### Walter Riley Leads City Election Ticket Tuesday

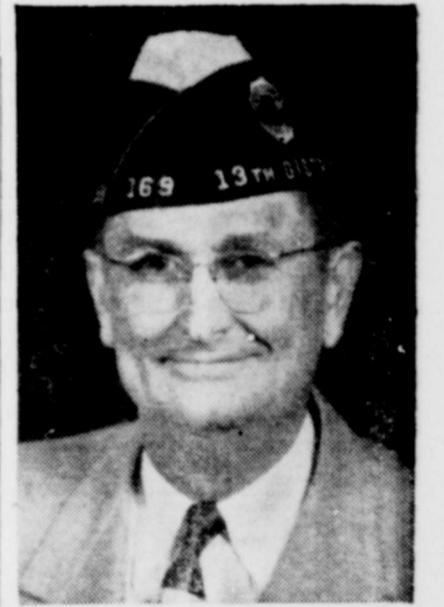
Walter Riley lead the ticket in Tuesday's City Commissioner race, polling 331 votes. The largest vote ever recorded in a City election here was counted Tuesday. The total was 536.

Francis Kauer and Gene Robertson were next high, polling 273 votes each. Not far behind were H. D. Smith with 226, Clark Gresham, 220. Harry C. Dodson, 165; C. C. Howard, 65, and Vernon Duke, who had withdrawn from the race, 36.

Riley, Kauer and Robertson will be sworn in at the next meeting night.

Two hundred representatives of the 32 American Legion Posts in the 13th Congressional district are expected to be at Gainesville, Saturday and Sunday, April 5 and 6, for the annual spring convention of the 13th district. ## GOOD CLEAN FUN

The State Department has asked Congress for \$218,416 to pay the cost of publishing the magazine "Amerika," which is circulated in Russia. More accurately speaking, Moscow officials, who are in charge of distributing the magazine, say it circulates in 70 Russian cities, but have refused of late to furnish detailed information.

But this is not all. The material for the magazine is passed on by the Communists before publication, and lately, an increasing amount of material, we are told, has been turned down as "not objective."

Somehow, we do not see what good it does the U. S. Taxpayer to circulate in the USSR a magazine directed by the USSR. We doubt very much if it even amuses the USSR. . . . But they must think the State Department is a scream!

## THEY ALSO SERVE

While it is only a minor skirmish, with the winner still in doubt, you should know that the Navy has engaged the Senate Preparedness Committee in the battle-of-the-paperweights. At the risk of revealing classified information, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, H. R. Askins has reported the need of 48,000 paperweights per year. Any reduction, he indicated, is a case of saving at the spigot and wasting at the bung, since if paperweights are scarce, "individuals have a tendency to improvise by utilizing other office equipment for the same purpose, which often results in damage to more expensive items not designed for use as paperweights."

It seems hardly likely that anyone will discover that if there were fewer papers they wouldn't need so many weights . . . or so much "other office equipment", such as Waves . . . to fill out the papers and then sit on 'em afterward.

## DON'T FORGET THE TREES

To turn the old saying around, sometimes we can't see the trees for the forest. Many organizations and groups in modern society are so large and, seemingly, so impersonal, that we lose sight of the individuals who compose them and give them life. The tendency of generalize blurs our vision.

We have heard so much about the "masses" that we are in danger of forgetting it's only a term for a lot of folks who have wives, kids, bills, and dreams just like we do. We read of "a great concentration of military might," but the simple translation is "a lot of men who would rather be home." Then, there's that great catch-all term, the "consumer"—actually, a variety of people who buy many different things because they have different tastes and needs. And, up near the top of the list, is the expression "giant corporation". That's a Goliath of a misnomer for a host of little Davids who have teamed up to serve the demands of their customers.

A big corporation, after all, is just a means by which many individuals cooperate to carry on a business that has grown too large for just a few people to handle.

## It's The Law In Texas

A Public Service Feature of the State Bar of Texas

### Homeowners May Be Liable for Accidents On Premises

Can a homeowner be held responsible for accidents that happen to other people while they are on his property. Lawyers say it is difficult to state a hard and fast rule about liability for such accidents because the facts differ so much from case to case. However, some conclusions can be drawn by noting how the courts have decided in specific cases which have been brought before them.

A postman delivering mail slipped on a child's roller skate one morning. He sued the homeowner for damages. The court held that the delivery of mail is for the benefit of the homeowner and that he must take care to remove any conditions on his property which would make delivery of the mail dangerous.

Then there was the case of the meter-reader who slipped and fell on the basement steps and the courts held the owner responsible because the steps were defective.

On the other hand, a guest sued her host because she slipped and fell when she stepped on some beans strewn about the owner's living room. The host's children had been playing with bean shooters on the day she chose to visit. The court held in this case that the host was not liable for her injury.

Similar cases where social calls resulted in disaster involved a guest slipping on a small scatter rug, and another overnight guest who slipped and

fell in a shower. Both cases were decided in favor of the homeowners—not the visitors.

From these cases it may be seen that the law is usually more strict about accidents befalling tradesmen and others who enter your premises in the line of duty, so to speak—postmen, laundrymen, meter-readers, delivery boys and the like—than it is in the cases of those who enter your home for purely social reasons.

This does not mean that a homeowner is absolved of all responsibility for injury to his guests. If he knows a dangerous condition exists, he has a duty to correct it and can be held liable for accidents which might happen if he doesn't. For example, a rotted tree branch fell to the sidewalk, injuring a passerby. The general rule here is that the owner was responsible because he knew of the defective condition and should have remedied it.

The law is especially zealous in protecting small children. In many cases situations where no liability would be imposed for injury to an adult, you may be held responsible to an injured child. If you have a piece of machinery, a pond, a well or some other apparatus or condition attractive and dangerous to a child on your property, it may be your duty to take special pains to keep children away from it.

Fortunately, not everyone who falls down the front steps gets up and rushes off to sue his host. However, a substantial body of law has grown out of this type of negligence case. This is not surprising when you realize that more fatal accidents occurred in and around the home last year than from traffic accidents on the highways.

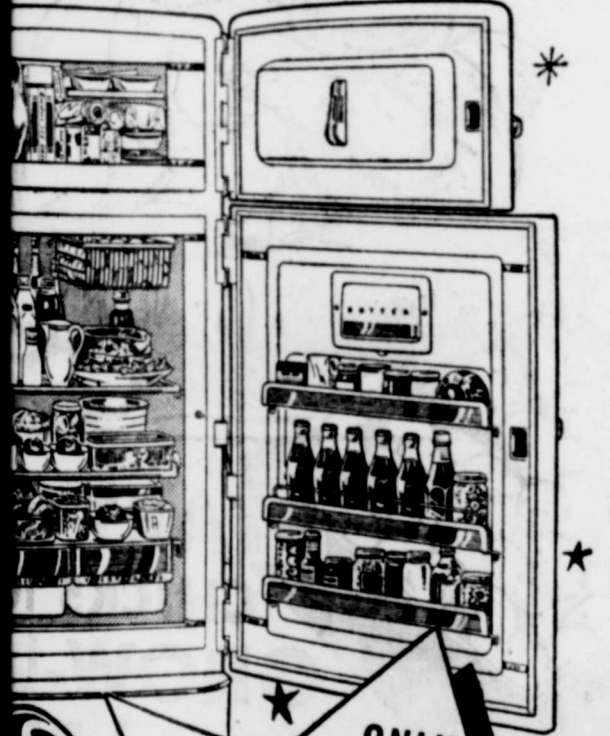

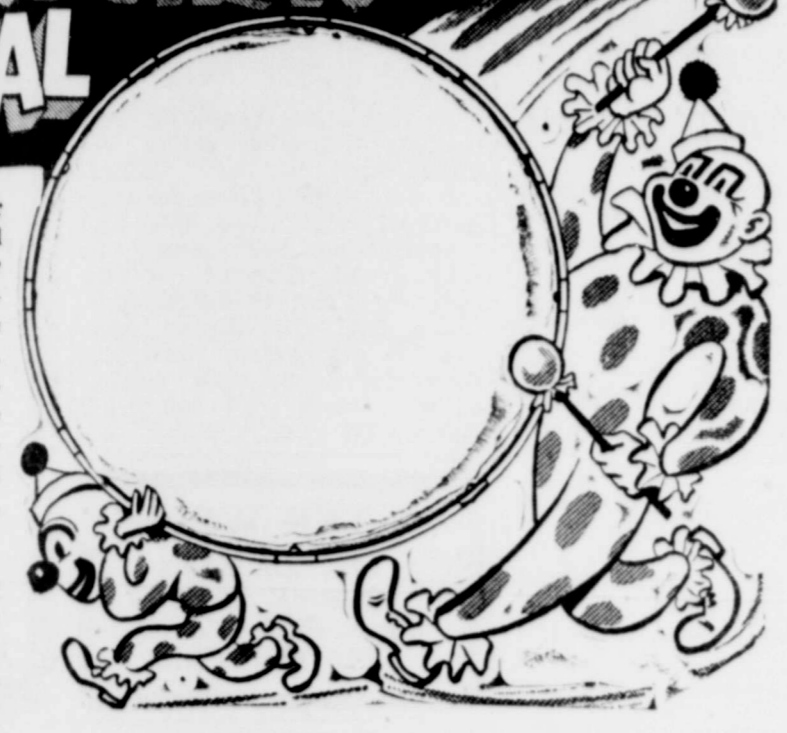

### C. of C. Managers Meet April 20-22 In Brownwood

Program of the annual convention of the Chamber of Commerce Managers Association of West Texas in Brownwood, April 20, 21, and 22 was announced today by the program committee chairman, E. O. Wedgeworth, Pampa Chamber of Commerce manager.

The Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway and the Brownwood Chamber of Commerce will be hosts Sunday evening, April 20 for a hospitality hour and a buffet supper and play night program.

W. E. Cantrell of Dalhart, president, will call the convention to order at 8 A. M. Monday in Hotel Brownwood. The morning's address will be delivered by William J. Bird of Dallas, assistant manager of the southwestern division of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

### 4-H Club Girls' Recognition Day Saturday, May 3

Fifty 4-H girls from a 16-County area in North Texas will take part in the first 4-H Girls' Recognition Day in Wichita Falls on May 3, 1952. Plans for the Recognition Day were made at a meeting of all Home Demonstration Agents of District No. 3 this week and supervision of plans are under the direction of Miss Fern Hodge, District Home Demonstration Agent of the Extension Service of Vernon, Texas and Mrs. J. E. Wolfe, representing the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the Recognition Day.

This will be the district elimination basis and winners in the contest held at Wichita Falls on May 3rd will be entitled to participate in the finals at College Station at a later date.

There will be a dress review and the winning girls who are 14 years or older from each county are eligible to enter. Girls under 14 years old will model their dresses at the afternoon program. In the vegetable team demonstration, individuals or teams may represent a county. There will also be a shrub identification contest and a dairy foods contest. Judges for the dress review will be Bernice Puckett who is the Home Demonstration Agent from Cook County and Miss Orene McClellan, Demonstration Agent from Dallas County. All contests will be held simultaneously on the morning of May 3rd and a program for the public will be held during the afternoon. The place for the contest will be announced at a later date.

### Soil Conservation NEWS

Ed Muller, who farms 1 mile south of Clara, says he won't predict the weather but that he will predict a good wheat crop following the use of clover. This, coming from a man who farms with only a year to year lease and one who has the evidence to back his statement, is a story within itself.

Muller, in 1950, harvested 5 bushels of wheat per acre on land that had never been in clover; adjoining wheat on land that had been in clover 1 year made 8 bushels per acre and wheat on land in clover 2 years made 12 bushels. This was a gross income of \$10.00, \$16.00, and \$24.00 respectively per acre which varied directly in accordance to the previous land use. His plan is to have one-third to one-half of his land in clover which he has found will still make him more money.

Muller has also found that clover does better than chisel plowing or less expensive. In 1950, he had wheat following clover that made 16 bushels. Adjoining wheat on chisel plowed land made only 7 bushels. This meant a gross income of \$32.00 and \$14.00 per acre difference. The deep-rooted clover penetrates the hard pan and then the decay of the root aids in keeping it open.

Even though Muller has the evidence of better yields, he says he can tell the difference just by walking over land that has had clover. He says it is spongy, mellow and has a darker color. The land doesn't slick over, run together or bake. The soil feels more like cornbread instead of flour. He feels that "clover land will take a 2 1-2 to 3 inch rain without having any run-off. Yes, Ed Muller knows that soil conservation does pay, even on a short time basis.

In addition to using clover in his conservation plan, Muller has worked in terracing, contour farming and stubble mulching in his coordinated soil conservation plan. He was among the first to request technical assistance from the local Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District in 1946. He is a firm believer in sound land use and treating the land in accordance with its capability and needs. T. E. Gilbreath of the Soil Conservation Service has assisted Mr. Muller in carrying out his conservation plan.

Muller has been a consistent winner in the Bridwell Soil Builders program. In all probability, he will be a strong contestant this year in the new portion, "increased crop yields following legumes." He has already entered the program this year. Others desiring to give him strong competition should enter immediately. All agricultural agencies have entry forms.
