

Letter to the Editor:

Is this happening in your community?

Due to recent circumstances in our rural community, Archer City, Texas, our attention has been drawn to the questionable sanctions imposed upon the doctors of rural areas, in particular, by the Texas Medical Foundation's Peer Review Organization. The criteria set down by this organization is so stringent that no physician could possibly be in compliance with all aspects included.

These sanctions in many cases will result in the closing of many rural hospitals, leaving a large percentage of our population without immediate medical care.

I am interested in finding out how many other communities share our same problems.

Only by cooperation of all Texans and their legislators can something be done to rectify this situation. Many of the legislators are aware of the problem and are investigating the workings of the Federally Funded Texas Medical Foundaiton.

Due to the stigma this imposes upon the physician the public is not always aware of the situation until it is too late.

We're fighting for our

doctor, R.D. Schlomac, M.D. and our hospital, Archer County Hospital. I hope you will be equally as concerned because this could also be pertinent to you, your

physician, and your hospital. The number of hospitals closed January 1, 1986 through December 31, 1986 is 25. A large number of Texas doctors have been sanctioned and many more are waiting official sanctions. If the hospital or hospitals in your county and or town are presently being threatened, or any of the doctors county and or town are presently being threatened or any of the doctors are being investigated and or sanctioned I would like to hear from you.

This letter could be written about "Your Doctor and Your Hospital," so please let your voice be heard by writing your legislators in both Texas and Washington along with letters to:

Lilly was born in Throckmorton, Texas, and lived there until his family moved to Pendleton, Oregon for his senior year in high school. He was an Oregon All-Stater in football and basketball. He was recruited by the Texas Christian University on a football scholarship and earned All-American honors. Selection to the Kodak Coaches' All American Team included a 35 mm camera

He was drafted by the Dallas Cowboys and during his 14 years with the Cowboys earned All-Pro honors seven times and played in 11 Pro All-Star Games. He is listed on the Ring of Honor in Texas Stadium.

Lilly retired from the Dallas Cowboys in 1975 and moved to Waco. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August of 1980, the first Dallas Cowboy to be so honored.

In December 1981 Lilly was inducted into the College National Hall of

Lilly's first major display of his photography was in his book "Reflections", which depicts photos of his former Cowboy teammates.

Lilly recently opened a photo gallery in Old Mesilla, the "old town" area of Las Cruces, N.M. Lilly and his wife, Ann, are the parents of four children and they currently live in Las Cruces.



Irish Brown Soda Bread

Everybody wants to be Irish on St. Patrick's Day. Break this bread with your friends on the 17th.

3 cups whole wheat flour 1 tbsp. sugar 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose 1 tbsp. soft margarine flour 1 1/2 -1 2/3 cups buttermilk 1 tsp. baking soda

Measure the whole wheat flour into a large mixing bowl. Sift together the all-purpose flour, baking soda and sugar, and mix into the whole wheat flour. Cream in the margarine.

Add buttermilk a small amount at a time until the dough is soft but

Form dough into a ball, and knead in the bowl for 15 to 20 seconds. Place on a lightly greased baking sheet and flatten with the palm of the hand into a circle about 1 1/2 inches thick. Cut a cross on the top to prevent cracking during baking.

Bake at 425 degrees Fahrenheit for 25 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 15 minutes longer.

Cool on a wire rack, then seal tightly in a plastic bag. To serve, slice about 1/4-inch thick (slices best 24 hours after baking). Yield: 1 Round Loaf (20 slices)



Fat-The Good, the bad and the ugly

Americans are getting their kicks out of health these days and fat is a dirty word. Before you go around kicking the fat, however, it's wise to bone up on the fat facts.




