each wing of the hallway, placed in such a way that time can be told from any spot in the halls.

The halls have 324 metal lockers, dial operated, just outside each class room.

Inside the class rooms, all of which have windows all along one side, the same construction as the hallways is followed. Each room has a different color or combination on the asphalt tile floor. Blackboards are the new green instead of the old black. Adjustable and movable chair-desks are in each class room and the library.

The clinic room is now being used as a speech therapy room, to aid students who have difficulty with their speech. The instructor has had special training in this work.

A two-way communications system with each room and the stage in the gym is located in the principal's office.

Three electrically operated cold water fountains are located in the halls. Two near the class rooms, one in the hall by the gym.

A central heating boiler room furnishes heat for the class rooms portion of the building. The gym is heated from a separate unit which heats water for the showers in the gym.

Entrances and exits seem to be located everywhere—four for the main building, three for the gym. In the hallway between the main building and the gym are ladies' and gents' rest rooms, a fountain, ticket office and concession room.

The gym itself is something to behold. It is the largest such facilities this side of Stamford, Texas. Nothing in Wichita Falls compares with it. Two basketball games or two volley-ball games may be played simultaneously. The floor is maple, slick and smooth as glass. All seats

are located on the South side of the gym. The large, roomy seats in the balcony, and the fold-away seats that come down to the edge of the gym floor, will seat approximately 1,300 people. A large stage on the north side is completely equipped with lights, curtains, microphone, etc.

Shower rooms, both boys and girls are located underneath the balcony. The athletic director's office and supply rooms are located next to the boys' shower room.

Every hour of every school day a group of students may be found taking physical education in the gym. Afterward they take a shower and resume their classes.

This building cost \$275,000.00. The contract was let in early 1950, completed September 1951. Estimated cost of such a building is around \$350,000.00.

It is difficult to describe such a wonderful school building. You must see it to appreciate it. Be on hand Sunday afternoon, September 30th, from 2:30 to 5:00 P. M. and make your own tour of inspection. There is no planned program. Just go at your leisure and stay as long as you like.

## E. C. Nelson of State Health Dept. Inspects This City

E. C. Nelson, Community Sanitation Consultant, State Health Department, Austin, Texas, was in Burk Burnett Monday making a detailed inspection.

After his inspection tour, which took him all over the city, Mr. Nelson came by the Star office and made a partial report on his findings. While here he said that, naturally, the State Health Department is interested in the good health and welfare of every city in the state, but they were especially interested in cities near Army Camps, and in cities where Army personnel live. Burk Burnett, by its proximity to Sheppard Air Force Base, is coming in for fine toothed comb inspection at this time.

Mr. Nelson said: "In many respects you have a very fine little city here. But, Burk Burnett has the highest fly population for the time of year of any city I ever inspected. The reason for this is your open trash barrels all over the city. Sanitary conditions in the residential area, in alleys and near trash barrels, are the worst I have ever seen in any city of comparable size. You people need to do something before it's too late."

Mr. Nelson promised a complete report as soon as it could be worked up from his field notes.

## Burkburnett Man John A. Hinnant Killed in Wreck

One person was killed and two were seriously injured—all members of the same family—in an automobile collision Saturday night on the Burk Burnett Highway about nine miles north of Wichita Falls.

Four others were slightly injured in the crash.

John Allan Hinnant, 31, of Burk Burnett, interior decorator, was killed.

Seriously injured are his wife, Jane, 28, and their five-year-old daughter, Jo Ann. The Hinnants were enroute to Wichita Falls when the crash occurred shortly after 7 P. M.

Hinnant was driving a 1936 Ford coach.

**Others Injured**  
Paul Shay, 20, Chickasha, Oklahoma, driver of the other car involved in the collision, suffered an injured right knee. Other occupants of the car driven by Shay suffered shock and bruises. They are Charles Pittmann, Jr., 17, Don Pittman, 19, and Loren Cunningham, 19, all of Chickasha.

Deputy Sheriffs L. T. Stephens and T. P. Stonecipher of Wichita Falls investigated the accident.

Justice of the Peace H. M. (Doc) Newman conducted an inquest and returned a verdict that Hinnant's death was caused by injuries suffered in a automobile crash.

**Met On Hill**  
Stephens said his investigation showed that Shay, driving a 1939 Lincoln sedan, was traveling north toward Burk Burnett and apparently started to pass another car and met the Hinnant car as it topped a slight hill just this side of Cashion curve.

The deputy sheriff said that Shay's car struck the Hinnant machine on the driver's side. Both cars were virtually demolished, he said.

Mrs. Hinnant suffered severe shock, chest injuries, several cuts and probable internal injuries. She is in Wichita General Hospital.

**Child Hurt**  
The Hinnant child, first taken to Sheppard Air Force Base Hospital and later removed to the Wichita General, suffered a severe head laceration, severe shock and possible internal injuries.

Hinnant died a few seconds after he was taken to the emergency room.

The three were taken to the hospital in Owens and Brumley Funeral Home ambulances.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3 P. M. in the Calvary Baptist Church here, Rev. Ray C. Morrow, pastor, officiating.

Burial was made in the Burk Burnett Cemetery under direction of Owens and Brumley Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife and daughter, a son, Johnny, 9; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hinnant; four brothers, Earl Hinnant and Jack Hinnant, all of Burk Burnett, W. A. Hinnant of Wichita Falls, and J. S. Hinnant of Ulysses, Kansas.

## MEAT GOES UP AGAIN

As you read this, your butcher will be writing new price tickets for his wares. Beef is expected to be 1 1/2 cents a pound higher; ham, bacon and shoulder cuts of pork to advance 1 to 2 cents a pound, and corned beef and other cured meats even more.

But don't reach for the shotgun. This increase will merely compensate the man who wraps up your hamburger and hot dogs for his higher wholesale prices he will be paying under new O.P.S. regulations.

## OIL - FROM THE GROUND UP

A barrel of oil, in the state in which it comes from the ground, can't be used for anything productive. It has enormous potentiality, true enough—but before it can power cars or grease machines or heat homes or wash clothes or do any other job it must go through a complex metamorphosis.

First of all, it must be refined. Some refineries are small, some are huge. A typical one employs 1850 men and represents an investment of \$75,000,000. And it's always on the job, working 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

The refinery turns the crude oil into a wide variety of finished products. But the consumer can't come to the plant, in most cases, buy what he wants, and haul it away. So oil has developed an enormous, nationwide system of transportation, employing 220,000 people and representing a net investment of \$1,750,000,000. Five hundred tankers, 2400 barges, 100,000 tank cars, 147,000 trucks and 153,000 miles of pipeline are engaged in the task of moving oil products to centers of consumption.

Then the distributors enter the picture—some 15,000 of them. They truck the gas to the service stations and the fuel to homes and businesses.

Finally, we come to the service station. There are about 200,000 of these familiar institutions in existence in this country. They move 35,000,000,000 gallons of gas every year and offer 75 to 100 other products in addition.

This gives a small idea of the oil industry. It is highly competitive, highly progressive. Its primary goal is to sell fine products at fair prices. And there's room within it for businesses of every size—from a giant corporation down to a one man enterprise.

President Truman, "will not run again, and never has intended to." That is the flat statement of the Scripps Howard Washington political observer, Thomas L. Stokes.

If we understand Mr. Stokes correctly, this noble decision is due in large part to the president's desire to heal the Dixiecrat rift . . . and to throw consternation into the Republican camp.

But, whatever the reasons, we would not want to see as conscientious a reporter as Mr. Stokes make a wrong guess.

Singing Bless Be The Tie, opened the meeting, and Mrs. Hayes read the minutes of the previous meeting and gave the treasurer's report.

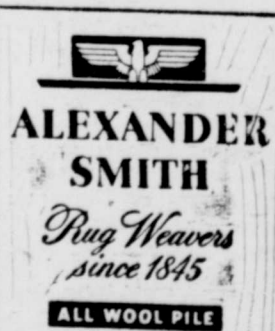
