grass-roots organization of farmers and ranches which represents agriculture at the county courthouse, in Austin and in Washington, D.C. by voluntary dues," the proclamation reads, "Across the nation, the organization has 3.5 million members in 217 organized counties, Farm Bureau, which has 1038 members.
