

#### OFFICIAL WRIST-SLAPPING

Travel restrictions, which have been threatened sinec the USSR put a 25 mile leash on US and other foreign representatives, have been clamped on Russian diplomats and others on Soviet business in the US. The State Department has informed 226 Soviet diplomats and employes of the Russian Tass news agency in Washington and nine officials of the Russian Amtorg Trading Co., in New York, that they are not to travel more than 25 miles from the center of their respective cities without giving 48 hours notice and naming a destination. The 144 Russians assigned to the UN are not included in the order, being restricted unde ra previous agreement.

There seems, however, to be one minor embarrassment in the new retaliatory order. Russia can enforce its restrictions and we can't. And besides, there is mighty little information about the US of military importance that can't be found within 25 miles of any of Washington's more elegant cocktail bars.





#### Texas State Dept. of Health

By Geo. W. Cox, M. D. State Health Officer

Commenting on the unusually high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation in the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomer and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucous. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth,' Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way down to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the

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



#### Old Barn a 'Cow House' Now: Radiant Heating Warms Bossy

the only thing that hasn't changed. Scientific agriculture today calls for scientific barns. Many of these include luxuries such as radiant heating and concrete sun terraces where the cows can take their

Some cow barns might better be called "cow houses." A barn of this kind even has a "bedroom" and a "dining room." The cows bed down on straw in the sleeping room, are milked in a separate milking parlor and then are taken to a feed room to eat.

Barns Suit Special Needs The old-fashioned barn was good enough for every indoor farming need, but modern farm-ing methods demand specialized buildings. A dairy barn is differ-

ent from a horse barn, and a hay barn is different from both.

There are hog farrowing sheds, poultry houses, "storages" for grain, machinery sheds, maintenance shops, and a long list of other specialized structures. The general-purpose barn continues in favor for small farms, but it frequently is partitioned into specialized sections.

When barns were built of local materials, there wasn't much choice aside from wood and stone. Both of these usually could be found on the farm itself.

Now that agriculture is benefiting from modern construction techniques, stone has dropped out almost entirely and asphalt roofing and concrete have joined wood as principal materials for build-

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


