City Makes \$18,000 Advance Payment On Old Bonds

The City has made another \$18,000.00 advance payment on the old bond refunding issue. This brings the total to \$44,000 in advance payments in the last four years. The City is paid up \$44,000 ahead on bonds not yet matured and due. The money comes from taxes, which, under a prior agreement when the bonds were refinanced, cannot be used for any purpose except to pay interest and principal on the old bonds.

The old indebtedness is now cut down to \$228,000, from an original amount of some three hundred thirty thousand.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Out in Forest River, North Dakota, recently, about 250 farmers gathered from miles around to see Jack Halverson plow a ten acre field. And it wasn't just to watch the other fellow work, either. Farmer Halverson had put a new engine in his ten-year-old tractor, a General Motors Diesel, and they wanted to see for themselves what Diesel power could do with a tractor.

The bare facts are that Halverson plowed the field (9.9 acres, to be exact) in three hours and ten minutes, using 11.7 gallons of Diesel fuel, which cost 20 cents an acre. He also did the job in a lot less time, and at considerably less cost.

Naturally, such savings are just as important to the farmer as they would be to any other businessman, but there is more to the story. These savings are just as important to the rest of us. We are faced, economists say, with a fast growing population, a shortage of farm labor, and a big question of whether we will be able to feed our population in twenty years. Added efficiency and economy of operation gives us greater hope of being able to feed ourselves and check rising food costs.

Obviously, the country gains any time the farmer finds a way to do his work more efficiently and more economically. The news that he can do more work in a day at less cost per acre is certainly good news for everybody.

LONG OVERDUE

The United States of Europe, first suggested to the world, we believe, by British historian, H. G. Wells, right after World War I, is again in the news. But the present coalition effort is based on the Schuman Plan for consolidating the coal and steel industries of the continent and the European Army Plan which would merge the military resources of Europe into the common defense plans from which the British are notably absent.

These two basic plans were to have been undertaken by the European nations without involving the sovereignty of any participant, but it is now believed that a supranational political union is needed to make either plan work. Of the various reasons reported for this new attitude, one is the fear that the new Free Germany might either become too strong to be controlled, or might back out and two, that General Eisenhower has supported the unification idea from the beginning, and his nomination for the presidency has given fresh enthusiasm to the other supporters.

To Americans, the artificial boundaries and limited area of Europe's smaller nations have seemed ridiculous in an age of rapid transportation and instantaneous communication . . . and likewise an unending source of international quarrels. We are flattered too, of course, that they should emulate our idea of a federation of states. At the same time, the greatest peril that faces our own country is pressure from the UN enthusiasts who would like to see us sink our own national ego and independence of action in a world coalition.

However, at the risk of being considered illogical, we believe the US of Europe is a workable idea . . . very likely the only idea that can provide Europe with the new hope, fresh spirit and adequate defenses that it must have. Certainly this is a move that should be made long before anyone gives serious thought to the World State.

Well, What Do You Know?

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SNAFU Is A Chinese Word

UN hopes for a Korean truce are dashed again, after being built up by two successive Red requests for two-day recesses, and a Red Chinese announcement that they would abide by the 1949 Geneva Conventions concerning treatment of prisoners and wounded, protecting civilians and rejecting germ warfare.

Latest word in this Chinese puzzle comes from London, where the Reds submitted proposals on prisoner repatriation through diplomatic channels. Since the new offers still require that all Chinese prisoners be sent home, the situation would again seem to be normal . . . still fouled up.

In Washington, however, a refreshing note was sounded by Secretary of State Acheson, who tells us, that in spite of their announcements, the Reds are still not playing according to the Geneva rules. At least, he's learning.

Grass On Vacant Lots Is Hazard For Neighbors

People owning vacant lots in Burkburnett, are in many cases, working a distinct hardship on home owners of adjoining property, by permitting grass and weeds to grow rampant on the vacant lots.

Home owners take pride in the appearance of their yards, but the job of keeping them neat and free from Johnson grass is made very difficult if a vacant lot next door has grass two or three feet high. Aside from the extra work involved on the part of the home owner, he is faced with a health hazard presented by mosquitos and other insects which find favorable breeding conditions in tall grass and weeds.

In most instances, owners of vacant lots have not realized their neglect was causing someone else inconveniences, and in lots of instances, hardships. If vacant lot owners will see that the lots are kept mowed or plowed, they will have the undying gratitude of neighbors living on adjoining property.

TB and the X-Ray Bus

Time was when the TB victim innocently walked the streets of his town undetected—and undetectable.

For who had the millionaire's pocketbook to pay for examining a whole town of a thousand people to sieve out one possible victim?

Now comes the x-ray bus, able to be TB detective for whole cities, for a few pennies a person. Millions of people now have their TB worries erased when the doctor says "Okay."

How long did it take to get the x-ray bus? Well, for its part, General Electric had been working on x rays for 57 years. Costs of diagnosis have come down by better and better equipment. No year passes without some new development. So this was another big chapter in a long book of events.

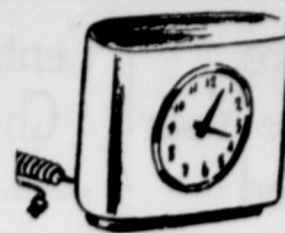
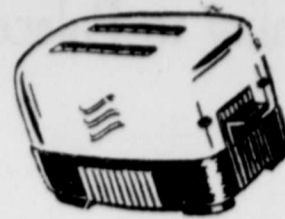

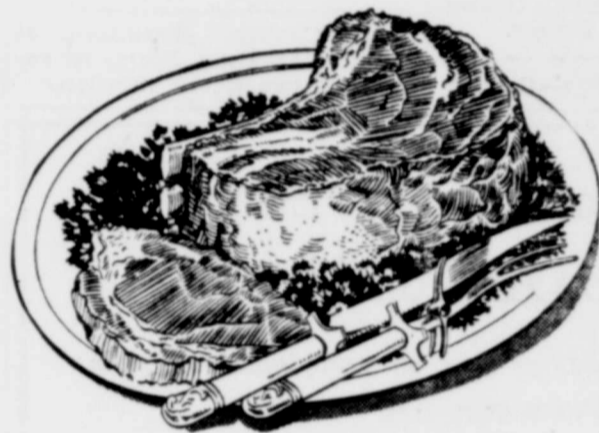

County Agent Gives Cotton Insect Situation

The following information released by J. W. Bradley, County Agent of Wichita County, and George Davis, Extension Entomologist.

The fine rains of the last week have given us the much needed moisture to keep our cotton growing and fruiting vigorously for awhile. While the cotton is doing so well, we want to set as much fruit as possible and as soon as possible, in order to get full benefit from this moisture. If the insects are kept below a damaging infestation level, this heavy quick loading will take place.

There are three insects that we should be especially concerned with at this time. They are the fleahoppers, bollworms, and boll weevils. Fleahoppers knock off the very young squares while bollworms and boll weevils work primarily on the larger squares and bolls.

Probably the fleahopper will do the most damage for the next two or three weeks. They are already pretty well established in many fields, and should certainly increase under present weather conditions. This insect is especially destructive because it damages the small squares about the size of a pinhead and they cannot be seen when they fall to the ground. Careful field inspections for the insect itself is the only way to keep up this pest.

Bollworms are moving into the fields somewhat at the present time, but we hope the beneficial insects can control them without chemical aid. This is the critical time for bollworms, as they have moved into the fields about three weeks earlier than usual, because so much of the feed and corn has burned up. If the friendly insects can take care of the present threat, they will continue to protect your fields, but if we have to poison now to knock them out, we also destroy our beneficial insects, and usually have to follow up with more applications of poison. As long as there is a chance of the beneficial insects taking care of the bollworms without too much damage, let them do it. Insect infestation counts in each field will indicate which is winning the battle, the friendly insects or the destructive.

Boll weevils are rather heavily infesting many fields at the present time, while others have very few in them. Weather conditions have been ideal for weevil buildup lately and considerable damage is expected before the season is over, if they are not properly controlled. Control measures should begin when 25 per cent of the green squares are punctured with three or four applications of a weevil poison, applied at five day intervals.

For materials to use and the rate of application for the various insects, consult your Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in Texas for 1952. Demonstrations on how to take these insect infestation counts are being held each week. Visit the one nearest you for detailed information on keeping up with our insect pests and ask any questions you might have.

part of Lone Star's petition for a 25 year franchise to operate as a gas utility in the City of Burkburnett. Under the franchise, which would not be construed as exclusive, the company agrees to pay to the City two per cent of the gross receipts derived from the sale of gas to residential and commercial customers in Burkburnett. This would amount to approximately \$2,000 annually.

"Under the proposed rate revision," Mr. Bird said in discussing the application, "the increase per customer (family unit) would average \$8.95 annually or just about 2 1-2 cents per day."

The revised rate, amounting to a boost approximating 16 1-4 per cent, would bring Lone Star some \$13,700 additional gross revenues each year, Mr. Bird stated, but, he emphasized, almost \$7,300 of this amount would be absorbed by corresponding increases in taxes.

"Records show," he declared, "there has been no increase in Burkburnett's residential rate since the first gas franchise was granted to Clifford Moores on December 20, 1920." He pointed out that gas service rates and charges under the franchise shall be subject to revision and

change by the City or Company in the manner prescribed by law.

"Higher rates are needed at once if our standard of service is to be maintained," he continued. "But even now we want only the most essential and absolutely minimum increase we can possibly get along with under present conditions, still being optimistic that before long there may be a turn in the trend of our costs."

The rate schedule proposed under the new franchise is as follows:

First 600 cubic feet, Gross \$0.17 per 100 cubic feet; Net, \$0.153 per 100 cubic feet. All over 600 cubic feet, Gross, .7833 per 1,000 cubic feet; Net, .705 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The company does not propose to increase the \$1.00 minimum monthly bill charge. The net rate shall apply to bills paid within ten days from the date of the monthly billing.

The present rate schedule

Gross monthly rate:

\$0.75 per thousand for first 25,000 cubic feet.

.65 per thousand for next 25,000 cubic feet.

.55 per thousand for next 25,000 cubic feet.

.45 per thousand for next 25,000 cubic feet.

.40 per thousand cubic feet for all additional gas.

No bill shall be rendered under this schedule for an amount less than \$1.00 net. A ten per cent discount is allowed on gross bills paid within ten days from date of monthly billing.

Mr. Bird said Lone Star was chartered by the State of Texas in 1909 and now serves more than 600,000 customers in 385 cities and towns in Texas and Oklahoma. He stated that rate revisions similar to the Burkburnett schedule are now being sought throughout the gas company's operating territory.

"The additional revenue," he declared, "is required to meet losses in net income due to increased taxes, costs of gas in the field, rising costs for exploration and development, wages and salaries and numerous other items. I believe our customers as well as regulatory bodies will understand our situation, because all businesses
