Haskell County 4-H Horse Club Holds Meeting

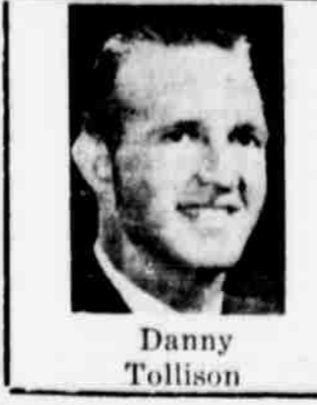



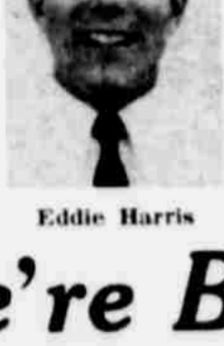
