

board of directors, Mr. Pierson was born in Has-kell September 18, 1895. He was reared here and graduated from Haskell High School with the class of 1915. He later completed his education at Simmons College Abilene.

In March of 1920, Mr. Pierson who had been ranching in Stonewall County, went to work in the Haskell National Bank and advanced from bookkeeper to cashier, then to vice-president and finally to president of the bank, as his mother and father

before him had been. The Haskell National is the oldest bank in the county, the first one chartered and has been in the latter years the only bank in town. It has had only three presidents during this 75-plus years of life. All have been named Pierson.


M. S. Pierson, the father of A. C., founded the bank and was its president until his death in 1909, Mrs. M. S. Pierson succeeded her husband as president, serving in that capacity until her retirement in 1947. The son, A. C., assumed the title from his mother.

## Time for Action


A concentrated attack on costly and thoughtless federal fiscal policies was delivered on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives by Congressman Wendell Wyaff of Oregon. He pointed out that, since 1960, the U.S. population has grown 10 per cent: total federal spending has increased 83 per cent; non-defense spending has increased 97 per cent; the number of federal em- ed a family reunion of sisters ployees has increased 25 per cent; the cost for federal payrolls and brothers of Mrs. Bledsoe, has increased 75 per cent and the federal government has rolled-up a deficit of \$50 billion. Congressman Wyatt stated that if the government does not return to a financially desponsible outlook immediately we could easily have a \$300 billion annual budget at the taxpayers' expense.

## Economy Is Not A Bad Word

All over the nation, states are struggling with the problem of bringing their budgets within their income. The alternative is more debt unless higher taxes are to be levied, and the people are emphatically opposing increased taxes, During boom years, tax receipts have been high and public money has been spent like water. Now, as the boom has been "cooled," it becomes a case of debt, economy or higher taxes.

The federal government is in the same position, but according to official statements there will be little or no easing of domestic social expenditures in the face of mounting war costs. So, get roady for more debt, higher taxes or both, and more inflation.

Nothing has been said about what will happen when the tax consumers outnumber the tax earners. With economy out the window one wonders if the countries we have aided will have a foreign aid program for us




