FREEDOM OF CHOICE

Under free enterprise, the consumer has freedom of choice. He can go into any store, look around and buy or not buy, as he pleases. He can shop about from store to store seeking the most attractive deal.

Things are different in a totalitarian economy. For instance, the book business in communist Lithuania had been in the doldrums. So a cooperative federation there decided to improve sales by deducting money from the paychecks of its workers for the compulsory purchase of books—whether the workers wanted books or not! It also compelled every consumer purchasing any article to buy one or more books in addition!

This is the same as if, when you went into a store to buy an overcoat, you were forced to buy a pair of shoes too, or go without the coat. Today an American merchant would last about twenty minutes if he attempted to follow such a policy. All his trade would move with the swiftness of a hurricane to the stores of his competitors.

Actually, in most foreign countries there is nothing that bears even a good resemblance to our splendid American retail stores. And in the communist countries, of course, the consumer gets what the bosses want to give him—which is usually the bare minimum needed for subsistence on the near-starvation level—and he likes it or lumps it. Everything is rationed, and practically everything is scarce and extremely expensive when measured in terms of the average man's earnings. Freedom of choice is unknown.

All in all, American retailing is just about a perfect example of the virtues of the whole free enterprise system.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

EAST ROCHESTER, N. Y., HERALD: "Did anyone ever ask how to increase their take home pay the quickest and easiest? Did anyone ever think that by cutting down on the great masses of rats which are gnawing away at the paychecks of every man, he could get an immediate lift in that take home pay? It's just like a barnful of grain. As long as the rats continue to carry it away, you have to work that much harder to raise more to take up the losses. These Federal rats have waxed fat over the years, and they have grown more and more defiant of the public, by the protection which the government has given them. They have reached a point of an army of rats which not only will not be dislodged, but demand more and more of the public money."

SYCAMORE, OHIO, LEADER: "Alexander F. Jones, president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, calls for a prompt end to the free press privileges granted Communist correspondents in Washington."

"Tass Agency (the Soviet press bureau) enjoys the full privileges of the free press in the United States," says Jones, "American reporters in the Soviet countries are subjected to every indignity—even jail—in their attempt to do an honest reporting job . . . Tass is not a news service. It is a Russian government-supported and controlled propaganda bureau. Its Russian employees—Mikhail Fedorov in Washington, for example—are Soviet Government employees who come to this country on diplomatic passports. Tass serves no free customers. They represent a government whose political philosophy teaches and advocates the overthrow of the United States. Government by force and violence. Yet these representatives are accorded every privilege of the free press in Washington."

Wichita County Defense Bond Drive \$535,298.25

Wichita County's sales totaled \$535,298.25 during the first U. S. Defense Bond drive, Nathan Adams of Dallas, state chairman, informed R. Marvin Pierce, local county chairman. The drive was held from Sept. 3 through November 13th.

Final sales figures showed that Series E bonds accounted for \$366,498.25 and Series F and G for \$168,800.00 of this county's total.

Sales of \$27,778,453.25 in Texas during the drive were almost 50 per cent more than normal, Mr. Adams said.

"Normally sales for this period would have been about \$18,000,000 or \$19,000,000," he said, "and the fact that sales were so much higher is definite proof that the people of Texas are responding, as they always do, to the country's need in national emergencies."

The sales total for the state included \$22,459,665.25 in Series E bonds and \$5,318,788 in Series F and G. There were no state or county quotas, the goal being the "largest possible" volume of sales.

Mr. Adams expressed appreciation to the thousands of citizens who served as volunteers in the drive, but urged that they continue their efforts.

"The need for buying Defense Bonds still exists," he said. "With our country engaged in a gigantic preparedness program, these bonds form an important economic link in our defense."

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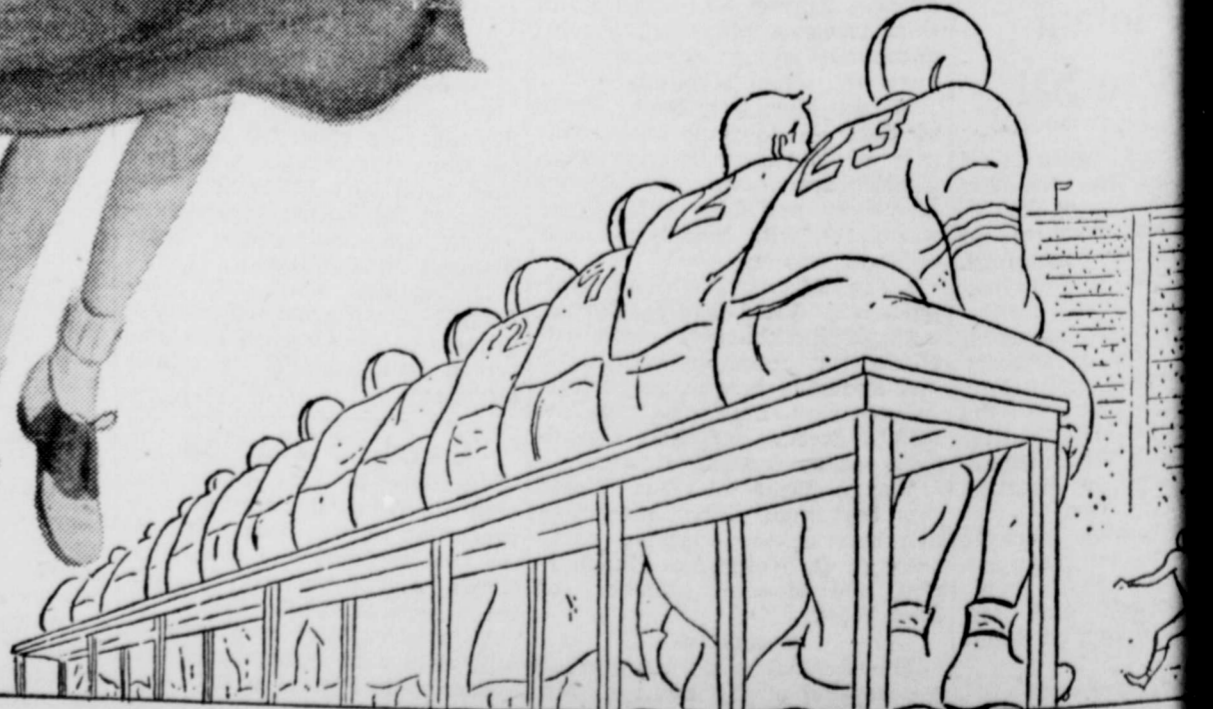

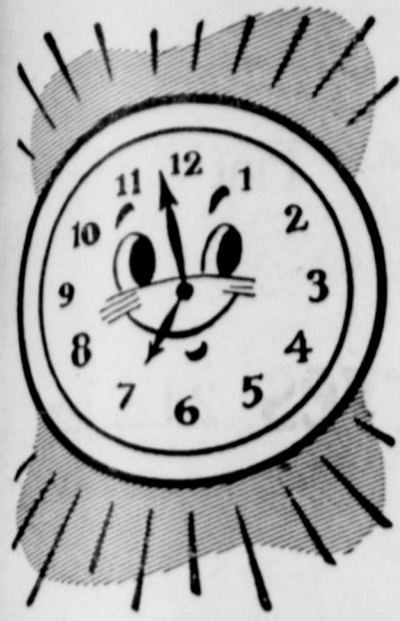

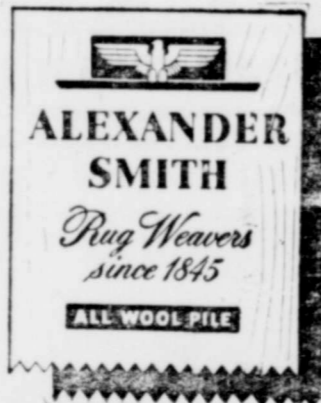
