Tom Yates and Floyd Patton have filed for re-election.

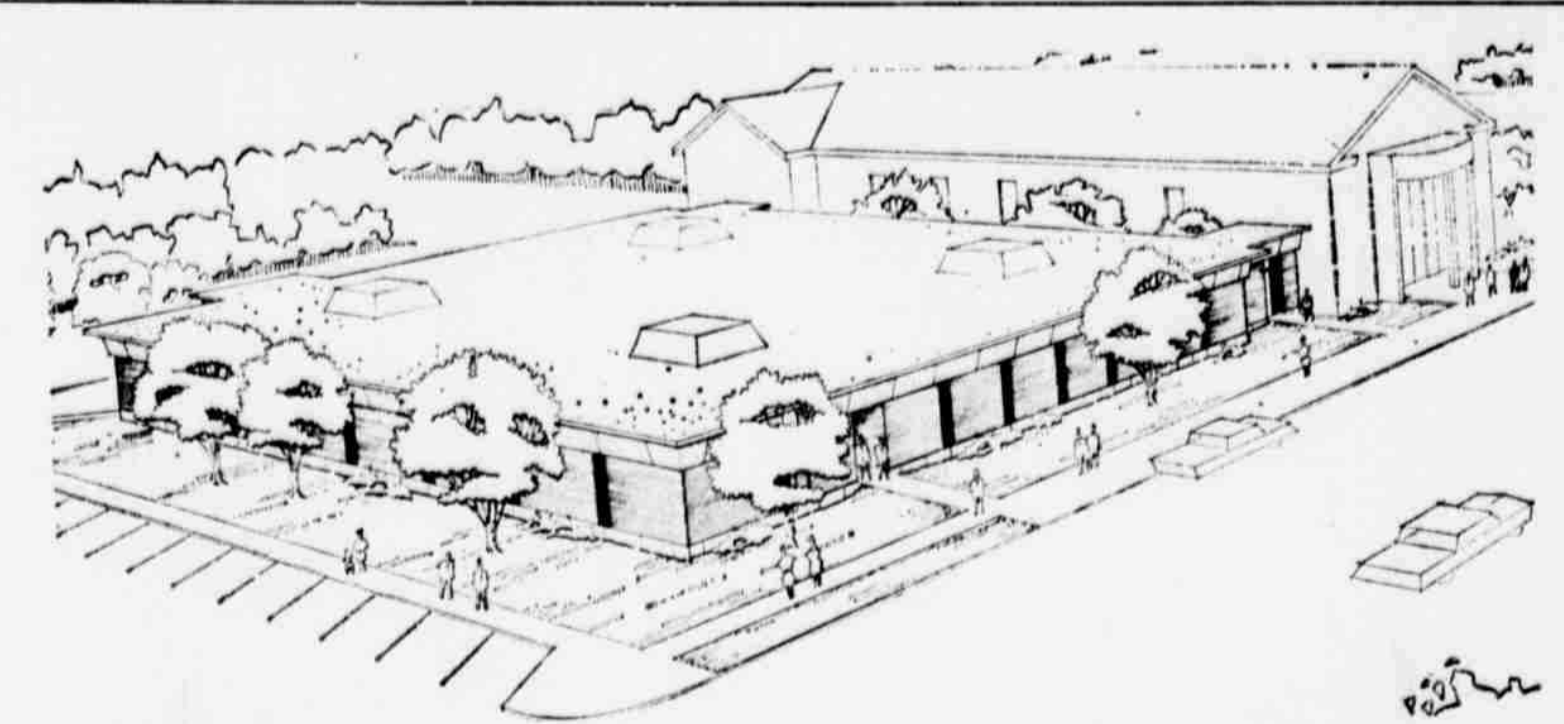

Architect's Concept of Proposed First Baptist Church Education Building

Shown is the Architect's concept of the proposed "Education Building" for the First Baptist Church of Haskell. The probable estimated cost is set at \$200,000. The new structure will replace two existing buildings—one a residential-type structure which had served as administrative, kitchen and classroom facilities, and the old sanctuary.

The First Baptist Church of Haskell was organized September 8, 1888, with 19 members.

The church now has a resident membership of 1,943 and operates two local missions. The first building was built in 1892 at a cost of \$2,500.00. The old sanctuary, now converted into three stories of educational classrooms, was built in 1916. The present auditorium was constructed in 1952 at a cost of \$150,000.00. Troy Culpepper is pastor; R. C. Couch, Jr., is chairman of the plans committee; Carl Bailey is chairman of the building committee, and J. C. Yeary, Jr., serves as Sunday school superintendent.

The new structure will encompass 15,200 square feet of space on one level and attach to the existing sanctuary in two locations. This provides a completely enclosed church complex. The new building will contain 36 classrooms, 16 of which convert into a 200-seat banquet hall.

Also provided are new administrative areas, kitchen facilities, and a small meeting or chapel area to seat 100-plus, designed to meet present and future requirements.

The structure was designed on a multi-use space concept, with a minimum budget in mind. It will have year-round air conditioning, be fire rated and relatively maintenance-free.

The architect is Grady R. Cozby, Jr., Abilene.

Heart Fund Campaign In "Full Swing"

A county-wide meeting of Heart Fund Campaign workers was held at the Haskell Chamber of Commerce Office Wednesday night, February 12th, for the purpose of officially getting the drive for funds underway.

Mrs. Paul (Joyce) Cargill of Wichita Falls, Regional Director of the Texas Heart Association, gave a report on the accomplishments of the Heart Association, and told of a meeting she had attended in San Antonio where she heard Dr. Coolidge, of Houston, give a report on how the diseases of the heart is the largest single cause of death in the United States, taking the lives of more than 500,000 persons each year.

Mrs. Cargill pointed out that the Heart Association is helping massive heart research programs.

The 1969 Heart Fund Campaign in Haskell County was officially "kicked-off" Monday, February 17th, and a "Heart Sunday" residential appeal is scheduled from Sunday, February 23rd to 24th.

In the Heart Sunday effort, which is the high point of the campaign, approximately fifty volunteers will visit their neighborhoods to distribute heart-saving information and to receive Heart Fund contributions.

The Haskell High School Homemaking young ladies will assist with the fund drive.

The Haskell County Heart Association has set a goal of \$2500. Officers of the county organization include Bob Beauchamp, president; T. C. Walker, vice-president; Abe Turner, finance chairman; Mrs. Harlan Weinert, secretary, and Nettie McCollum, treasurer.

Strickland Named Outstanding Farmer At Chamber Banquet

Despite two days of rain and mist more than 250 persons attended the thirty-third annual Haskell Chamber of Commerce Banquet held Friday evening in the Elementary School Cafeteria to hear Dr. Travis A. White, president of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, speak.

Dr. White, for 13 years head of Midwestern University, filled his address, "Citizen of the U. S. A."

Stressing citizenship and fulfillment of our "Christian Democracy," he said, "We must have faith in the capacity of modern man... the common man is willing to do an honest day's work... and man has a desire to excel."

He pointed out that man is of the highest order in the universe... "and has the capacity to live by high moral ideas... and to put general good before his own selfishness."

Dr. White noted two threats in our communities. One threat he said is "unmoral liberty." "We must assume responsibility and put to work the idea of citizenship."

He said the second threat was "misuse of liberty."

"I believe that the greatest enemies America has are not outside the boundaries but are those who destroy the liberties we possess. Those who misuse liberty are those who miss the chance to do something about misuse of liberties."

He concluded with this quote from Webster: "Whatever makes good men, makes good Christians."

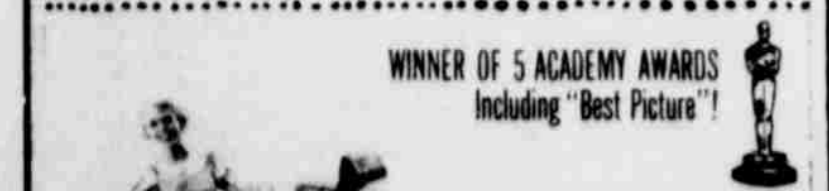

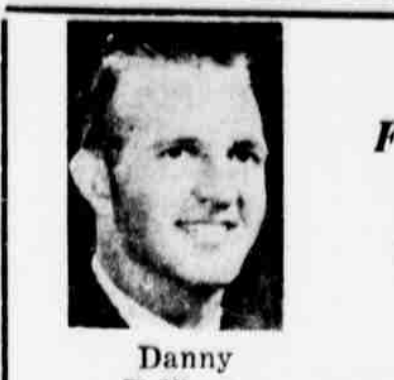

40 YEARS AGO (February 21, 1929)

There was prevailing drought over Texas in the years of 1886 and '87.

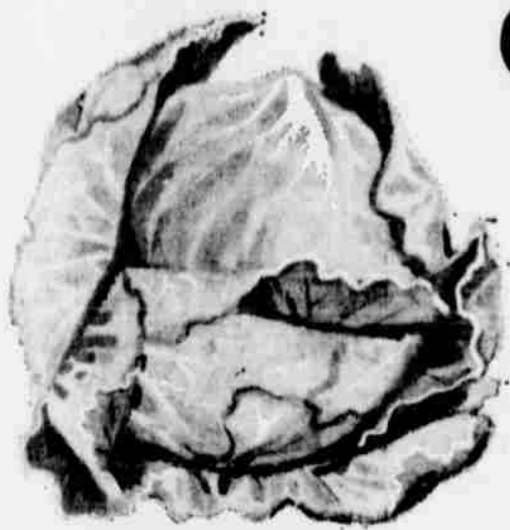

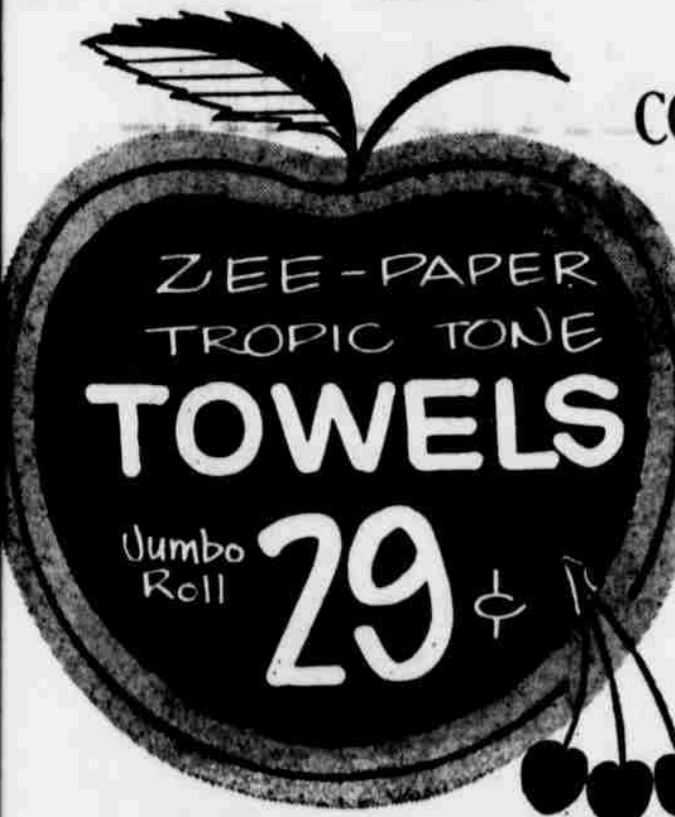

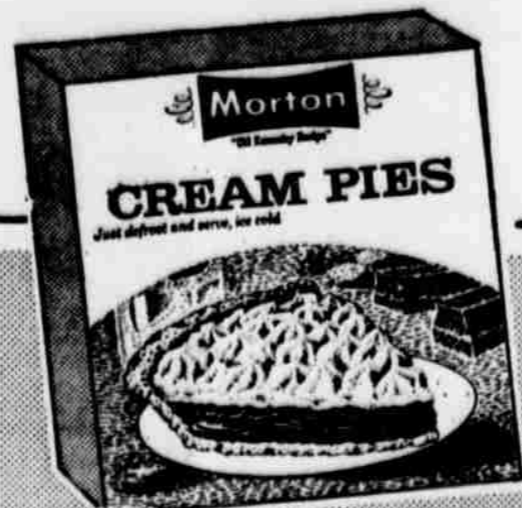
