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Civil Defense School Begins Here Monday

John Kimbrough, Haskell City and County Civil Defense Director, announced that a Civil Defense School for residents of the county will be held in the District Courtroom, Haskell, on the nights of June 12, 13, 15, 16 and 19, at 8:00 o'clock.

A look at the calendar reveals the school will get underway next Monday evening. It will be held again on Tuesday night, skip over Wednesday night, then will be in session on Thursday and Friday nights, skip Saturday and Sunday evenings, and close-out Monday night, June 19th.

Purpose of the school will be to teach those attending how to operate all equipment to gauge the amount of fall-out in atmosphere, on the ground and in buildings.

The school will be conducted by a team headed by Major Lewis E. Johnson of Fort Bliss. It is a 16-hour course and every man and wife team completing the school of instruction will be furnished the necessary equipment to be placed in their homes. Equipment will be kept in working order and once each year will be completely replaced, Mr. Kimbrough said.

"The civil defense course is open to everyone in the county but we would especially like to have a man and wife team attending the school in order that they might work as a team during the year on the civil defense project," Kimbrough pointed out.

The school will be limited to 35 persons. Several have already signed to take the course. Those interested should contact Mr. Kimbrough immediately.

Should more than 35 persons sign up for the course, another school will be held at a later date for their convenience.

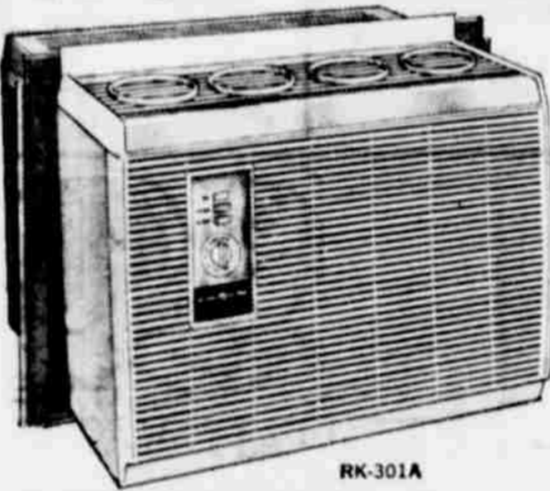

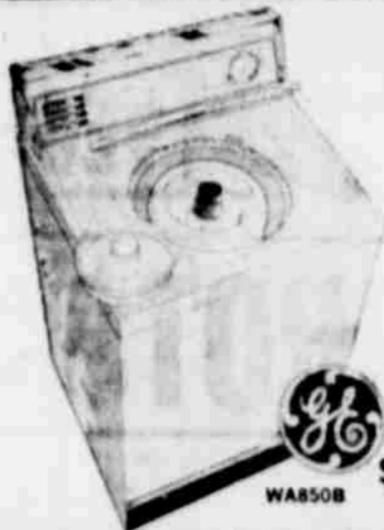

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TRAFFIC SAFETY BILLS PASS TEXAS LEGISLATURE

The Texas Legislature has given Lone Star motorists a set of traffic laws designed to help check the state's escalating traffic accident rate. Strengthened driver license provisions, more complete vehicle inspection requirements plus statewide expansion of the driver education program and study of the medical aspects of traffic safety are all a part of the newly enacted legislation.

The new drivers license law provides for the issuance of licenses at age 16 to teenagers who have completed approved driver education courses, or who present a certificate from their superintendent of schools showing that driver education is not taught in their school. This exception will apply only until June 1, 1969, and is designed to permit schools to gear up for a vastly expanded driver education program.

The minimum age for teens without driver education will be 15. However, operators of motorcycles or motorcycles with five-horsepower or less may be licensed at age 15. The minimum age for chauffeur and commercial licenses will be 17.

For the first time in Texas, all motorcycle operators will be required to have a drivers license and all persons will be required to pass a driving test in the type of vehicle for which they will be licensed to operate. This provision includes trucks, tractor-trailers and motorcycles.

Vehicle Inspection

The present vehicle inspection law has been amended to provide for the inspection of a vehicle's steering system, seat belts, wheels and rims. The inspection fee is raised to \$1.75 to cover this addition to the list of items inspected.

Expansion of the driver education program in high school was assured with the appropriation of \$2 million. When this expansion is completed, all Texas teenagers should be able to take driver education prior to graduation from high school and qualify for licensing at age 16 instead of 18. The bill accomplishing this also designated the Governor as the one person responsible for preparing and administering a state-wide traffic safety program designed to reduce traffic accidents.

Commercial Schools Licensed

For the first time, commercial driver training schools and their instructors will be licensed by the state. This is an effort to bring all driver training schools up to the standards set by the State and Federal governments.

September 1, 1967, is the effective date of most of the traffic laws passed by the legislature. A law requiring all motorcycle riders to wear approved safety helmets will become effective January 1, 1968, and on that same date all motorcycle operators will be required to have a motorcycle operators license.

Six head of female Brangus, owned and raised by Justin Pueschel, of Haskell, and Ervin Pueschel of Stamford, brought the highest and second highest prices at the Texas Brangus female sale held at Sealy, Texas last week, bringing \$590 and \$570 respectively.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Elmore and family, of Levelland, accompanied the Pueschels to Sealy.

Some 100 cattle were sold during the sale, Pueschel said. Prior to the day of the sale, members of the Brangus Association toured several ranches in the vicinity.

Iron Chlorosis Showing Up In Many Lawns

Iron chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants throughout the state. Symptoms, according to County Agent R. W. Schumann, are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them, adds the county agent. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions. In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. The county agent says the spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if the yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just inside the spread of the branches. A five-foot tall shrub requires about a fourth of a pound. A tree should have three-

fourths of a pound for each inch of trunk diameter. In the case of highly alkaline soil, the foliar spray is more effective than soil application, says Schumann.

Close growing plants such as grass should receive an application of four pounds per 1,000 square feet. Any soil application should be watered immediately, says the county agent.

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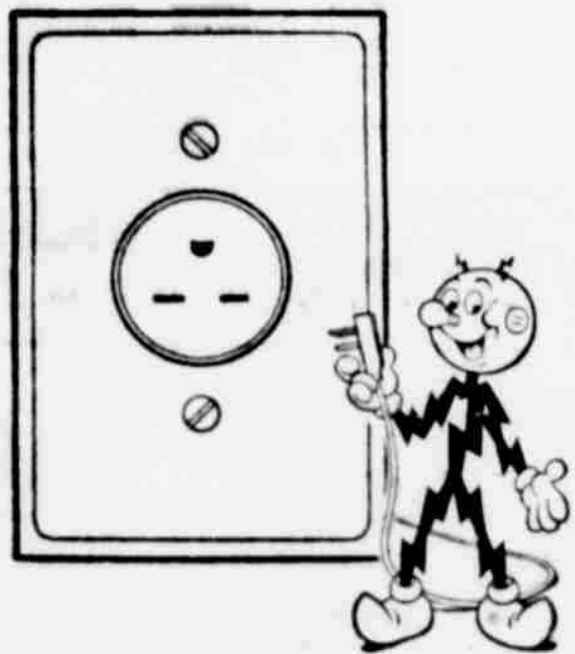
AT THE CROSSROADS

Haskell can no longer look to the rural area of the county for population growth, nor can Haskell County expect in the future to attract any more rural people than are now employed.

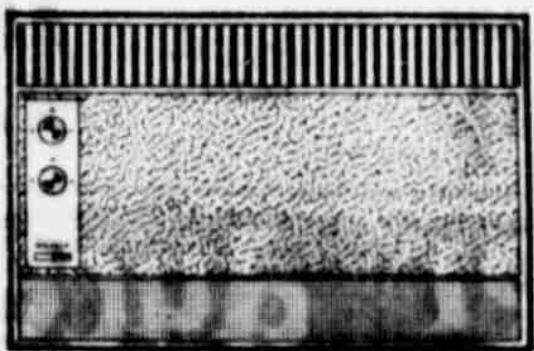

Why pay rent, when you can buy out of the Pierson Ranch from 100 to 320 acres of improved or unimproved land at from \$20.00 to \$35.00 per acre, one-fourth cash, balance 60 to 100 years at 8 per cent interest.

On last Tuesday the first business house ever erected on the north side of the square in Haskell was moved away to make room for a modern two-story brick building to be erected by the Old Fellows. As this, almost the landmark of the primitive town, was moved away, the Free Press Editor and Mr. F. C. Wilfong got into a reminiscent mood and talked of the incidents of 1884-5, when this little box house, 18x24 feet, was the most pretentious business house in town. It was erected in 1884 by Wm. Harvey, a rather dignified, old-fashioned farmer who had come west to make his fortune. When the house was completed Mr. D. M. Winn was put in charge with a stock of drygoods, high-heeled boots, fine Stetson hats, woolen blankets, men's suits. The only well on or about the square was sunk in front of the building, and served to attract the thirsty who drank anything as mild as water. All the ranchmen and cowboys in Haskell, Stonewall, Knox and King counties came to Haskell to buy their clothing, blankets, whiskey, ammunition and ranch supplies.

The Good Earth

Mr. and Mrs. Abeldt (Vance and Sylvia) have a rather newly established yard, but my, what they have done in so short a time.

Mr. Abeldt finds many hours of relaxation in his garden. Sylvia readily admits that her husband is the gardener, but she takes great pride in his accomplishments.

An emerald green lawn is given privacy by a hedge of Euonymus Japonica. Two plum trees, a Sapa and Santa Rosa, add beauty as well as profit to the front yard. Mr. Abeldt picks

ed his first large plum the evening I visited the garden. The fruit of the Santa Rosa plum is larger than golf balls and are a bright, glowing red. The Sapa plum hasn't come into production yet.

Dwarf pyramidal juniper flank each end of the entrance walkway, a red Barberry hedge runs between the two shrubs. As one steps upon the porch they are treated to a pretty picture of a planter box filled with portulaca of many hues.

Green barberry, roses, golden bell forsythia and pink flowering almond march across the front of the house. The rose, a Curly Pink Brownell, is a grandiflora and was completely covered in blossoms this spring. Sylvia said there were were nearly a hundred blossoms on the bush at one time.

The bush has budded all over for another grand display in June. It is a monthly bloomer.

Grandiflora roses have tea rose size blossoms, but bloom in clusters like a Floribunda. Nandina, rose colored Froebel Spirea, a fig tree and roses grow along the east wall.

The back yard is planted for beauty as well as profit. Mr. Abeldt has enclosed the back with a Red Robin rose hedge. Each month these roses are a blaze of color.

A dwarf Golden Delicious and a dwarf Red Delicious apple tree, not over four feet tall, has more fruit on them than I have ever seen on a tree in my entire life. So thick was the fruit, that grows in clusters of three, one could hardly see the foliage. The Red Delicious apples, although still small, about the

size of golf balls, already had a red blush to their cheeks. So amazing is it to find so much fruit on two small trees one just stops and drinks in the picture for a minute or two; they are truly a conversation piece.

Apricot, peach, pear, cherry and pecan trees make up the rest of the orchard. A dewberry patch, hanging thick with luscious red, green and black berries, is like a framed picture against the Red Robin rose hedge fence. Strawberry plants were still producing large red, mouth watering berries. There is also a large vegetable garden with long rows of tomatoes staked to prevent the fruit from touching the ground.

A lovely All Red plum tree, with purplish red foliage, attracts one's attention as they round the house and enter the

west yard. Mimosa, red and purple pampas grass and roses share the limelight. There is also a Pittisporium, this shrub is rare in this part of the state as it isn't very hardy. Mr. Abeldt has been fortunate enough to keep his from freezing out.

We can say the gardener who can get that are as beautiful as the yard of Mr. Abeldt. They, like many, like to see a good need it.

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
