### Munday Man Is Victim Of Hit And Run


The body of David Chandler, 29, of Munday, was found Sunday around 11:45 p, m. in the middle of U. S. Highway 277 about one mile north of Haskell.







Many of them seem to feel that business does not offer a challenge, that it is boring. One typical view being, "Business isn't where action is." Commenting on this, a wellknown industrialist, F. Rockwell, Jr., observes: "Youth says that it doesn't like the competitive nature of business life. Somebody needs to tell these young people that 'challenge' and 'competition' go together by definition of the words themselves. And perhaps we all need to do a better job of telling youth about the tremendous contributions to a healthy and dynamic society made by business every day of our lives." 




