"Thinks Like Human Being By ALICE HUGHES

In New England where I was brought up, girls were taught to sew by hand and by machine. We cut and basted our grammar school graduation dresses in the sewing class, took them home and stitched them up on the singer. It may seem quite quaint but I still find a sewing machine indispensable, and until recently mine was operated laboriously by foot pedal.
