

Sales tax holiday to be held Aug. 8-10

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Fri., Sat. and Sun., Aug. 8 -10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the back-to-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."

Cut the line on scammers posing as IRS employees

If there's an issue with your federal taxes, you'll initially receive a letter or notice in the mail from the IRS. Don't fall for scam artists on the internet or over the telephone. Real IRS employees have badge numbers. Ask the caller for his or her badge number, owe taxes or have no reason and then call 1-800-829-1040 to confirm it. Sometimes the caller may brazenly volunteer a fake badge number before you even ask for one.

In many cases, the caller becomes aggressive and insulting. Victims may be told they owe money to the IRS. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they may by this scam, you should be threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's

"These crooks make detailed efforts to try and scam you out of divulging personal informationincluding checking account aware that there are other numbers and other types of bank account information," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas. "Don't fall victim to these misleading attempts to hard-earned cash."

•Scammers may be able to recite the last four digits number.

•Scammers spoof the IRS toll-free number on caller ID to make it appear that it's the IRS calling.

•Scammers sometimes send bogus IRS emails to some victims to support their bogus calls.

• Victims background noise of other for PINs, passwords or mimic a call site.

local police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS, here's what you should do:

•If you know you owe taxes or you think you might owe taxes, call the IRS at 1-800-829-1040. The IRS employees on that line can help you with a payment issue-if there really is such an issue.

•If you know you don't to think that you owe any taxes (for example, you've never received a bill or the caller made some bogus threats as described above), then call and report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-366-4484.


•If you've been targeted also contact the Federal Trade Commission and use their "FTC Complaint Assistant" at FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments of your complaint.

Taxpayers should be unrelated scams (such as a lottery sweepstakes) and solicitations (such as debt relief) that fraudulently claim to be from the IRS.

"It doesn't have to be steal your identity and tax season to fall prey to one of these scams-Other characteristics of unfortunately, they happen during other times of year as well," Sanford added. "To be safe-always be alert of a victim's Social Security to phone and email scams that use the IRS as a lure."

The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels. h e a r The IRS also does not ask calls being conducted to similar confidential access information for credit card, • After threatening bank or other financial victims with jail time or accounts. Recipients driver's license revocation, should not open any scammers hang up and attachments or click on others soon call back any links contained in the pretending to be from the message. Instead, forward the e-mail to phishing@ irs.gov.



Heart Disease:

Illness prompts investigation

A recent surge in reports of illnesses due to the parasite Cyclospora has prompted the Texas Department of State Health Services to begin an investigation into the infections in hopes of determining a common source. DSHS has received reports of 77 Cyclosporiasis cases from around Texas this year, including 69 in the last month. The department is collaborating with local health departments to gather information and identify the cause.

Last year, Texas had 351 cases, more than any other state. In most previous years, the number of cases reported was in the single or low double digits.

Cyclosporiasis is an intestinal illness caused by consuming food or water contaminated with the Cyclospora parasite. The major symptom is watery diarrhea lasting a few days to a few months. Additional symptoms may include loss of appetite, fatigue, weight loss, abdominal cramps, bloating, increased gas, nausea, vomiting and a low fever. Symptoms may come and go multiple times over a period of weeks.

People who think they may have a Cyclospora infection should contact their health care provider. DSHS encourages health care providers to test patients for Cyclospora if they have diarrheal illness lasting more than a few days or diarrhea accompanied by a severe loss of appetite or fatigue. Cases should be reported promptly.

DSHS recommends thoroughly washing fresh produce, but that may not entirely eliminate the risk because Cyclospora can be difficult to wash off. Cooking will kill the parasite.

Although no common exposure source has been identified yet, past outbreaks in the United States have been associated with imported fresh produce, including pre-packaged salad mix, raspberries, basil, snow peas and mesclun greens. A 2013 outbreak in Texas was linked, at least in part, to fresh cilantro from Puebla, Mexico.



Farmers reminded of 2014 **Farm Bill Conservation** compliance changes by USDA

2014 Farm Bill require them to have on file a Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification (AD-1026). The Farm Bill relinked highly erodible land conservation and wetland conservation compliance with eligibility for premium support paid under the federal crop insurance program.

"It's important that farmers and ranchers taking the right steps to conserve valuable farm and natural resources have completed AD-1026 forms on file at Agency (FSA) office," said Vilsack. "This will ensure they remain eligible for crop insurance support."

For farmers to be eligible for premium support on their federal crop insurance, a completed and signed AD-1026 form must be on file with the FSA. Since many FSA and Natural Resource Conservation (NRCS) programs have A listing of service center farmbill. this requirement, most producers should already have an AD-1026 on file. If producers have not filed, they must do so by June 1,

When a farmer completes the AD-1026, FSA and NRCS staff will outline any additional actions that may be required for compliance with the provisions. The Risk Management Agency, through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), manages the federal crop insurance program that provides the modern farm safety net for American farmers and ranchers.

Since enactment of the 1985 Farm Bill, eligibility for most commodity, disaster and conservation programs has been linked to compliance with the highly erodible land conservation and wetland conservation
