The second show of the annual event saw some of the fastest time expected here in the steer wrestling event. Bill McGuire put his steer to the ground in 4.7 seconds. Todd Whatley with time recorded at 5.7 seconds took second place. Willard Combs, with only 1-2 second longer, took 3rd.

In the calf roping event Todd Whatley had the calf assigned to him roped and tied tight in 13.9 seconds. Jack Saunders was second with time of 16.6. He was followed by Jess Goodspeed with 18 seconds for 3rd.

Todd Whatley came back to take the bull riding event to take the first place. He was followed by Elliott Calhoun and Leonard McCravy.

Marvin Brown won the bareback riding contest and was followed by Freckles Brown. In the saddle bronc riding event, Billy Weeks was first, Freckles Brown second and Guy Weeks third.

Two wild bucking broncos were killed in the contests when they ran into the fence head-on and broke their necks.

**Bullfighting Record Broken**

In the third performance of Boom Town Rodeo here, an enthusiastic crowd of 4,200 saw what is still unofficially a world's record set in the steer wrestling event.

Bill McGuire dogged a steer, clipping almost a second from Rodeo Contestants' Association fastest time, in 3.1 seconds. The time will have to be declared official by the association to make it a world record. Bill's time the first night was 4.7 sec.

In the bulldogging event, Elliott Calhoun followed the record setting McGuire by bringing his steer under control in 6.5 seconds. Wayne Garrett was third with a time of 7.3.

In the bareback contest Guy Weeks placed first, Wilbur Plaugher second, and Billy Weeks third.

Billy Weeks came back in the saddle bronc riding event to take first place. Freckles Brown was second and Guy Weeks 3rd.

Orbin Garrett was first in calf roping with 14.5 seconds. Second went to Jess Goodspeed for his time of 15.1 seconds. Glenn Christian came up third with 15.8 seconds.

In the bull riding show, Elliott Calhoun placed first with Billy Weeks returning to place second, and Todd Whatley was third.

### Judge Earl P. Hall Seeks Re-election For Chief Justice, Second Court of Civil Appeals, At Fort Worth, Texas



Judge Earl P. Hall, Chief Justice of the Second Court of Civil Appeals, Fort Worth, was in Burkburnett Wednesday. He called at the Star office and left the following article, in the interest of his race for re-election to the office:

Judge Earl P. Hall is a native of this Court of Civil Appeals District which is composed of the following counties: Archer, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Hood, Jack, Montague, Parker, Tarrant, Wichita, Wise, and Young. Judge Hall was born and reared on a farm in Montague County, where he worked, except when he was away in school, until he received his law license at the age of twenty-two. He is now forty-eight years of age.

Judge Hall was educated in the public schools of Montague County, at Texas Christian University, and at Cumberland University of Law, from which he received his Bachelor of Law Degree. He passed the Texas Bar examinations and entered the practice of law in 1926.

The Court of Civil Appeals is composed of three members. Judge Hall is the only member on the Court who came from one of the smaller counties. We think it is democratic for the smaller counties to have at least one member on the Court.

The following is Judge Hall's statement to the voters:

"In announcing my candidacy I realize that a person in politics is no stronger than his friends, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking my many friends throughout this District for the splendid support they have given me in the past. The people of my home county have seen fit to elect me several times to important offices, and the people of this Court of Civil Appeals District have heretofore elected me to serve as Associate Justice of this Court. I am deeply grateful for this, and I sincerely trust that the people of this District will see fit to vote for me to continue to serve them as Chief Justice of the Court.

"As you remember, in June, 1951, Governor Shivers appointed me Chief Justice of your Court of Civil Appeals to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Judge Atwood McDonald. I now seek election to the full six year term. Prior to that time I had served five years as Associate Justice on the Court and ten years as District Judge of the 97th Judicial District, composed of Archer, Clay and Montague Counties.

"During the time I have been a member of this Court, cases coming before it have been given the most careful consideration, yet have been promptly decided, with result that we have kept up with our docket, even though there are many cases transferred from other districts to us by the Supreme Court. It has been the desire and purpose of both myself and other members of the Court to decide cases impartially and promptly.

"It is my belief that law is the greatest thing devised by man, and that the proper administration of it is a demanding task of our courts. The law should at all times portray satisfaction of the average man feeling for common justice visibly done. It should meet the demand of a sound and progressive society, and at the same time protect our individual freedom.

"Believing in the old adage that a man should first earn his spurs before he wears them, I feel my long experience in the trial of civil cases, both in private practice and as District Judge, together with the knowledge I have acquired during my time on this Court, will enable me to discharge my duties even more efficiently in the future.

"I earnestly solicit your influence and your vote in the coming Democratic primary, to be held on Saturday, July 26th."

## Perhaps We Should Pay for the Bullet

Russia has "rejected" our protest against the wounding of a US Military policeman by Communist police on the Berlin border June 4th. The Russians said they fired one shot in the air as a warning. When Mr. Acheson gets to Berlin later this month, however, he can probably apologize for our man being up a Russian tree . . . or wherever he was.

## Larceny By Persuasion

"Cartel" is still a horrid word in America, or ought to be, even though US is a participant in the International Materials Conference, a "super-cartel" that presently controls the allocation and seeks to stabilize the prices of sulphur, nickel, copper, zinc, cobalt and tungsten . . . that can expand its control to more and more materials, extend its authority indefinitely beyond the present defense production shortages. This commodity cartel has never been submitted to Congress for ratification.

This is the view of John L. Collyer, president of The B. F. Goodrich Company, as expressed to the National Association of Purchasing Agents at Atlantic. "Behind a veil of secrecy," said Mr. Collyer, "decisions reached by IMC . . . may go unchallenged until the damage is done. As one example, US manufacturers are forced to reduce automobile production because of lack of copper while other countries are allocated enough copper to increase their automobile production."

Previous cartels, Mr. Collyer said, were mainly successful in speeding up the development of synthetic rubber, and now the primrose path to scarcity and price control beckons again because of "leaders in certain nations." "But, instead of restricting production," he says, "we should expand consumption. High prices restrict the use of rubber; low prices encourage its use."

The IMC, Mr. Collyer thinks, "may be the mechanism thru which planners, always working behind the scenes on an international scale, could force a basic revision of our American economy." The remedy, he declared, is legislation now in committee in the House and Senate, to limit Executive authority to participate in cartels.

We hope Mr. Collyer is right, that there is still time to act, before we have an empty stable to lock up. It looks from here as if the barn door is wide open and our Free Enterprise horse is being led down the lane by some suspicious looking characters in crepe whiskers.

## THE LAW NOBODY WROTE

The Curry County Times, published at Clovis, New Mexico, recently ran an editorial pointing to some of the tremendous and expensive administrative problems the price control regulations have imposed on business. At the end it said, "Somehow the threat of inflation and skyrocketing prices sort of fades in comparison with the mess artificially maintained levels have precipitated."

"Anyhow, we haven't heard anything about the law of supply and demand being repealed. Until it is, we think it's pretty unlikely anyone in Washington can dream up something better."

Nobody wrote the law of supply and demand, no legislature enacted it, no eager-beaver government people enforce it. It's just a law of nature, and it has governed economies of the world since time began. Every effort to tamper with it or replace it with man-made economic law has created only confusion—and, in some cases, national disasters.

That law makes it certain that manufacturers will produce the things people want—in the quantity and quality wanted. It also makes it certain that our retail stores, from the smallest one-man shop to the biggest national chain, will stock those articles—and sell them at a price which is held to the lowest practical figure by free competition.

No one has come up with anything even remotely as successful as the law of supply and demand in centuries. It's not probable that even our present-day deep-thinkers in government will be able to.

Morris Dean, who has been agriculture teacher in the schools here for the past several years, resigned last Thursday to accept a position with the schools at Munday, Texas.

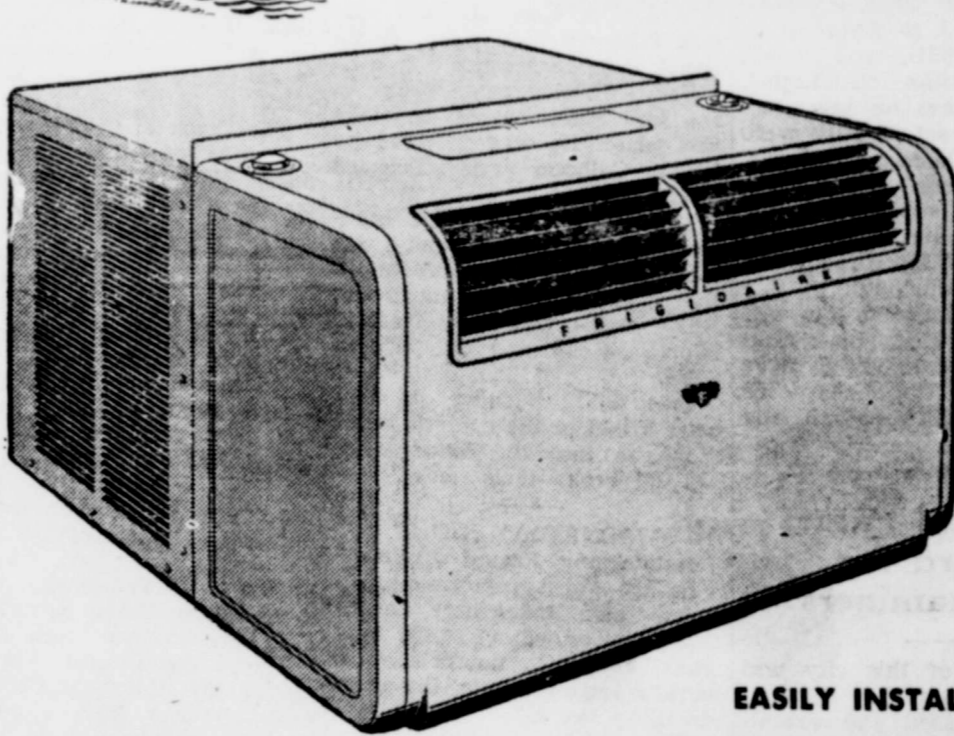

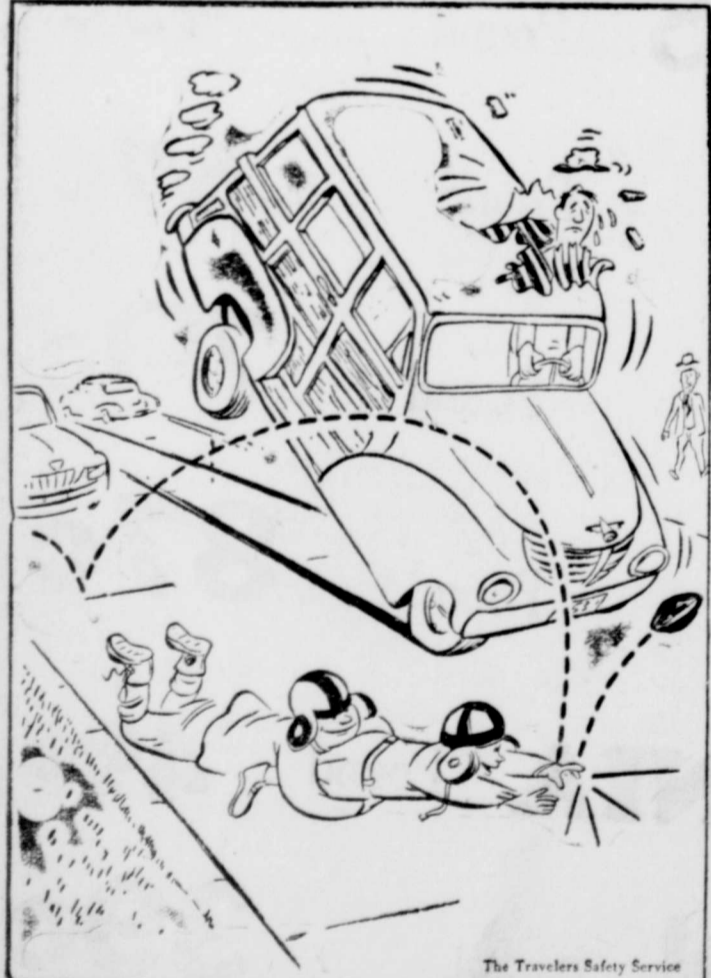

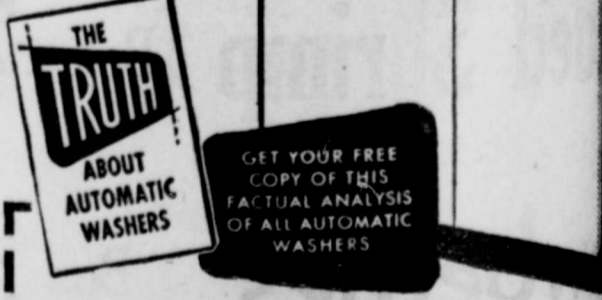

The highlight of the trip was our stay in the Taninul Hotel, which is located just ten miles from Valles, on the Valles-Tampico Highway. In the Huasteco language, this means, "A place where earthen pitchers

are filled." The King and members of the nobility used to bathe here, and the capital of the Huasteco Kingdom was at the old Tamuin, on the right bank of the Tamuin River, only a short distance from the Taninul Hotel. The sight of enchantment, the Taninul Hotel, lies in the slopes of the Tanchipa mountain range and aside from the thermal sulphurous waters, from its inmost an infinite number of cold springs arise, as well as the charming Choy river. At this place, the great poet Manuel Jose Othon, created his immortal poem, "Hymn Of The Forest." The hotel is surrounded on the west by the Tanchipa ridge, on the east, north and south by a great plantation of orange trees, a fact that greatly enhances the beauty and charm of the landscape. We arrived at the Taninul Hotel later than we had planned, due to a rain storm. Mr. Wilson H. After special greeting from the hotel hostess, we went on a sight seeing tour through the hotel and its surroundings. One of the group rightfully described it, as being "A Magic Fairy Land."

The hotel with the longest portico in the world, furnished all types of entertainment for the group, including horseback riding, ping-pong, billiards, shuffleboard, dancing, fishing, and hunting only one hour from the hotel. Swimming in the Emerald swimming pool, where the moon shines 365 nights of the year, furnished entertainment after other activities were over. The Taninul Hotel furnished transportation in their station wagon for the group to go to the beautiful pic-nic paradise. Swimming back under the mountain, and climbing the falls was something one reads about, but never realized, until we made this trip. The group was treated as royal guests at the hotel. 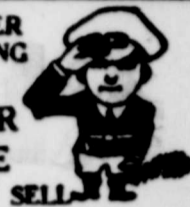

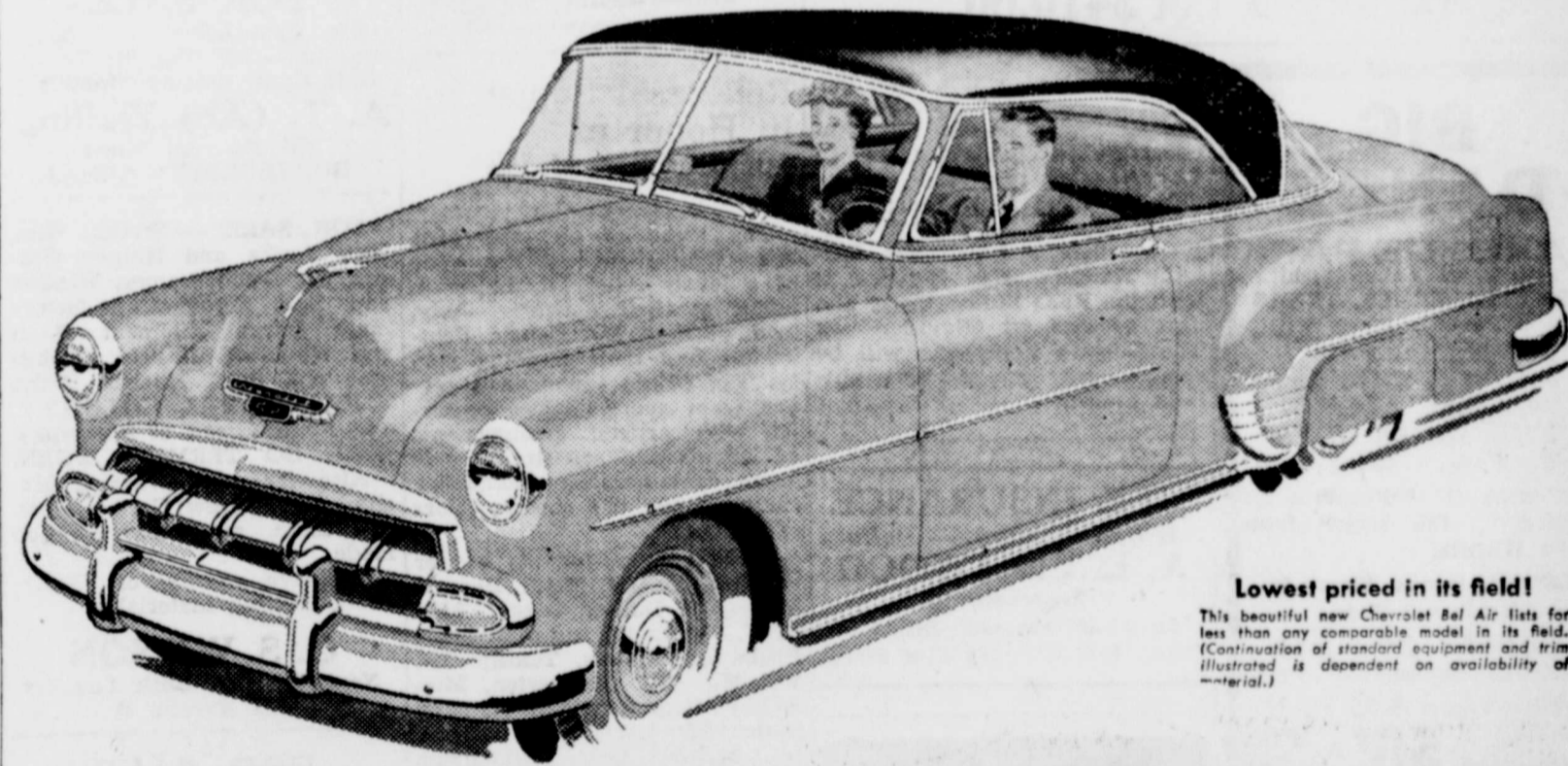

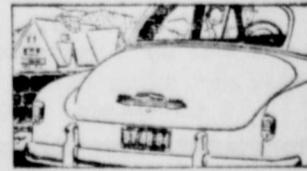
