Burkburnett Man Named Assistant County Attorney

County Attorney Jimmy Castledine appointed Don Short of Burkburnett as assistant county attorney Saturday. Short has resigned his position as city attorney of Burkburnett. He is expected to begin his duties in the county attorney's office this week. The position of assistant county attorney has been vacant since Castledine left the post to become county attorney May 1st. Castledine replaced Jim McCormick, Jr., who resigned to enter private law practice. The assistant's job has a salary of \$3,750 per year. Short, 25, is a native of Deport, Texas, near Paris. He attended Texarkana Junior College in 1944 and 1945 and returned in 1946 and 1947 after serving 18 months in the Navy as a pharmacist's mate third class. Short attended Baylor University at Waco and was graduated with a law degree in 1949. He practiced in Wichita Falls in partnership with Titus T. Mitchell from November, 1949, to September, 1950. After Mitchell was recalled to active duty in the Air Force, Short began practicing in Burkburnett. He was appointed city attorney in April, 1951. Member of the Baptist Church Short is commander of American Legion Post 264 in Burkburnett, and a member of the Burkburnett Rotary Club board of directors. Short's wife is the former Miss Joyce Butts of Burkburnett. Born in Clara, she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Butts, who are now Burkburnett residents.

Now We Can Stockpile Kilowatts

Today, for the first time in our history, we are having to think seriously and realistically about reinforcing our nation against physical damage from a foreign aggressor. If we can deliver an atomic bomb to any address in the world, so can an enemy.

And high on the list of strategic targets is electric power . . . especially in America, where it energizes our whole economy and is a recognized essential in the lives and occupations of nearly all our people. Thus, it is startling news, and mighty reassuring news, to learn there is a way to stockpile power!

Not only that, the power we stockpile will be a lot cheaper than the power we make ourselves. So, if you are now sufficiently confused, let us explain that this bottled power is not imported from Mars or inter-stellar space, but from our American neighbor, Canada . . . in the form of aluminum ingots.

Aluminum is "packaged power". There are ten kilowatt-hours of it in every pound . . . 20,000 KWH per ton . . . 20 billion in a million tons. The power required to produce a single ton of aluminum would run your house for ten years, deep-freeze, washing machine, elevator and all!

Certainly, if and when we need to draw on this stockpile, aluminum itself will be one of the materials we will most need . . . for aircraft and other weapons of war. To be able to divert the power required by our own aluminum producers to the essential manufacturing industries should our own generating capacity be crippled, could mean the difference between survival and helplessness.

If, as we hope and pray, we shall have no such grim need of this "packaged power," the industrial value of our stockpile can only increase, since all estimates of aluminum needs in 1960 indicate a tonnage far in excess of world-production estimates for that year. It would then be like money-in-the-bank. In fact, we'd a lot rather have those aluminum ingots of "packaged power" cached at strategic points than those gold bricks at Fort Knox!

About the time you read this, 26 young American "Grass-roots Ambassadors" will be shaking hands with their hosts in seven foreign countries, where they will spend the next few months in the families of French, Belgian, Irish, Scotch, Swedish, Dutch and Norwegian farmers, under the International Farm Youth Exchange program.

Most of these youngsters, who represent 22 states and Alaska, are former 4-H Club members, and all are well qualified both to demonstrate US farm methods and to learn and evaluate Old World ideas and operations. A similar number of foreign young people will come here and live on our farms in this two way project for spreading ideas and understanding.

Conducted by the Co-operative Extension Service of the US Dept. of Agriculture, no Federal or state funds are used for these exchanges. About half the cost is raised by 4-H Clubs and other youth organizations, the balance by individual contribution.

It's too bad their elders made such a mess of the world before these youngsters were called in. But, if peace is attainable, the Farm Youth Exchange should prove a mighty force.





Cotton Insect Given County Agent

Released by Joe County Agent of Services, and George Entomologist. June 25 (20th off) our cut off automatic early season come and past, a moment to present situation

and what should be done from now on to keep insect damage at a minimum on cotton this year.

There are more cotton insects in the fields to start with than there was last year, and if we get weather that is even fairly favorable for their reproduction; a heavy infestation may be expected in the late season. A fair part of the farmers carried out an early season control which should help somewhat; however, there are many fields left unpoisoned that will serve as a breeding ground for the destructive insects to build up in the spread to the poisoned fields. Naturally this decreases the effectiveness of an early season program, but the treated field will have an advantage in that they should have a pretty good crop set and on the way before the destructive insects build up so heavy in the untreated fields that they will migrate to the treated fields for a better food supply.

Thrips are so neavy this year that in some areas young cotton may have to be poisoned even though it is past the cut off date, to keep it from being stunted. One pint of toxaphene to the acre will do a good job.

Fleahoppers are showing up in large numbers for this time of the year; however, they can be controlled, even on large cotton, with one pint of 6 lb toxaphene per acre without kill-

ing off the beneficial insects. The big advantage of this is that we can kill the fleahopper without killing off our friendly bugs and leaving the field unprotected against bollworms.

Bollweevils are very heavy for this time of year, but should be expected after the mild winter we had. Should we receive several showers between now and the last of July, we can expect a heavy weevil infestation for the late season.

From now on we want to stay out of our fields with poison as long as we can. Insect infestation counts should be made in each field every 5-7 days in order to keep up with the insects and not let them destroy the cotton before we realize they are there. In our demonstration from now on, we will show how to take these infestation counts as well as how to identify both destructive and beneficial insects.

Often more harm is done than good by poisoning a field when it actually doesn't need it, so know what you are poisoning for and be sure you are using the proper poison for that particular insect. Don't poison just because your neighbor is; he may not know what he is doing.





Allan Shivers Hits Campaign Trails For Fifteen Days

Allan Shivers took off his formal governor's coat this week to hit the hot July Texas campaign trails for 15 days of intensive travel before he leaves for the national Democratic Convention in Chicago the week of July 20th.

Shivers' jam-packed campaign tour will take him over much of Texas—from small communities like Dime Box in Lee County to metropolitan communities of Houston and San Antonio.

His tour will start on July 4 following a busy week at the national governors' conference at Houston, where Shivers participated with 46 other governors in mapping out programs

for continued improvements in state hospitals and schools, betterment of prison systems, highways, farm-to-market roads and educational systems.

Shivers, who has always spent much of his time visiting with the people and listening to their ideas for the betterment of state government, will hit the general areas of Stamford, Abilene, El Paso, Texarkana, Paris, Tyler, Waco, Corsicana, Mexia, Hillsboro, Temple, Brownfield, Lubbock, Lamesa, San Angelo, Odessa, Midland, Kermit, San Antonio, Houston, Baytown, Beaumont and Port Arthur from July 4th to July 17.

During the past several weeks the governor has been speaking and working more on precinct meetings than on his own campaign, devoting a great deal of time meeting in various communities with precinct workers who took the lead in May to assure Texas of an uninstructed delegation to the National

Democratic Convention.

Shivers pointed out in connection with his campaign tour that he has responded to the invitations of the people to visit in their communities during the campaign, as best he could, considering the brevity of the time available.

"I try to know at all times what Texans want, need and think," he emphasized.

Grass On Vacant Lots Is Hazard For Neighbors

People owning vacant lots in Burkburnett, are in many cases, working a distinct hardship on home owners of adjoining property, by permitting grass and weeds to grow rampant on the vacant lots.

Home owners take pride in the appearance of their yards, but the job of keeping them neat and free from Johnson grass is made very difficult if a vacant lot next door has grass two or three feet high. Aside from the extra work involved on the part of the home owner, he is faced with a health hazard presented by mosquitos and other insects which find favorable breeding conditions in tall grass and weeds.

In most instances, owners of vacant lots have not realized their neglect was causing someone else inconveniences, and in lots of instances, hardships. Attorney General Price Daniel Fights For State's Gas Tax

Attorney General Price Daniel this week interrupted his campaign for U. S. Senate to carry on his fight to save the State's new gas tax revenues for building more rural roads and improving public schools.

Himself a farm owner and REA member, Daniel has pledged in his campaign for U. S. Senate to work to strengthen and maintain the REA program, soil conservation work, farm price supports, aid to the aged, and other such "sound and constructive programs."

The 41-year-old Attorney General, who is the only veteran in the Senate race, is reported by impartial newspaper polls to be leading in the Senate race by a 6 to 1 majority, according to Everett Hutchinson, his state campaign manager.

Daniel is noted for his leadership in the Texas fight to prevent Federal seizure of our tidelands. He favors an "immediate house-cleaning of dishonesty and disloyalty" in Washington, opposes big spending, waste and extravagance, and wants taxes lowered at "the earliest moment possible."
