OIL FIND GOOD IN HASKELL COUNTY

The drillers who are drilling the well on the Colbert ranch in this county, 13 miles south east of Haskell, struck a flow of gas Thursday, March 26 at a depth of 1820 feet. The well was immediately capped. There was an 80 foot cave in below the casing, and the salt water was mixed with the gas. Tuesday morning, when the well was uncapped it began to flow oil and salt water. The drillers will ream out and lower the casing, and when this is done experts expect an oil gusher. Stamford parties are drilling several wells in Haskell county.

There is the greatest confidence expressed by oil experts,

that this whole section is underlaid with oil and gas, and a rumor is current that in less than two weeks drilling will begin near the city of Haskell.

Hundreds of farmers and oil prospectors have visited the wells being drilled, and if the Scott well is brought in as is being expected, there is going to be something doing in this old town. The Scott well is now in the oil sands and if it is located right, has every prospect of being a gusher. If it is a failure, the people who are behind it will begin another, as they have plenty of money and the oil indications are strong enough to generate the faith necessary to make them spend it.

BETTER PUBLIC ROADS NEEDED

Hon. Homer D. Wade has kindly sent the Free Press a copy of the report made to the commissioners court of Jones county, by Prof. R. J. Potts, Road expert of the A & M College, after driving over the roads. We have not space to print the voluminous report, but will reproduce some of his observations for the benefit of public road building in Haskell county.

He condemned the slip scraper as expensive and it also makes a bumpy road. Some of the grades were too narrow or too wide, and in some places where clay had been used, the bed was so low the sand had recovered the road. He said the neglect of the drag was the greatest fault. His whole recommendation is summed up by him as follows:

"Let the people along every road in the county give assurance, through the overseers, to the commissioners court, that if the county will furnish a drag, they will drag every mile of road that the county will grade, and that they will drag it after every rain; then let the county provide the drags and concrete, and repair culverts and bridges." "The road bed should be from 28 to 32 feet wide, and should be crowned 8 to 13 inches in the center, and sticky or black soil, 12 to 18 inches."

Prof. Potts puts great stress on the drag and the fact that the overseers should do this work, and only warns out a few hands at a time.

Manufacturers who brand their products with their name or trademark, and then spend large sums of money advertising them, have to keep up quality to protect their names and their investments in advertising, whereas manufacturers of unbranded, unadvertised products have neither name nor publicity investments to protect, and can therefore well afford to slight quality at the expense of those consumers who do not acquaint themselves with the facts in the case and accept goods of the "glitter" variety simply because they look good.

Sam Sparks has withdrawn from the race for Governor. He said he had a good organization and could win the nomination, but that several of the leaders who helped to call the convention had declared they would not support him if he won the nomination, and that he did not care to lead his friends to defeat, a thing he never had done. There is talk now of calling off the Fort Worth Convention, and giving the anti support to Jim Ferguson. Ferguson is the best man in the anti ranks, and would no doubt make a good Governor if he can defeat Tom Ball, but the way things look now Ball's bunch is better organized than the other side. There is some talk of Colquitt running for a third term and the Governor is saying nothing. It will be too much to

expect the "Colonels" as Home and State calls the Colquitt bunch, to turn the leadership over to an outside independent man like Ferguson. The old Guard are a rule or ruin bunch, and they are likely to prove it this year. It looks like the more the anti eliminate the farther apart they get. Ferguson has a strong following and they are stayers. If the race is to be between Ferguson and Ball, it will be clean and dignified and either one can take defeat like men. There is one thing certain, either of them will go into office free to give a statesman like administration, independent of any coterie of politicians.

Recent investigations of the management of the public service corporations, such as railway companies, has shown that the boards of directors are taking all the revenues by trades with subsidiary corporations, owned by the boards of directors. The stock holders have robbed and fleeced and the public have been swindled out of billions of dollars. Such swindling operations is what has made the many multi-millionaires in the financial centers. The people are coming to believe in government ownership as the only remedy. Some day the innocent public will wake up to the fact they have been fleeced. Every Texas railroad company is bankrupt. The road bed and rolling stock has run down to provide graft for the big financiers, and it is dangerous to travel. Time is vindicating the doctrine of state ownership of public utilities. Mr. Bryan's Madison Square Garden speech, "has become the head of the corner," of progressive statesmanship. 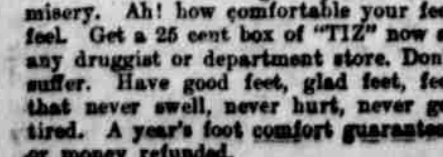
