





Muller has also found that clover does better than chiseling ni opening the soil, is more permanent and less expensive In 1950, he had wheat following clover that made 16 bushels. Adjoining wheat on chiseled land made only 7 bushels. This meant a gross income of \$32.00 and \$14.00 per acre difference. The deep-rooted clover penetrates the hard pan and then the decay of the root aids in keeping it open.

Even though Muller has the evidence of better yields, he says he can tell the difference just by walking over land that has had clover. He says it is mellow and has darker color. The land doesn't slick over, run together bake. The soil feels more like will be announced at a later cornbread instead of flour. 


