PROCLAMATION Official Clean Up Day Set For Friday, May 16, 1952

FROM THE HOURS OF 9:00 O'CLOCK
A. M. UNTIL 12:00 O'CLOCK NOON

WHEREAS, the general health and welfare of our citizens depend upon wholesome surroundings arising from good clean living conditions, and

WHEREAS, the lives and property of our people are endangered by fire caused by the cluttered condition in and around homes, alleys and streets, and

WHEREAS, unity of effort is required for the future development of our community,

THEREFORE, I, Walter Riley, Mayor of the City of Burkburnett, do hereby designate FRIDAY, MAY 16th, as CLEAN UP DAY, and call upon all departments of the city, its commercial organizations, civic clubs, schools, churches, boys' and girls' clubs, and all other associations, and our people in general to take an active part in this constructive program for community improvement to insure its success.

Job Expected to Be Finished In Just Three Hours

Frank Kelley and Roy Magers, co-chairmen of the Clean Up campaign, expect to complete the job in just three hours once the trucks start rolling. Of course a lot of work will have to be done before the big pick up—trash, weeds, paper, tree limbs, cans, everything—must be piled in an accessible place prior to Friday morning, May 16th. On that morning, beginning at 9:00 o'clock, the chairmen plan to have enough trucks and pickups, and men and boys to operate them to get through with the pickup of trash all over town by 12 noon.

This system has been used successfully in other town already this year, and with full co-operation Burkburnett will have one of the best clean up campaigns ever staged.

The ground work, that is the work each individual citizen is supposed to do—clean up his own premises, begins Friday, May 9th. That gives one week to get everything cleaned up and ready for the trucks. Each civic club and all organizations in town are being asked to cooperate in the move. Representatives from each club will meet Friday night, May 9th at 7:30 at the City Hall to map the master strategy.

Every truck and pickup will be needed on the 16th. If you have one get in touch with Roy Magers or Frank Kelley. They will do their best to have some one to go with the truck and help pick up the trash.

Council Accepts Bids On Water, Electrical Work

At the regular meeting of the City Council Monday night, sealed bids were opened on a water tower, 6 inch pipeline to Prescott Station and Electric System improvements.

Bill Bean of the B & G. Welding Works was low bidder on the 6 inch pipe line work. His bid was \$18,529.28.

Darby Corp. of Kansas City was low bidder on a 250,000 gallon overhead water tower, with a low of \$41,987.00.

Southwest Electric of Wichita Falls was low bidder on the Electric System work. Their bid was \$27,697.17.

The water tower will be delivered and set up within 12 months.

Completion of the water line calls for 45 days.

Improvement work on the Electric System, transformers, lines, etc., will be 60 days.

Last week a new Street Department truck was purchased from Acme Chevrolet Co., and a man hired for full time street patching and grading work.

Rebuilding of the Electric System in the down town alleys will be completed Sunday. The load capacity in the down town area has been increased three times and all wires have been changed out to new heavy duty service type to take any additional load available without a voltage drop.

Diplomatic Victory

The Government of the United States, in all its economic, military and humanitarian majesty, has finally prevailed on Czechoslovakia, that crawling little Communist satellite, to permit our Ambassador, Ellis O. Briggs, a half hour visit with William N. Otis, former Associated Press chief at Prague. In the presence of a police official and two interpreters, he was allowed to talk to a fellow countryman for the first time in more than a year.

He is reported to be in good health. He is allowed to read and to write. There were no complaints — of course. That much our ambassador was privileged to learn before Otis was returned to his cell.

In Washington, Secretary of State Acheson says the Government is determined that Otis will be released. He didn't say how. And he didn't say when. Such dogged determination usually wins. And after all, Otis only has 9 years more to do.

Patriotic, At All Costs

Motorists of the Nation's Capital are to have red, white and blue license tags embossed with the capital dome and two inches longer than the present plates . . . if the steel is available. Thus, the capital will be making its tags more expensive and more wasteful at a time when progressive states are thinking (and acting) to provide plates that can be used year after year with suitable tabs to indicate the year.

These fancy plates were to have been ready for 1953, but the factory at Lorton Reformatory needs a year to retool for the job . . . when Washington is telling the rest of the country that machine tool shortage is slowing down defense production.

NO MANNERS

The three Western powers, U. S., England and France have rejected, in a stiff note, the Soviet explanation of the vicious and prolonged attack by jet planes on an unarmed French passenger airliner over East Germany.

The Russians explained they had fired "warning shots" across the plane's bow to warn the pilot he was out of the neutral air corridor. Since the fighter planes circled the liner three times with their guns blazing, and since two passengers were wounded and the plane seriously damaged, the Soviet note was deemed inadequate.

Such conduct, the Allies said in their note "is en-

tirely inadmissible and contrary to all standards of civilized behavior." Apparently we are still, in Europe as well as Korea, expecting "civilized behavior from the Commies.

Lochinvar Of The Rails

Americans have set a fast pace on the highway of progress. Within a single century we have moved from the most primitive wood-burning steam engines to jet propulsion and are actually building power plants to operate on atomic fission.

But until we get our atom-splitting well under control, we will be content for our railroads to continue their program of Dieselization. We like that smooth-starting, smooth-stopping Diesel ride. We like the idea of faster schedules, and being on time. And considering his responsibility, we like the idea of the engineer being comfortable and relaxed with a better view of where he is going.

We are also fond of the Diesel because of its spectacular ton-mile economy. What's that to us? It could well mean the difference between a free, competitive railroad industry and permanent government ownership and operation of the rails. Government regulation, such as we now have, is necessary and in the public interest. Government ownership would be a long step toward a socialized state of faceless people, the kind of a country Mussolini used to run.

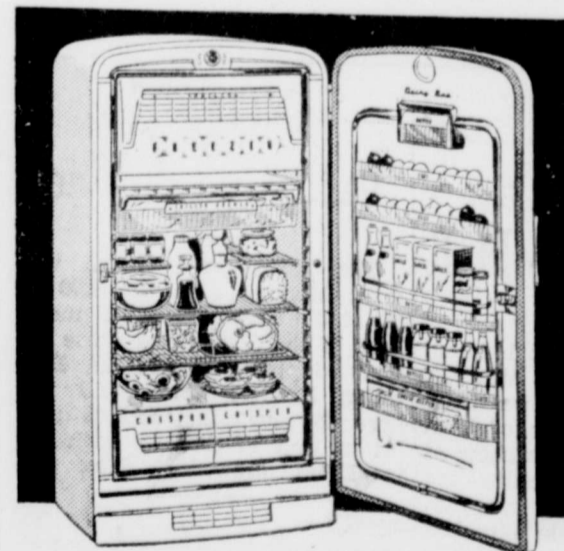

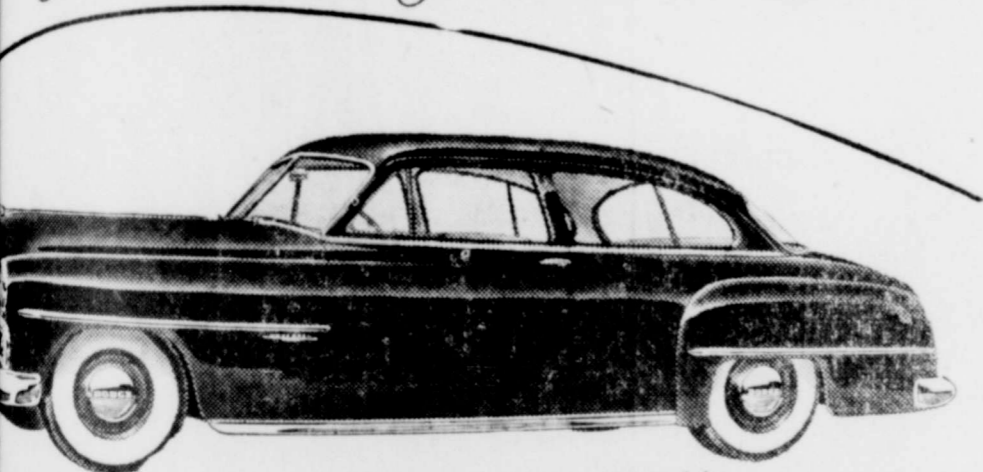

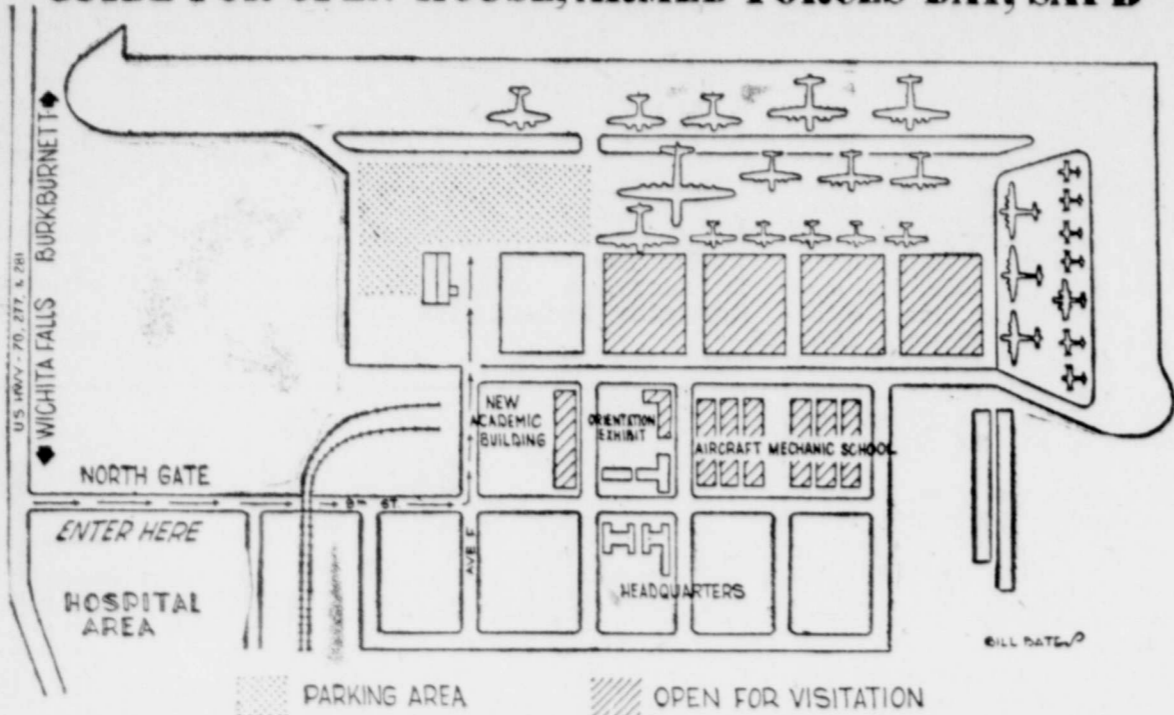

GUIDE FOR OPEN HOUSE, ARMED FORCES DAY, SAFB



Approximately 15,000 visitors will attend "open house" at the Aircraft Mechanics School, at Sheppard Air Force Base, on Armed Forces Day, May 17th. They will come from scores of communities in north Texas and southern Oklahoma. Hours of visitation are 1:30 to 5 P. M. The north gate—toward Burkburnett—will provide direct access to the area of interest. Air police will guide traffic to the car parking section near an information booth. Nearby are the flight line, Orientation Exhibit, and the Academic Buildings open to the public that afternoon.

Visitors may go singly or in groups within the open house area. Planes on the flight line open for inspection will be two B-29's, two F-84's, two B-25's and two C-15's. Ramps will permit entrance and exit. Two airmen will be on duty at each to supply information. Instructors of the Aircraft Mechanics School will be on duty with two in each classroom to explain the equipment used. There will be no classes because of the Armed Forces holiday. A first aid station will be operated by personnel from the

base's Regional Hospital. Sounding of retreat and lowering of the flag at headquarters will climax the day. Distinguished guest of Maj. Gen. C. V. Haynes, Commanding General, SAFB, will be Lt. Gen. Idwal H. Edwards, Commanding General of the Air Forces educational system, Air University, Maxwell AFB, Ala. He was the commanding general of the U. S. Air Forces in Europe from March, 1946 to August, 1947. The Air University, which he heads, has more than 8,500 students in residence in a variety of advanced courses at specialized Air Force Schools and in colleges; 43,000 correspondence students, and effective August 1, will operate the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps with 110,000 students in 187 colleges.
